As rehearsals progress; songs are choreographed, sets are built and painted, costumes are designed and sewn, an over-all sense of anticipation begins to grow. County Property Tax Values Announced

County Judge Scott Bailey states that certified property tax values for the County have been sent to his office from the County Appraisal Dist. Board of Review by Steve Thomas, RPA, Eastland County Tax Appraisal District.

The total appraised value for all property in the County is listed at \$713,350,744. The total of new improvements is \$7,572,362. The total net taxable value is \$434,330,822.

This is down approximately \$5 million from the appraisal last year. Judge Bailey says that much of this loss is due to the State changing the dates of the taxable year for some products.

The total net taxable property for Road and Bridge purposes is certified at \$427,484,232 down about the same \$5 million as the County General Fund taxes.

"The Commissioners will await Mr. Thomas's report on the effective tax rate to generate the same County revenue as last year," says Judge Bailey.

This information on the effective tax rate will also be published in the newspapers, according to Steve Thomas. The Commissioners will set

the actual tax rate after considering the budget and other factors.

The County is allowed up to a 3 percent tax increase without the possibility of a rollback. The current County tax rate is 33.039.

in a small West Texas town, have selected Eastland as the site for an area rally for his campaign, and Clayton Williams is scheduled for a two hour appearance at the rally, including a major campaign speech.

Media representatives from the Metroplex and Abilene as well as local newspapers and radio stations are expected to cover the rally which will be held in Eastland's Maverick Stadium. The rally is expected to draw a couple of thousand people from the 26 county campaign area, and a free barbeque dinner will be served.

Agriculture Commissioner candidate Rick Perry is also scheduled to be at the rally on Saturday, September 8.

Williams' supporters at the meeting told how he had put safety in the oilfield and equal treatment for minorities ahead of making money and popularity. And many of his volunteer workers are women.

The campaign goal for Eastland County is for at least 4,518 or 61.6 percent of the county's qualified voters to vote for Williams.

While the county has long elected local officials on the Democratic ticket, Republicans George Bush, Phil Gramm, and Bill Clements have received a majority vote in Eastland County. And Williams seems to have a stronger campaign organization in the county and area than any of those.

Clayton Williams has been drawing large crowds even in strong Democratic areas and one East Texas Democrat who is influential in the Legislature has endorsed him. But maybe the biggest surprise came when Williams visited Midefian. He was met by a crowd of supporters led by an

elephant playing a harmonica held in his trunk.

Tyron said that the last polls showed Williams to have a substantial lead over opponent Ann Richards with very few undecided people. Williams is defining the agenda and issues in the race, taking stands against such things as crime, gun control, abortion, and excessive paperwork for teachers. He has also challenged Ann Richards' two debates, one in her home town and one in his, but Tyron says Richards seems more interested in trying to use William's crowd during ability to draw a crowd for her to address.

Williams, who has had a Hispanic business partner and speaks Spanish fluently, is expected to receive part of the Hispanic vote, enabling him to expect about half of the San Antonio and Houston vote, according to campaign people. He seems to be very popular in West Texas and the Dallas-Fort Worth area, and public response has been very good in usually Democratic East Texas.

Richards, who reportedly has accepted donations from out-of-state liberals and anti-war activists, has a campaign chest closer to \$100,000, while Williams has already raised about \$2 million for the General Election, according to Tyron, who says mud slinging may come from a desperate Richards campaign, as she tries to convince Texas voters that she is more conservative than her party and supporters indicate. He points to an attempt by Democrats to try to link Williams to a racist in Louisiana.

Berkley To Recycle Monofilament Line

These events kick off at 6:00 p.m. All anglers must be checked in prior to fishing. These events are open to anyone wishing to join in the fun. Talk is that since these events are drawing so well that the E.C.B.C. may adopt a Lake Leon only circuit plus their normal 12 lake a year schedule. The big news from the AFTMA show in New Orleans comes from the leader in today's fishing industry Berkley. Recycling of fishing line has to be the single most important contribution any manufacture could make this year.

How many trolling motor's, big motors fish have been destroyed from anglers throwing their old line in the water after spooling up with new. I know I have caught a boat load fishing, both on lures and motors.

Well save that line Berkley will be announcing the details of this rebate marvel in the near future, so save that line.

Act Now To Create Winter Forage For Deer

Texas landowners interested in providing nutritious supplemental feed for white-tailed deer next winter should begin preparations now, according to wildlife biologist

David Rideout of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"Supplemental feed does not mean shelled corn for feeders," Rideout said. "Corn that is used to attract deer during the hunting season is poor feed for deer because it is low in digestible protein."

Rideout said the answer to a healthy deer herd during the winter stress period may be supplemental food plots that are planted in a combination of oats, elbon rye and yucchi clover. "Planting one to three percent of a landowner's acreage in these plots and fencing them off from cattle can fill the nutrition gap from November through May," he said.

Recommended planting rates are 50 pounds of oats and 50 pounds of elbon rye, overseeded with 10 pounds of inoculated yucchi (arrowleaf) clover per acre.

Planting only oats, even if they are fertilized, is not recommended, Rideout said. "Oats are often killed by freezes and don't last as long as elbon rye and yucchi arrowleaf clover, which are very tolerant of cold weather. The primary advantage of oats is that they produce early and a selective harvest can be done on deer that are attracted to it."

Rideout said his East Texas region generally has adequate rainfall during the fall and winter, so food plots can be relied on to produce from 6,000 to 8,000 pounds of forage per acre. "A deer requires an average of four pounds dry weight forage per day, or about 1,500 pounds per year of native vegetation or planted forage," he said.

Wherever the land is located, a soil test is a good idea prior to planting grains, and especially clover, Rideout noted. Soil sample packets and instructions can be obtained from county agricultural agents. "Soil analyses each cost \$10 and are worth the money because application of proper amounts of lime and fertilizer is essential for optimum forage production," he said.

If plot sites are mowed, disked thoroughly, and the recommended lime with magnesium is applied during

July, the soil will usually have time to absorb these nutrients by October so clover can become established. Yucchi clover requires a soil pH of above 5.8. Most East Texas soils require one to two tons of lime every three years in order to produce clover.

Rideout added that food plots should be from two to 10 acres in size, on well-drained soils, located in or near brush or woods, away from public roads and limed and fertilized as recommended from soil tests.

Food plots can supplement winter diets of deer, turkey and other wildlife, but they are not a substitute for native vegetation that is properly managed. "Deferred rotational grazing of cattle, fencing off of woods from cattle, prescribed winter burning of upland woods and proper harvest of antlerless deer to balance available food to the number of animals are some of the most important management strategies for wildlife managers," Rideout said.

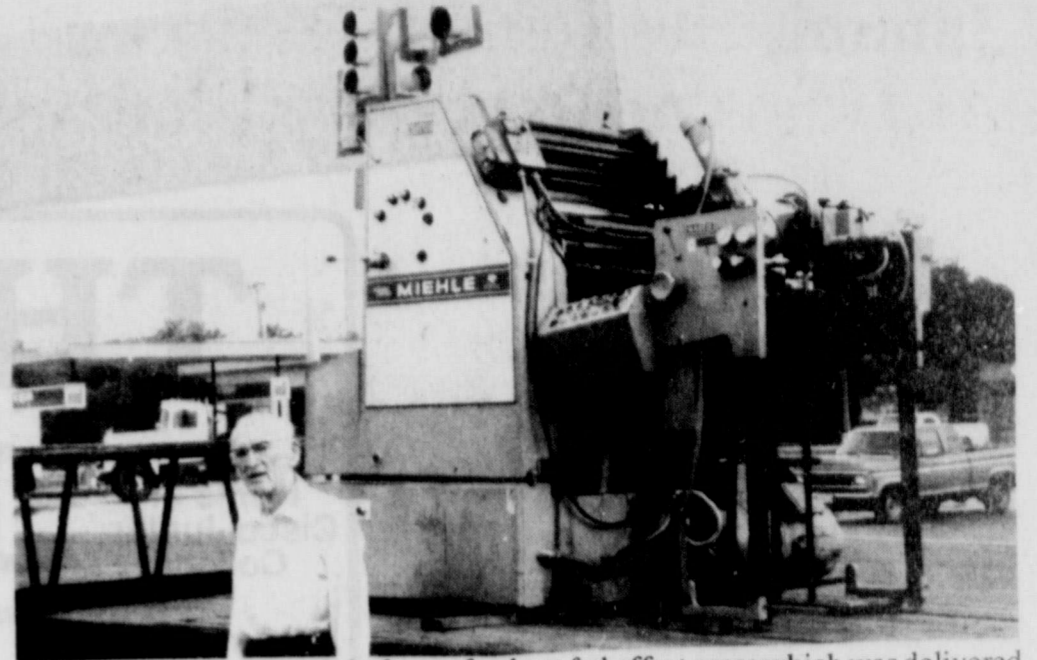

The Gordon Spot

The May or June beetles have emerged from the soil

and have been swarming during the late evenings since May. The females have been laying eggs which hatch into the white grub. These grubs will soon be feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustine grass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Homeowners in Eastland County should treat between now and August 10th, if you have white grub problem. Timing of applications is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon, Dursban, Dylox or Prolox all give adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular forms is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After applying granules with a fertilizer the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

If you use the spray, wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticides through the grass to the root zone where the grubs are feeding.

Recertifications is now required for persons holding private applicator licenses and for those wishing to maintain private applicator certificates issued prior to January 10, 1989. Private applicators must obtain 15 continuing education credits over a 5-year-period. Of the 15, 2 credits must be in laws and regulations and 1 credit in integrated pest management. The recertification requirement is among new and amended regulations adopted by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Licensed private applicators must satisfy the recertification requirement by December 31 of the year preceding renewal of their license. Persons wishing to maintain private applicator certificates issued prior to January 10, 1989 must satisfy the recertification requirement by December 31, 1995 and each 5-

year period thereafter.

Persons who obtained private applicator certification during the period January 10, 1989 through December 31, 1989 must recertify by becoming licensed on or before December 31, 1994. Upon becoming a licensed private applicator, recertification through continuing education will apply a previously described.

Educational activities of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service that include the opportunity to obtain continuing education credits will be identified in program announcements and related publicity. Opportunities to obtain continuing education credits may also be provided by universities, governmental agencies, associations and private, independent (nonapplicator) businesses.

Business Leaders Give Schools Low Grade

Texas business leaders give the state's public schools a grade of C-minus, barely a passing grade, according to a survey by the Texas Research League. The survey, part of the League's student retention project, also shows that nearly half of those surveyed think that the quality of education has declined since the passage of House Bill 72 in 1984.

The survey assessed business attitudes toward public education, educational requirements for employees (both today and in the future), support for various school reform strategies, and current business involvement in the schools.

Other survey findings include:

- Two-thirds of the business people surveyed are very concerned about the problems facing Texas education.
- Forty-three percent of the respondents report difficulty in hiring entry-level employees who possess basic skills in reading, writing and math.
- Employers expect to need entry-level workers with skills beyond the basic level in the future.
- While most companies offered advanced or developmental courses and at least partial tuition reimbursement, the percentage anticipating offering these incentives in the future is going down. On the other hand, the number of companies providing remedial basic skills courses is expected to increase significantly in the future.
- Business overwhelmingly supports the following school reform strategies:
 - raising academic expectations, emphasizing basic skills;
 - requiring a longer school year;

- offering early childhood programs;
- increasing teacher pay;
- holding teachers more accountable for student performance; and
- decreasing class size.
- More than two-thirds of business surveyed provide assistance to local schools.
- Business is willing to become surveyed provide assistance to local schools.
- Business is willing to become more active in its

support of education, particularly active involvement such as loaning executives to the schools, teaching courses, and tutoring and counseling students.

• The school's lack of accountability and mismanagement are cited as the most significant hurdles that business must overcome to be active in supporting local schools.

Prompt drug treatment after spinal cord injuries can reduce paralysis and other disability, the National Institutes of Health reported. In research, patients were given high doses of a steroid hormone, methylprednisolone, within eight hours of injury.

Rheumatologists at the University of Michigan Medical Center and the Presbyterian Medical Center in Philadelphia now emphasize the benefits of exercise against the stiffness of arthritis -- even if it hurts. Gradual, custom-tailored workouts are recommended.

Antidepressant clomipramine can curb the compulsion of some people to pull out their hair. Drug therapy was reported in the New England Journal of Medicine.

What causes diabetes? Researchers in Sweden and the United States say that overproduction of islet-amyloid polypeptide, a newly identified natural hormone, may trigger the disease by interfering with insulin effectiveness so that the body can't use glucose properly.

Dan Childress Is 'Farmer Of The Year'

Dan Childress, who with his wife Nancy owns and operates Childress Nutty Acres about eight miles northwest of Cross Plains, was named Resident Conservation Farmer of the Year by the Callahan Divide Soil and Water Conservation District. Childress is a native of Eastland County and an Eastland High graduate. Following graduation from Oklahoma A & M, he was employed by the U.S. Forest Service for 33 years.

Planning for retirement, Childress bought 80 acres of sandy bottomland which was covered with brush in 1965. The brush was cleared and pecan trees were planted and budded. Most of the trees were Wichita, but there were 25 varieties. With help from sons Bob and Scott, the horticulture and peanut farm was expanded to the present 350 acres.

Following retirement in 1970, Dan and Nancy Childress moved to Eastland where they began a new life. Dan worked to improve the farm while Nancy entered politics. After Nancy served a term on the City Council and as Mayor, they moved to the new Spanish style adobe house which Dan had built on the farm.

Afghanistan pines and peach trees were also planted on the farm, with the pines being sold to individuals for Christmas trees before the peach trees became productive. Some of the unharvested pines have grown to 25 feet in

height. The trees were watered from a storage tank on a hill by a gravity fed drip irrigation system, and they provided a wind break for the sandy land. Different varieties of peaches were used so that they will produce fruit at different times during the year.

Peanuts are rotated with sorghum and grain in a 3 year rotation program. Cover crops are used to prevent erosion. About 45 acres of coastal Bermuda grass have been sprigged for grazing and hay. Weed control and fertilizer are used.

Through hard work, Dan Childress has turned brush infested land into a conservation show place. But he still finds time to be an active member of both the Eastland Farm Bureau and the Eastland Pecan Growers Association, and he often talks or participates at various functions. And his pecans often win at the shows.

Adopted Children Can Get Social Security Benefits

A change in the Social Security law effective January 1990 makes it easier for a child adopted by a Social Security beneficiary to receive benefits based on the beneficiary's record.

Under previous law, these children generally could not receive benefits unless the adopting parent had lived with and supported the child for a

full year before the parent became entitled to disability or retirement benefits. The legislative change eliminated this requirement for most children.

Any beneficiary who has adopted a child who might be eligible for benefits should contact Social Security to file a child's benefits application.

The child's birth certificate, Social Security number, and proof of adoption will be needed, but claimants should file applications right away to avoid loss of benefits, even if these documents are not readily available.
