# Cisco JC To Play Tyler JC Here

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, who lost a hard-fought football conference game to Tyler JC here last Saturday night, will meet Navarro County JC of Corsicana in a conference contest at Chesley Field in Cisco at 3 p.m. Saturday. The game will be the climax of the annual homecoming activities for CJC Ex-Students.

Tyler's Apaches scored twice in the final period on the passing of QB Ronnie Rittiman and the running of Fullback Cedric Jackson to score a come-from-behind 28-to-17 victory over Cisco. The Wranglers had led until midway in the final period.

Rodney Dolgener, sophomore Cisco defensive lineman from Fredericksburg, was probably lost for the season when he suffered a knee injury in the game. An ambulance took him to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital where x-rays showed a cartilage tear in his right knee area. Surgery was scheduled for Thursday by an Abilene specialist.

Both teams scored in the opening period. Tyler took the kickoff and, starting from their 37, used passes and runs to send Tailback Eric Sanders across for a score on their first possession. Chris White added the extra point.

The Wranglers came back to score on their first possession. Ezell Scott, running back from Irving, brought the kickoff back to Tyler's 46. QB David Dacus hit Wide Receiver Kevin Evans for 22 yards, and Diron Lintz then caught a 12 yard pass to the Tyler 5. Cisco drew a five-yard penalty and Running Back Randy Rowe plowed over to score. Eric Edwards converted to tie the score.

Late in the third quarter, Cisco got the ball on the Tyler 20 and, on 4th down, Edwards missed a field goal. On their next possession, Dacus passed to Running Back James Dixon who raced 73 yards for a touchdown. Edwards converted.

Both teams scored in the second period. The Wranglers scored after Defensive Back Andre Horton intercepted a Tyler pass, and ran to their 14. On 4th down, the Wranglers were still on the 14 with 10 yards to go, so Edwards went in and kicked a field goal.

Later in the period, the Wranglers were held for downs on the Tyler 46. Five plays later, Jackson went in to score and the extra point was made by White. Cisco had a 17-to-14 lead at halftime.

The third quarter was scoreless. Edwards missed a field goal from 45 yards early in the quarter.

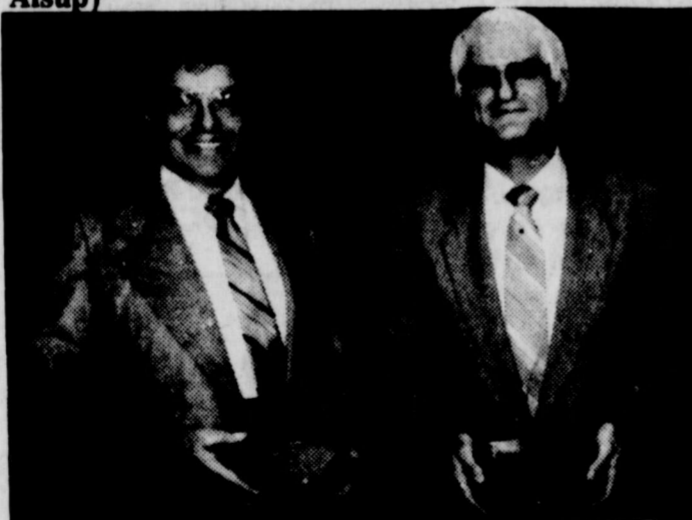

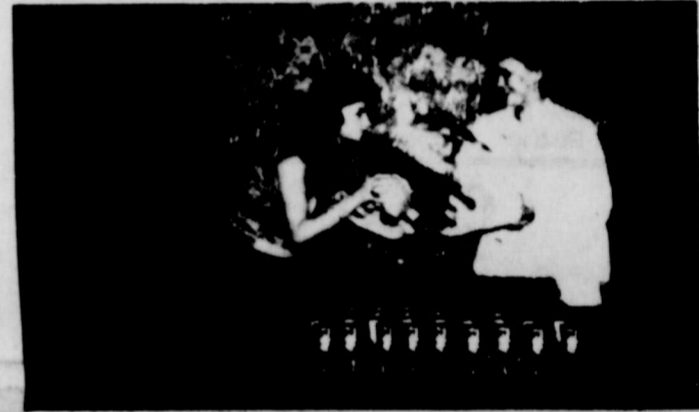
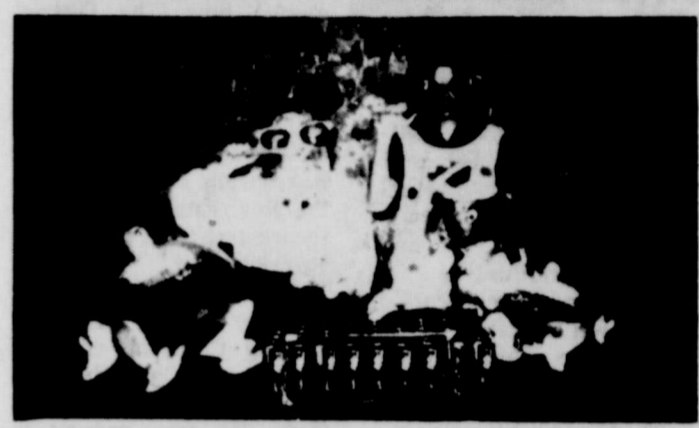
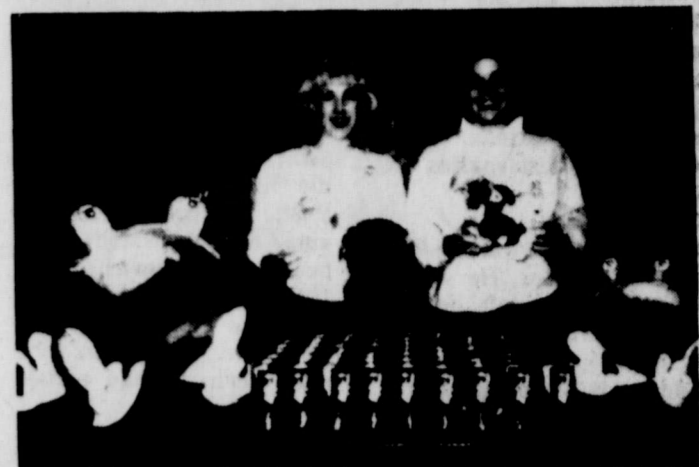
Phillip has held many offices, President and Vice-President of his club, President of the Jr. Leader Association and has been chosen Outstanding 4-H member for three years.

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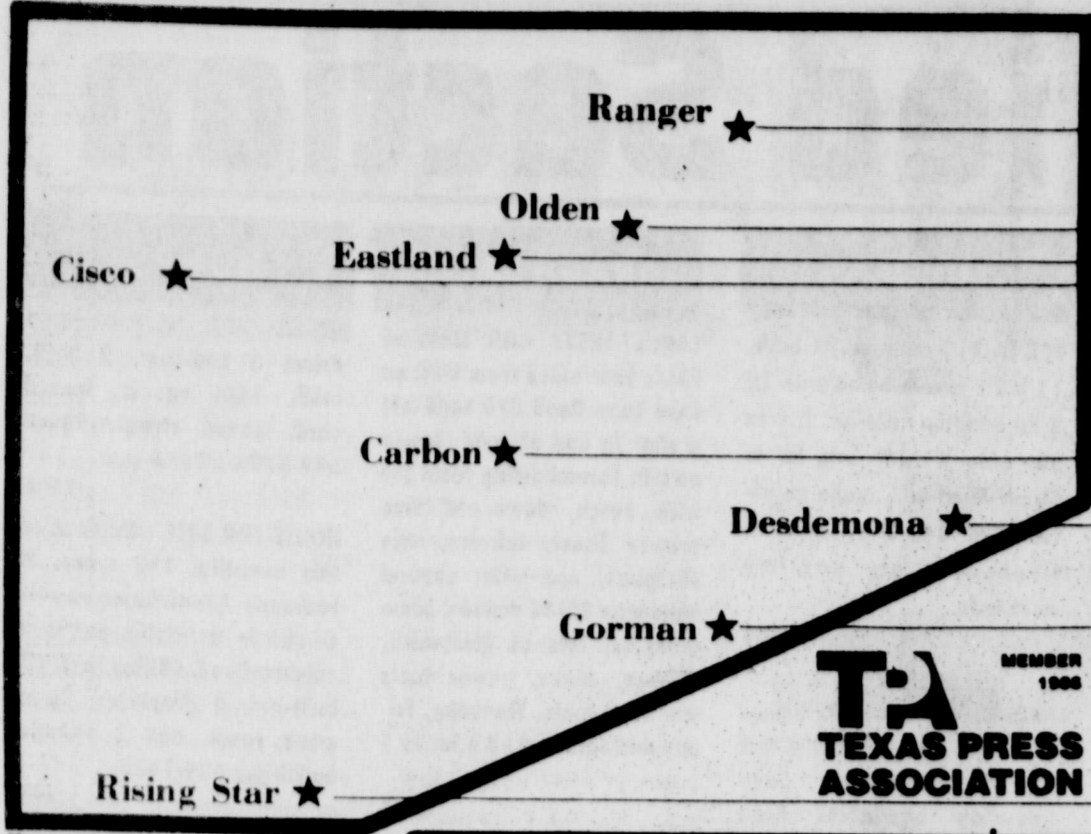

The football game will be Ranger vs. Cisco, and there ought to be plenty of excitement in that.

The framed artist print of roughnecks celebrating "Roaring Ranger" will be auctioned off at half-time of the Ranger High School Homecoming football game on Friday, Oct. 25. The proceeds will go to help support the Roaring Ranger Museum in the old depot. People from all over the United States stop to visit this museum, yet it is faced with the possibility of closing its doors due to lack of revenue. The pageant, which will be directed by Davene Jeffcoat, will be held at the Creative Arts Building at 10 a.m. on that date. This school is one of only nine in the state which has been invited to sing at the Fair.

The program was presented in Eastland on Monday, Oct. 20, at Gorman on Wednesday, Oct. 22, and will be presented at the Ranger Senior Citizens Center in the Joseph Hotel on Friday, Oct. 24. The program is highlighting vegetables such as squash, and will show news ways to prepare them.

The Eastland County Extension Homemakers Club members have made a red-white and blue Sesquicentennial quilt which will be given away at the Senior Citizens Bazaar on Friday, Nov. 7, during a drawing. The quilt is now on display in the County Extension Office. This beautiful object will be only one of the many crafts displayed during the Bazaar, which will be held Nov. 6 as

well as 7 in the Rebekah Lodge in Eastland.

The First Christian Church Choir of Ft. Worth, under the direction of Charles Duke, will present "Liberty", a musical presentation of freedom on Oct. 26 at the First Methodist Church. The program will begin at 5 p.m., and such numbers as "You're A Grand Old Flag," "When Johnny Comes Marching Home" and others will be presented. This church choir is considered a very fine one, and the evening should be memorable.

**CISCO**  
The Cisco City Council has granted approval to execute an option to purchase 23.94 acres of land near the landfill on the old airport tract. The land, owned by J.T. Cross, will cost \$25,000. The city will make application to a state agency to use it for landfill purposes. The present landfill will be full of trash and debris within a year, councilmen were told. State laws require all trash to be buried.

Curt Cover, local airplane owner and rancher, has discussed a plan with the City Council for him to take over operation of the Cisco Municipal airport. He said that Archie Brixey, who has been operating the airport for the past year, would remain and run an airplane engine shop. Councilmen said the matter would be discussed further at the next meeting.

Eris Ritchie, president of the Mobley-Hilton Board, reports that they are working on plans to solicit volunteers to keep the hotel

### Someone To Care

On a recent visit to The Rock House Springs facility, located south of Caldwell Motors, my first impression was that of a spacious suburban residence.

The earth-tones of the brick exterior flowed inside to the carpeting and pale beige walls. Comfortable furniture and bright accessories added to the relaxed feeling.

It was hard to realize that this was a group home for the very mildly disabled - a Level I House, in clinical language.

Dave Hulett, the director, was not inclined to dwell on this sort of description. A soft-voiced person, he left the impression of individual concern interwoven with strength.

"The home here was built for around 15 people," he said. "There are 15 presently residing here, ages 16 to 59. They stay here all the time, unless they are carried out for recreation or to go to church."

Various rooms, large and small, opened from the main hall beyond Hulett's office. I was wondering how any place with 15 residents plus personnel could be as tranquil as this appeared. All I could hear was the low hum of voices in the distance.

"Most of our residents are in the classroom," explained Hulett. "We spend a lot of the day here on academics, with short breaks between classes. Our recreation is usually at night. We are really sorry about the closing of the Majestic Theatre," he added. "The people here really enjoyed going out to the movies."

He mentioned that seven full-time workers were hired here with all doing some teaching or training. Either he or someone from the staff is in charge 24 hours each day.

A quick stop at the living room found individuals studying and a teacher assisting. A television set, various completed crafts and other items were about the room. The bedrooms beyond the group area were decorated according to individual tastes. Varicolored bedspreads, flowers and other things brightened the

surroundings. I finally found most of the residents - they were in a large classroom with several teachers. There didn't seem to be complaint from the students - they were digging into their lessons.

Back in Mr. Hulett's office he explained more about this home, which is owned by a private company but operates with a contract from the state. The company has a profit-sharing plan in operation for all employees, and operates with a low turnover of personnel.

Although new to Eastland, there are three Rock House Homes in Stephenville and two in Austin. The company operates on a basic Christian philosophy, Hulett said. This includes emphasis of the worth of each individual, and the concern as to the moral development of clients.

The homes provide services in the area of academic training, home maintenance, personal and social adjustment, and medical care, he said.

A pre-vocational program will begin immediately here, providing a service of shelling pecans for the public. This has worked out very well in the Stephenville homes. Charges of approximately .75 cents per pound will be made for this service. After the main shelling season other horticulture pursuits will be continued.

The state is getting away from huge, centralized schools for the retarded, he explained. The idea is for the residents to be as integrated into the community as possible. This facility was re-located in Eastland because this town was considered a desirable place for family-type living.

Hulett was familiar with Eastland, since he worked for Northview Development Center from 1980-82. At that time, however, he and his wife Kathe and their three children lived in Gordon, with him commuting. Now Kathe is a day LVN at Northview, and the family resides here.

Hulett's interests in the field of human services began as a young person in his home state of Missouri. A farm boy, he first planned to

be a minister in the Baptist Church. After he graduated from Southwest Baptist College at Bolivar, Mo., he was ordained and pastored several churches.

His life was beginning to change directions, however, into what he called "broader areas of ministry". In Missouri he worked in a Retirement Home Ministry, then began to work for those with mental disabilities.

After he left Northview in 1982, he took a position with the Rock House Springs facility in Stephenville. In 1985 he was named director of a similar home in Big Springs. Then the decision was made to move the home to Eastland - a wise move, he says.

The approximate 4,000 sq. ft. Eastland home was constructed with mostly local labor, and the clients moved in on August 1. They have found the people of the area helpful, Hulett said, and the company wants to support the local economy in ever was possible. Plans are to make local purchases of most food and all clothing for the residents.

"These residents will also attend the local churches of their choice. Transportation is somewhat a problem for that," the director added. "Bussing is needed for them to leave the premises."

His remark made me appreciate my own means of transportation waiting at the curb. But as I concluded my visit, I suddenly turned to Director Hulett.

"Do you need any volunteer programs here? Can the local people help you in ways other than church?"

"Yes, there is a way," he said slowly and seriously. "Some of the residents here have no families - no one to come to see them - no one to do those extra things that families think of."

"If a few volunteers could find it in their hearts to visit on a one-to-one basis - to show these people that they care, it would be wonderful."

"Someone to care." That thought kept on echoing, even after I drove away from The Rock House.

Today she is a living miracle of God's redeeming grace, a trophy of God's saving love and forgiveness.

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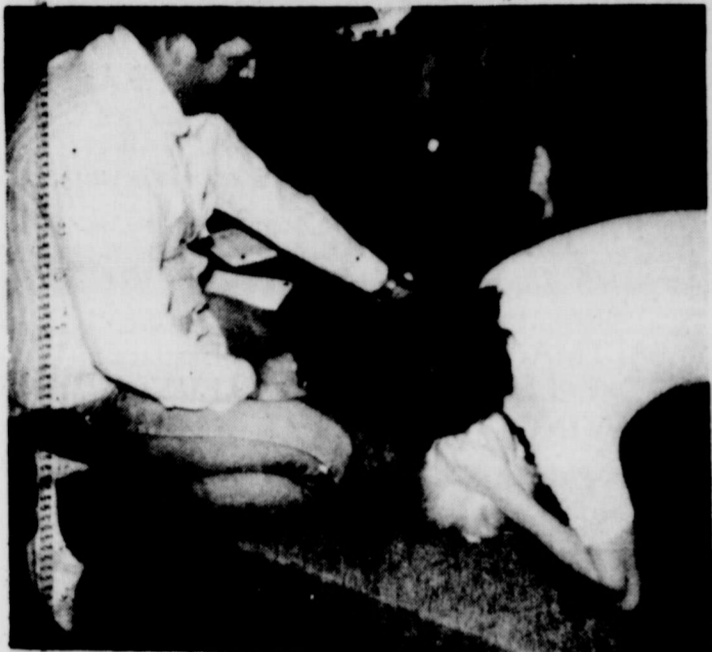

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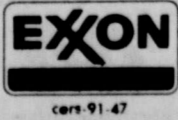

More time than not if you purchase bulk spools of monofilament, you are ruining most of your purchase. How? Improper storage. Manufacturers recommend monofilament be kept in a dark, dry, cool area. Light rays and heat deteriorate line very fast. So tell the wife to scoot that left over meatloaf over and place your line in the icebox, it could mean that one extra fish to win the tournament next time out. Good luck and good fishing. 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## FBI Announces Burglary Possibilities

The FBI has announced that, over a 10-year period, an average of one of every four residences throughout the Nation is likely to be burglarized, according to recently tabulated Uniform Crime Reporting probability figures. The data, based on the current residential burglary experience, show the chance is even greater over longer timeframes. For a 30-year period, the burglary probability exceeds an average of one of every two households.

The Nation's households have lost an estimated \$13 billion to burglars during the 1980. Residential burglaries reported to law enforcement totaled more than 13 million from 1980 to 1985, or 27

burglaries annually for every 1,000 households. The average loss per burglary was \$945.

Data concerning those offenses for which time of entry is known show more residential burglaries occur during the daylight hours than at night, and the average loss per break-in is higher for daytime occurrences.

Household burglaries result in greater average losses than those against nonresidential property such as commercial and industrial buildings.

Residential burglary reached a nationwide all-time high between 1980 and 1981. Declines in the next three years were followed by a 3-percent increase in 1985.

Something can be done about this offense. The FBI said collective crime prevention efforts by citizens and law enforcement can make a difference. Crime prevention programs conducted by citizens' groups, such as Crime Stoppers and Neighborhood Watch programs, have been developed throughout the country and have been shown to be effective in helping to reduce vulnerability to crimes such as residential burglaries.

Crime prevention measures are often simply a matter of common sense. For example, giving a residence an "occupied-at-the-moment" look while the homeowner is away, and property securing all doors. These simple rules are very effective.

# Alternatives For Aging Families

COLLEGE STATION-- Does grandma have to go to a nursing home? Can dad manage in that big house all alone? How can I cope with the demands of raising teenagers and mother's illness at the same time?

These are the kinds of questions faced by many families with aging members.

"Between 80-90 percent of the care needed by elderly persons is provided from within the family," says gerontologist Dr. Judith Warren.

"Sometimes these situations become unsatisfactory, either because the elder is not receiving necessary support, or because one member of the family has been burdened with almost all of the caregiving duties," she adds.

Family members may also feel the situation can't be changed, when in fact there are resources they can use to discover alternative approaches to their caregiving responsibilities, says Warren, a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program.

The gerontologist points out that family members can learn something about coping with their situation by attending courses on caregiving offered through county

Extension offices, community colleges, health care or other organizations.

Books and publications on subjects such as coping with senility, the aging process or dealing with an Alzheimer's patient is available from the same sources. County Extension offices have a letter series on "Adult Children - Aging Parents" with information for families.

"Family members can also talk to someone with special knowledge, such as the aging parent's doctor, a geriatric specialist, family counselor or social worker who can help them identify possible solutions to caregiving problems," Warren remarks.

Local resources for families include the nearest Area Office on Aging. Staff

members at this office will have information on adult day-care services, home care and visiting nurse services as well as nursing homes.

Once you have located available options for caregiving in your community, it's important to have a family conference which includes all family members, not just those who are doing most of the care, Warren emphasizes.

"The elder should be involved, if possible, to express his or her needs and wants," Warren says.

In a family conference, members can discuss and decide on ways to provide needed care and how to share caregiving tasks, along with the financial and emotional demands of caring for an elderly parent.

"This type of meeting may not be easy, and will probably have to be repeated as the aging parent's situation changes," Warren observes. "But it can result in improv-

# Texas Utilities Electric Company Announces Plans To File For Refund

DALLAS - Texas Utilities Electric Company announced it plans to file in November its third application of 1986 asking the Public Utility Commission to authorize a refund of fuel cost savings to its customers. The refund, totaling approximately \$58 million, including interest, is the result of lower fuel costs in July, August and September.

Because the fuel cost savings are expected to continue in 1987, TUEC will also ask the PUC to approve lower fuel charges.

ed care for the elder and better relations among family members who care for and about that person."

The company will ask the PUC to authorize the refund at the earliest possible date, which probably would be in January, through a credit to customers' bills.

Under the company's proposal, the residential customer with an average January usage of 1200 kilowatt-hours would receive a refund of about \$10.00.

The refund will be made in accordance with the PUC's fuel rule requiring refunds to be made if amounts over-recorded from customers exceed 4 percent of an electric utility's authorized annual

fuel costs or \$40 million, whichever is lower.

Decreasing market prices of natural gas and the company's continuing efforts to obtain lower-priced gas supplies have resulted in lower fuel costs than expected in late 1985 and throughout 1986. As a result, the company requested a 5 percent reduction in fuel charges that was approved by the PUC effective with March 1986 billings. Refunds totaling \$205 million have been authorized. Approximately \$140 million was refunded in May, and \$65 million is being

refunded on customers' October bills. Company Senior Vice-President Tom Baker said the company will continue to pursue the lowest-priced fuel supplies available in order to provide further savings to its customers.

Texas Utilities Electric Company provides electric service to about one-third the population of Texas through its operating divisions - Dallas Power & Light, Texas Electric Service and Texas Power & Light.

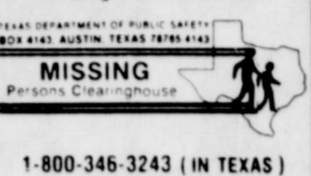

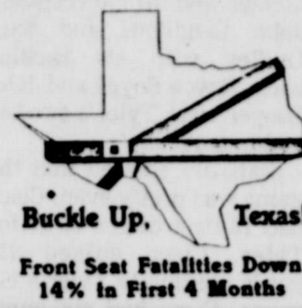

Authority for the above story is Mr. Leon Cagle, 91-year-old resident of Cisco, who saw and heard it all. Mr. Cagle arrived in Cisco in 1914 and is a WWI veteran. He knew Mr. Hilton casually, he told us.

Mr. Cagle, a retired auto parts dealer, also knew the late Stanley Marcus of Neiman-Marcus store fame.

Midway in the final period, Tyler got the ball in midfield and Jackson broke loose for 25 yards. Three plays later, the Apaches were on Cisco's nine and on third down, Sanders plowed over. White converted to give Tyler a 21-to-17 lead.

Late in the game, Cisco missed on four passes and Tyler took over on their 45. Four plays later, Jackson broke around end and went 43 yards for a touchdown. White kicked the extra point. The Wranglers named the entire offensive line as their star of the game on offense. The line allowed only two sacks and gave passer Dacus plenty of time to work effectively. Dacus had 22 completions in 47 attempts for 329 yards with two interceptions.

Jerry Childress, freshman defensive lineman, was named defensive player of the game. He had eight unassisted tackles. Other top defensive performers were Andre Horton with five tackles and an interception, John Langilotti and Sam Dudley with six tackles each. Royce Boyce and John Cooper were Tyler's two top tackle makers.

Statistics showed that the game was pretty even. Cisco had 18 first downs to 17 for Tyler. Cisco gained 329 yards passing to Tyler's 117 yards. Cisco had six punts for 44 yards, and Tyler

punted 11 times for 39 yards. Cisco drew nine penalties for 65 yards while Tyler had seven penalties for a total of 75 yards. Cisco had 149 yards rushing while Tyler had 214 yards.

**PRESS BOX NOTES**-Bob Keyes, member of the ACU coaching staff and former Wrangler head coach, gave the pre-game invocation. The three small boys who kept up with footballs were Bradlee Rains, Jason Hoffman, and Hoot Beckett. Tyler had a radio crew in the press box and sent a live broadcast back to East Texas. Jackie Williams operated the scoreboard clock. The Rev. Buddy

Sipe handled the PA system. Basketball Coach Dan Montgomery was in charge of the press box. Two Wranglers on the sidelines in regular clothes were Reggie Roberts and Tiger Mack. They are roommates at CJC and both are out with identical knee injuries and are awaiting braces before returning to action. Names captains for the game were Sam Dudley, David Dacus, Mark Lozano and Mark White. The Wrangler Band and Belles staged a fine half-time show that was applauded by a good crowd. Tyler JC had 10 cheer leaders out front of about 50 folks on the south side.
