U.S.-Soviet Relations Chilled By New Moves

Relations between the United States and the Soviet Union today hit the lowest point since detente became a cornerstone of foreign policy during the Nixon Administration, as the U.S. withdrew its consular mission to Kiev and asked Moscow to remove its consular employees from New York.

At the same time, the Civil Aeronautics Board moved to curtail flights be-tween Russia and the United States. The Soviet Union denied permission to two noted musicians to leave the country for a tour of the U.S.

The United States also moved today to restrict Soviet fishing in U.S. waters. The Coast Guard sent three cutters to Alaskan waters to enforce the cutback in Soviet fishing ordered by Carter.

In his speech last Friday announcing U.S. retaliatory steps for the Russian military intervention in Afghanistan, President Carter said the United States would delay opening any new American or Soviet consular facilities. The Kiev and New York facilities, both in the preliminary stage, apparently fall under that

category.

said guerrillas battling Soviet and Afghan government forces were clinging to con-trol of the key city of Faizabad, near the Soviet border. Those sources said Monday the rebels had taken over three more northeastern districts, in Kunduz province, and captured two southeastern towns, in Laghman province just northeast of Kabul.

But the powerful Red Army force estimated to number as many as 100,000 troops — was reported in control of most major cities and towns in this central

Asian nation.

A Soviet-led coup Dec. 27 toppled one
Marxist regime — headed by Hafizullah
Amin — and replaced it with another, led by Babrak Karmal. Amin was executed, and the Russian troops fanned out across the country to try to put down the 20-month-old rebellion by anti-communist Moslem tribesmen.

After the coup the new government ordered an amnesty for 2,073 political prisoners at Kabul's Pul-i-Charkhi prison, but Kabul residents reported seeing only about 300 prisoners freed.

Afghan officials have denied reports that political executions were continuing. But reliable Afghan and diplomatic sources here said they had information that officials of the Amin regime were being executed and buried in mass graves on unpopulated hillsides near the

Despite this report, even anti-government Afghans in Kabul said repressive measures under the new regime appear to be on a far smaller scale than under

The rebel sources in Islamabad said today the anti-government forces were holding on to Faizabad, in the northeastern province of Badakhshan 50 miles from the Soviet border, and continued to put up strong resistance in the snowswept mountains elsewhere in the province. They said guerrillas also were holding out in the Gardez and Khost areas of Paktia province.

Bamian province, northwest of Kabul, was under guerrilla control, reliable sources said. The mechanized Soviet forces were unable to penetrate the area because villagers blocked the main highway to the east with landslides and the mountain road to the west was impassaThe rebels told reporters in Islama-bad that the guerrillas were aided by defectors from the Afghan army, who de-serted because they oppose the Soviet military occupation of the country.

The mood of the public in Kabul was a mixture of seething anger and resignation toward the Soviet forces.

"Unless there is some powerful force to kick them out of here, which there is not, the Russians will never leave," said a military academy graduate who sympa-thizes with the guerrillas.

The dead man was identified as James A. Box, 33, of Muleshoe, who re-portedly fled in a car from a residence northeast of Muleshoe after Deputy Bob Henderson attempted to serve a warrant

It was not immediately known what the warrant was for.

The final crash of two sheriff's cars and the Box car happened about 10 a.m. 11 miles north and five miles east of Muleshoe in the driveway in front of Laz-

Witnesses said the two wrecked sheriff's cars had been hit by shotgun pellets and the windows on the right side of the car Henderson was driving were blown

Henderson was being treated at a Muleshoe hospital for glass imbedded in his face, arms and hands.

Henderson reportedly was alone in one car and Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements and Department of Public Safety license and weight officer Lyndon Huckaby, with Huckaby driving, in the

Deputy James Williams was following in a third sheriff's car.

Witnesses said Box got out of his car after the crash and was aiming a sawedoff shotgun at Huckaby when Sheriff Clements shot Box in the head with a shotgun at close range.



Confidence in the city's public school desegregation plan continues to grow, say school officials who report that almost one-third of the majority students bused the first semester this year have rejected the option of returning to their

home schools the remainder of the year. Administrators are encouraged by the increased numbers, but the logistics of providing transportation for all the students could prove a problem, says the

director of transportation.
On Jan. 22, majority schools involved in the plan will initiate the mid-year busing switchover, when students not bused

ported the second half of the year.

The first semester students in specific grades whose last names end with A-L were transported to their crosstown "sister" school, while students whose last names begin with M-Z will be bused the second semester.

But 365 of the 1,102 students bused the first part of this school year have cho-sen to take advantage of the option that allows them to remain the second semester at their crosstown school.

About seven percent more students this year elected to continue being trans-ported than last year, when 271 of 1,023 students bused maintained the option.

"I think this is a positive indicator for our plan," said Dr. E.C. Leslie, assistant superintendent for administration. "It's a confidence vote from people who've been over there (at crosstown schools)

The total number of students who will be bused next semester will really only increase by 125, even with the 365 optional students added, because there are about 240 less students in the M-Z half of the alphabet than in the first half.

Still, some rerouting and addition of buses may be required to deal with the increased numbers.

Leslie said, "We may have to look at some bus routes to make sure we can

clude Bowie, Brown, Hardwick, Haynes and Wheelock elementaries.

Williams, with 42 optional students and Parsons, with 86 optional students, had the greatest number of youngsters who elected to continue being bused, but Leslie said the current busing plan for

those schools will probably be adequate to handle the additional numbers.

Robert Miller, director of transportation for the school district, said that the change "will be pretty difficult," especially since there is a shortage of buses in

Miller said he has looked at the fig-ures indicating additional students to be bused, but has not yet worked out a re-

bused, but has not yet worked out a revised transportation plan.

Leslie said there was "no real problem" handling the 75 additional students who were bused the second semester of the 1978-79 school year.

However, he said there could be some transferring of teachers in order to handle the extra number of students at some schools. He called the transferring of teachers a "negative factor," but "if 20 kids want to stay at a school, we may need some more teachers."

The former heavyweight champion endorsed Carter on Monday and was named to head a campaign organization called Athletes for Carter.

Ali, at the White House to report on his recent goodwill trip to China, described Carter as "real cool," but apparently couldn't pass up a chance to blow his own well-blown horn at reporters a bit.

"I feel like I'm the first colored president... I think I like it here." he said. Ali added that the prospect of a black chief executive in the near future was not to be taken lightly. The three-time champion said he would be an excellent choice.

South Dakota Solon May Quit **GOP Presidential Campaign**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Larry Pressler, the youngest contender in the crowded Republican presidential field. may be on the verge of ending his darkhorse candidacy

Pressler, a freshman senator from South Dakota, called a news conference today "to discuss the status and future" of his slow-starting presidential bid.

Pressler's aides refused to elaborate on the brief announcement and would neither confirm nor deny speculation that the 37-year-old senator would quit the race. Pressler was unavailable for

If he withdraws, Pressler will be the second announced Republican candidate to drop out. Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., quit last May after officially announcing his candidacy only two months

Competing for the nomination in the GOP's 10-man presidential field, Pressler has had trouble raising money and attracting media attention

He was not included among the six Republicans who debated Saturday night in Iowa. He announced earlier that he would not enter the first-in-the-nation New Hampshire primary.

Pressler's campaign chairman, Paul Arneson, said Pressler would focus his efforts instead on the Florida primary

and on later contests in the Midwest. His candidacy has drawn sharp criticism from the chairman of South Dako-Party and has been ta s. Republican largely ignored by national political col-



Luckier Boat People Live At Base By FERNANDO DEL MUNDO dogs and hamburgers. That is about the

SUBIC BAY NAVAL BASE, Philippines (UPI) - An American naval base in the Philippines is a paradise for more than 500 Vietnamese boat people rescued on orders from President Carter.

The base is nothing like the crowded and desolate refugee camps in the asylum countries of southeast Asia, where the Vietnamese scrounge for food and fight for a space to stretch out.

There is none of that here in the cluster of quonset huts at Cubi Point Naval Air Station beside Subic Bay Naval Base. the sprawling 7th Fleet logistics base 60

miles northwest of Manila. Children scamper about, laughing. At lunch time, a Navy truck parks in front of a playground to deliver trays of omelette, green peas, potatoes and rice.

The refugees take their meals in a spanking clean dining hall, where cups of fruit cocktail and vegetable salad have been prepared by some of their countrymen to go with the usual ration

"It's like paradise here," said Nguyen Than, 34, who escaped his hometown of Nha Trang with his wife and four children and hopes to find refuge in the Unit-

In the meantime, he attends three hours of classes in English and familiarization with American customs each day, plays volleyball, basketball or hor-seshoes and watches Kung Fu and other action movies at night.

Than was one of the 846 Vietnamese rescued in th South China Sea by American warships following Carter's directive July 21 to the Navy to search actively for It followed worldwide concern for the refugees, more than 250,000 of whom

The Vietnamese were supposed to be turned over to Philippine authorities, but the move was delayed pending completion of a U.N.-administered refugee proc-essing center at the nearby World War II battlefield of Bataan.

With the refugee flow coming to a halt, Navy authorities hope to close the only refugee camp in an American base

"We're very lucky to be here," says Hung Tran Cam, 28, who taught English in a school before he fled his native Canthe with his wife and 45 others aboard a 50-foot boat last Sept. 3.

"We're very happy. Everyday we have free meals. We have clean bedsheets, bed mattress. Everything is comfortable.

pervises the refugee camp, says he has had no trouble with the Vietnamese. They are confined to the camp and none has attempted to leave without permis-Dennis Schulik. 25, from Euclid.

Yemen Rife With Strife

THE STRATEGICALLY situated country most of them, never reached the Yemenis. of Yemen at the southeast tip of the Arabian They were held up, Washington discovered, peninsula that hit the headlines early in 1979 is back in the news.

The Soviet-equipped forces of South Yemen, a one-time British colony that acquired Marxism along with independence, we're invading neighboring Yemen proper, you may

Yemen proper, a geographical entity and legendary home of the Queen of Sheba, went through its own left-tilted revolution back in the 1960s but has since become a semi-satellite of neighboring and fiercely non-Marxist Saudi Arabia

The Saudis in Riyadh were understandably alarmed, and that as usual was sufficient to alarm Washington.

WASHINGTON RESPONDED with an emergency arms program, several hundred million dollars worth of warplanes and other super-sophisticated weapons for a region still in the process of emerging from a prolonged medieval past.

And just to make the American commitment unmistakable, an aircraft carrier was

moved into the adjacent Arabian sea. What is now news is that the arms, or Paul Scott:

U.S. Hostages In Cuba, Too

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico-In the growing Cuban exile community here, which now numbers more than 40,000, the anti-Castro leaders talk as much about the "American hostages" still in Cuba as

From refugees and former political prisoners, who in recent months have made their way here from Communist Cuba, there are at least 30 U.S. citizens being held as "political prisoners" in the damp and dimly lit prisons run by Fidel Castro's secret police.

These "American hostages," whose number-may total as high as 42, include Americans whose only "crimes" were to spread the word of Jesus or whose light plane was forced to ditch in interna-

A GRAPHIC ILLUSTRATION of these "Forgotten American Hostages" is the case of Mark Dayis Contino, 26, of Miami, Fla. He was captured and imprisoned last July after his small aircraft was forced to ditch approximately 30 miles from Cuba.

Contino was picked up by a Cuban fishing boat, apparently operated by Castro's growing Navy, and taken to Havana. There the young private pilot was tried and convicted of violating Cuban air spaces (which he did not do) and is now awaiting

Son of a National Airlines captain, young Contino is now being held in a prison 15 miles east of

State and Justice Department officials contacted about Contino's plight have shown little interest in trying to free the illegally held Contino, concentrating instead on bringing former Cuban communist prisoners to the U.S.

Another example of the State Department show ing little interest in obtaining the freedom of U.S. citizens involves Thomas White, a missionary connected with the "Jesus to the Communist World" organization of Glendale, Calif., and his pilot, Mel Bailey, from West Virginia.

THE TWO WERE forced to land their light plane in Cuba when it ran out of fuel while on a mission of dropping Christian literature, including bibles, into small Cuban villages Memorial Day.

Both White and Bailey were sentenced to 24 years in prison although their only "crime" was to use modern means to spread the word of Jesus to the Cuban people.

Another American being held as a "political hostage" by the Castro regime is a private yacht owner whose small craft exploded off the coast of Cuba. He floated on to the Cuban shore on a small raft made of parts of his sinking boat.

Some of the other U.S. citizens being held in Castro's jails are listed as "drug pushers" and 'hijackers" but no real investigation has been made by the State Department to determine if the charges are phony or whether their human rights have been violated.

A MAJOR EFFORT is about to be made to change all this.

Meldrim Thomson, former three times governor of New Hampshire and presidential candidate of the newly formed Constitution party, has gathered information on U.S. and Cuban political prisoners and soon will bring their plight to the attention of Congress and the media.

Thomson will call on the lawmakers to take immediate action to determine the number of Americans being held in Cuba and in other Communist countries and then mobilize the country to secure

With Americans beginning to show sincere concern about U.S. hostages in Iran, Thomson believes the time has come to force off the secrecy lid of U.S. political prisoners in Cuba and other communist countries.

Any government dedicated to protecting human rights," as the Carter administration claims, Thomson contends, must make the securing of these rights for Americans overseas its number one priority.

Thomson also believes that the U.S. must become the champion for the tens of thousands of Cubans still being held as political prisoners in their own country.

HE IS NOW seeking information on their numbers along with the location of their prisons for presentation to the Senate and House Foreign Affairs Committees.

The plight of the U.S. hostages in Iran could become a blessing in disguise for the American and Cuban prisoners, who have become the forgotten hostages of our times. The only question before the American people is a simple one:

Do we care and love our brothers enough to make the sacrifices needed to help them regain their freedom? Each one of us will have to answer that question during the coming year.

Public Verdict Out On Connally

WASHINGTON-Ordinarily, an American need be acquitted only once of a charge, but John Connally is not ordinary.

He's 62, three times a millionaire, self-made, and he's never yet been brought down.

Whether you and I finally support him. Connally's got to win another verdict in another trial and he won't have a convicted felon (Jake Jacobsen) to scowl down, nor Edward Bennett Williams as defense counsel.

Connally's first trial in 1975 promised to be much tougher than it was. Attorney Williams, defender of Joe McCarthy and Bobby Baker, had a losing streak of scoundrels which made Connally look bad, but the Rev. Billy Graham took the curse off when he appeared as a character wit-

THERE WERE 10 black jurors and it was still Watergate time for the Nixonite defendant, but my observation is that black jurors are admirably

Now comes the six-year Texas Governor, twoparty Cabinet officer to the second ordeal of judgment by his peers. The prosecution, instead of being a pair of no-name government hacks, is a legal journal, "The American Lawyer.

In its December issue, author Steven Brill brings up two particulars which the grand jury charged against Connally, but which the prosecution conveniently dropped. One charge was perjury, and the other was obstruction of justice.

Considering the unbelievable absurdity that a politically ambitious millionaire would take \$10,-000 from a lobbyist, it is unlikely that the trial jury would have convicted Connally in any known cir-

BUT THE AMERICAN Lawyer, having a professional obligation to make the worst case, tries to trap Connally in a lie and to show that he and Jacobsen then tried to camouflage it.

Some of the Brill piece saw print last month in the N.Y. Times Magazine. We may be sure that the material in the form of political mud will begin to fly if Connally threatens to be or does become the GOP nominee. He would then be standing trial by innuendo.

and trustees according to your wishes. You may want them to retain certain investments, to carry on your business or to liquidate it.

If you are silent, they will be governed by the powers and duties laid down by statute or recognized by the courts. Such rules may not allow your

executor or trustee the flexibility in handling your property that you may wish. Witnesses—at the end of your will is a section containing your signature, the date of your signature, followed by an "attestation clause.

This clause contains the signatures and addresses of your witnesses and a statement properly certifying that they saw you sign the will. The witnesses must sign in your presence and also in the presence of each other.

Most states require two witnesses, but some require three.

This will make it easier to probate your will after your death in the event, say, that you own real estate in another state which requires three witnesses to a will. A beneficiary of your will should never be a witness.

IN FACT, IF you do make the mistake of having a beneficiary as witness, it could result in this person being partially or totally disinherited!

A common procedure for getting a will witnessed is simply to call in any two people who happen to be around your house when you sign your will and ask them to serve as witnesses. This is not the best practice.

Your executor may not be able to locate these witnesses when the time comes to offer your will for probate. If your lawyer presides at the execution of your will, he will provide witnesses from among his associates or staff who can be reasonably easy to locate when your will is probated.

I would suggest that your husband see an allergist again to see if there's anything else that can be done. Meanwhile, there are a number of milk substitutes that contain none of the milk protein. Usually if a person is allergic to milk, as opposed to having the problem with milk sugar, the allergy will be to the milk protein, not the sugar

He Needs Milk Substitute

You might check the different milk substitues that are available in the infant food section. Milk allergy is more common in infants and that's why those products are developed for infants. Some of these are made purely from soybean products that contain no milk at all. Others do contain lactose but the milk protein has been removed. You might wish to experiment with different ones of these to see if there is a milk substitute he could use that would at least provide him some satisfaction and would defi-

nitely provide the calcium. Men usually don't have as great a need for calcium supplements in the middle years as do women. Men do develop softening of the bones in the

course of time if they're on a calcium deficient diet and there are other factors involved too. This usually doesn't occur until about 20 years after the time we see it occurring in women. This probably has something to do with the difference in sex hormones. A woman's sex hormones will diminish at the time of the menopause. This does not occur in men. Usually in healthy men there is no significant decrease in the level of sex hormones after the early 30s.

Of course, your husband should receive an adequate amount of calcium, even though he may not need as much as a woman his age would require. And if the milk substitutes won't work, you might want to get a doctor to prescribe some calcium tablets for

there is activity, value changes hands. And there are the industrial users, some of whom also speculate for their self-protection. Among them are companies involved in jewelry, dental devices, and electrical and electronics manufac-

Is there a chance that gold prices could fall? Well, what would you say the chances are for non-inflated currencies, for economic cooperation, for political stability? For peace on earth?

Women's Wants Influence Auto Company

DETROIT (Special) — Today's American women are strong contenders in the automobile marketplace, and are expected to purchase nearly one half of the 1980

What do these women buyers want

in a car? Finding the answers to this complex answer was the job assigned to the yearold Chrysler Women's Passenger Car Committee of 15 women representing different ages, departments, and backgrounds and headed by senior mid-size product planner, Carrie Gray.

These women, ranging from product planners, engineers and attorneys, to marketing and finance executives, have agreed that there is indeed a women's market to be tapped, and that astute automakers should target this market. However, in the overall assessment, preferences in automobiles are not that different between women and men.

Women rank reliability, efficiency and serviceability very high," notes Gray, "but there are many women who buy cars as a personal expression of themselves." Chrysler sales to women are continuing to grow, with emphasis on the Plymouth Horizon and Arrow import within the Chrysler-Plymouth lineup.

mileage rating of 29 mpg; the Horizon has an estimated EPA rating of 23 mpg.

Consensus from a discussion of four members of the committee was: "What women really want reflects their age, financial status, and particular life style at any given time.

Gray, who has been selecting cars since she turned 16 because she's always been interested in automobiles, likes room, comfort and convenience.

"Cars serve as a means of communicating who you are and what you do. I drive a New Yorker because it is an attractive product which represents Chrysler Corporation to the rest of the world."

Many misconceptions about women as car buyers are being dispelled, they agreed. Women don't want pink cars or highly decorative interiors, but good transportation that is reliable and efficient. Essentially, they want the same things men want: the best car for the least amount of money which makes a statement about themselves in some

Concludes Gray, "if there are any differences, women prefer handling ease and serviceability to power and image. But women, like men, have changing attitudes as their life style changes. These attitudes usually determine the purchase

The name Jacoby is almost synonymous with contract bridge. Papa Oswald was a member of the Four Aces team that defeated France in what is considered to be the first official world championship in 1935. Son James was a member of the Dallas Aces when they won the championship in 1970. They were on opposing teams in a match at the recent Fall North American Championships. and by a coincidence, both declared this hand in the same contract-three no trump. And the play at the two tables was identical!

The auctions were relatively straightforward, although some purists might object to South's 15-point no trump opening. Since West couldn't lead his partner's suit even if he had wanted to, the jack of spades was the opening lead at both tables. Both Jacobys ducked, and spades were continued. East won the second spade and cleared the suit.

Both declarers led a diamond to the king and ace, and East shifted to a club, won with the ace. Since East was known to hold the diamond jack, the declarers could count five-and only fivetricks outside the heart suit. Thus, hearts would have to produce four tricks for the contract to succeed.

To lead to the ace and

finesse the jack on the way back would be the best way to tackle hearts in terms of percentages, but it would be futile here. Even if the queen were onside tripleton, there would be no entry back to dummy to cash the long heart, nor to finesse against East's jack of diamonds.

ements Seeks Ban On Nuclear Wastes

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Bill Clements has called for a ban on shipments of radioactive wastes to Pelican Island and action to force Todd Shipyards to remove any waste stored at the site for more than a year.

"This is an absolutely deplorable situation and one which must be rectified immediately," Clements said in a letter Monday to Dr. Robert Bernstein, state

Wee are going to do everything we can," said Bernstein, who said he plans to go the the Shipyard on Friday.

Clements said he has learned Todd has an estimated 11,000 drums of nuclear waste, although its State Health Department license limits it to 2,000 drums. He said the wastes included abut 345,000 gallons of cooling water from a Sacramento.

Calif., nuclear reactor and cooling water from an Arkansas reactor.

He said some drums have been in storage for several years although the license prohibits storage for more than a year. And he said Todd had shipped no nuclear waste out of Texas for permanent storage for at least two years.

Clements said Todd management officials admitted to a member of his staff

in violation of its license from the health department

"In effect, the Todd Shipyards facility has become a quasi-permanent storage site in violation of their license and state law." Clements said

Bernstein said the health department told Todd as far back as October to get rid of materials it had stored for more than a year "but they haven't done much about it.

Because the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission controls waste storage, he questioned the health department's authority to order its removal from Todd or limit the intake of nuclear materials at the shipyard.

Bernstein said the waste stored at Todd is "all low-level stuff" but is still the kind of materials you shouldn't fool

Clements said he especially was concerned because Pelican Island, near Galveston, "is a high risk area due to historical weather patterns." He said Tedd's nuclear waste storage facility was "totally inadequate to prevent possible spillage resulting from a severe hurricane.





General Assembly Action Debated'By U.S., Others

UNITED NATIONS (AP) - The United States and other nations are discussing asking the General Assembly to condemn the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan following the Soviet Union's veto of a protest resolution endorsed by 13 of the 15 Security Council members

'It is unfortunate that the Soviets prevented the council from acting, but the council has, and the organization has other recourse, and that is under active consideration," U.S. Ambassador Donald McHenry told reporters following the veto Monday night.

He indicated a decision might be made today. A 1950 resolution provides that if a veto prevents the

council from acting to preserve or restore peace, a majority of the council or of the U.N. membership can have the assembly meet within 24 hours in a special emergency session to consider the matter.

No country has a veto in the 152-member assembly, but unlike the Security Council it has no power to enforce its decisions. However, an assembly debate and the adoption of a condemnatory resolution would mobilize more international

In the council vote Monday, only East Germany's communist government voted with the Soviet Union. The resolution, introduced by five non-aligned members of the council after three days of debate, deplored the armed intervention in Afghanistan and called for the withdrawal of all foreign forces from the Central Asian nation.

Most of the speakers in the debate criticized the Soviet intervention, contended that it was an uninvited move to shore up the communist regime Moscow fostered and to crush the Moslem revolt against it.

Ambassador Oleg Troyanovsky, who cast the Soviet veto, repeated his government's claim that the Afghan government requested Soviet military aid, and said the resolution was "a flagrant intervention in the affairs of a sovereign state and should be rejected.'

Afghanistan's foreign minister, Shah Mohammad Dost said the charge that Soviet troops invaded Afghanistan and carried out the Dec. 27 coup in which President Hafizullah Amin was executed was a "baseless slander against my country, my government and people."

He also took note of U.S. plans to resume arms ship-

ments to Pakistan, on Afghanistan's eastern border, and said: "If Pakistan continues to arm herself to the teeth, no course is left to Afghanistan but to think seriously about its defense and naturally act accordingly."

White House press secretary Jody Powell told reporters in Washington that the Soviet veto was a "predictable and cynical action which demonstrates the lack of respect for the principles of religious freedom and independence and territorial integrity of nonaligned nations.'

WASHINGTON (AP) - The dramatic burst of Soviet adventurism in Afghanistan and the realities of domestic American politics are having a profound effect on President Carter's view of the world and his conduct of foreign policy.

The transformation may not be permanent, for in the ups and downs of U.S.-Soviet relations a thaw historically follows a freeze as predictably as winter

But for the moment, at least, Carter has cloaked himself in a traditional anti-

communism, sounding more like Harry Truman in the upsurge of the Cold War, with just a tinge of the sort of piety often associated with John Foster Dulles. Jimmy Carter in 1980 seems a far cry from the ex-governor of Georgia who moved into the White House three years ago preaching good will.

A string of Carter's recent moves tells the story. The SALT II nuclear arms limitation treaty has been swept from the Senate calendar. Defense spending will be boosted, as will American arms sales abroad. Food is being used as a foreign policy weapon.

Having entered office determined to seek an accommdation with the Soviet Union, Carter now condemns the Russians as "a powerful atheistic govern-He could easily have been mistaken for Dulles, the Eisenhower administration secretary of state who often saw the devil lurking in the Kremlin.

By his own testimony, Carter is a changed man, jolted into a new awareness of Soviet imperialism by its military intervention in Afghanistan and Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev's "completely inadequate and completely misleading" explanation.

Carter bore witness to his conversion in a New Year's Eve interview with ABC and exposed himself at the same time to charges of naivete and resulting politi-

"My opinion of the Russians has changed more dramatically in the last week than even the previous 21/2 years before that," he said.

Accusing Brezhnev of not telling the truth, Carter volunteered, "This action of the Soviets has made a more dramatic change in my own opinion of what the Soviets' ultimate goals are than anything they've done in the previous time I've been in office."

Apparently, Carter was as much distressed by Brezhnev's lack of candor the Soviet leader claimed the Russian troops had been invited into Afghanistan by the Amin government to protect the country against "some outside third-nation threat" - as by the military action

Some observers detected echoes of George Romney's 1967 declaration that he had been "brainwashed" on the Vietnam War, a remark that ended his chances for the Republican presidential nomination. No sooner had Carter spoken than Ronald Reagan issued a sarcastic statement congratulating him for "belatedly" discovering the Russians cannot be trusted.

How much Carter is being pushed in-

to an anti-Soviet stance by his political competition is unclear. But even as he moves to harden his position, virtually all the presidential candidates, Democratic and Republican, are accusing him of not being tough enough.

Besides Reagan's criticism, Republican John Connally charged that "we've shown weakness and appeasement," and Howard Baker said the Soviets had embarked on a policy of adventurism because "they can push the United States and the United States will not push

Among Democrats, Edward Kennedy accused Carter of "a weak policy" and, in the same vein as Reagan, said, "We can't afford to be surprised when the Soviets lie to us.

None of these competitors of Jimmy Carter was about to give him credit for his shift. As they keep the pressure on, it would not be surprising if Carter took an even tougher approach toward the Rus-

When he entered the White House in January 1977, Carter set out to change the emphasis in American foreign policy. For years, the focus had been on the Soviet Union. The first consideration in any major step had been whether it would

Instinctively, and with support from

a broader view. He had the United States, reaching out to the Third World, seeking the friendship of radicals in southern Africa, the Palestinians, communist Cuba and Vietnam.

But Carter could not sustain this soft" approach:

- He gave up trying to establish normal relations with Vietnam and Cuba.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter says the best way to prepare for any possible effort by the Soviet Union to win control of the oil-rich area around the Persian Gulf is "to prevent its oc-

Threats raised by the recent Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan can be countered through mobilization of world opinion and "the strengthening of countries in the area that might be threatened so that they can repel any potential invasion," Carter said Monday in an NBC News interview.

Among the preventive measures under way is U.S. participation in plans for an international "consortium" that will offer military aid to Pakistan, which borders on Afghanistan, the president said.

He declined to elaborate on the program, saying it is "still in the embryonic ment to Pakistan to supply military aid, but noted the extent and nature of such assistance would depend on cooperation by other nations, Pakistani desires and authorization by Congress.

Carter also acknowledged that the United States is considering the installation of naval and air facilities in Somalia,


"We don't have any definite agreement yet," he said, "but that is the kind of thing that I think is important to our nation to prepare for the long-range meeting of any threat to the peace in the Mideast, Persian Gulf, northern Indian Ocean area.

On the continuing crisis in Iran, Carter said if any of the 50 American hostages held in Tehran were subjected to trials. "we are prepared to take action that would be quite serious in its consequences for Iran." He declined to discuss the Iranian situation further.

No government official previously has been quoted as saying Palestinians were among the captors at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran, although there have been unconfirmed press reports that Palestinians might have been involved in the takeover and that some of the students may have been trained by Palestinians.

Christopher could not be reached for comment on Crane's statement. A State Department spokesman, Miro Moreville, said he could not confirm that Christopher made the remark nor that Palestinians were among the captors.

"We have no way of proving that the captors are anything but what they say they are," Moreville said. "If Christo-

pher has something else, I don't know." Crane, an 11-year veteran of the House, said Christopher "did indicate fe-dayeen and Palestinians were amongst the terrorists holding the hostages." The

WASHINGTON (AP) - The State De Illinois Republican quoted Christopher as saying there was "evidence" to support this. There was no elaboration on the nature of the "evidence.

Crane reiterated in a follow-up interview that his recollection and the notes of an aide indicated Christopher referred to "fedayeen and radical Palestinian

He said he was not sure whether the fedayeen referred to by Christopher was the Palestinian fedayeen, a terrorist group, or the Iranian fedayeen, a radical left wing of the local Communist party. And he said he wasn't sure whether the "radical Palestinian groups" was a reference to the Palestine Liberation Organi-

Crane declined to say what actions he felt should be taken in Iran, saying the current administration got the United States into the predicament and should have a free hand to get it out.

But he did say, "I have not heard anything to date that suggests to me that we have any more constructive solutions to how we can extricate those people than you already are aware of.'

Crane said he and Christopher discussed the possibility of a naval blockade of Iran and said he personally believed that "has to be an option given serious

SPAG Funds May Be Slashed

Executive committee members of the South Plains Association of Governments received some bad news today concerning state Criminal Justice Division funding for this area.

SPAG Executive Director Jerry Casstevens told the committee this morning that new state legislation possibly could cut funding for the council of government's 15-county area from more than \$300 000 to \$95 000

Under the new legislation, Casstevens explained, governmental jurisdictions with populations of more than 150,000

can apply for criminal justice money directly to the state office, rather than through a local planning agency such as SPAG as smaller entities must do.

If all the larger "entitlement jurisdictions," which would include the City of Lubbock and Lubbock County, voted to. apply directly to the Criminal Justice Division, the money available to the remaining cities and counties in SPAG would be cut drastically from last year's total, Casstevens said.

The executive director mentioned however, that if SPAG applied for criminal justice money as a whole under the entitlement jurisdiction category, its membership could receive more than \$300,000 for the entire area.

Although the state office has not yet decided exactly how much funding the local panel's membership will receive, Casstevens pointed out that SPAG last year was allocated \$385,000 for local law enforcement programs.

Excluding a sizable allocation for the new Lubbock County jail, \$50,000 of the money went for funding SPAG's Law Enforcement Training Academy, leaving about \$100,000 for outlying co es

However, should the entitlement jurisdictions in the state get their funding separately, Casstevens noted, the balance of SPAG counties outside of Lubbock would only receive \$95,000 in criminal justice money. Casstevens said the \$50,000 law en-

forcement academy allocation would probably remain a top priority with board members, leaving the smaller counties with only about \$45,000 to fund

The full SPAG board is expected to decide at a later date how it will apply for the state money.

The SPAG criminal justice committee has scheduled three meetings this month to decide which local projects should be considered as priorities for funding.

Following the executive committee meeting, the entire SPAG board met and unanimously gave favorable comments to Community Development block grant application from 11 cities. The applications totaled more than \$5 million .

Board President Medlin Carpenter explained after the vote that the favorable comment doesn't not necessarily mean the state will fund all block grant applications

Carpenter said he made the explanation in response to comments from some area residents that SPAG itself refused their cities Community Development funding.

Carpenter pointed out that SPAG is not the law enforcement funding agency, but instead serves to review the grant ap-

New ERA Strategy Suggested To President WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is being advised to make a major speech on the proposed Equal Rights Amendment as part of a new high-profile campaign to increase the administration's role in the ratification drive.

The President's Advisory Committee for Women, in a report being delivered officially to Carter today, also suggests that the administration use influential go-betweens in states that have not ratified the amendment to pressure state legislators to vote for it.

In addition, the group wants no administration official to travel to an unratified state without speaking about the ERA, which would outlaw discrimina-

In essence, the committee is asking the White House to begin a ratification drive similar in scope to its past effort to win support for the strategic arms limita-

The administration's campaign for SALT II, since shelved because of Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan, was an all-out effort. Carter mentioned the treaty in practically every speech, and a different group of business and community leaders was invited to the White House each week for a SALT briefing that ended with a request for them to go out and lobby.

The advisory committee, which Carter appointed to counsel him on women's affairs, recommends that ERA be given such a high priority that "every time you open your mouth to say hello something also comes out about the ERA," according to Suone Cotner, executive director of ERAmerica.

Carter, who asked for the report when he met with the committee in October, has shown a willingness to work harder for ratification of the ERA since some women's groups and a political opponent, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, have

criticized his handling of the issue. The National Organization for Women announced last month that it would not endorse Carter for re-election, partially because he has not paid enough attention to the ERA.

If Carter accepts the recommendations in the report, it will signal a tactical switch from working with women's groups in the ratification effort to taking

a leadership role. The ERA has been approved by 35

Joy Adamson Cremated

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) - Conservationist Joy Adamson, author of the book "Born Free" on lion behavior whose death now is being treated as a murder, was cremated today near the African fauna and wildlife she loved so well.

About 50 friends and relatives, including her husband, George, attended the brief ceremony, held at the suburban Langata Crematorium, a stone and brick building surrounded by Eucalyptus and located just across from the Nairobi National Park.

She has come to the end of her last safari, but she will live on in her books, films and above all, in her influence," The Rev. Bill Owen said in his eulogy.

She has been taken from us in the bush that was her home and surrounded by the animals she knew and loved so well," he said.

Mrs. Adamson, 69, was apparently murdered Thursday night while strolling alone outside her isolated tented camp in the Shaba Game Reserve, located about 175 miles north of Nairobi, the Kenyan capital.

Initially it was thought she was mauled and killed by a lion, but police launched a murder investigation when it was found that wounds on her body were inconsistent with those left by an animal. Police also said the battery to her car

Miss Silkwood was a Kerr-McGee Corp. nuclear plant worker when she died in a one-car accident on Nov. 13, 1974. In May, an Oklahoma City federal court jury awarded her estate \$10.5 million in connection with her contamination with plutonium the week before her death. She had become a martyr to antinuclear forces even before the trial, which received national attention.

In their Oklahoma County District Court petition filed Monday, Bill and Merle Silkwood of Nederland listed as defendants CBS Inc., Time-Life Films, G.P. Putnam's Sons, Berkley Publishing Corp., Thomas B. Allen, and David Susskind: Talent Associates Limited.

The Silkwoods seek an injunction to prevent the CRS-TV division of CRS from turning a book entitled "A Short Life." by Maryland author Thomas R. Allen, into a movie.

The Silkwoods claim the supposedly fictional plot of the book was "slavishly copied from the life of Karen Silkwood.

Each parent is seeking \$200,000 in actual damages and \$1 million in exemplary damages.

They claim Allen promoted the book by appearing at press conferences and giving interviews during the Silkwood trial emphasizing the connection between his work and Miss Silkwood's sto-





NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market struggled to maintain a rally today amid worries over the economic impact of President Carter's restrictions on grain sales and other trade with the Soviet Union in the aftermath of Russia's invasion of Afghanistan.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials was ahead by 1.70 at 833.70 at noon. Gainers outnumbered losers by a 3-2 margin on the New York Stock Exchange.

Big Board noon volume rose to 20.29 million shares from 17.43 million a day before.

Aerospace issues were mixed after earlier sharp gains. Boeing was off 11/8 at 56 in active trading. Lockheed, which announced development of a new Hercules transport aircaft, was unchanged

Class B shares of Benguet Consolidated led the NYSE most actives, gaining 1/2 to 81/8 after the company said production from a new copper and gold mine in The Philippines would "dramatically" boost earnings.

Other gold mining stocks slid along with the price of bullion today. ASA was off 1 at 4414, while Hecla dropped 2% to 42.

Great Western Financial was off 7s at 201s, while Household Finance slipped ¼ to 17%. Analysts said continued high credit costs may result from new government borrowing to finance purchases of U.S. grain that otherwise would have been shipped to Russia.

Atlantic Richfield rose 5 to 8038. Analyst Eugene L. Nowak of Dean Witter Reynolds, Inc., today sharply boosted his estimate of Arco's 1980 earnings.

The NYSE's composite index rose .11 to 61.51; the American Stock Exchange market value index was up .79 at 247.17.

Gold Prices Decline On Exchanges

LONDON (AP) - The price of gold fell on world bullion markets today as harried dealers tried to agree on a stable price somewhere above \$600 an ounce. The dollar steadied on foreign exchanges.

Gold opened in London at \$630 an ounce, after the metal closed in Hong Kong at \$631.58, down \$22 from Monday's \$653.61 finish in the Asian center.

By mid-morning, the London price had dipped to \$618.

The same pattern was in evidice at Zurich, Europe's largest bullion market, where gold opened at \$630 and fell swiftly to \$610 before bouncing back to \$618 by mid-

Gold hit its all-time peak of \$673.16 in Hong Kong on Monday after smashing through the \$500 barrier on world markets Dec. 27 in the wake of Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan.

President Carter's decision to cut grain sales to the Soviets and the continued hostage crisis in Iran added more reasons for Arabs and other major investors to flee paper currencies for gold and other precious metals.

Silver, which hit a record \$40 an ounce on Jan. 2, traded at \$34.50 today in London, down \$3 from late Monday but still nearly double its value a month ago

The postponement was ordered Monday by U.S. District Judge Kevin Thomas Duffy who is handling confirmation proceedings in about 75 suits launched by American banks and companies

The suits were brought to protect possible losses of billions of doffars in Iranian loans and investments from default.

Quinn said he did not know why Exxon prohibited the use of its credit card for gasohol sales.

The New Jersey association, which represents about 1,500 of the state's 5,000 gasoline retailers, claims Exxon's refusal to honor gasohol purchases on credit is "against the best interests of this country," said Ruth.



American Arts Center **Shifting Emphasis**

PARIS (AP) - After nearly 50 years giving tea parties for wealthy children whose parents wanted them kept out of Parisian cafes, the American Center for Students and Artists is challenging its students with an avant-garde, multi-disciplinary program, according to Board chairman Judith Pisar. With the aid of a Rockefeller Founda-

tion grant of \$375,000, the center is developing a fledgling artist-in-residence program for painters, sculptors, and performers in dance and choreography, drama and music. The visiting artists will give work-

shops and performances in all the fields in which the center gives courses. It enrolls 4,300 students a year - only 20 percent American - and adds courses in American English to its arts program.

The artistic courses will remain basically at the same level but improve in quality, according to Brigitte Delattre, the center's spokesman. Courses can be taken to earn credits at other institutions, but the center does not offer its own diplomas.

Mrs. Pisar said more than 75 visiting artists - in painting, sculpture, dance and choreography, drama and music were scheduled for long or short-term stays during the coming year. They include Henry Smith and the Solaris Dance Company, musician Tom Johnson, artist Sheila Hicks and dance-drama performers Greg Light and Leslie Gifford.

In addition to the new programs, extensive improvements are being made to the center, built in 1931 and now partly

Architects Hugh Hardy, an American, and Jean-Pierre Jouve of France are enlarging the already-spacious halls and sun-washed wooden dance floors, and plan new, underground, ultramodern theaters and studios. Mrs. Pisar, the driving force behind

these improvements, was director of music at the Brooklyn Academy in New York until she came to the center in 1977. She is also raising funds for the pro-She and executive director Henry

Pillsbury, with their 12 other staff members, are enthusiastic about the avantgarde emphasis in the cultural renaissance of the center.

One new program this year teaches video techniques, during which students watch themselves, or professional actors. emit agonized screams or hysterical laughter or show other emotions, to evaluate performance quality.

We want something that's alive today, something that will help the Franco-American future," said Mrs. Pisar. In addition to exhibitions, shows, workshops and classes by mainly American artists and performers, "we also hope to see interchange with French-speaking students and artists from the Third World, for whom Paris is a principal place of study and work

"We believe Paris in the '80s will be THE place for art, and the American Center for Students and Artists will be the heart of new artistic activities, Mrs.

Senior officers formally assigned to non-military posts in state-owned corporations or government departments were not affected. The policy of having them take on social-political-economic jobs as well as their military one is called "dwi fungsi" or dual function

The military role in civilian affairs was formally written into the broad guidelines of state policy adopted in March 1978. About one-third of the army is engaged in civil and administrative duties, according to one source.

Scientists Say Nuclear Fusion 25 Years Away

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - Nuclear fusion has the potential to produce unlimited safe and clean energy, but it will be at least 25 years before it can be used commercially, a panel of scientists said today.

And they emphasized there are many scientific and engineering obstacles to using the process - the same that produces the sun's heat.

The United States has been trying for 30 years to develop fusion as a safer and inexhaustible alternative to the nuclear fission process on which current nuclear generators rely. But the effort gained momentum only a few years ago.

"We have under way a very aggressive national program," Dr. John S. Foster, vice president for science of TRW Inc., said. "It's no longer a scientific effort in search of scientific goals. It's now become a major scientific-engineering

"We have a concept here which seems very attractive, very promising from

Dr. Andrew M. Sessler, director of the Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory of the

University of California, said the feasibility of nuclear fusion will probably be demonstrated in the 1980s, perhaps in 1985. But he said it will take much longer to convert the laboratory process into a commercial enterprise.

Dr. Wulf B. Kunkel of the Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory said the engineering designs that would take the process out of the laboratory and place it on line to produce electricity are now beginning to be believable.

Unlike the nuclear fission procss that splits atoms, nuclear fusion is aimed at combining hydrogen nuclei to form heavier helium nuclei and thereby release enormous amounts of energy. In uncontrolled form, fusion is the process that

Sessler said fusion power plants would have far fewer environmental problems than today's fission reactors but, he said, would still produce some of the same radioactive byproducts.

He also said the nuclear proliferation problem would still exist because fusion reactors could be used to make bomb-grade plutonium.

The CAB said it has revoked the special authority it had granted Aeroflot to operate one or two extra flights between the United States and the Soviet Union.

'The action was taken in reponse to a request by the U.S. State Department, which said it 'has conducted a careful review of U.S.-U.S.S.R. bilateral relations and, taking overall foreign policy considerations into account, has determined that it is in the national interest to reduce the number of scheduled flights to the United States by the U.S.S.R.'s national air carrier Aeroflot'," the CAB

The order has the effect of cutting back Aeroflot's current authority to fly three roundtrips a week between the Soviet Union and New York and Washing-

The CAB action is effective Jan. 13. The Soviets have pending an application for extension of the exemptions for extra flights through the coming summer to accommodate an expected increase in traffic for the Olympic games in Moscow.

The CAB also ordered Aeroflot to advise all affected passengers promptly of the change, assist them in obtaining alternative transportation and fully refund any deposits of passengers it does not accommodate.

The order does not affect the two regular weekly roundtrips, which will con-

Although the move could inconvenience travelers going to Moscow for the Olympics, CAB Chairman Marvin Cohen said normal travelers should not be harmed "in light of the fact that other carriers do serve on connecting flights." Cohen said, however, American trav-

elers will probably have to fly initially to other countries and transfer to flights to

The biggest pinch will be to Aeroflot, which had planned to offer a total of 11,-000 roundtrip seats for Olympic travel-

Meanwhile, Russian conductor Yuri Temirkanov and violinist Vladimir Spivakov have been denied permission to leave the Soviet Union for a tour of the United States, their agent said today.



WINAMAC, Ind. (AP) - Ford Motor Co. attorneys have refused a prosecution request to release results of simulated Pinto crash tests they say will provide 'highly persuasive" evidence in the reckless homicide trial against the giant auto-

But defense lawyers did turn over two large cartons full of documents as the first day of jury selection in the trial ended Monday before Pulaski Circuit Court Judge Harold R. Staffeldt.

The charges against Ford followed women whose Pinto was rammed from behind in an accident on a northern Indi-

Chief Ford counsel James F. Neal refused to elaborate on the crash tests. which he said were conducted at his Nashville, Tenn., law offices earlier this year. He said he intends to introduce test reports as evidence later in the trial, and they "will reveal a lot of things relevant and highly persuasive to this accident."

Prosecutor Michael A. Cosentino had requested reports on the tests as one of 134 different documents sought for its case. Neal said no written report on the crash tests was yet available.

The charges against the automaker are based on a 1977 Indiana law making corporations as well as individuals subject to criminal prosecution. Autopsies showed the three young women burned to death when their 1973 Pinto sedan burst into flames after it was rammed from behind by a van.

The car was one of about 1.5 million Pinto sedans and Mercury Bobcats made between 1971 and 1976 that Ford announced in June 1978 were being recalled because of government tests show-ing the fuel tanks leaked large amounts of fuel in moderate-speed crashes. Modifications had not yet been made on the

Outside Jurors To Hear Trial

CHICAGO (UPI) - The jury that will decide the fate of accused mass sex murderer John Wayne Gacy will be chosen in Winnebago County, nearly 100 miles west of Chicago, then moved to Cook County for the trial.

The plan, unprecedented in Illinois, was ordered Monday by Cook County Circuit Judge Louis B. Garippo in re-sponse to defense testimony indicating that pretrial publicity would prevent a fair trial with a panel of local jurors.

Gacy, 37, is charged with the sex slayings of 33 boys and young men, many of whose bodies were found buried under his northwest suburban home. He is charged with more slayings than any other single person in U.S. history.

Gacy attended the hearing, was attentive and occasionally questioned his at-

Garippo also said selection of jurors outside the county will assure that a jury is seated more quickly and at less expense. The prosecution did not object to the order. Jury selection is scheduled to start Jan. 28 in Winnebago County Circuit Court in Rockford.

Although the plan has not been used before in Illinois, Garippo noted it has been used successfully in Wisconsin. Rockford is a city of about 135,000

people, located near the Wisconsin border about midway across the state. In addition to Rockford, Winnebago County includes large rural reas.

Could be that by projecting the results in a computer, making the necessary

adjustments for ethnic, geographical and religious var-Muliania iants, they could save the country a bunch of money and not have to go around pestering people.

This year we received 216 Christmas cards, not count-

ing the ones the Post Office hasn't got around to delivering yet. The geographical range was from Winnipeg. Canada, in the north to Tasmania way down at the bottom of Australia and from Tokyo and Bangkok in the East to Cyprus in

At least a half-dozen of the neighbors walked up the road and put their cards in our box, eliminating the middle man at the stamp window, which should provide some kind of economic commentary on the way the country is headed. The total number of cards, at this date, is 36 fewer than last year, which may

be another depression indicator. Six new divorces and one trial separation turned up in the small print at th bottom of the poems this year, including one couple who announced splitsville after 29 years of surface bliss. Three of our divorced correspondents had remarried since last Christmas, showing new spouses and some new children in the

family photograph on the card, and two more already had started brand-new But the baby boom was definitely over, as evidenced from the pediatrician's card which reported she has since become a resident physician at a retirement

colony near Yuma, Ariz. Eight of our friends have moved to the Sun Belt since we heard from them last Christmas, and two have returned to the Misery Belt here in the Northeast after finding only boredom in endless sand, surf and canasta.

Sadly, three families we heard from had the principal bread winner out of work and the prospects of their finding employment soon didn't sound too

In various commentaries and wishes for the New Year and the new decade penned at the bottom of the cards, no one praised or damned Jimmy Carter or expressed a preference for any other candidate. But the Ayatollah got six unfavorable mentions and two shockingly unseasonable denunciations. None had a kind word for the tax collector, which was to be expected, even on cards quoting the Gospel of St. Matthew, a practitioner of that unpopular profession.

Religious cards with Nativity scenes or the Three Wise Men backgrounded by desert palms outnumbered Santa Claus in his various manifestations 3-1, while Scottie dogs raising martini glasses and chimpanzees riding sleds seemed to be in serious decline, which may indicate a more serious mood among participants in our Christmas sampling.

Those who appended long notes or provided one of those mimeographed an-nual family histories shed some light on our changing lifestyles as a new decade begins. Friends were "into," to use their trendy phrase, cross-country skiing, roller disco, wok pot cookery, macrame, buying gold bars and short-term savings certificates against a rainy day, home insulating, switching to a small car. protesting or supporting nuclear power, defending the wetlands or the dunes against the developers, car pooling to save gas and joining a co-op to keep the cupboard reasonably full.

More single women than last year signed in as "Ms." and one widow reverted without explanation to her maiden name. Cards in general this Christmas were a good deal less elaborate. Cheaper,

you might say, although they probably cost more.

This year again into my mailboax fluttered all those little Christmas bulletins that tell us in a way the 1980 census never can that life is still worth living

and no substitute has yet been found for it.

When the census takers get through tallying up their figures and burning up the computers, the results will be the same as William Faulkner predicted in his Nobel Prize acceptance speech: humanity will not only endure, it will prevail. Even over the Post Office.

PhoneCenter Stores Gain Momentum

NEW YORK (UPI) - The Bell System says it expects its huge investment in a national network of PhoneCenter stores to pay off eventually, but it won't

give out any figures.

Paul Mulvee, director of marketing for the PhoneCenter stores, says although individual store results vary, the project is doing well overall and is expected to be successful.

Aother AT&T official, who didn't want to be identified, said "We have spent a fortune on it, but it hasn't paid off yet.

The stores are rather elaborate and the instruments and services offered make up quite a package of options for the individual or small office user.

Installations - many in high-rent locations in shopping centers and other strategic, high-traffic spots - have been pushed so rapidly the number of stores has increased from 49 to 1,900 in just three and a half years and is still grow-

The Bell System has backed this expansion with a strong national marketing effort geared for both home and office

The most visible feature of the stores' services is Bell's Design Line phones. The PhoneCenter stores, of course, result from the court decision some years back that Bell must make instrument modularity available to all its customers so they may use either Bell'equipment or instruments bought elswhere on Bell

"This made it logical to more or less do away with the telephone installer and the fixed installation," Mulvee said. "It became desirable that, like our new equipment supply competitors, we make it possible for the subscriber to pick up his chosen phone at a store, take it home and plug it in himself.

But unlike independent suppliers who

sell telephones outright, Bell still rents its telephones. It is only the ornamental or special function shell of the Design Line phones which is sold. The working parts are rented, in the way the Bell phones always have been rented.

Bell expects this strategy to pay off big in the long run and so far it appears to have done so because, although the independents who sell telephone instruments and the office telephone interconnect industry, have reported big sales gains, Mulvee said they still have made only a tiny dent in Bell's market.

Inflation May Aid Unionism

By LEROY POPE NEW YORK (UPI) — An upsurge in union membership - a distinct turnaround from the trend of the last few years - is being forecast by some labor


Richard U. Miller, a business professor specializing in labor relations at the main campus of the University of Wisconsin at Madison, said the unions conceivably could double their membership in the 1980s as a result of such a turna-

Miller thinks continuing inflation will provide the biggest impetus to resurgent unionism because it will make times harder for workers, increase their feeling of insecurity and make them determined to wring more money and greater security

from employers. Audrey Freedman, labor relations specialist for the Conference Board, an independent business research group, also predicts a resurgence of union mem bership. She thinks the biggest gain will be in commerce and finance.

Miss Freedman would not be surprised to see a large new financial workers union established that would organize workers in financially-oriented businesses that are not now unionized and perhaps take over some workers from existing unions with their consent.

The Conference Board recently sponsored a seminar of seven industrial labor experts who came to the conclusion that 1980 is going to be a tough year for workers in the United States because of continuing inflation of 10 to 12 percent, a rise in unemployment and "zero economic growth in the economy."

Duke Maintains Top Ranking

Unbeaten Duke held the top spot in The Associated Press college basketball poll for the fourth consecutive week Tuesday as up-and-coming DePaul took over the No.2 position and preseason favorite Indiana fell to No. 19.

The Blue Devils, 12-0, were tabbed No.1 on 48 of the 54 ballots cast by a nationwide panel of sports writers and broadcasters and received 1,073 of a possible 1.080 points. Duke, which posted a 73-44 victory over Colgate last Saturday and whipped Georgia Tech 55-42 last night, was ranked no lower than third in

DePaul, ranked 11th just four weeks ago, continued its climb by receiving five first-place votes and 1.011 points and replaced Kentucky in the No.2 spot. The Blue Demons, 11-0, knocked Missouri from the unbeaten ranks last week and also posted victories over Loyola of Chicago and Ball State.

Indiana, meanwhile, continued its slide. The injury-plagued Hoosiers dropped their fourth game of the season last week, losing a 59-58 decision to Ohio State - this week's No.3 team.

Ohio State collected the other firstplace vote and 954 points in jumping from fifth to third in this week's poll. Besides nipping Indiana, the Buckeyes also beat Purdue - ranked eighth at the time

Kentucky, upset by Tennessee 49-47 last Saturday and a two-point winner over Auburn last week, slipped to No.4 with 814 points.

Syracuse, another of the surging teams in the poll, jumped from ninth to fifth with 814 points. The Orangemen, 11-

Raiders Face 'Wall' Today

COLLEGE STATION — It wasn't but a week ago when Texas Tech coach Gerald Myers surveyed the Raiders first three conference games and termed the

road ahead "murderers row." After all, the Raiders had to open against Texas in Austin, come home only to find the Houston Cougars snarling at the Coliseum door and then fly down to

College Station for those awesome Aggies. Well, the Raiders zipped through the first two stops on "murderers row" unblemished but now they've run right smack dab into a wall. That wall is Texas A&M.

With one of the biggest front lines in the country, the Aggies were dubbed "The Wall" way back before a single contest had been played this year. And although they stumbled at times in the early going, the Aggies are rolling now.

The Raiders will tangle with A&M here tonight at 8 p.m. in G. Rollie White Coliseum in a game that has to rank as one of the early season showdowns.

Both teams are 2-0 in SWC play — the Aggies fresh off an impressive 74-57 dismantling of the Baylor Bears and the Raiders are coming off a 77-70 win over

So this game, only the third of the SWC season for both squads, looms as a battle for the early conference lead. In other conference games tonight, Arkansas is at TCU, SMU is at Baylor and Texas is at Hous-

But for the Raiders, all that matters now is "The Wall" - and against Baylor it was awesome.

Vernon Smith, the Aggies 6-7 junior forward, was 10 of 11 from the field and scored 26 points. Rynn Wright, A&M's 6-8 muscle man, held Baylor's leading scorer, Terry Teagle, to a measly 12 points (five of 16 from the field) and Rudy Woods - the Ags big, 6-11 center - hauled down 14 rebounds and scored 11

For those three - who make up "The Wall" - it was a performance that was long overdue.

Woods' 14 rebounds marked a return to reality for him after he'd grabbed only one board against TCU in the Aggies season opener. But Smith and Wright have been the story for the Aggies thus far.

"I've said it before," commented A&M coach Shelby Metcalf, "but as Smith and Wright go - so goes A

"But through the first 14 minutes of the second half (against Baylor) we did a very good defensive

job," he added. "We need to continue that kind of play against Tech.

Metcalf was also pleased with the performance turned in by Woods, saying, "He (Woods) played good basketball for the first time in quite awhile.

So for the 8-4 Raiders, they may be catching the 10-5 Aggies at the wrong moment. Smith is averaging 18.2 a game, Wright is at 16.4, Woods is averaging 11.7 and senior guard David Britton is right at 10 points per contest. Tonight's other starter, 5-10 senior David Goff, is the Aggies' quarterback.

In addition to its starting 6-11, 6-8, 6-7 inside lineup the Aggies have a 6-9 freshman - Claude Riley who is coming around in a hurry.

Riley, averaging 5.2 points and four rebounds a game, scored 10 points and hauled in eight rebounds in 20 minutes of playing time Saturday against the Bears. And when someone with Riley's credentials is sitting on the bench — it can make the opposing coach shiver from head to toe.

"It was really hard for me to watch Claude Riley come in and play as a substitute," said Baylor coach Jim Haller, "when I know he could be starting for us. He is going to be a great one.

But that's hardly news to Myers. "A&M is really starting to play up to their potential, "said the Tech coach. "They played a real tough early schedule and they played a lot of road games.

But I know they are going to be tough at home."

The games seem to be close whenever these two schools get together. Tech holds a skimpy 26-25 edge over the Aggies — seven of those games have been decided by a single point — including the Raiders' 63-62 win over the Aggies in last year's SWC postseason tournament. In addition, eight games have been decided by two points. cided by two points.

Prior to last year's win over the Ags in the postsea-son tourney, the Raiders had lost a 68-63 decision here but prevailed 67-63 at the Municipal Coliseum.

The key to Tech's 8-4 start this year has been defense and an uncanny knack for shooting the eyes out of the basket. Through 12 games, the Raiders own a team shooting percentage of 54.6 but, even more importantly, have held the opposition to a 42.8 percentage. The Raiders have dipped under 50 percent only twice this year (they lost both those games) and have been outshot only once (they lost that one also).

The Raiders will stay with their regular starting five of 6-8 Ralph Brewster at the post, 6-6 Ben Hill and 6-6 David Little inside with 6-4 Jeff Taylor and 6-5 Kent Williams at the guard spots.


Little and Taylor still lead the Raiders in scoring, averaging 15.0 and 14.3 points respectively but Kent Williams has taken over the scoring lead since conference action began. The senior floor leader is averaging 14 points an outing — after leading Tech with 19 points against Houston. All five Raider starters are averaging in double figures and Thad Sanders is scoring 6.5 points per game coming off the bench.



It's open season again on "zebras," a winter form of big game hunting in professional football. But don't worry, folks — the striped monsters with the shrill whistles aren't an endangered species.

There's no chance football officials will be replaced by a bevy of big electric eyes spying from every conceivable vantage point — an interesting idea, but impractical.

That doesn't prevent squeals of anguish every time a questionable call comes up in the National Football League, such as Sunday's American Conference championship game in Pittsburgh and, to a lesser degree, the National Conference battle in Tampa

Bay. "Give Us Honest Calls, Rozelle,"

pleaded a TV column headline in New

Pittsburgh Steelers and the long-shot Los Angeles Rams in Super Bowl XIV Jan. 20, in Pasadena.

Late in the third quarter of the game at Pittsburgh, with the Steelers eading 17-10, Houston quarterback Dan Pastorini sent a pass toward Mike Renfro in the corner of the end zone. Renfro made a leaping grab, planted one foot solidly on the ground fore sliding over the end zone line.

"Touchdown!" yelled NBC broadcaster Dick Enberg.

"Yeah, he got the throw and both feet on the ground," added fellow commentator, Merlin Olsen, a former

When side judge Donald Orr ruled no touchdown, the TV crew blew a

"Let's do a rerun," one of them said. The play was rerun. "Oh, my," gasped Enberg, "It's a touchdown, no doubt," said Olsen. "This may make the instant replay important," said

So some 40 million viewers - give or take a few million - went to bed thinking that the underdog Oilers might have been jobbed out of a chance to upset the Super Bowl chamscore 17-17, and who can say the Steelers would have gone on to win

Twenty-four hours later. Commissioner Pete Rozelle and his supervisor of officials, Art McNally, examined NFL films which showed the disputed play from a different, clearer angle from the front.

This piece of film revealed that

Renfro, in seeking to secure the ball which he had grabbed with a sensational catch, sought to shift it from one arm to the other.

In so doing, he juggled the ball ever so slightly, not securing it until he was out of bounds.

"It was definitely questionable that he had possession," said the commissioner, citing Article 6 in the rule

book which states a player must have full control.

"He didn't have complete control you can't fault Orr's call," added McNally. "This shows the danger of jumping to quick conclusions. Suppose the side judge had called it a touchdown. Then the next day we look at films and they show that Renfro didn't have possession. We would have egg on our faces

There were at least three calls at Tampa Bay — two involving interference and the other an out-of-bounds catch - which the Buccaneers thought were questionable.

We don't say our officials are infallible," insists Rozelle. "But surveys have shown a very low percentage of bad calls. And here we have a case of a camera failing to give the true picits close to half-a-billion dollars in TV revenue, couldn't afford an electronic

"We use regular film in our NFL movies," Rozelle said. "It takes time to develop and process them. Look, we only got Sunday's film at 3 o'clock

Monday. If TV can do instant replays, why can't the NFL?

"That's different," said supervisor McNally. "We found that such a network of cameras in all stadiums would cost \$55 million, not to mention the expense of manning every Sun-

"Even then, as in the Pittsburgh case, cameras can't be conclusive. They are not an exact science.'

Tampa Bay Owner Presents McKay New, Five-Year Pact

coach John McKay has insisted on building the Tampa Bay Buccaneers his way. Now he'll get five more years to do it.

Owner Hugh Culverhouse obviously likes the McKay way. He announced Monday a five-year extension of McKay's contract as head coach and vice president of the National Football League

"It is my hope John will continue as head coach for many years to come. He's my coach of the year," said Culverhouse, a Jacksonville attorney who has fully supported McKay through the struggling start of the four-year-old franchise.

The announcement came just after McKay guided the young Bucs to a National Football Conference title game. They were stopped short of the Super Bowl Sunday in a 9-0 shutout by the Los Angeles Rams.

McKay, 55, is in the last year of his initial five-year contract, reportedly worth about \$1.5 million. He came to Tampa as head coach in the 1976 season from the University of Southern California, where he closed out a 16-year career with a 127-40-8 record.

McKay also has agreed to serve as president and chief executive officer of the Bucs at the end of his coaching days.

Culverhouse also extended contracts for McKay's coaching assistants for three

"I plan to coach as long as I think I'm doing the job," McKay said. He praised Culverhouse as a boss and a personal friend. "With this contract we now have the oportunity to bring championship football to Tampa Bay fans.

Terms of the contract were not revealed

After taking the Bucs farther than any fourth-year team, McKay credited the rise to his decision to stick with young players and build through the draft.

"We could have gotten a few older players the other teams didn't want and then won two games, but what would that have meant?" McKay said.

"They all had an option as to how to build the team but I didn't meet anybody who had done it.

Struggling through an 0-26 start, McKay put up with with T-shirts that read "Dump McKay in the Bay." After a 5-11 finish and the worst offense in the league in 1978, the Bucs climbed to a 10-6 record and the NFC Central Division championship this season. Then they de-



McClendon Says Coaches Should Police Ranks

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Charles McClendon, president of the American Football Coaches Association, said coaches should begin policing their own ranks, since existing penalties don't di-rectly affect those who cheat.

McClendon is president of the American Football Coaches Association, which is holding its 57th annual convention in conjunction with the NCAA convention.

Probation - the usual NCAA sanction when recruiting rules or other standards are violated — prevents a school from appearing on television or in bowl games and can force cancellation of a school's intercollegiate program alto-gether. A player can also be declared ineligible for intercollegiate competition.

"I think society now tolerates - excuses — probations, and that's not good." McClendon said.

He didn't spell out what the AFCA could do about scofflaws within its ranks. After 18 years as head coach at Louis-

iana State Universty, McClendon's contract was not renewed, leaving him unemployed with an overall record at the school of 137-59-7 and a 1979 mark of 7-5. He said Monday that for the good of

college football, university presidents must recapture control of their athletic programs and reduce the influence of alin part - which cost him his job. There was always grumbling that he couldn't win the big ones, and Alabama is the biggest in the Southeastern Conference. But he said almost all coaches are fac-

ing unrealistic pressures to win.

"I'm hoping school administrators will help to bring things back into focus," he said. "They'd better get the game back on campus and not let outside forces get too involved.

"There's no way anyone can satisfy He also said he would like to see some

changes in recruiting rules. Allowing a school to sign 30 players a year, but permitting a maximum total of only 90, is unfair, especially when cou-

pled with the relatively new provision permitting one-year scholarships, he "A hard-nosed person can always

make room for 30 a year," he said. "For 20 years, I was told that you couldn't do that, and now I'm told you can. "I've always believed in numbers, but sometimes a person can drown in his

own beliefs." And, he said, the 30 limit might prove to be a drain on recruiting budgets.

# **Charities Denouncing** United Way's Methods

America, the mammoth nationwide char ity drive that raised more than \$1.2 billion last year, is under attack for the way its 2,300 U.S. chapters raise and spend

Critics, chiefly a host of smaller philanthropic groups and health agencies that must compete for America's inflation-pinched charity dollar, are challeng-ing United Way's historic monopoly on the cheapest and most lucrative form of fund-raising — on-the-job solicitation and payroll deductions. They also take issue with United Way's image as the chief spokesman for American charity.

Dozens of advocacy groups — like the Sierra Club, the Gray Panthers, the National Organization for Women, Zero Population Growth and the National Black United Fund - also are clamoring for a share of Americans' largess.

Last month, a congressional panel recommended major reforms in the Combined Federal Campaign, the \$80-million-a-year drive that United Way and ployees of the federal government.

Among the findings of the House Subcommittee on Civil Service, chaired by Rep. Pat Schroeder, D-Colo., was that non-United Way charities have been excluded from participating in the federal

The subcommittee recommended elimination of coercive tactics said to have been used during the federal cam-paigns — like the public posting in some agencies of the names of workers who refused to contribute.

Rolland Hoffman, president of Denver's United Way, served as the charity's liaison to the subcommittee. He argued that the campaign doesn't need an over-

Robert O. Bothwell, executive director of the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy, terms "fraudulent and misleading" United Way's claim that it "works for all of us."

# **New Mortgage Rate** Offers Protection

WASHINGTON (AP) - With home mortgage interest rates already at record high levels and more increases likely, efforts are under way to protect homebuyers from being locked into high interest

The effective interest rate on mortgages for new houses averaged 11.65 percent in early December, up from November's 11.37 percent, the Federal Home Loan Bank Board said Monday.

A hint of more increases could be seen in the commitment rate, the interest that financial institutions promise on yet-to-be-closed mortgages, which rose from 12.65 percent in November to 12.93 percent last month. The December commitment rate averaged 2.54 percent higher than it did a year earlier, the bank board said.

"The Federal Reserve Board's Oct. 6 anti-inflation monetary action continues to push mortgage commitment rates higher," said Jay Janis, bank board chairman, adding that the housing industry must expect "several more months of

Janis said he has received "highly fa-

proposed "renegotiated rate mortgage," intended partly to protect homebuyers from being bound to current high inter-est rates for 20 to 30 years.

The new rate proposed by the board would ease pressure on lenders as well as homebuyers, giving them latitude to increase mortgage rates, if necessary, to keep up with market conditions.

The proposal would make financial institutions more willing to make mortgage loans, Janis said

Loan activity in many areas has come to a virtual standstill because lenders refuse to offer fixed mortgages at interest levels lower than the short-term rates they must pay to borrow. The bank board already allows thou-

sands of savings and loan associations to offer variable rate mortgages, which let interest rates rise or fall as much as 2.5 percent over the life of the loan.

Under the new proposal, the rise and fall limits would be raised to 5 percentage points.

Janis also said the bank board will act soon to permit savings and loan associations to invest more in commercial loan programs guaranteed by the Small Business Administration, the Farmers Home Administration, and the Economic Development Administration.

He said the moves are intended to spur more investment by savings and loans in their communities.
