## Dr. M.H. Clark Is Pastor At Faith Baptist Church

The new pastor at Faith Baptist Church in Cisco is Dr. M.H. Clark, a native Texan who is returning to his native state after a 24-year absence.

Pastor Clark grew up in Abilene, where he yielded to the call to preach in 1940, at the age of 14 years. At age 15 he was pastor of Central Baptist Church in Coleman. The first pulpit he ever spoke from was in Cisco in 1940.

After pastoring for 26 years in the Big County area, he spent the next ten years in Oklahoma and Missouri. In 1976 he was hired as a professor of Bible and Greek in Baptist Bible College East in Boston. He taught there for eight years, during which time he was given the Doctor of Divinity degree. Clark has a B.A. degree from Howard Payne University in Brownwood and two theology degrees from American Bible College in Florida. In 1984 he returned to Missouri, from where he moved back to

Texas. Pastor Clark recently observed his Fiftieth Anniversary in the Baptist ministry.

The new pastor is married to the former Pauline Turnidge, daughter of the late W.A. Turnidge, a long-time Abilene business man. They are the parents of four children, one of whom is a Baptist missionary in Brazil. They also have 13 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Faith Baptist Church, located at West 18th and Avenue J, will have a revival meeting September 16-23, with the new pastor as the speaker. The public is always welcome to visit any services of the church. Sunday school is at 10 a.m., with preaching and worship services at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. Wednesday evening service is at 7:30 p.m.

## Final Jail Payment Made

The announcement in Commissioners Court Monday of the final payment on the County Jail was low-key in marked contrast to the controversy surrounding construction of the jail more than ten years ago.

Only two County officials remain who were deeply involved in the building of the new jail - Judge Scott Bailey and County Commissioner of Pct. 3 L.T. Owen. Other Commissioners during that time were Danny Wood, Pct. 1, O.E. Blackwell, Pct. 2, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4.

Ronnie White was Sheriff when plans were made for the new jail, and Johnnie Morren was Sheriff during most of construction and when the new Jail was opened in 1980. Don Underwood served as Sheriff from Jan. 1985 to late Dec. 1988, and Dee Hogan is the current Sheriff. Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, is designated by the Commissioners Court to oversee the operation of the jail.

In its 10th year the 24-bed jail appears to be in good shape, with the building clean and in compliance with all State and Federal "Guidelines." Around the brick building is a well-kept lawn, with roses, trees, including an ornamental pear tree planted 10 years ago by the Extension Homemakers.

The sturdy old sandstone jail sitting beside the new one cost \$8,000 when it was built in 1897. That's quite a differ-

ence from the estimated \$1.2 million the new jail cost. It costs more to run the new jail, too. Its hard to remember the days in the old building when jailers cooked beans and bread and trudged up the high, dangerous stairs.

It was in 1956 when Federal laws were passed that set up criteria the old jail simply could not meet. By 1977 an inspection by the Texas State Jail Standards Commission listed numerous "guidelines" the building did not meet.

Not long afterward local jail prisoners filed a lawsuit against the County, listing officials by name. The American Civil Liberties Union helped the inmates in their case, which became something of a landmark.

In 1978 Federal Judge Leo Brewster ruled in favor of the prisoners, and the County was ordered to build a new jail by Jan. 1, 1980. Judge Brewster died in 1979, not long after this ruling.

Since there were no public funds to build a new Jail, County officials called for a referendum on a new tax called the "Road and Bridge" tax. This was approved by the public, and provided funds to begin the construction.

## Christian Concert To Be Held At Mountain Top Church Sunday

The Mountain Top Church is honored to have Michael Jones, a trumpet player of fame, to hold a concert Sunday night at 600 E. 8th Street (Old Highway 80) in Cisco.

Michael Jones has been on television programs, and ministered with groups such as Gloria Copeland, Hensons, and Blackwood Brothers. He is a graduate of Lee College in Baytown, McNeece University of Lake Charles, La. He has ministered over the country in churches and large gospel music concerts.

Everyone who loves gospel music is invited to the concert which is free to the public to hear a "spirit-filled" minister and musician play anointed music on the trumpet as he ministers to the crowd. The Mountain Top Church is an inter-denomina-

tional Charismatic church which ministers weekly to people from all walks of Christian experience. The church baptized over 45 people in the last 12 months, or almost one per week, and has seen outstanding church growth since relocating into Cisco, according to Pastor John C. Jones.

The services start at 6 p.m. and the public is encouraged to come early to assure seating.

## Hagan Family To Hold Reunion

The annual Hagan Family reunion will be held Saturday and Sunday, July 28-29, at Camp Inspiration in Eastland. All family members and friends are invited to attend.

Records are not readily available on how much was paid them - these accounts are in the minutes of Commissioner's Meetings for 1979 through 1983. These minutes are held in the office of the County Clerk.

From late 1983 to June, 1990 the County paid off Jail Debt bonds at Eastland National Bank, The First National Bank of Cisco, and a bank in Abilene. These totals came to \$680,000 principal and \$242,550 interest. An estimate of the total cost at \$1.2 million from all financing does not seem out of line.

The new jail was built by Boone and Pope of Abilene, with James Wheeler as architect. While it was under construction in 1979 the County had to ask for a variance on the completion date, due to shortages of material, a painter's strike, and numerous inspections.

By summer, 1980 the new 8,000 ft. structure was finally complete, and Sheriff Johnnie Morren proudly opened it for inspection by County officials. All agreed it was a more secure Jail than the old one, and appeared to be easier to keep. It had room for 17 men, and eight spaces for women and juveniles.

Prisoners were moved from the old jail to the new around Sept. 2, 1980. Everything went well for awhile, then new laws were enacted which made it more difficult to comply with regulations.

First came the ruling on juveniles, which forced the county to send all juveniles to a detention center in Abilene. Then came rulings on segregation of sexes, number of inmates, etc... There also seemed to be problems with

## Fund Started For Jackie Taylor Reeves

A fund has been started at First National Bank in Cisco for Jackie Taylor Reeves, who is currently undergoing radiation treatments at M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston.

jail maintenance.

By 1986 the County was under a Court Order from Austin on the Jail, with the possibility the Texas Jails Standards Commission would order Jail enlargement to 48 beds. An architect offered plans that would cost the county another million dollars at least.

In 1988 the Commissioners authorized the purchase of land adjoining the jail on the north, planning to expand if needed. This purchase cost \$75,000.

As yet, the jail expansion has not been necessary. The jail population generally stays under 20 inmates, with the only crowding problems coming from state prisoners left in the County Jail. The County Commissioners have passed a Resolution on that, and hope that something can be done.

Other matters have also been brought into compliance, and Comm. Billy Bacon has good reports to give to the Commissioners Court.

As the final jail debt payment of \$129,900 was made to Eastland National Bank the Commissioners felt good about eliminating that "Debt Service" item for their new budget. But all of them wished that crime was also that easy to get rid of.

## Cisco Hospital District Tax Rate Among Lowest In Area

In view of renewed discussion of the taxing authority of the Cisco Hospital District and the circulation of a petition calling for an election to dissolve the taxing powers of the hospital district and to close E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, a survey was conducted of the taxing entities in Eastland County and of some ten hospital tax districts which operate health care facilities comparable to the Cisco district.

The survey was also conducted in direct response to a

statement made in support of the petition which stated, "You are being heavily taxed in this district."

Following the tax roll-back election in January of 1990, Cisco Hospital District, which operates E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, operated with the lowest tax rate in Eastland County. The same tax rate, .14 per \$100 property valuation, is one of the two lowest in a recent survey of ten hospitals of compa-

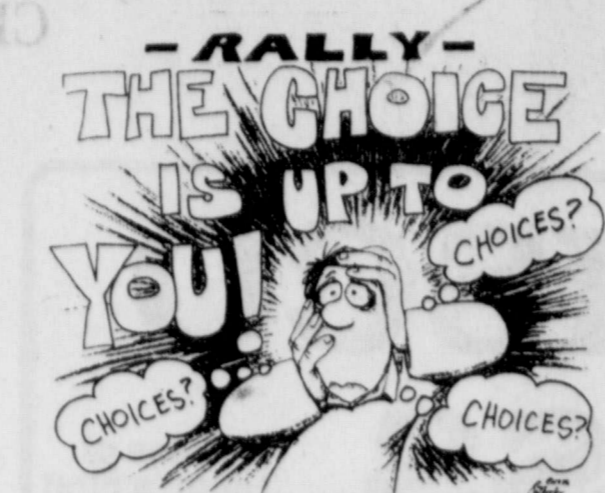
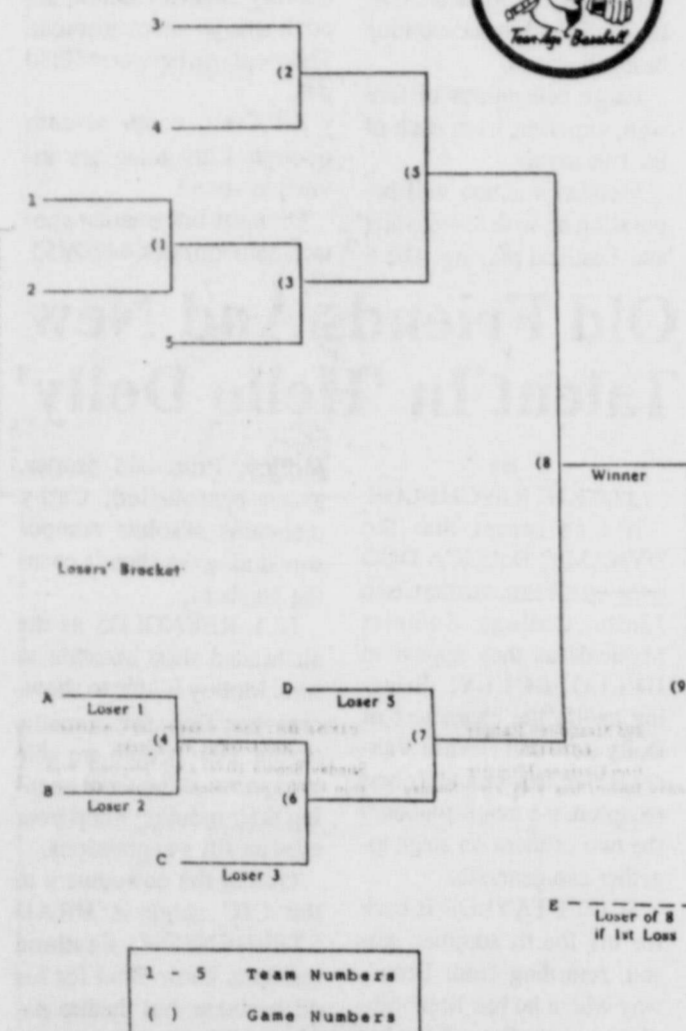

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,  
Thank you for the article in the Sunday newspaper of July 22, by Rena Pederson entitled "More Than Just Peanuts." Hopefully this will alert peanut farmers and consumers to the lengths Representative Dick Army and his coalition will go to destroy a Peanut Program which has worked so effectively for many years. Maybe this information will awaken us peanut producers to action that gets us involved in the promotion of the Peanut Program proposed by the Senate and House Agricultural Committee.

I am enclosing a rebuttal by Bill Grant, a Republican Congressman, to Dick Army and others of his mindset. First, however, I want to comment.

I am bothered a great deal when articles such as Rena Pederson's combines half truths, innuendoes, and outright falsehoods. It must be challenged.

I farm peanuts for a living. The government has given me

nothing except in case of disaster. Peanuts require high inputs in terms of money, labor and capital. The cost per acre of dry land peanuts, according to Texas A&M University, is about \$173.79 with 10 to 12 trips over that acre per year. My crop insurance is about \$6,000 per year and in case of crop failure, will only pay expenses. We face the uncertainty of weather (drought, flood, heat, cold, wind), plant diseases, and insects. Therefore, we must know something of the price our crop will bring.

Almost all those who want to scrap our very efficient Peanut Program which operates at almost no cost to the taxpayer also are for the B-1 and B-2 bombers when our enemies are crumbling all over the world. I would like to ask them how they can morally justify spending \$258 million of dollars on one B-1 and a probable Billion dollars on one B-2 and be against a peanut program that costs, at maximum nationwide, 4-6 millions of dollars;

and if we have it so good, why don't they farm?

Charlie Rose, House Agriculture Subcommittee Chairman, said that he could not understand why the present Administration wanted a policy that would SAVE peanut manufacturers (candy, peanut butter, etc.) money while costing farmers. He gave testimony showing that if the peanut farmers GAVE their peanuts to them, the retail price of peanut products would not be reduced. Please read Representative Grants' answers to Dick Army's proposal to abandon the peanut program.

## PEANUT PROGRAM FACT SHEET

Congressman Bill Grant

You may know that legislation has been introduced which would basically end the present peanut program. While authors of the legislation are well intentioned, they are basing their arguments on inaccurate information.

### WHAT IS THE PEANUT PRICE SUPPORT PROGRAM?

It is a supply management and price stabilization system which provides a high quality, consistent flow of edible peanuts to the American consumer. Through limits on production we ensure the economic viability of the southern and southwestern family farmer. The USDA annually sets a quota price for peanuts sold on the domestic market. A second tier price for export peanuts is also established. There will never be losses to the Federal Government through this price support because any outlay would be absorbed through the profits of program producers.

The peanut program operates at virtually no cost to the U.S. taxpayer, and it is fair to the farmer, manufacturer and the consumer.

### WHO IS THE AVERAGE GROWER?

There are 20,000 family farms producing peanuts in the United States. In my district there are roughly 1500 growers producing an average of 100 acres of peanuts. They have an average return after production costs of \$342.75 per acre and an annual income of \$34,275; and this figure does not include land costs.

Opponents of the peanut program offer a number of arguments for their position. I have provided a few of their arguments, and the facts about the program for your review.

### FICTION:

They argue that high price supports have created an artificially high price to the American consumer.

### FACT:

If the price of peanuts was lowered, the consumer would not enjoy any pass-on savings. Peanut farmers receive one cent of the fifty cent purchase price of the leading peanut candy bar. An 18 ounce jar of brand name peanut butter costs \$2.45, while the same jar of generic product costs \$1.65. The farmer gets 46 cents no matter which jar is bought. Consumers could save over \$600 million annually by buying generic. They pay more because of advertising, not because of the high costs of peanuts.

### FICTION:

Opponents say we have created "farm feudalism" and a system closed to new producers.

### FACT:

The peanut program is open and accessible to new producers. Since enactment of the 1985 farm bill we have seen over 5000 new peanut producers, giving farmers a new hope in avoiding financial disaster and farm foreclosure at tremendous costs to the American taxpayer.

This year alone there will be an 8.3 percent expansion in program peanut production.

There are four ways new producers can participate in the supply management program: 1) buy quota from another farmer, 2) combine farm quota within the county, 3) rent quota, and 4) grow non-program peanuts for 2 years and become eligible for new domestic quota allocated each year. In fact, new producers are guaranteed a large portion of the new quota.

### FICTION:

The peanut program costs the taxpayers.

### FACT:

The peanut program is a net cost program. That means that unlike many other agricultural commodities, there are no taxpayer support payments given to peanut producers.

If you review the facts about the peanut program as I have, I believe you will support the program which is so important to the future of the southern family farm.

Dietary Measures

Q. I have periodontal (gum) disease. Can changing my diet help?

A. Yes, you can help fight gum disease with special dietary measures. First of all, be sure to decrease the amount of sugar you consume. High blood sugar leads the bacteria that cause infection in the pockets of your gums. If you have the unfortunate habit of clenching your teeth, keep some carrot or celery sticks to chew on so you won't loosen your teeth further. You might want to supplement your diet with some vitamin C to help speed along the healing of your gums. Some dentists also recommend taking vitamin A and bone meal tablets. In any case, be sure to check with your dentist before you begin any vitamin or mineral supplement program.

I made up my mind hurriedly and we were on our way to Eastland County, and a fun filled weekend. We met our cousins there, who had driven in for the momentous occa-

I went to school at this place (Carbon, Texas) for a very short time, so short, I don't even remember when. I do know why. When my mother visited her sisters or parents, she would send me to school-no previous registration-

things were that simple then. The reason I was sent to acquire more knowledge was, I'm afraid, to get me out of their hair so they could have nice quiet visits. I do remember one thing. Those were the days whistlers were so popular as entertainers, and one entertained us with the selection, "Listen to the Mocking-

## I Saw a Dream



A basic first-aid kit should be aboard all boats. Cuts, burns, scratches, bruises, sunburns, embedded hooks, fish fins, and more can happen as easily in a boat as on land. A minor problem can rapidly become serious when you're far from land or help a basic kit containing a variety of bandages, gauze, tape disinfectant, first aid cream and a small instruction booklet is a good beginning. You may wish to add to the kit or make your own kit.

An army ammo box makes a good container for a first aid kit. Make sure the cover seal is in place and conduct a water proof test. Spray paint the box white and using a stencil, paint a red cross on both sides to easily recognize it as a first aid kit. All materials in the kit should be sealed in a water-proof bag. Other items to add include seasickness pills, pain reliever and a spare set of glasses if you wear them. Essential to boaters is sunscreen or sun blocking lotion. Waterproof matches, an emergency hypothermid or space blanket, which takes up very little space and a couple of emergency flares can complete the kit.

Most fishermen carry pliers. An extra pair in the first aid kit is a good idea. These needle-nose pliers should be heavy duty with good gripping surfaces and a side-center to cut hooks.

Of course, the proper personal flotation devices should be on board and it's also a good idea to have a warm jacket or two stored in a safe, dry place, unexpectedly going

overboard, even in mild weather, can cause hypothermia if not treated properly. A good flashlight should be part of the kit.

All the equipment, however, is useless unless you're prepared to use it. The American National Red Cross offers Standard First Aid and Personal Safety night courses at many high schools. Take a course and know basic personal first aid. It's important in boats, just like elsewhere.

AUSTIN-Although the year is a little more than half over, the Angler Recognition Programs Committee has already certified more catches for Big Fish Awards, Water Body Records and Lunker Catch & Release Awards than in all of 1989.

Certifications for the Big Fish Award stood at 161 through June 25, up from 106 for all of last year. While 102 Water Body Records were certified in 1989, 111 already have been certified this year. Lunker Catch & Release has 29 certifications in 1990, compared to 25 in all of 1989.

To present a catch for certification, anglers need only to fill out the Fish Record Application Form, which can be obtained from area Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices or from Austin headquarters, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744. Many sportfishing license vendors also have forms.

One form covers all award categories and anglers must submit the application within 60 days of their catch. Only fish taken from public waters by legal means may be entered. Weight, except for the Lunker Catch & Release program, must be taken on certified scales within three days of being caught. The scale certification number must be

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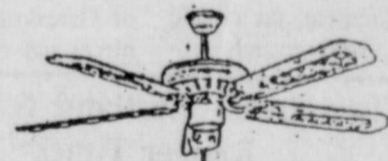

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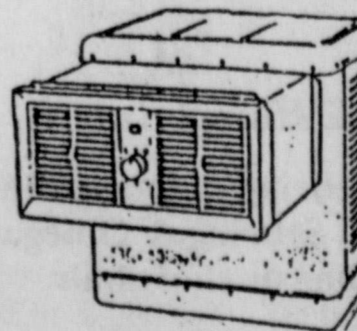

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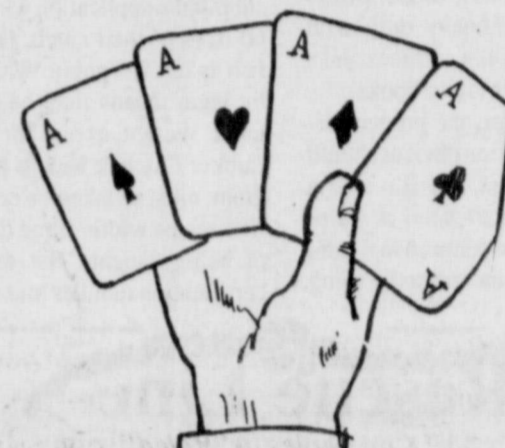

## Pharmacy Topics

Old wives' tale confl. med: a daily cup of yogurt reduces flare-ups of vaginal infections, even in women with chronic vaginitis, according to a study at Long Island Jewish Medical Center in New York. It's important to eat a brand with live lactobacillus acidophilus culture.

Scientists are searching underseas for anti-cancer drugs. Compound didemnin B, found in a sea squirt, may be effective against leukemia and melanoma. The National Cancer Institute is sponsoring trials.

Vitamin B12 deficiency may often be the cause of neurological symptoms, say scientists at Columbia University in New York and the Colorado Health Sciences Center in Denver. They recommend testing for deficiency in any unexplained dementia.

Professors of dental medicine at Columbia University and the Medical College of Philadelphia note a correlation between estrogen levels and dental problems in women. Good dental care is vital, especially during pregnancy, they say.

able size in this area.

By way of comparison, the tax rate used this year by the Cisco Hospital District was just over a penny more than the tax rate levied in the De Leon Hospital District, .13 per \$100 property valuation.

Of the hospital districts surveyed, North Rannels Hospital in Winters has a tax rate of .28 per \$100 to partially support a hospital that is one-third smaller than E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Ballinger Hospital District, which operates Ballinger Memorial and only became a taxing district a year ago, levies a tax rate of .25 per \$100. Both of these hospitals are in Rannels County, an area whose economy is all but totally dependent on agriculture and the oil industry and the property values, along with individual income, is dwindling.

In Eastland County, Ranger General Hospital had a tax rate of .1928 per \$100 property valuation for 1989. That hospital is currently involved in bankruptcy proceedings that will have a strong effect on that district's tax rate.

Eastland Memorial Hospital's taxing district, which came into being in 1989 will assess ad valorem for the first time this year and figures from the Eastland County Central Appraisal District office indicate that tax rate will be approximately .30 per \$100.

Among the other hospital districts surveyed, the tax rates are as follows: Stamford .2152; Hamlin, .18; Comanche, .1620. Stephens Memorial Hospital in Breckenridge is a county-owned and supported hospital in which the tax rate levied by Stephens County includes support of the hospital.

Figures from the Appraisal District office indicated that the total amount of taxable property in the Cisco Hospital District for the current tax year totaled \$109,204,319. The newly certified figures for the 1990 Tax Base for the district is \$110,115,608.
