Pickup Stolen In Eastland; Runaways Are Suspected

An '89 Chevrolet pickup colored grey with a headache rack and 2 way radio was stolen about 6:30 a.m. Tuesday in front of a convenience store at the I-20 and Hwy 6 intersection south of Eastland.

Weldon Bosworth reportedly left his motor running as he stepped inside the store to purchase a cup of coffee, and his pickup was believed to have been taken by three juveniles who ran away from a home in Cisco.

It was reported that three juveniles had attempted to steal a vehicle earlier at Tiner's Truck Stop near the intersection, and there may have been other attempts. The high school at Cisco may have been burglarized also.

Deputy Sheriff Ben Sancillo recovered three abandoned bicycles near I-20 west of Eastland, which were believed to have been used by the youths to make the trip from Cisco to Eastland.

Cisco Police Officer Darrell Shipman is investigating the runaways. It is reportedly the ninth theft of a vehicle by runaways from the home for problem youth.

CISD Purchases Three Diesel School Busses

The Cisco Independent School District has purchased three new International diesel buses that should be delivered in August, according to Superintendent C.R. Saunders.

The Cisco school board accepted the bid of \$108,000 for the buses from Statewide Bus Sales in Inc. of Dallas. The debt will be paid in three installments during the next two years, Mr. Saunders said.

Two of the school's nine buses are no longer serviceable and will be sold after the new ones arrive. Mr. Saunders added that diesel buses will be less expensive to operate and need less maintenance than gasoline powered buses. The new buses will carry 47, 65 and 77 passengers.

Health Care Matters; Jail Discussed By County Commissioners Monday

Eastland County Commissioners Monday approved a proposal for County Tax Collector Nancy Trout to begin collecting taxes for Eastland Memorial Hospital District this fall.

The proposal was submitted by Marsha Carr, Administrator of the Eastland Hospital, who explained to the Commissioners that the Hospital Board had discussed this matter with Mr. Trout.

Nancy Trout told the Commissioners that she had agreed to collect this tax. In Eastland Hospital District (generally the boundary lines of Pct. 1) the tax will be added to the County and Road and Bridge taxes.

In other health-related matters, the Commissioners approved a request for \$30,000 toward the purchase of a new ambulance for Ranger, George Falls and Stan Parker of Ranger brought this proposal to the Commissioners, and also submitted an ambulance service contract for consideration. The new ambulance will be purchased in the city's name, with Ranger General Hospital operating the service. If the Hospital should ever close, the City will continue with the service, with the County continuing to pay half of the cost of the insurance.

The \$30,000 will come from funds already budgeted by the County to assist with ambulance service in all four Precincts.

There was discussion on the present status of the Southeast County Hospital District, how dissolved. At a recent

meeting former Board President Hershell Cordell reported to the Commissioners that the District had complied with all requirements for dissolution, and now reverted to the County. He requested that \$68,000 in funds not resolved with the I. R. S. be placed in escrow until the matter was settled.

Nancy Trout reported that one person had tried to pay delinquent taxes in from the dissolved district her office, but she had no delinquent roll or other paper work from the District.

Judge Bailey said that he County could do little "Until we get the papers and records" of the Hospital District. Several Commissioners said "We can't collect anything now," and indicated they needed legal advice before agreeing on the \$68,000.

The Commissioners did approve a Resolution submitted by Day by Day Care Centers that outside Revenue Bonds may enter Eastland County. Andrew Kinser, representing Day by Day Centers, reported that this group is acquiring the Gorman Hospital, currently operated by Dublin Recovery Centers. Kinser said that Day by Day will operate a Substance Abuse Recovery and Educational Resource Program at the Hospital. This facility was once operated by the South Eastland County Hospital District.

When the Commissioners turned to the subject of the jail, Sheriff Dee Hogan told the Court that the jail was currently overcrowded.

Eastland County is now paying \$120 per day for three prisoners housed in Comanche County.

"Taxpayers money is going out the door," the Sheriff said. "We need to address the issue."

"Who do we need to address it with?" Asked L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3.

"Start by talking with the District Attorney," Hogan replied. He said that the County Jail is overcrowded because District Attorney Walton has not scheduled the time to hear plea bargains from at least five inmates. "I want to be sure the Court is aware of it," he added.

The Sheriff continued his report by saying that 21 inmates were in the jail, with three scheduled to be transported to the Texas Department of Corrections Tuesday.

On the return trip law enforcement officers would pick up the prisoners in Comanche and return them to Eastland.

After Hogan left District Attorney Emory Walton talked to the Commissioners. "I don't know why he says some want to plead when they don't," Walton said. "He brings two people into the Courtroom to plead, and they don't."

Walton added that arresting officers generally handled their cases, and Hogan was overstepping his authority interfering with these inmates. Furthermore, the Sheriff did not allow easy access to prisoners, making the District Attorney and other officers wait in the Sheriff's office to talk with inmates.

The County Commissioners had hoped to continue this discussion with Hogan and the District Attorney present at the same time. But Walton was due in Court that afternoon. So a meeting to iron out procedures had to be postponed.

Two More Arrests Made In Ranger Murder Case

Two additional men have been charged with murder as the investigation of the Leslie Renee Roberts murder continues.

Justice of the Peace Jamie Honea set bond for Randy Wells and Thomas Hennington III, at \$100,000 each, and they were being held in the Eastland County Jail.

Santos Zarate had earlier been charged with murder in the case and is also being held.

Miss Roberts was found shot to death in her car on a road in southeast Ranger earlier this year.

Texas Ranger Gene Kea declined to make any comment on the case. Ranger Police Officer Virginia Skaggs and Deputy Sheriff David Franklin are also assisting in the investigation.

Grass Planting Tip From Soil Conservationist

Well, it looks like the drought is over for the time being anyway. Just in time for seeding or springing grass. Even though there is good moisture there are many obstacles to overcome in getting your grass up.

No matter what grass you are planting there has to be a firm weed free seedbed. Many times grass is planted into a seedbed which is fluffy. This

does not allow for good contact of the soil to the seed. In such situations the seed planted in the tractor tire tracks may be the only seed to come up. A good practice if possible is to use a packer behind your seeder.

Many soils in our area are subject to crusting. A crust can cause sprigs to sour and can keep seedlings from pushing through to the surface. If the crust is severe enough it may be necessary to break the

crust. This can be a problem because you do not want to bury the seeds to deeply or uncover the sprigs or seedlings.

Weed control can be very important in a grass planting. There are chemicals which can be put down before sprigging which will control weeds while the grass is getting established. On seeded grasses shredding or chemical application after the grass has reached the 6-8 leaf stage will do a fine job of weed control. When using chemicals always read the label before using.

Fertilizer is especially important when planting on old cropland fields. The necessary nutrients are usually depleted enough to cause stunting of the plants or to cause a poor stand.

other, there will also be discussion of the possibility of forming a patient support group in the area, how the Network can assist with any special needs of the community and a real highlight will be information of the day long Anderson Network Patient Conference planned for the North Central Texas area on June 2, 1990.

This Patient Conference will be a time when patients and family members/friends can become informed on cancer site information, participate in sessions on coping skills, learn of ways to deal with insurability/employability concerns relevant to the cancer patient and share in a day of social interaction and refreshment with those who truly understand the cancer experience. M.D. Anderson staff/physicians will be the presenters. Plans are well under way for this very special event.

The ANDERSON NETWORK provides many services for cancer patients and is solely composed of volunteers who are current or former Anderson patients. If you are an Anderson patient and return periodically to the Cancer Center in Houston, they invite you to share a cup

of coffee, a glass of juice and a connection with another patient by visiting the Network Hospitality Room-ask at the Concierge Desk for directions. The Anderson Network also publishes Network, which is a patient communicate reaching 55,000 Anderson patients-call the Network office if you are/were an Anderson patient and are not receiving it. They hold Open Houses in the Center, form satellite chapters throughout Texas and eventually throughout the nation and offers the telephone networking service where a patient-newly diagnosed or ongoing-may call the Network office and ask to speak to a patient of similar cancer diagnosis. A Networker then contacts that patient and support can be shared over the miles or across the city.

The Anderson Network can be accessed by calling 1-800-345-6324. Come to the Open House on Saturday, March 31 in Eastland to hear more and to learn how you too can reach out in the understanding and support of others. Or call the Anderson Network office if you would be interested in attending the Patient Conference in June. More information will be coming out about that soon.

'Texas' Celebrates Silver Anniversary

Towering cliffs light up in color, hide Indians, accommodate horsemen and get hit by lightning every night from June through August during the production of "TEXAS."

"TEXAS" is the story of farmers against ranchers and their eventual collaboration which brings the railroad and a new town to the 1880 wilderness. A cast of 80 illustrates the struggles, romance and tribulations of settling the area.

rousing hoe-down and listen silently to the death speech of a dying chief.

For 24 years the same story has entertained over two million visitors. Still, Director Neil Hess keeps the action fresh with brilliant choreography that constantly changes to accent the special talents of dancers, updated vocal arrangements by Renee Clausen, sets by Knott's Berry Farm designer George Petis, and the latest sound and light technology from Disneyland designers D. Scott Linder and Lynn Hart.

WIC Program Adapted To Help The Homeless

A growing number of women and children living in supervised shelters for the homeless are benefitting from nutrition services offered by the Texas Department of Health (TDH). The department's Special Supplemental Food Program for Women Infants and Children (WIC) safeguards-- through sound nutrition-- against health problems among low income mothers, their babies and children.

WIC services include providing nutritious foods, health assessments and nutrition counseling to eligible pregnant or breastfeeding women, new mothers, and their babies and children less than five years old.

To be eligible, applicants must undergo health screenings at WIC clinics to establish their nutritional needs. They also must meet state and federal guidelines for low income.

In addition, health officials have adapted WIC services and rules to meet the unique needs of homeless participants.

According to Debra Stabeno, Chief of TDH's Bureau of WIC Nutrition, "Our challenge in serving the homeless is greater than it is with other participants. We must provide homeless participants with foods that are not easily perishable. These people don't have refrigerators, freezers or other kitchen conveniences, so we try to supply a more durable food

package," she explained. The supervised shelters where homeless WIC participants stay must follow specific guidelines set by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Among those conditions are: - WIC foods must benefit the authorized participant, not a facility for the homeless or other institution. The facility may not gain financial or in-kind benefits from any person's participation in WIC.

- WIC foods may not be included in communal feedings.

- Shelter personnel may not make collective or bulk transactions for participants living in their facilities,

Weekend Catching Was Fair

For those of you who laughed at the boats traveling to their favorite fishing holes this past weekend all I can say is you missed some fine catching. The average size fish caught at area lakes were small, but the numbers were good. At the Brownwood Bass Club Invitational 11 pounds for 3 fish won, with the big bass going 7 pounds 8 ounces. Fewer anglers weighed in fish than there were awards, but every angler I visited with reported catching an average of 10 fish per person. 102 contestants attended this event with around 30 weighing in one or more fish over 14 inches.

I hear our good friend Chuck Loferty from Abilene won the open Jackpot held at Lake Leon with over 10 pounds of fish. The remainder of the results were not available at this time. This event drew 5 anglers for a cold day on the lake.

The fish at Lake Brownwood were taken from 1 to 2 feet of water. This may sound a little strange but the water cooled so quickly that the ground in shallow water with rocks remained 3 or 4 degrees warmer than deeper water say around 3-5 feet.

If the weather doesn't break in a few days this will definitely set the spawning fish back a few weeks.

Anglers looking for some excellent crappie fishing should look at Lake Brownwood. The many brushpiles in the main lake area hold some 1 to 2 pound crappie in excellent numbers. The colder weather will insure some great flea-fie action for the anglers brave enough to venture out.

Cordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

This is the time of year that is considered the beginning of the frost-free days in Eastland County. Actually, it is the beginning of the average frost-free period. This means that 50% of the time there are no more frosts after this date.

Lack of frost signals the beginning of a safe period in which to grow the delights of the vegetable garden such as beans, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, Southern peas, pepper, squash, tomatoes, and watermelons. All these vegetables are very sensitive to frost conditions and must not be planted until all danger of frost

is past, unless some sort of protection is provided. The average length of these frost-free periods is relatively stable in most areas of Texas. The problem arises in determining when these periods will begin and when they will end. Meteorological information collected over many years indicates the 'average first frost-free date' and 'average last frost-free date.' The term 'average' is the misleading culprit. Average means that which has occurred most of-

ten or normal. As most Texans know, 'normal' weather is the usual rather than the expected occurrence. Unfortunately, extremes are also averaged in. For instance, March 22, is the beginning of the average frost-free period in the spring here, and mid-November is when we 'normally' expect the first frost of the fall. Yet we can all remember that last April 11, we had a killing frost of 27 degrees and on September 24, we had our first frost of the fall and a hard freeze on November 3rd. I'm sure many of you remember years when the first frost-free day occurred in early February and the first frost of the fall was in December. You can now begin to appreciate the farmers' situation.

Anytime we try to outguess the weather, we take a tremendous risk. Yet successful gardening depends on outguessing the weather. For instance, if we wait until well past the average first frost-free date to insure success with such tender crops as tomatoes and beans, we may experience a complete failure. The failure will be caused by the later bloom date due to later planting. Tomato bloom during hot temperatures will cause lack of proper fruit set and reduced yields.

The answer to this dilemma is to plant frost-susceptible crops according to the average first frost date, but be fully aware that you may have to protect them if a cool period occurs. Home gardeners can do this by covering plants with cans, blankets, a cage garbage bag system, or boxes on frosty nights.

Crops such as Southern peas (black-eyed peas), sweet potatoes, and okra should not be planted until well after the first frost-free date. These crops are extremely susceptible to cold air temperatures and do not grow properly in cold soils. Wait about two or

Further information can be three weeks after the first frost-free date.

Of course, it is important that cool-season, frost tolerant crops be established well before the first frost-free date.

As you can see, growing vegetables is not as easy as one might imagine. Timing is a major key to success. With proper timing, adapted varieties, and a slight assist from Mother Nature, anyone can be a successful gardener. If you feel that successful vegetable growing in your home garden is risky, just be glad you don't have 100 or 200 acres and your livelihood hanging in the balance.

Farmers Home To Elect New County Committee Members

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 5 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Jack Phillips, County Supervisor said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Phillips said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has

been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Phillips said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 29.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Phillips said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

"Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 1309 East Main Street in Eastland," Phillips said.

Tax Deferral Available For Elderly Homeowners

Section 33.06 of the State Property Tax Code requires the following information concerning the Deferral of Certain Property Taxes to be publicized.

Property taxes on the residence homestead property of those persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older may be deferred or abated if they satisfy the requirements of the State Property Tax Code.

The property owner must occupy the residence homestead on which the tax is being levied on or on which a suit has been filed for collection of delinquent taxes.

To obtain a deferral, the individual must file with the Chief Appraiser for the Appraisal District in which the property is located an affidavit; stating that they are sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that they do own and reside in the house that the tax is being levied on.

If a suit has already been filed by a tax unit, the individual must file with the court in which the suit was filed the same type of affidavit.

By filing the affidavit with the proper authority, the payment of taxes or forced collections through suit is postponed until the person filing the affidavit no longer owns and occupies the property as a residence homestead.

Although the tax is deferred; it is not cancelled. A tax lien remains on the property and penalties and interest continue to accrue during the period that the collection of taxes is deferred.

Child Labor Violations Cost All Texans

In light of recent child labor law infractions discovered by the U.S. Department of Labor, Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers of the Texas Employment Commission today admonished Texas employers to refresh their knowledge of the rules concerning hiring minors.

"Texas employers received more citations than employers in other states during the D.O.L.'s recent sweep," lamented Nabers. "Considering the fact that Texas is facing such monumental problems with illiteracy and student drop-out rates, employers and parents in our state need to reaffirm a commitment to abide by these laws which were, after all, enacted to ensure that all children have an unobstructed opportunity for a good education."

Employers should be aware of these basic guidelines:

- (1) Youths 18 years or older may perform any job, whether hazardous or not, for unlimited hours;
- (2) Youths 16 and 17 years old may perform any NONHAZARDOUS job, for unlimited hours;
- (3) Youths 14 and 15 years old may work OUTSIDE SCHOOL HOURS in various this past week.

NONMANUFACTURING, NONMINING, NONHAZARDOUS jobs under the following conditions:

- (a) no more than 3 hours on a school day,
- (b) no more than 18 hours in a school week,
- (c) no more than 8 hours on a nonschool day,
- (d) no more than 40 hours in a nonschool week,
- (e) work may not begin before 7 a.m., nor end after 7 p.m., except from June 1 through Labor Day when evening hours are extended to 9 p.m.
- (f) 14 and 15 year olds who are enrolled in an approved Work Experience and Career Exploration Program (WECEP) may be employed for up to 23 hours in school weeks and 3 hours on school days (including during school hours.)

(4) Fourteen is the minimum age for most non-farm work. At ANY AGE, however, youths may DELIVER NEWSPAPERS, WORK FOR PARENTS in their solely-owned nonfarm business (except in manufacturing or on hazardous jobs) or GATHER EVERGREENS and make evergreen wreaths. Children of any age may perform in RADIO, TELEVISION, MOVIE, OR THEATRICAL PRODUCTIONS. There are, however, state regulations concerning child actors which must be followed. Employers in this industry may obtain a copy of the rules and regulations by contacting the State Office of the TEC, Office of Special Counsel.

FARM JOBS:

- (1) Youths 16 years and older may perform any job, whether hazardous or not, for unlimited hours;
- (2) Youths 14 and 15 years old may perform any nonhazardous farm job outside of school hours;
- (3) Youths 12 and 13 years old may work outside of school hours in nonhazardous jobs, either with parent's written consent or on the same farm as the parents;
- (4) Youths under 12 may perform jobs on farms owned or operated by parents or, with parents' written consent, outside of school hours in nonhazardous jobs on farms not covered by minimum wage requirements.
