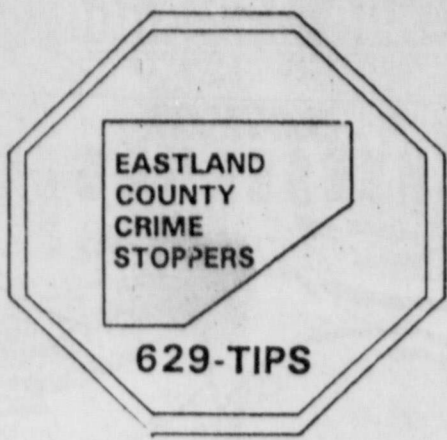

General Rain For Eastland County; Lakes Gain Water

A slow-moving cold front met some Gulf moisture in Eastland County this past Saturday and Sunday. The result was general rain in most parts of the area, with 3 1/2 inches in Cisco, 3 inches in Ranger, 3.75 for Rising Star, and even heavier rains reported across the south part of the county. Rising Star's total for Thursday through Sunday was 4.2 inches.

The total in Eastland was considerably less, reports Ron Bailey of the ASCS office. Sunday's total in his rain gauge was 1.8, with very little for Saturday. The blue cloud that rolled in from the northwest on Saturday split before it got to Eastland. Cisco got a good rain from that one, though - water ran curb deep in places on Main Street.

Randy Johnson of the Pump Station at Lake Cisco reports that the gauge there showed 3.2 inches for Saturday and Sunday. The lake has risen seven inches from these latest rains, and things are looking good. He mentions there is still room for some more water, however.

Lake Cisco had gone down about 12 inches since the early spring rains, but these August rains have nearly put it all back, Johnson says.

Lake Leon has caught over five inches of water recently, an operator at the Eastland County Water District Pump Station reports. Both forks of the Leon River have been running, although there are no reports of flooding in lowlands.

Three-inch rains were general around the town of Ranger, but no serious flooding was reported. The Flat-

wood community received about 2 1/2 inches, with totals higher toward Gorman and DeLeon. Carbon reported 2.10 in Sunday's rain, with other totals earlier.

There was no flooding in Eastland County to match that in neighboring Comanche County. DeLeon received almost 3 inches of rain in 48 minutes Sunday morning, bringing the town's two-day total to about 5 inches. The heavy rains brought water over a bridge in the main part of town, and two cars were washed off roads.

Number Of Registered Voters Slightly Down

Eastland County Tax Collector Nancy Trout reports that the list of registered voters in her office is holding fairly steady - but slightly under that of last January.

In January, 1990 the total of registered voters in all County Precincts was 11,002. The August 1990 total is 10,959.

The Tax Office has been making continual revisions on voters, Mrs. Trout says. Some names have been taken off because of death or moving away, but other people have been coming in almost daily to register.

Mrs. Trout urges any County resident who is not registered to come to her of-

fice (first floor of courthouse) and be listed.

With the General Election on Nov. 6, 1990, the effective cutoff date for that election would be Friday, October 5.

Texas State Aquarium Extends Summer Hours

The Texas State Aquarium will be open with longer hours beginning July 29 in response to high public demand to see the new facility.

Summer hours, which will be in effect through Labor Day, will be 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Friday, Saturday and Labor Day.

"More than 90,000 visitors from throughout the state have gone through the facility since we opened July 6," said Denise London, Aquarium marketing director. "Our extended hours will give more visitors the opportunity to see the Aquarium this summer. The extended hours also will allow them more time so that they can go through the facility at their own pace."

The new extended summer hours will make it easier for out-of-town visitors and local residents alike to visit the facility.

An average of 4,500 people have visited the Aquarium each weekday, with the number increasing to 6,500 visitors per day on weekends.

To further accommodate visitors, the Aquarium is using timed-entry ticketing that allows visitors to purchase their tickets in advance through Ticketron and to enter facility at a specific time. Visitors can also purchase timed-entry tickets on the day of their visit from the Aquarium ticket office.

"Timed ticketing is designed as a visitor convenience, and it does not limit the amount of time the visitor may spend in the facility," explained London.

Ticket sales begin each day at 9 a.m. The first visitors are admitted at 9:30 a.m. Ticket

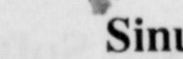

Sinus Toothache

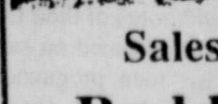
Q. Is it possible to have a toothache from a cold?

A. Yes. The sinuses are bony openings in the upper jaw. There are several sinus cavities located right above your upper back teeth. If you have a cold, sometimes congestion occurs in these cavities, and that can cause a toothache. One way you can judge if you have a sinus toothache is if your back teeth are sensitive to hot or cold liquids, or if they feel loose when you bite down. If you think you have such a toothache, a visit to your dentist is in order. After an examination, he or she will probably prescribe a decongestant to relieve the pressure, and perhaps an antibiotic as well.

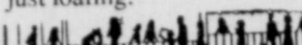

Aspirin-a-day dose reduces the risk of stroke by 80 percent in patients with atrial fibrillation, a nationwide study found. Doctor's care is vital, say researchers, because aspirin may raise other risks.

"Band Aid surgery" for gallbladder removal is done with a laparoscope. Pain and postoperative limitations are reduced, say doctors at the Scripps Clinic in LaJolla, California.

The longer an alcoholic stays away from drink, the easier it gets, says a psychologist at Johns Hopkins University. The relapse rate lowers with time, down to almost zero after five years, a study found.

New drug, flucanazole, has received approval from the Food and Drug Administration. It's used to treat fungal infections common in people with AIDS and other conditions that weaken the immune system.

Vitamin C supplements were given to ease the discomfort of allergic dermatitis in a test at UC/San Francisco. Result: both severity and number of symptoms were reduced.

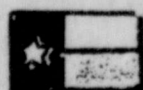

Children Of Working Parents Need After-School Care

By 1995, 80 percent of all school-age children will have mothers in the work force, and many of those children may be left to care for themselves after school, says Texas Medical Association.

When parents don't arrive home from work until after 5 or 6 p.m., their children face a number of safety risks, such as fire, falls and molestation, said TMA member Jerry Newton, M.D., school health doctor of San Antonio Independent School District.

In addition to physical danger, these so-called "latch-key" children are deprived of nurturing and other social-emotional needs. Some sit fearfully behind a locked door watching television, while others roam the streets where they risk getting involved in alcohol and drugs.

Finding quality after-school care for children often is difficult and expensive. TMA supports the concept of after-hours care in the schools, particularly in children of low-income families.

"After-school care at school is an excellent way to provide day-care for working parents," Dr. Newton said, because the physical facilities (building, utilities, playground) already are there.

But, he emphasized, after-school care should not "be an extension of school." Children should not do homework or other academic tasks, but rather engage in "free play."

"Children need to develop social skills by playing with other children, and they can't do that when adults are always telling them what to do," said Dr. Newton.

Play "ought to be fun and not geared toward physical fitness," he continued. Parents should be caregivers "encourage children to participate" for their own enjoy-

ment and "not to perform or perfect athletic skill."

Besides play, after-school programs ideally should offer nutritional snacks, arts and crafts projects, and enrichment activities such as music.

In most large cities in Texas, after-school care is available at some public schools, usually in cooperation with a non-profit community organization.

In 1989 the Texas Legislature passed a law requiring school districts with more than 5,000 students to have two public hearings annually to assess the need for schoolage care and its availability in the community.

Whether seeking public or private after-school care, TMA encourages parents to choose quality programs. Anything less is not worth the risk.

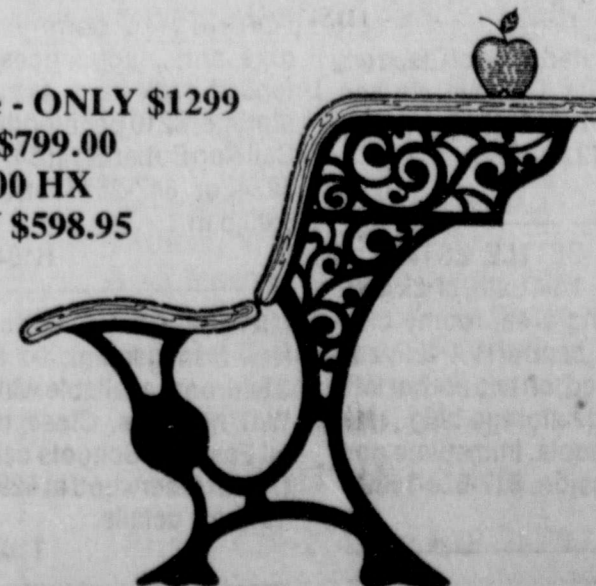

New Cases Of Childhood Cancer Will Occur In 1990

An estimated 7,600 new cases of childhood cancer will occur in 1990. This disease in children is rare. There will be an estimated 1,600 deaths, about one third of them will be leukemia. As a result, cancer is the chief cause of death by disease in children between the ages of three and fourteen.

Children's cancers are often difficult to recognize since symptoms are similar to many simple childhood ailments. Persistence of any of the eight warning signals warrants medical attention and may indicate a serious health problem. Parents should make sure that their children receive medical checkups during preschool and school years so that a doctor is familiar with the child's pattern of growth and development.

Know the eight warning signals of possible childhood cancer.

- Continued, unexplained weight loss
 - Headaches with vomiting in the morning
 - Increased swelling or persistent pain in bones or joints
 - Lump or mass in abdomen, neck or elsewhere
 - Development of a whitish appearance in the pupil of the eye
 - Recurrent fevers not due to infections
 - Excessive bruising or bleeding
 - Noticeable paleness or prolonged tiredness

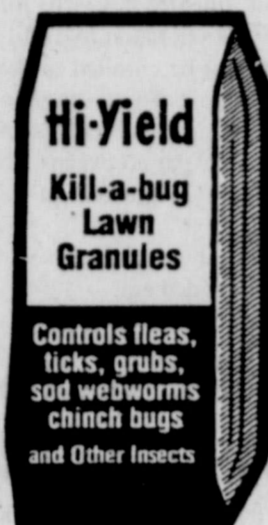

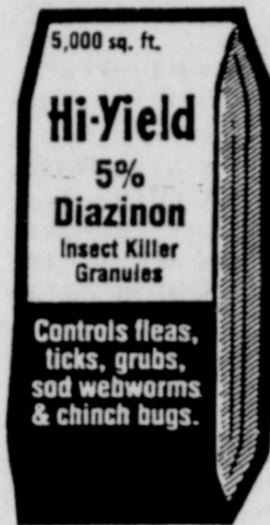

Most Arrests Related To Substance Abuse

According to a survey of those arrested and brought to the Eastland County Jail by the various law enforcement agencies during the first six months of 1990, substance abuse is still the major factor in county crime event though the number of crimes has been declining.

Driving while intoxicated topped the lists with 104 arrests, followed by public intoxication with 51. There were 30 arrests for possession of marijuana, 24 for possession of methamphetamine, two for possession of cocaine, and 3 for selling or manufacturing methamphetamine.

Theft with 29 arrests and burglary with 22 were usually drug related with the proceeds from the crimes

The other double digit figures were 20 assaults, which are often the result of family disagreements, and 13 miscellaneous non traffic offenses.

There were five arrests for murder and one for manslaughter by negligence, four for sex offenses other than rape and prostitution and 6 for offenses against family or children. That is a total of 344 arrests in six months, or an average of more than 57 per month.

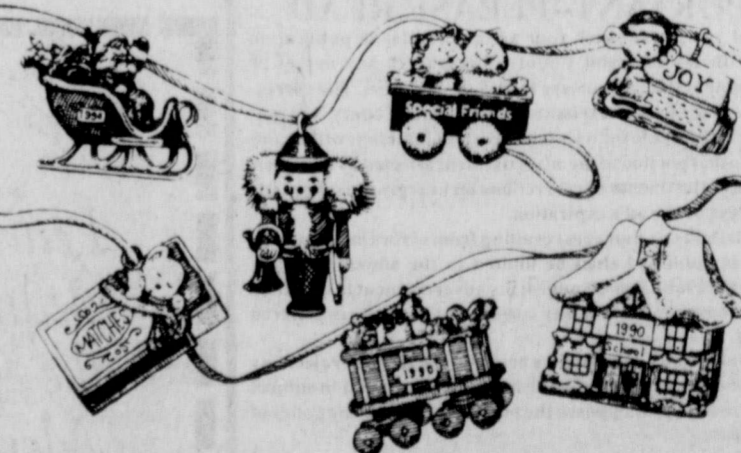

Vaccines, Caution Prevent Rabies

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) routinely issues public reminders that pet owners need to renew their animal's rabies vaccinations yearly, as the law requires. However, health officials stress that shots for pets are only the minimum precautions Texans should take in avoiding exposure to rabies.

People also should stay away from stray cats and dogs, particularly any that are behaving unnaturally. They also never should try to handle a wild animal which appears to have no fear of humans. It is impossible to know whether a stray animal without a tag has been vaccinated, and no vaccines have been developed for most wild species.

Veterinarians, trappers, hunters and cave explorers should note the general health of any animals they encounter, and should consider precautionary immunizations against rabies every two years.

Bobby L. Davis, Director of the TDH General Sanitation Division, explained that anyone handling wild mammals risks exposure to rabies. In recent years, a wide variety of animals, including the first armadillo known to be diagnosed with the disease, have been reported to TDH. Also, for a second year, a

serious outbreak of rabies has persisted among rural dogs and coyotes along the Mexican border.

At least one human death from rabies has occurred this year in Texas, resulting from a man being bitten by a bat.

"Bats are second only to wild skunks as the most frequent carriers of rabies," Davis said.

Davis said that bats in recent years have been proven beneficial in controlling insects and in pollinating crops. They also are innocent of evils attributed to them through centuries of folklore. "We know now how useful bats are," he added, "but that is no reason for us to forget that they, like most other unvaccinated animals, can carry deadly diseases."

"We recently have been concerned about potential danger in the new public interest in bats, raccoons and other non-domestic animals. Some people have begun to adopt these species as pets, even taking them into school classrooms," he said.

"In our opinion at TDH, no animal should be allowed on school property unless it has a clean bill of health, and there is no way a veterinarian can certify that a wild animal does not carry rabies," Davis added. Davis said that anyone who

is bitten or attacked by an animal believed to be rabid should notify local health and animal control authorities. Specimens of the animal should be tested to determine whether the animal is rabid. Also, the victim's doctor may recommend treatment to prevent onset of rabies.

Host Families Needed For Exchange Students

The Russians are coming! So are the French, Spanish, the Italians, Japanese, Australians, the South Americans and the Scandinavians.

Unfortunately, many might not be able to come because there will not be a place for them to stay when they get here.

All over the United States, volunteers and staff with student exchange services say they are facing a critical shortage of host family homes for year long high school exchanges.

If host families aren't found within the next few weeks, some organizations say that many students eager to live an American experience may have to give up their dream. Were this to happen, some of tomorrow's future foreign leaders may be deprived of the opportunity of learning first hand about the United States, its customs, its institutions and, above all, its hospitable people.

"We are finding it very difficult to find families interested in hosting. Perhaps the market is too saturated," said J. Scott Thornton, President of International Education Forum.

"There has been a dramatic increase in the number of student exchange service organizations. There are now dozens of foundations bring-

ing thousands of students to visit and study in the United States," Thornton said.

"This dramatic increase in the need for host homes is also coupled by a decline in the number of host families asking for an international student," Thornton continued.

When both husband and wife have separate careers, they are often reluctant to take on the responsibility of caring for an international high school student. They worry that the student may feel neglected and unhappy in this family situation.

"But two-career families, and single parent families should not rule themselves out," says Bill Gustafson, President of ASSE International Student Exchange Programs.

"Local coordinators interviewing prospective host families are not looking for a specific traditional family structure that might resemble 'Ozzie and Harriet'," said Marsha Day, local coordinator. "We are looking for a happy family situation even if it is a busy one. The family must also provide a student with their own bed and include the student with the family meals and normal activities."

AMERICAN SCANDINAVIAN STUDENT EXCHANGE (ASSE): ASSE, founded as American Scandinavian Student Exchange by the Swedish government, is affiliated with the Swedish and Finnish national Departments of Education, maintains 21 offices in 19 countries and accommodates more than 10,000 high school age student exchanges annually. In August, over 2300 girls and boys, 15 through 18 years of age from Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Mexico, France, England, Australia and eleven other countries, plan on coming to the USA through the ASSE program. Families or persons interested in finding out more about hosting as ASSE exchange student should call Debbie at 1-800-333-3802.

INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION FORUM (IEF): Over 1300 high school age students are expected to arrive in August from Brazil, Denmark, Finland, Sweden, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, the Netherlands, Thailand, and many other countries. Students are high screened, and academically qualified since school attendance is a requirement. Students will be visiting for 3.5, or 10 months. They have medical insurance and have their own spending money. Those families interested in hosting an international student should call 1-800-234-8339 and ask for April. SPANISH HERITAGE:

Spanish Heritage needs homes for carefully screened high school students from Spain and Mexico who wish to attend high school for one year in this country. They are fully insured and are responsible for their personal expenses. For further details, call 1-800-669-1223.

Officials of long-established student exchange foundations recommend that potential host families ask the agency representative several questions before they agree to take in a student:

- Is there a local representative who will be available to counsel the student and family if there are problems? Will they be ready to move the student if relationship between the family and student doesn't work out?

- If the student is here for a year long high school program, does the program have counselors available to help students get in the right classes, assert themselves if a school tries to push them into inappropriate classes?

- Does the organization require visiting students to have their own medical coverage and other insurance before they come to the United State? Is a responsible agency representative nearby and on-call in case the student gets in trouble or has an emergency?

- How long has the organization existed? If the organization has its headquarters overseas, how long has it operated in the United States?

- Has your local school district ever worked with the agency or had students enrolled who came to the United

States through the agency? Were there any previous bad experiences?
