Dinner Theater To Present "A Foreigner" In New Building

The freshness of the characters and its recent availability as a production made "The Foreigner" a logical choice to be the first in the new space.

"It's bright and fresh with comic strip characters in preposterous situations,' says Caroll Brown. "We wanted our maiden production in the Mobley to be as full of life and possibilities as the theatre itself."

Written by a playwright who also worked as an actor, "The Foreigner" is very definitely a physically and intellectually demanding piece of theatre.

'We've rehearsed long hours for 'The Foreigner',' states Fred Mullinax, "because so much attention must be paid to comic timing." Mullinax was last seen in CJC's 1985 season opener, "Harvey," as Elwood P. Dowd, but if you expect the same gentle soul you're in for a surprise. Joe Perry Expected Back From Boston Soon

Efforts of Joe Thomas Perry to avoid extradition from Boston, Mass., to Eastland County, Texas, for prosecution in a murder case failed Friday when officials there denied his request, according to word received by Special Prosecutor Bill Hart.

Mr. Hart said that Sheriff Don Underwood or Deputy Jerry Heflin have been designated by officials to fly to Boston and take custody of Perry. They had not made travel plans Tuesday but Mr. Hart expected Perry to be in Eastland County next week.

A pre-trail hearing for others who were indicted by a special grand jury in the case is scheduled for Thursday at 9 a.m. in 91st District Court. This includes Brenda Gail Perry Andrews, Pat Dewayne Starr, Elizabeth Perry Peacock and Richard Edward Hinton.

Perry was arrested near Boston in early September and elected to fight extradition. The normal procedure required nearly two month before Friday's final hearing and action by the governor there.

Perry, 46, had been alluding capture for months following his indictment.

Thomas LeFlore of Cisco, are serving sentences of 65 years and 50 years, respec-tively, in the Texas Depart-ment of Corrections for their





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
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Joe and Frank McCollum and Barbara Ann McCollum accepted the Texas Family Land Heritage certificate for The Jo-Bar Farm and Ranch founded in Eastland County in 1884 from Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower at the October 15 ceremony at the Lyndon B. Johnson Auditorium in Austin. This is the thirteenth year of the Texas Department of Agriculture's program which honors properties that have been maintained in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more by one family.

13th Annual Family **Land Heritage Program**

AUSTIN-"Not only are we here to recognize the past achievements of the state's family farm system, but also to help assure a future for such families. Farm families are our nation's seed corn, and we need to protect and nurture the family farm system so it remains vibrant and productive for us for centuries further down the road," Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said today.

Hightower made the comments at the LBJ Library, where the Texas Department of Agriculture held its 13th Annual Family Land Heritage Program. One hundred eighty-five Texas farm and ranch families -- the largest number since 1975 and the third largest number ever recognized in a single year by TDA's Family Land Heritage Program--were honored for keeping their land in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more.

Four of the honored properties are older than Texas, having been established prior to 1836.

The oldest property recognized this year is the Winfree Ranch of Orange County, founded by Abraham Winfree in 1831. In Austin today to accept the Family Land Heritage recognition from TDA was the current owner, Lester Winfree.

Since it was started by TDA in 1974, the Texas Family Land Heritage Pro-

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gram has now recognized

"Now think about that for a moment," Hightower said. "Go out on the streets of Austin, Dallas, Houston or any place in the state-few of the businesses you see have made it to their tenth anniversary, much less have been able to celebrate a century of enterprise. The achievement of these productive agricultural families

is remarkable indeed." Each of the 185 honored families received a special gate sign designating their property as a "Texas Century Farm" or "Texas Century Ranch." The 12-inch by 18-inch metal sign, bearing the seal of the State of Texas, certifies that the property has been maintained in continuous operation for more than 100 years by the same family. The signs can be posted on gates or fences, making the Family Land Heritage recognition known to neighbors and passers-by.

Honorees will also receive a Family Land Heritage Certificate. The four farm and ranch families who have maintained their property for more than 150 years will receive a certificate of "Special Sesquicentennial Recognition" from TDA. Each of the properties will also be included in the 1986 edition of TDA's Family Land Heritage Registry, which includes a written history and photographs of each of the honored farm and ranch families.

"But it's much more than

historic property that we salute today," Hightower said. "Really what we're talking about are peoplehard working efficient, productive, innovative, creative people. There are people of every ethnic background-German, Czechoslovakian, Italian, Black, Mexican-American, right on down the list. These are solid people who are living, productive symbols of an en-trepreneurial unit that is our lifeblood in this state and in this country-the family farm and ranch. Better than 15 million Texans, 250 million Americans and a good portion of the rest of the world count on the very people we are honoring today to put three 'squares' a day on the table for us. It's hard to

get along without that. "Yet, too often we as a larger public have taken dinner for granted. We've kind of been like hogs rooting for acorns under an oak tree, never bothering to look up to

see where it is these acorns are coming from, or to worry about whether the tree itself is healthy. Now we must be concerned about this, because the tree is endangered.

"The price-busting, surplus-creating, tax-eating farm policies we're now living under are crushing the life out of America's rural economy," Hightower said. 'Under this misguided federal legislation, farm prices are at historic lows. and farm bankruptcies are at historic heights; surpluses are so large we don't have room to store them, and exports continue to plummet; taxpayers' costs have skyrocketed, and farm-related employment is in the dumps; farm debt is disastrously high, and farm equity is disastrously low.

"The results are devasting. Texas could lose 20 percent of its farmers and ranchers this year. This loss will be most serious among those 60,000 full-time commercial operators in our state who struggle to derive their living from the land. It's not just that we expect to 'expel' more than 10,000 Texas farmers and ranchers from their livelihood in 1986, but that expect to lose our very best farmers-the ones we count upon to put three square meals a day on our

"All of us in Texas, especially urban consumers, must take note of this crisis and view today's Family Land Heritage celebration as more than a ceremony. The state of Texas must rededicate itself to the family farm and ranch system, and we as a people must join in the search for solutions that allow families such as these being recognized today to continue doing what they do best, so that future generations of Americans can benefit from the efficiency and productivity of their

"Nor is it a matter of just appreciating Texas farmers and ranchers, but relying on them. Our state's greatest wealth is not in the oil and gas wells; it is not in the high-tech industries that are coming into this state; it is not in the giant bank towers that dominate our urban skyline. Rather, it is in the land, the water, the sun and the people who feed us-these people we are honoring today. They are the difference between our being a well-fed country and being a hungry country. That is why we salute them today," Hightower said.

The families and their guests at the LBJ Library also viewed the "Texas Family Land Heritage Sesquicentennial Touring Exhibit." The exhibit is cosponsored by TDA, Central Freight Lines, Lufkin Industries, and the Texas

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
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
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
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Halloween History



Nowadays, it's just for fun. Merely make-believe, nothing more. But it hasn't always been so. No, not at

It began long ago, in a darker age, when simpler folk with simpler ways huddled in horror on Halloween. And only a stout cottage or roaring fire meant safety from a cold touch or things that bump in the night...

To the ancient Celts of Britain, nearly 3,000 years ago, the waning of the harvest moon marked not only a new year but the start of winter, season of cold and darkness. So it was, that mighty and terrible Samhain, Celtics lord of darkness, took Halloween as his feast day.

Samhain celebrated, the Celts believed, by releasing the souls of all dead in a night-long reprieve to moan, wail and visit among the liv-

Fearing a macabre family reunion, the Celts fled their homes at nightfall after decorating their hovels to placate their ghostly kin. Sheaves and gourds from the new harvest were signs that the household prospered. And mementos of those passed on were signs that the dead were yet remembered and revered.

The living then huddled until dawn around great fires built by their druids, or priests. In the sanctuary of those Halloween bonfires, the druids foretold event and led the tribes in prayers for eniency from Se

ed his minions to ple their black schemes and choose their carnate forms for the coming year. The forms were usually those of animals, and it is from this belief that the aura of the black cat arises.

The black cat was sacred to Samhain. Its silhouette adorned his coat-of-arms, and only his evilest demons

After the Romans conquered Britain around 45 B.C., their autumn festival of Pomona, goddess of the orchard, was incorporated into the Halloween of the conguered Celts. The Roman game of bobbing for apples on Pomona's feast day remains a staple of modern Halloween parties.

Despite the advent of Christianity in the fourth century, peasants of the old civilizations clung stubborn-ly to their old beliefs. Christian doctrine was often synthesized with pagan ritual.

In time, Samhain took on horns and a tail. He no longer reigned over all dead souls but held only a minor demonship over the eternally damned. Black cats became familiars of witches. Bonfires gave way to nightlong masses for the dead.

The Church, too, played part in this melding of old beliefs and new, though for different reasons. The Vatican hoped, in time, to diminish pagan holidays by supplanting them with Christian ones. Thus, in the ninth century, Pope Gregory IV delcared November 1 to All Saints, or All Hallows. And October 31 became 'Hallowe'en," from All Hallows Eve.

The middle ages not only gave Halloween its name, this period also gave Halloween its most enduring tradition.

Trick-Or-Treat sprang from the medieval belief that, on the night preceding All Hallows, witches, demons and condemned spirits roamed the earth, terrifying the righteous and playing cruel tricks.

To protect their homes, people left sweets and newlyharvested fruits as bribes at their doors. And those who had to venture out on All disguised Hallows themselves in grotesque costumes, allowing them, so they thought, to move undetected among the hor-





County Judge Scott Bailey presented the Eastland County Commissioners with Old Rip in bronze at the beginning of the County Commissioners meeting on Monday, October 27.

This replica of the famous Eastland County Horned Toad was cast by Dale Stewart, Cisco sculptor. Mr. Stewart has donated this piece as a gift to the county. Judge Bailey and the commissioners expressed ap-

preciation for this striking piece. Suggestions were made to put this bronze toad in the courthouse with Old Rip. It was also suggested that a plaque be placed in the case with the name of the

Bill Riddell, Commissioner of Pct. 2, reported that the Pct. 2 bulldozer (Traxloader) which had been held about three years had been returned to the County Barn in Ranger. After an agreement to do so it was removed from Calvin Ainsworth property by Rid-dell and a county employee

A lawsuit by Ainsworth and a cross-action suit by the Commissioners Court concerning this bulldozer are still pending in District

The commissioners decided to have an expert on heavy equipment inspect the bulldozer and determine it's condition before putting it in service for the county again.

In other business, Sgt. Jerry Matthews of the Department of Public Safety requested that the county hire a replacement J.P. Court Coordinator. Cindy Carlton, who is presently holding this position, will soon begin work for the DPS as a Driver's License Clerk.

Sgt. Matthews suggested that the J.P. Coordinator replacement be hired by Nov. 13, so that Mrs. Carlton would have time to train this person before she assumes her DPS duties.

This plan was approved by the commissioners.

Another item on the agenda concerned the appointment of a replacement for an Absentee Election Judge. Mrs. Bill (Wynell) Brown of Pct. 2 was appointed to this position.

The commissioners discussed Ad Valorem Property Tax Relief at some length, with the feeling expressed that many property owners are unhappy about the tax raises they have ex-

perienced during the past

few years. A measure was passed during the last State Legislative Session which gives the county power to levy a one-half cent raise on sales taxes. State Comptroller Bob Bullock would collect the extra taxes, which would then be returned to the county and replace some of the property taxes.

A county-wide referendum would have to be held for voter-approval of this addition to the state sales tax. This additional tax would bring the local sales tax up to around .06 cents per \$1.

County Judge Scott Bailey and the commissiones indicated possible approval of the plan, but said they felt it would be best to wait until April, at least, to hold a referendum on it.

Bills, claims and accounts occupied the rest of the session for the commissioners. Present at the meeting were Richard Robinson, commissioner of Pct. 1; Bill Riddell, Pct. 2; L.T. Owen, Pct. 3; and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4.

Norman Christian, Democratic-Elect Commissioner of Pct. 2, sat in the courtroom as an observer County Clerk Joann Johnson recorded minutes.



The rocky shorelines and clear waters of Canyon Reservoir west of New Braunfels have proved to be excellent habitat for introduced smallmouth bass. Biologist Mike Ryan of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said the fish, which were first stocked in the mid-1970's have had excellent reproduction and

Fishermen should have success during the fall at Canyon because smallmouths become more active when the water cools. While smallmouths often are caught with the same tackle and techniques used on largemouth bass, some adjustments should be made to adapt to smallmouths habits. Smallmouths are usually found from 15 to 35 feet down, small jigs used with multicolored plastic grubs may be the best artificial lures for smallmouths, and live crawdads are considered the

best live bait. Current state record sixpounds seven ounces was caught from Lake Lyndon B. Johnson during 1985, but most of the previous smallmouth records were caught from Canyon.

On November 21, 1986 a developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to five (0-5). This screening will be conducted at the Eastland County Child Care Center, 300 S. Oak, Eastland, Texas, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas; personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipuae small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents, and teachers.



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
