Date To Be Set For Garcia Murder Case

The pre-trial date for defendants in the 1981 murder case of Debra Garcia in Cisco is expected to be set by Judge Jim Wright of 91st District Court after a formal arraignment hearing Thursday, Nov.6, Special Prosecutor Bill Hart reported Monday.

The pre-trial hearing scheduled last week was postponed Friday after defense attorneys for three defendants protested that the trio had not been formally arraigned and they asked for ten days after arraignment to prepare for the pretrial hearing

The 4th defendant, Joe Thomas Perry, was due to be transferred from Boston some two months to Eastland this week. Sheriff Don Underwood reported Monday that "we'll go after him this week." In a hearing last Thurs-

day, attorneys for Defendants Richard Hinton, Brenda Andrews and Pat Starr, sought to have both Judge Wright and Prosecutor Hart removed from the proceedings. Visiting Judge Herman Fitts of Palo Pinto overruled the defense re-

Attorney Saul Pullman, representing Hinton by appointment of the court, requested the county to pay him more than \$30,000 for ex-

penses. Mr. Pullman said this amount has already been paid the prosecutor and that under the law an attorney appointed by the court should be compensated on the same basis.

Mrs. Garcia, a convenience store employee, was abducted from her job on Nov. 29, 1981, and her body was found in a roadside ditch west of Cisco two days later. Two Cisco brothers, Thomas and Charles LeFlore, are serving prison sentences in the case after pleading guilty to murder charges.

The four other defendants were named in indictments returned after Mr. Hart was appointed special prosecutor in the case.







The goal of \$24,000 for the purchase of a new ambulance has been changed, due to price increases in the cost of the ambulance since the fund was started nine months ago. The new goal is \$27,000, and the balance in the New Ambulance Fund is now \$23,048. Various funraising projects are under consideration. It is sad to be so near this goal and yet not have this vitally needed equipment at hand. This Volunteer Ambulance Service operates all around the Rising Star area, and makes runs to hospitals quite frequently. The next regular board meeting will be November 10, and the next general meeting of the association will be November 11.

The name "Cisco" will be repainted on the I-20 area reservoir in larger letters so it can be read from a distance. The firm will be paid \$2500 for this work and \$800 for the work on College

The engineering firm of Jacob and Martin, Abilene is expected to make a study and give a report during November on a comprehensive area water survey, City

Manager Mike Moore reported. Alternate sources of water are needed by the City, he said, and the City Council recently asked the firm to make this survey.

Facts In 1986...

AUSTIN, Texas--Lung diseases are the third most common cause of death in the United States today, says the American Lung Association of Texas - the Christmas Seal people . Besides the cost in human suffering, the direct economic cost of lung disease to the nation is expected to reach a staggering 640.9 billion in 1986.

Lung cancer remains this country's most deadly form of cancer. Only 13 percent of lung cancer patients live five or more years after diagnosis. It is a frightening fact that the incidence of lung cancer in American women has risen 380 percent in the last 35 years. Already the leading cancer killer among men, lung cancer has now surpassed breast cancer as the foremost cancer killer of American women.

According to the ALA of

Texas, much of the premature death and disability caused by lung disease is unnecessary and can be prevented. •19 million Americans suffer from some form of chronic lung disease including 7.7 million with chronic bronchitits and 2.3 million with emphysema, the two major disease categories within COPD

The Texas Farm Bureau Resolutions Committee, consisting of 41 farmers and ranchers from across the state, will meet here Nov. 10-12 to compile state and national policy recommendations which voting delegates will consider Nov. 30 - Dec. 3 at the 53rd TFB annual meeting in McAllen.

Resolutions pertaining to state matters approved by voting farmers and ranchers in McAllen will become state policy for the general farm organization during 1987.

During the Eastland County Farm Bureau Convention on Oct. 4 the 1925-member organization here passed three Resolutions, one on a county, one on a State, and one on a National level. Those on a State and National level will go to Waco.

The State Resolution reads: LIABILITY SUITS -Eastland County Farm Bureau advocates the drafting of legislation to impose a ceiling on punitive damage claims for bodily injury in liability suits."

The National Resolution reads: AGRICULTURAL PROMOTION - "Eastland County Farm Bureau opposes the Federal Beef Referendum Program in its present form. We feel the \$1 per head assessment should be lowered, 50 cents per head. This amount should be collected one time only."

Adopted resolutions pertaining to national policy will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting Jan. 11-15 in Anaheim, Calif.



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

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
