Dear Editor:

A matter of minutes on any given day can change your life forever! Few people want to think of facing a medical crisis. Fewer still want to think of facing a medical crisis without the skill, judgment, and physical interaction of competent personnel.

Yet a frightening scenario is being repeated daily in rural communities across the country, and Cisco is one of the latest statistics. The only hospital in town closes. Heart attack, accident, and other medical emergency victims must wait for an ambulance to transport them to out-of-town hospitals. In towns that are fortunate enough to retain ambulance services, the possibility that the units may be in use when needed is not remote. These units are used for everything from transporting elderly patients to out-of-town nursing centers to standing by at local football games.

In life-threatening situations, response time is critical. Every passing second counts. The benefits of having a local hospital where a victim can be stabilized within minutes is crucial.

It's unbelievable how fast a bad situation can get worse. Your life could hinge on the extra time that tick away while you are being transported to an out-of-town hospital. When your life is threatened, having a local hospital is just not a matter of convenience. It is a matter of life and death.

If you support your hospital, vote AGAINST a tax rollback.

growing up during the Depression where they didn't have and couldn't afford a hospital. Now to try and scare them by saying they will die because they are ten miles from a hospital is a very cruel joke. Having to go to Eastland to the hospital is not a very expensive or frightening experience. You do not have to drive for hours, you do not have to stay in a motel for days, you do not have to do anything you would not have to do if you went to Cisco. It sure is a lie to say that the men and women at Eastland Memorial hospital don't have compassion for you because you are from Cisco; or to say that it is easier to get into Cisco's hospital than to get into Eastland's. I know, because my son just spent five days in Eastland's hospital and they cared just as much for him there as they would have in Cisco.

Voting for the 50 cent tax rate will not show your support for the hospital, it will show that you are willing to let people take your money and do whatever they want for it. I am not against the hospital, I am just against the ideas that the only way to solve every problem is to throw more tax money in the fire. What we need to do is recognize that times are changing in America and the world and we are going to have to come up with new solutions. Many people in and around Cisco are of the opinion that we no longer need a thirty bed hospital draining money from the people. We need a good emergency center with 5 or 6 rooms to get people to and get them stabilized. Then transfer them to Eastland or Abilene. I, myself, would just as soon build up a real good regional hospital in Eastland than have three "bed and breakfast" hospitals ten miles apart.

A vote for the tax rollback

is a vote to work for a more realistic future for Cisco and Eastland County. Send a message to the hospital district that they must listen to the voters and do something more than waste our money.

As ever, for better or worse, for friends or foe, I gladly sign my name so you know where I stand and that no one does my thinking for me.

Faith Baptist Church News

Pastor M.H. Clark of Faith Baptist Church in Cisco is currently discussing the divine origin and infallibility of the Bible on the church's radio broadcast on KEAS (97.7 FM and 1590 AM) each Sunday morning at 9:30. This Sunday, November 24, he will speak on the Bible's historical accuracy as attesting its supernatural origin. Dr. Clark affirms that archaeological discoveries have left very few Biblical events unconfirmed. As one example, the scholars once said that there were no such people as the "Hittites," mentioned forty-seven (47) times to Nehemiah 9:8 (about 450 B.C.). But the archaeologists dug up old cities that showed the Hittites to have been a very powerful kingdom at the very time the Bible speaks of them, and now scarcely an ancient history text-book is without at least a chapter or section on the ancient Hittite Empire. Pastor Clark will give many more such examples of how the "scholars" have been proved in error about the bible by their own archaeological discoveries. Following this, he will show the astonishing scientific accuracy of the Bible, prophecies which were fulfilled in the most minute details hundreds of years after they were made, and the perfect unity and harmony of the 66 books of the Bible, written over a period of sixteen centuries by some 40 different human pensmen of God.

Wise Economic Move?

Q. Could I tighten the clasp on my removable partial denture and save myself time and money?

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the Extension Homemaker Clubs will sponsor the 1990 Pecan Bake Show on Thursday, Dec. 6, at the Eastland County Courthouse Lobby.

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring ribbons and cash awards for the winning entries in the six (6) divisions for both the ADULT and YOUTH divisions. The Eastland County Extension Homemakers Council will sponsor engraved silver trays for the youth and adult Pecan Bake Show Grand Champion winners.

The divisions are: PIE, CAKE, CANDY, COOKIES, NUT BREAD AND PECAN SNACKS.

All baked products must contain pecans. Recipes should accompany all bake show entries. No refrigerated items and no food products made with mixes will be accepted.

Mrs. Janet Thomas, Eastland County Extension agent-Home Economics, states that the Pecan Bake Show is held in conjunction with the Pecan Show each

year. All men and women are invited to enter. The youth division is open to all school age youth 3rd grade to 19 years of age.

All entries must be entered by 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, Dec. 6, at the Courthouse Lobby. Cash awards and ribbons will be awarded as follows: first place \$2.50; 2nd place \$1.50; and 3rd Place \$1.00. Grand Champion of the Adult and Youth divisions will be awarded \$5.00 and Reserve Grand Champion will be awarded \$4.00.

Entries will be returned to the owners between 4 and 5 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 6. Pecan Bake Show entries not claimed by 5 p.m. will be sold and the money will go to the Extension Homemakers Council treasury fund.

Entries Are Due By December 5 For Eastland County Pecan Show

Entries for the 38th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show are due at the County Extension Service office by 4:00 p.m., Wednesday, December 5th. The office is located in the basement of the Eastland County Courthouse.

Each entry must have at least 43 nuts of the same variety. Bring the nuts in a paper sack marked with owner's name, address, telephone number and variety if known. All pecans entered in the show must have been grown in 1990 by the person showing them. Each grower is limited to one entry of each

improved or papershell variety. There is no limit on the number of seedling or native entries one grower may enter. There will, also, be a class for the largest pecans and the smallest pecans.

Plaques will be awarded for the champion and rosettes for the reserve champion in the commercial, classic and native divisions. Ribbons will be awarded for the first three placing entries in each class. Plaques and ribbons are courtesy of the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association and the Texas Pecan Grower's Association.

The pecan show is being organized by the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association, Eastland Chamber of Commerce and Eastland County Extension Program Council Pecan Committee.

Q. What are Identity Achievers like?
A. Identity Achievers are a more diverse group than Forecloures. Many factors and circumstances cause the formation of a self-made identity.
Psychological growth involves increasing autonomy from the parents and increased individualization from the pre-adolescent self.
The adolescent has internalized the parents values. Further growth involves re-working the internal self. This is the process of individuation.

Although the adolescent gains in autonomy and freedom, some security and protection as a child is relinquished.
Individuation is painful because it involves giving up trusted aspects that feel like the self. There is a sense of uncertainty and rootlessness. In return the adolescent gains possibilities, but freedom can be terrifying. They feel relativity and risk in life decisions. They are free but vulnerable.

Identity Achievement women have gone through this process during adolescence. They have forged identities on their own terms. They have reworked the identities assigned to them as children. They are not necessarily achievers in the work world. They are women who choose lives after stillthrough options and have a life plan they can claim as their own.

Identity Achievement women are considered payers of the way.

Ask Theatre Manager Ed Allcom how much trouble he had getting this film! It's a big demand all across the country, with both popular and critical acclaim.

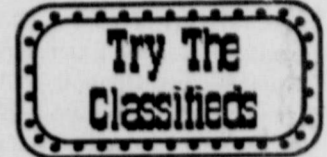

This figure compares with preliminary July production of 1,699,325 barrels daily. August 1989 preliminary production was 1,755,463 barrels daily.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for August is 53,313,628 barrels, up from 447,945,688 barrels in July.

August 1989 preliminary Texas oil production figure was 54,419,363 barrels.

Hance said the state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary August production were: Andrews, 3,760,204 barrels; Gaines, 3,268,584 barrels; Yoakum, 3,054,562 barrels; Hockley, 2,655,475 barrels; Ector, 2,442,016 barrels; Gregg, 2,345,965 barrels; Pecos, 2,135,807 barrels; Crane, 1,712,862 barrels; Scurry, 1,108,512 barrels; and Kent,

1,054,338 barrels. Eastland County crude oil production for August is reported at 74,690 barrels, an increase from previous months.

You asked the question how can I find out if my account has been properly credited.

It is simple and does not cost you. Call 1-800-234-5772 and ask for Form 7004. The form is called "Request for Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement." Three to four weeks later you will receive the form — complete it and return it.

Be sure and have the following information at the time you call: full name, address, age and social security number.

When you return your card you can get a projected estimate of your Social Security when you retire at age 62 or 65.

Since Social Security provides this information for you free never pay anyone to get the information for you.

You should check your Social Security contributions every two years. At one time if the earnings were not reported. Three years ago, you had great difficulty in getting them adjusted. Today, it is more simple but it does pay to check often.

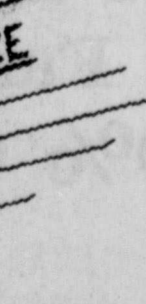

Santa Face Cookies For The Kid In All Of Us

For many of us, home baking has ceased being routine. And then December arrives, and we can't seem to resist the urge to stir up at least one batch of rich flavorful butter cookies.

So many of the cookies we so love this time of year are based on butter cookies...probably because they keep so well and taste so good. These whimsical Santa-Face cookies from the American Dairy Association test kitchens are short, tender, light and delicate and will keep for up to two weeks stored at room temperature in an airtight container.

The butter cookie experts at ADA recommend using quarter pound sticks or pound pieces of butter, never whipped butter, when making these or any other butter cookies. Use butter that is firm but not too hard. Cut cold butter into small pieces and it will quickly whip to the

creamy state. If you're over zealous in the beating or if the butter is too soft, you'll need to add extra flour and that renders the cookies less tender.

To firm up dough that is to be rolled out so it won't stick to the rolling pin or surface, chill it in the refrigerator for one to two hours. Or, chill it in the freezer for 20 to 40 minutes.

Work with a third of the dough at a time, wrapping what is left in plastic wrap and returning it to the refrigerator so it stays firm. Roll the dough on a lightly floured surface such as a pastry cloth or countertop. Using a floured rolling pin, work from the center to the edges. Cut the dough into shapes, using cookie cutters dusted with flour to prevent sticking. Or cut out shapes with a sharp knife using a cardboard pattern. Reroll scraps left from the cutouts to cut more cook-

ies. Though this can toughen dough, rerolling on a surface dusted with a mixture of equal parts flour and powdered sugar will toughen it less than rerolling on flour alone.

With so many things to do during the holidays, few of us have the inclination for tedious decorations, but the jovial Santa's countenance is deceptively easy with currants for his eyes and a cinnamon candy for his nose. Color his cap and mouth using red food coloring diluted with water to desired shade and a small paint brush. His wispy beard is equally simple. Before baking, place a small amount of the dough in the cavity of a garlic press. Squeeze the handles together, forcing the



dough through the holes. Use a knife to break off the strands and apply to Santa's face.

Santa Face Cookies

Yield: 24

1 cup (2 sticks) butter
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
2 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
Currants

Red cinnamon candies
Food Colorings
Miniature marshmallows
Decorator's frosting
Cream butter until fluffy. Gradually beat in sugars until light and fluffy. Mix in milk

and vanilla. Mix in flour. Chill dough 1 to 2 hours for ease in handling. Preheat oven to 375 F. Work with about one-third of dough at a time, leaving remainder in refrigerator. Roll on lightly floured surface to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut into Santa Faces using floured cookie cutter. Place on unbuttered cookie sheets. Make face using currants for eyes, a cinnamon candy for a nose. Paint cap and mouth using red food coloring diluted with water to desired shade. Paint eyebrows using brown food coloring or cocoa powder and water mixture. To make curly beard, press small pieces of dough through a garlic press. Place on cookie to form a beard. Bake 10 to 12 minutes, or until cookies are just golden. Cool pan 1 minute. Remove from pan and cool completely on wire racks. Place 3 or 4 miniature marshmallows at end of the hat for tassel; secure with small amount of decorator's frosting. Store at room temperature in airtight metal container up to two weeks.

1 cup (2 sticks) butter
1 1/2 cups firmly packed brown sugar
2 eggs
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon EACH: cinnamon, nutmeg

Texas State Aquarium New Bayfront Marine To Be Built Near Gulf

Officials of the Texas State Aquarium announced today that they are breaking ground for a new bayfront marine education center to be built next to the Gulf of Mexico Building on North Shoreline Boulevard. The facility should be complete by next spring.

Appropriately named Shore Lab, the newest Aquarium expansion will be built on property already owned by the Texas State Aquarium Association.

The Shore Lab will provide ready access to the shore, collection equipment, and saltwater labs. Each classroom/lab will contain over 1,000 square feet of teaching, preparatory, and storage space. Each will have salt-resistant fixtures and 200 gallon holding tanks with filters and water tables.

"The facility is so close to

the Gulf of Mexico habitats that folks can go right out into the water, get wet, and come back with specimens to a lab that is designed for real hands-on involvement. The location also makes it easy for groups to tour the Aquarium before or after a Shore Lab

program," said TSA Education Director Bruce Stewart. Designed by the Corpus Christi Design Group, the \$500,000 facility features an attractive nautical facade to complement the Aquarium. Executive Director Dr. Quenton Dokken sums up the

Shore Lab's appeal: "Take the Sea Star Discovery Pool and multiply it by 100. That is the kind of exponential growth in hands-on marine biology the Shore Lab will provide.

Texas Horizontal Drilling Permits Top 1,000 Mark

The pace of Texas horizontal drilling activity accelerated in October, fueled by increasing applications for horizontal drilling permits in the Pearsall and Giddings (Austin Chalk) Fields.

The Railroad Commission issued 141 permits for horizontal wells statewide in October, raising to 1,070 the number of horizontal permits granted in Texas since January 1, 1984. So far, the Commission has issued 870 horizontal permits in 1990 alone.

By comparison, the Commission issued 104 horizontal drilling permits statewide in Sept., while just 127 such permits were applied for and granted during all of 1989.

The Pearsall Field remains the nation's hub of horizontal drilling activity. Eighty new permits were granted for horizontal projects in that portion of the Austin Chalk geologic formation during October. Operators in Frio County, heart of the current Pearsall "mini-boom," accounted for 45 of the total.

More than one-third of all horizontal projects planned or underway in Texas are located in Frio County. A total of 376 permits for horizontal wells have now been issued there, while 164 of those wells have

been completed.

Meantime, Zavala County ranks second in the Pearsall Field with 122 horizontal permits issued through Oct. 31, a gain of 14 from Sept., followed by Dimmitt County with 107, up 10, and LaSalle County with 77, an increase of 11 permits from September.

In all, 682 of the 1,070 permits for horizontal wells issued in Texas through Oct. 31 have been granted to operators in the Pearsall Field. Some 270 of those wells have now been completed.

Meanwhile, the Commission has issued 211 permits for horizontal wells in the Giddings (Austin Chalk) field through Oct. 31. Burtleson County leads the horizontal race there with 139 permits, followed by Lee County with 38, Fayette County, 30, and Washington County with 4. As of Oct. 31, 98 horizontal wells had been completed in the Giddings Field.

In all, operators in 49 Texas counties have received Railroad Commission permits to drill horizontal wells. Besides the counties previously noted, 61 permits for horizontal wells have been granted to operators in Gonzales County, 24 have been issued for horizon-

tal projects in Wilson County, while another 10 permits have been granted to operators drilling horizontal holes in Brazos County.

Horizontal drilling is a technique used to tap oil reserves that can't be recovered profitably using standard methods. Target reserves typically are found in vertical fractures or cervices in rock. The pockets usually are difficult to pinpoint and penetrate using vertical wellbores. In horizontal drilling, wells are drilled vertically to a predetermined depth. Then, the wellbore is turned and bored horizontally up to several thousand feet, intersecting several fracture systems.

When football is over, major changes have to be made in the instrumentation of the band in order to prepare for concert season. Time should also be allowed for practicing and any alterations to the program have to be considered before serious work is to be done.

Another reason for the change is that the concert, the Booster Club and Mr. Scarbrough hopes, will be one that band alumni will annually prepare to attend. Mr. S. is asking for names and addresses of all past band alumni in order to prepare a list to mail invitations for the concert. Methodist Home Selective Recall

The centennial celebration of the existence of the Methodist Home in Waco reminds me...

It was more or less a fluke that made me an instructor in a federal program there. The "fluke" lasted about twelve

years.

Reo Habern, North Waco Elementary principal, was a careful reader of fine print. All of the Methodist Home Children were sent to Waco public schools, and in persuading some of the federal fine print, Reo called Bill Copeland, then director of the Home, and told him, "I believe you folks out there qualify for a summer enrichment program under this Title I."

And so they did. For once, the "gov'mint" got in a hurry. The proposal was no sooner made than it was approved and scheduled to be functioning by the end of that school year, already near.

It was a real pleasure to be chosen to implement the Arts and Crafts segment of the program, and I never voiced my sneaky suspicions to co-workers, but I decided early on that we were selected because we weren't going anywhere else that summer. We went to work. How we did work!

We had six weeks. There were no guidelines. No one said it in so many words, but neither did we miss the message: "Spend your appropriation, or it will be cut next

summer."

To a crafts person, those words were sweet, indeed. I had already bought what I believed to be the best kiln on the market and a goodly number of plaster molds for ceramics classes. In addition, I splurged on glazes, more molds, clay for freeform creations, gallons and gallons of slip to be delivered for the next summer.

I pre-ordered on wood—that was "in" for several years, and we made purses, tissue boxes, bird houses, key-chains, name plates, and wood-burned wall plaques. We sanded, stained, decal-ed and varnished for several years.

We did beadwork and tied macrame and combined the two. We made literally bushels of paper flowers from as many colors as the Waco ISD could supply—from tiny, behind-the-ear size to the ones that would fill a summer fireplace, even the little fellows could go home with gaudy creations on a long stick waving over their heads.

The Methodist Home has always, it seems, had plenty to supply the needs of the children in the basics. In our work in the arts and crafts classes, to discourage waste (just because we had plenty

didn't men they could mess up their project and start another), I tried to instill the knowledge that hardly anything was a failure. They could mend, recycle, or change their goal, and only then, if something absolutely could not be fixed, could they start over and get it right.

At our first personnel meeting, Mr. Copeland told us we were there to help the children become more widely experienced, but we'd accomplish less than nothing if we let ourselves be swamped by sob stories. We didn't have time to separate truth from fiction.

"Unfortunately, it is true that every child here has a problem," Copeland told us. "They wouldn't be here if they didn't."

The psychologist the program paid for told me after several years that in all that time, every child answered to, "What kind of family do you have?" with the same word: "Nice."

At the time and since, when I think of his story, it reminds me of the 12 year old boy, busy on the mane of a ceramic horse, who told me why he and a younger brother and sister came to the home. One night his mother "...got drunk and made us get in the

car trunk. Then she drove around looking for a place to drown us." I checked it out; true.

My work spanned about twelve years with the summer program and two nights per week tutoring English and reading during the school term.

After the first summer, Ken Howard, director of the Waco ISD music department, became supervisor of the Title I program. He and I were the only ones who stayed with the program and the children until it was discontinued.

For many of these youngsters, Ken and I represented the major adult continuity in their lives. House parents came and went, home assignments and schools changed, but "Mr. Howard" and "Miz Worthy" could remember who got lost on last year's field trip and when the bus broke down on the trip to Six Flags. We hugged everyone who wanted a hug and wiped away a few tears...as did others, but we were there from year to year. Probably our chief contribution was that we listened to them and kept a straight face for some pretty tall tales.

The children were (are) fed and clothed, doctored and dentist-ed. They live in well-furnished brick homes on beautiful grounds, and dinner was served on white tablecloths. They learned how

to take care of their rooms, their clothes, and each other. They had special choir trips, vacations, and shopping expeditions. Volunteers were always doing extras for them. Very few children were actually orphans. As one young man remarked, "We've got more parents per square kid than anywhere!"

Regardless of how proud Methodist can be of such an operation, there is no escape from the fact that it is neither perfect nor an ordinary home. Of course, ordinary homes seldom are perfect, but based on my years there, I'll go on record as believing the Methodist Home in Waco makes an extraordinary effort to come close to perfection.

DR. JOE MILLS

Free College Education For Every Student

This new kid on the Ranger Junior College campus is dynamite.

My first impression on meeting Dr. Joe Mills, new President at the College, was that he has enough drive, energy and ideas to be half his age.

Second, he has the credentials, experience and wisdom of a man much older.

And third, Joe Mills is one of the most positive, dynamic, "Get it done or die," type of educators I have met.

Dr. Mills is a man of foresight, seeing exciting and progressive possibilities for energizing R.J.C. and this area.

In his youth, Joe directed his energies to his studies, following a long line of educators in his family. Ancestors dating back to the 17th century were teachers, scholars and judges. His mother, a teacher, probably had the greatest influence on his formative years.

Having followed a horse-drawn plow as a boy, Joe is well acquainted with livestock and farm animals; plus he initiated a rodeo performers program while President of Vernon Junior College. So when you ranchers and farmers around the county see Joe dressed in a blue blazer and gray slacks, don't mistake him for a neophyte.

While in high school he met a young lady, Dottie, and fell

head over heels in love, and were married in 1960. Joe graduated as high school valedictorian in 1958 and from the University of Kentucky in 1964.

Joe says modestly, "I owe everything to Dottie; she worked and put me through graduate school. Without her I wouldn't be where I am now."

The following quotations will provide the reader with insight into Dr. Mills' thinking.

"Year-round schooling is a good idea. It would be a great boost for education and a relief to tax payers to utilize all these school buildings 12 months a year.

"Students ought to be required to master progressively higher blocks of knowledge. By attending classes 12 months of the year instead of 9, it's possible for an 8th grader to graduate from high school. The idea of needing 12 years to graduate is antiquated thinking.

"Another idea I have is to initiate a cross-training program for our faculty. A faculty member who has a master's degree with 18 hours in one field and 12 in another, will realize a salary boost by getting 6 more hours of schooling, so they can teach either way.

"At the college level, 'Let Every Student Go Through 4 Years of College Free. The graduate would automatically become ten times more pro-

ductive than the dropout."

"To create an atmosphere for academic achievement we're going to balance the male-to-female ratio. We are predominantly male oriented here now.

"Also we will probably reactivate a drill team for the women similar to the one that was popular here before.

"We're going to develop an honors program which will have all the advantages of an out of town college but retain the benefits of familiar surroundings. We're going to bring in about 25 students next year on academic scholarships, that will grow every year.

"We will streamline our curriculum so that we are not offering anything that is duplicated. We are the biggest industry in Ranger with a budget of over 3 1/2 million dollars. Think what would happen to this side of the county if this college wasn't there? RJC and CJC bring in about 15 million dollars a year. There are counties all over the state that would just flip-over backwards for one of these colleges in their county.

"The Eastland County cost share of support in tax money is only about 3%. Whereas the typical revenue base of most junior colleges in tax money is about 30-40%. For every dollar we generate in taxes we bring in twelve."

"Our plan for helping the working adult is to offer more non credit classes to serve immediate needs of people who wish subjects that will help them in their professions, such as firemen and policemen who have to get retraining every year."

From this interview, I believe the students at RJC and the citizens in Ranger and the surrounding communities are indeed fortunate to have an administrator of education of such vision and talent.

Dr. Joe Mills deserves the support of every forward-thinking citizen in this area.
