It quoted him as saying that proposal was now before Khomeini and that he, Bani-Sadr, hoped for a response "in two days." The idea for an international commission was proposed by

U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldehim. At the United Nations in New York,

Bani-Sadr also gave an indication how he might then attempt to press a compromise solution on the militants holding the hostages. "In the case of a divergence of views, I would eventually go to the U.S. Embassy to convince them to fall in line with my view," he was quoted as

Nurses Hit Action By Hospital

The firing of the director of nursing at Health Sciences Center Hospital has drawn strong criticism from a local nursing group which has called a news conference to protest the action.

Betty McInnes, secretary of the Texas Nurses Association District 18, said today that a news conference is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Wednesday to protest the firing Friday of Mary Lemons by the hospital district administration.

Mrs. Lemons was hired in March

Contacted at her home today, Mrs. Lemons said she would "prefer not to comment" on the situation

Administrators could not be reached for comment, but Mrs. McInnes said she understood that Mrs. Lemons was told she was being fired so that the new hospital administrators could bring in their own director for the job.

Administrators Jake Henry Jr. and Charlie Trimble Jr. were brought in from two other hospitals in the state to man-age Health Sciences at the end of last

Gwen Stafford, vice chairman of the HSCH board of managers, said today that the board was not involved in the firing action, but said she thought it was an "efficiency move. I think he's (Henry) trying to make the hospital efficient and productive and if this is the way to do it,

I support him.' Mrs. McInnes said the firing was par ticularly unfair "especially in view of the nursing shortage" at the hospital and in the Lubbock area. "We're supposed to be recruiting nurses," she said, adding, Something like this just makes our job all the more difficult.

The latest chapter in the stormy history of Health Sciences Center Hospital comes amid moves to trim the payroll, which some staffers say have seriously damaged morale among hospital employ-

The financially troubled institution also got another jolt recently when a consultant hired by the Health, Education and Welfare Department predicted the hospital district would be in bankruptcy before the end of the year. The report, however, was discounted as giving an inaccurate picture by the new administra-

Grand Jury To Quiz Clayton Wednesday

AUSTIN (UPI) - Speaker Bill Clayton's appearance before a federal grand jury in Houston will be delayed until ednesday, aides said today.

Clayton, who returned home to Springlake to attend an appreciation dinner in Hereford, was subpoenaed to testify Tuesday before a grand jury investigating bribery and kickback charges resulting from the latest FBI undercover

investigation of government officials. Defense attorney Charles Burton of Austin asked for Clayton's appearance to be postponed because Burton was scheduled to be in federal court on another

The speaker conferred with almost three dozen of his staunchest supporters Sunday and adamantly rejected suggestions he could be deposed as the House's presiding officer because of allegations he took a bribe.

Clayton told backers at the closeddoor meeting at a downtown Austin hotel to support him while he fights potential charges for accepting "a stack of \$100 bills" given to him Nov. 8 by a union offi-

Asked if he was losing support, Clayton said he was amazed at the backing he has received "from members, from supporters, from friends.

"I've just been tickled to death," Clayton said. "They realize that nothing is wrong and that everything is going to be OK.

Several of the legislators who attended the more than two-hour-long session said it sounded as though Clayton had been set up by the FBI undercover investigation.

Some representatives, however, said while they were confident Clayton is innocent, the allegations may wreck his political career.

"I don't think he is a thief," said Rep. Wayne Peveto, D-Orange. "I think most members of the Legislature understand how this could've happened, but I find it hard to believe that the general public

Clayton, who had been subpoenaed to

appear Tuesday before a Houston grand jury investigating bribery and kickback charges resulting from the latest FBI undercover investigation of government officials, is alleged to have accepted \$10,-

But at a news conference Saturday. the millionaire farmer from Springlake said he accepted the money only to avoid embarrassing the supporter in front of a business associate and had every inten-

Begin Warns U.S., Rejects Concessions

JERUSALEM (AP) - Prime Minister Menachem Begin told the United States today that Israel will not be sacrificed in a policy of appeasement toward the Arabs on the Palestinian issue. In Tel Aviv, a bomb blew up at a crowded suburban bus stop, injuring 15 persons, authorities said.

Begin, speaking to the American Jewish Committee, said that Israel would make no more concessions to encourage Palestinians to join talks for autonomy in Israeli-occupied territories.

Begin, informed that an intense artillery duel had broken out along the Lebanon-Israeli frontier between Palestinians and Lebanese Christians, said Israel would not stand back and watch its allies destroyed.

Begin said Israel was closely watching the movement of Syrian troops in Lebanon. "We cannot tolerate or afford a surprise," he said.

In a newspaper interview published in Cairo today, Defense Minister Ezer Weizman was quoted as speaking out strongly in favor of co-existence with the Arabs. In a statement differing markedly from Begin's policy, he was quoted as saying Jewish settlements do not represent security for Israel. The interview was taken

in Israel earlier this month. In the Tel Aviv suburb of Petah Tik-vah a bomb blast injured 15 persons, one seriously, at the bus stop, a hospital spokesman reported. Israel Radio said two crowded buses left the stop mo-ments before the bomb exploded. It said police rounded up 10 Arabs and sealed off the area while they searched for more explosives, but there was no report that any were found.

In his speech Begin referred to state-ments by Secretary of State Cyrus Vance that a resolution of the Palestinian problem would boost American influence with Moslem and Arab states and ease the strategic position against Soviet advances in the Middle East.

In his bluntest statement to date, Begin cautioned "against this approach, which without any qualification can be called appeasement

He also rejected statements by Ambassador Sol Linowitz, the chief American delegate to the autonomy talks with

Egypt and Israel.

Linowitz has argued that not enough has been achieved in the talks to encour-

courtroom in the southeast corner of the building's first floor. Smith said prisoners could be brought

A 16-year-old Lubbock High School

student shot in the abdomen early Sunday died at 1:20 a.m. today at Health Sciences Center Hospital, and another Lubbock High student was in police custody in connection with the fatal incident. Ray Vasquez of 310 Ave. U died from

a single gunshot wound to the lower right portion of the abdomen despite futile efforts by more than 200 area residents to save the boy by donating blood. A boy, also 16, being held by police early today has admitted shooting Vas-

quez about 1:10 a.m. Sunday inside a residence in the 1800-block of Sixth Street. but he has maintained the incident was accidental, said investigating officer Ed Hernandez of the Lubbock Police Department's juvenile division

The Lubbock High student, who was scheduled to be turned over to the Lubbock Juvenile Probation Office later today, told police he was playing with a .357 magnum revolver when it accidentally discharged

Justice of the Peace L.J. Blalack, who pronounced the victim dead and ordered an autopsy, said this morning he had made a preliminary ruling of homicide -

Caucuses Boost Carter's Campaign

AUGUSTA, Maine (AP) - President Carter has beaten Sen. Edward M. Kennedy in their first New England contest, but the challenger claimed satisfaction in second place as the campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination

moved next door to New Hampshire. The president's men said it will be difficult to duplicate their Maine victory in New Hampshire, site of the first presidential primary election two weeks

But the victory Carter scored Sunday is sure to be an asset in that campaign. There is no momentum in defeat, for all Kennedy's claims that the president did

not match expectations in Maine's Democratic town meetings.

Carter gained 45 percent of the Maine vote to Kennedy's 39 percent, with results from about 50 Democratic town caucuses still to be tallied. California Gov. Edmund G. Brown

Jr. ran third, with 14 percent of the vote, and said that represented a takeoff for his campaign. Kennedy sought to minimize his loss, describing the outcome as a standoff and

"So we will head to New Hampshire and all the other states, confident of what the outcome will be," Kennedy

Carter, at Camp David, Md., thanked his supporters and workers for the victory, and said he was sorry he hadn't been able to campaign. "I regret that international circumstances made it impossible for me to travel to Maine during this campaign," he said.

White House press secretary Jody Powell said Carter almost certainly will remain in Washington throughout the

New Hampshire campaign Kennedy issues almost daily demands that Carter join the campaign and debate

him, but Powell said the president's absence is an asset to the challenger.

"He's sort of got the field to himself with the president locked up in the White House." Powell said. He said the loss was a major blow to

the Kennedy campaign because it came in the senator's home region.

'We've all known all along that a win by Carter in Kennedy's home court would be a major setback for the loser,' Powell said. He said the same rule would apply were Kennedy to defeat Carter in a southern primary.

Mrs. Johnson met with Roeusche Sunday in Oakton, Va. She had hoped to receive a verdict at the meeting, but said she got only word of the delay

Rouesche could sustain the excommunication, reverse it or order a new trial.

After the meeting, Mrs. Johnson called on the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to hasten its decision be-

cause of the trauma the delay is causing her and her family. She said the wait has made her sad, but has not dulled her love for the Mormon Church.

A church court in her Sterling, Va., ward excommunicated Mrs. Johnson Dec. 5, saying she had ridiculed church leaders and hurt the church missionary effort. She appealed

Mrs. Johnson is head of Mormons for ERA, a group supporting the Equal Rights Amendment although church lead-



Many Workers Retire In 60s

NEW YORK (AP) - When the mandatory retirement age was raised to 70 years from 65, effective Jan. 1, 1979, concern developed among some executives that corporate mobility would be slowed.

That's a considerable worry in some companies, one arising from the belief that if old-timers linger in the posh jobs at the top they'll clog up the advancement routes for younger executives with new ideas.

A bottleneck of that sort could have immediate consequences, forcing innovative young men and women to leave, perhaps slowing productivity growth and weakening competitiveness.

So what, the late-retirement advo-

cates said, at age 65 a worker often is healthy, generally useful, and sometimes in need of the money that goes with a job. He and she is not to be cast aside as all worn out.

There was power behind the movement. Consumer representatives, self-appointed, had learned how to get their way in Washington. And the geriatric

NEW YORK (AP) - Gemstones mined in North America and mounted in 18-karat gold jewelry valued at more than \$1 million will tour the country during the coming year after being on exhibit at the American Museum of Natural History here.

The 31-piece American Gemstone Jewelry Collection was designed by Coty Award-winner Aldo Cipullo and produced by the American Gem Society (AGS). It will be presented by the society to the Smithsonian Institution as part of that museum's permanent collection after it is displayed in a number of cities over the United States.

The centerpiece of the collection is an 18-karat gold ring featuring a 2.31-carat Arkansas diamond, both colorless and flawless, which has a value of more than \$100,000. Another major piece is a 216carat Arizona turquoise forming the body of a gold American eagle, which has a Montana sapphire as an eye.

And one rare gemstone in the collection is benitoite, a stone that has been found only in America. It is named after its source, San Benito County, Calif.

"Ever since our nation's beginnings, Americans have been fascinated with beautiful gems from other lands," says George Kramer of the AGS, an association of retail jewelers in the United States and Canada. "Yet many large, high-quality stones occur naturally within our own borders.

Though America is not regarded as a gem-producing country, it is a major source for three popular gemstones turquoise, sapphire and tourmaline -Kramer notes.

While Nevada is particularly rich in turquoise, other mines are located in Arizona, Colorado and New Mexico. A sapphire mine in Yogo Gulch, Mont., extends for five miles, making it the largest proven sapphire deposit in the world. The two most productive areas of tourmaline are Maine and California.

"A major factor in the dominance of imported gemstones in the United States is the strong and dependable supply of most of these stones," explains Kramer of the fact that American jewelers have traditionally looked to other countries for the best stones.

"With such a good supply, there is little incentive or reward for Americans to develop their own gem deposits. Mining gems is a risky and unpredictable busi-

Kramer says that beautiful gems age found in almost every state, including rubies in North Carolina, peridots in Arizona, jade in California, garnets in New York and opals in Nevada.

A relatively new find is the red beryl from Utah, and its quantities may prove large enough to be mined and sold commercially in the United States, Kramer

(1) He recognized the absolute necessity for having the machinery in place to beef up our armed forces if the need arises; and

(2) He separated that request from the emotion-laden question of requiring young women also to register, although he asked Congress to so require them.

International tensions have reached the point where the nation may not have time to fully debate the draft-women proposal before getting the young men registered.

THE PRESIDENT proposed that only 19 and 20-year-olds be required to register for the draft although present law specifies that men between the ages of 18 and 26 are subject to the draft.

Technically, the President already has the power to reactivate the Selective Service system, but as a practical matter he has to get Congress' permission by asking for a \$20 million appropriation.

Women, of course, are not now subject to the draft although they may volunteer for non-combat roles. Whether they should be subject to the draft and to combat assign- this very moment. It behooves the United ments just like the men has become em- States to get ready, too.

IN ASKING Congress for funds to reacti- broiled in the whole question of "equalrights, equal responsibilities" for women.

Regardless of how that question finally is resolved, it should not be used as an excuse for delaying the registration of draft-age

We think, as a matter of fact, that the situation is so critical that the armed services should know where all 18-to-26-year-olds are in case they're needed, not just those who are 19 and 20 as Mr. Carter proposes.

IT SHOULD BE borne in mind that registration for the draft is not the same thing as actually calling men (or women) up and inducting them.

If the next war gives the nation any lead time at all, however, it certainly is unlikely to give it enough advance warning to begin the registration process from scratch.

Critics naively suggest that mere registration will increase the probabilities for war. All evidence is to the contrary.

The all-volunteer armed services now have only 2,020,239 men in uniform in this country, slightly more than half of the Soviet Union's 3.638.000 men at-the-ready.

The Soviet Union is prepared for war and is, in fact, actively fighting in Afghanistan at

WASHINGTON-I'm trying hard-really-to believe that there is a new, hard-line Jimmy Cart- U.S. projected domestic production er who thinks as he told the Congress in his State of the Union address, that "we must face the world as it is." I'm trying hard to believe this, but I'm not having much luck

Carter drew the line in the Persian Gulf area. saying that an attempt by any outside force to gain control of this region "will be regarded as an assault on the vital interests of the United States" and will be repelled by the use of "any means necessary, including military force

The President said that U.S. dependence on foreign oil in the Persian Gulf region is a "clear and present danger to our national security." He de-

"I have been working with Congress in a concentrated and persistent way over the past three years to meet this urgent need.

BUT CARTER SPEAKS with a forked tongue. What I have in mind specifically is the concentrated and persistent way in which he has worked with the Congress in advocating a so-called "wind-

fall profits" tax of hundreds of billions of dollars on the oil industry. The result of this tax would be that the U.S. would be more, not less, dependent on foreign oil

According to a study by the Congressional Budget Office, if the President's "windfall profits" tax became law, by 1990, U.S. domestic oil production would be 800,000 barrels per day less than if there were no such tax at all.

It represents between 10 and 11 percent of all

If. by 1990, this 800,000 barrels of oil per day has to be replaced with imported crude at a cost of \$30 a barrel, then the annual cost to our balance of payments deficit will be nearly \$9 billion.

Carter said that the Soviets must answer some 'basic questions"-Will the Soviet Union help to promote a more stable international environment in which its own legitimate, peaceful concerns can be pursued?

OR WILL IT continue to expand its military power far beyond its genuine security needs, using that power for colonial conquest?

Now, what makes this formulation so distressing is the fact that the President obviously believes that these things are still a question mark. But why? These questions have already been answered so clearly that one would think that even Jimmy Carter could read the handwriting on the

The Soviets' naked aggression in Afghanistan, their stationing of a combat unit in Cuba and the Soviet support of thousands of Cuban troops in Africa demonstrates, for all the world to see, that the Soviet Union has no desire whatsoever to help promote world peace.

THE PRESIDENT STATED that, during the past three years, he has acted to improve our own security by annually increasing the real U.S. commitment for defense. But, the record shows that the President reduced former President Ford's

proposed defense budgets for the years 1979 through 1983 by \$57 billion.

Carter slashed Ford's strategic programs by \$24 billion, cut back U.S. general-purpose force programs by \$25 billion, and reduced defense re-

search and development by \$10 billion President Carter unilaterally canceled the production of the B-1 bomber, without any reciprocal concession by the Soviets; he shut down the Minuteman III production line; he delayed deployment of the MX missile; he slowed down procurement of the Trident submarine; and he refused to deploy the so-called neutron bomb in Western Eu-

On the 81st day of the hostages' captivity, Carter said that "if" our hostages in Iran are harmed, "a severe price will be paid." What does be mean

"if" these people are harmed? They have already been harmed just by being held prisoner by terrorists for nearly three months! And, by the way, what ever happened to the threat of economic sanctions against Iran?

Iobless Aren't Much Of A Political Force

WASHINGTON-If the downturn deepens despite the surge in military spending, some 8 to 8.5 illion men and women may be jobless when the U.S. goes to the polls this fall, an unemployment

rate of around 8 percent against under 6 percent Who will these jobless be and what might they mean to the candidates for the presidency?

Minorities, particularly blacks and the young will be hit the hardest, as in past downturns. The unemployment rate for blacks, for instance, now about 11 percent, may jump to 16 percent, up

about five percentage points.

In contrast, the jobless rate for whites, now roughly 5 percent, may move to 7 percent, a smaller rise of two percentage points.

BLACKS WILL BE laid off because they frequently lack seniority or hold assembly line or other less-skilled and non-essential jobs which em-

ployers eliminate first during recessions. Black teenagers, whose numbers have been increasing faster than other classes of workers, will

suffer because of the lack of new job openings. In addition, blacks, on average, are less well-educated, have less training and often are targets of racial discrimination as well.

And another reason black teenagers have high obless rates both in good times as well as bad, experts told my associate, Brooke Shearer, is that they have a much poorer "network" of job contacts than whites have.

A recent study by a Boston University economics professor, Paul Osterman, of labor problems in two Boston communities-one mostly white, the other black-disclosed that white youth found jobs twice as often through friends and relatives than did blacks.

THE REASON: DISCRIMINATION, both past and present, put black parents in less of a position to help their offspring get work than whites.

As a result, black teens must depend to a much greater extent than whites on such job placement nstitutions as schools, employment agencies and manpower programs. None of these has had notable success in placing applicants in good jobs.

Rising joblessness also tends to undermine the

programs that the federal government has put in

place to fight discrimination. Affirmative action plans, as an illustration, are undercut because the last hired are usually the first fired. (Last in, first out, or LIFO.) Job training programs, too, become what Osterman calls

'empty promises," since there are few jobs avail-

PARTLY IN ANTICIPATION of this problem. the Carter administration intends to reorient some job training programs toward basic educa-

able for those who have been trained.

hardship into political action, the authors find. In fact, they are less likely than the employed to be interested in politics, to read a daily newspaper, to watch the TV news-and most significant, less likely even to vote than the employed. The explanations are much more connected

with their backgrounds, education levels and oth-

er demographic characteristics than their lack of a

job, report the authors. UNEMPLOYMENT, HOWEVER, has "the potential for influencing national election outcomes. but that effect comes from others who vote in accordance with their opinions on employment as an

issue," claim Verba and Schlozman. Fundamental message: Much as Carter is pushing inflation into the background as he assumes the role of statesman in a foreign crisis and creates the "Carter Doctrine," zooming living costs

Stock Market Maintains High Level Of Activity

NEW YORK (AP) — After a New York Stock Exchange session early this month in which 46.61 million shares were traded, one newspaper reported: "Stock prices gain in light trading."

For regular followers of the stock market, that unobtrusive headline told the story of the remarkable increase in trading activity this year as well as any superlatives could have done.

That 46.61 million figure was nearly three times the peak volume on the Big

Board during the Great Crash of 1929. Less than two years ago, it would have been a record

But in the aftermath of a January rally in which well over 1 billion shares changed hands, it was indeed the lightest activity the exchange had seen in nearly a

By late last week, 1980 volume on the NYSE had passed the 1.5 billion-share mark in less than six full weeks of trading. If anything close to that pace is

Doctor Cites Bone Problem INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) - Denture wearers are more likely to swallow

small chicken bones than most people, because their palates have become less sensitive, a radiologist here warns. In some instances, these bones pierce the stomach or intestines and can cause abdominal hemorrhage, obstruction, in-

flammation or abscess. This problem was identified by Dr. Dean D.T. Maglinte and his colleagues at the Methodist Hospital Graduate Medical Center here. They examined four elderly, denture-wearing patients and discovered thet chicken bones had caused perforation in two of them.

Because of their calcium content, chicken bones can usually be seen on Xray studies, Maglinte notes. However, infected fluid sometimes surrounds the bone and masks it from view. It is often difficult for the doctor to determine the cause of these symptoms with X-ray examination, he says, because patients rarely recall swallowing the chicken

In addition to denture wearers, alcohol and drug abusers and patients who are mentally disturbed are the most plagued by accidental swallowings, Maglion shares will be broken before Labor

"Volume has often provided the key to stock prices," Charles Comer, an analyst at Bache Halsey Stuart Shields maintained. "Protracted periods of high vol-ume are invariably bull phases, and bear trends are marked by a relatively slower trading pace.

"In the past, a swelling of the trading pace has resulted from increased conviction on the part of the investing public. More recently, with institutional inves-tors accounting for the lion's share of trading, sustained high volume has been a hallmark of major institutional buying programs — basic decisions not made lightly and not likely to be abandoned



Madigan's amendment also tightened a credit-elsewhere test. Under the amendment, a farmer could not get an economic emergency loan unless he had written rejection with an explanation from a credit institution.

A borrower would have to produce one rejection for loans of less than \$150,-000 and two rejections for loans of more than that some farmers got economic emergency loans even if they could have gotten credit elsewhere. The investigators recommended a tightening of the existing law.

Congress is also tightening credit-elsewhere tests for other Farmers Home programs because of abuses.

Farmers can get economic emergency loans under current law if they are "unable at the time the loan application is filed to obtain sufficient credit from normal credit sources to finance actual needs at reasonable rates and terms."

Madigan's amendment also would bar a farmer from getting direct loans under the program unless the Agriculture Department determined that the farmer could not obtain a similar loan backed

Initially, the program was expected to include half direct and half guaranteed

loans. But as of last fall, only 4 percent of loans were guaranteed and 96 percent were direct.

Recently, the subcommittee approved, by a 15-0 vote, an extension of the economic emergency loan program with several amendments.

The \$4 billion program, started in August 1978 to supplement existing Farmers Home programs and to help farmers recover from low prices, is due to expire May 15. Its main purpose was for refinancing.

Congressmen say the program needs to be extended until Sept. 30, 1981 because of farmers' economic problems caused by the Russian grain embargo.

The pending legislation, to be taken up soon by the full House Agriculture Committee, would permit lending of another \$2 billion. A similar provision was introduced by Sen. Herman Talmadge, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee.

Members of the House subcommittee said they did not want several amendments that change the picture of the economic emergency loan program to impede actual lending of money after

They agreed the program should continue under current rules but that the

changes must be made by Oct. 1. Rep. Tom Harkin, D-lowa, said, "Let's face it, the real need is for the

money. In another amendment, the subcommittee approved a subsidy so that the interest rates for guaranteed loans would be as low as rates for direct loans. The difference would be paid by the taxpay-

Under the current program, interest on direct economic emergency loans is based on cost of money to the government. Higher interest on guaranteed loans is agreed to by a farmer and his banker.

Farmers can borrow no more than \$400,000 under the program. By a 6-5 vote, the subcommittee added another limitation: that farmers can use no more than \$50,000 out of \$400,000 for current farm operating expenses. The rest would have to go for refinancing of debts or major purchases like machinery.

The narrowly approved amendment also stipulated that at least \$1 billion of loans under the program must go for op-

erating expenses. The legislation would raise the ceiling on federal loans for farm storage facili-ties from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

The Soviets appear to have the most immediate opportunity to exceed the treaty limits because all the American weapons programs now underway would be permitted by the treaty anyway.

The Soviets have almost reached the limit of 820 modern, multiple-warhead, land-based missiles set out in the treaty. But their production line can turn out about 100 of those missiles each year. Moreover, the missiles are powerful enough to carry more warheads than SALT II would permit.

Male Registration **Expected To Pass**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Congress is expected to give prompt approval to President Carter's proposal to register 18-and 19-year-old males for the draft but the inclusion of women may be rejected.

Carter's proposals, calling for men and women to sign up for selective serv-

ice, go to Congress today. Senate Democratic leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., said the Senate is ready to vote funds immediately to permit resumption of registration for men. But, he said, women's registration might result in a "divisive debate" that the Soviet Union might regard as disunity.

"I support the idea," said Byrd, on NBC's "Meet the Press" Sunday. "I would support registration for women, but I think from a practical standpoint, it would be best not to proceed with that immediately in the Congress ...

Carter's proposals call for registration this year of all persons born in 1960 and 1961. Starting Jan. 1, 1981, those born in 1962 would have to register, with regis-

Patterns/Needlework Rivalry Poses Threat To Peace

KEZI, Rhodesia (UPI) - From the air Matabeleland is a picture of granite hills and green valleys. From the ground, what stands out in this area of southwestern Rhodesia are the scars and the

The hate is not directed at white-led government forces who punished black civilians for assisting guerrillas, but at Robert Mugabe's Zimbabwe African National Liberation Army, which for two years sought control over a population loyal mostly to Joshua Nkomo and his

separate guerrilla army.

Speaking a different language, using brutality to counter civilian hostility, the Mugabe guerrillas - ZANLA for short were much like foreign occupiers. They were treated as such by Nkomo's Zimbabwe People's Revolutionary Army, kown as ZIPRA.

The British-sponsored Rhodesian cease-fire largely put a stop to the fighting, including the conflict between rival guerrillas. Spokesmen for both camps insist the battle between them has end-

But Rhodesian intelligence experts assert it has barely begun.

The "war within the war" raged despite the technical alliance of the two armies within the Patriotic Front, formed in 1976. But attempts at military unity never got beyond the stage of rhetoric.

One reason was a long history of tribal hatred. Another was personal rivalry between Nkomo and the Marxist-leaning

Political unity was virtually ruled out when Mugabe's party rejected Nkomo's appeals for a joint campaign in the inde-pendence election scheduled for late February.

Between last April and December, when the cease-fire went into effect, police recorded 44 faction fights in Kezi -Nkomo's home district — compared with 63 between Mugabe guerillas and Rhodesian troops.

For 10 months, police say, Nkomo's men avoided conflict with Rhodesian forces, encouraged civilians to report the movements of Mugabe's guerrillas to the authorities and concentrated on flushing out Mugabe's ZANLA forces.

ZANLA's thrust into Matabeleland began in 1977. Mugabe, committing three times as many men to the struggle as his rival, complained that Nkomo was not doing his share. The scores of ZANLA guerrilla diaries

that fell into Rhodesian hands tell not on-ly of clashes with Nkomo's men but of systematic attempts to indoctrinate civilians politically. The political split goes back to the 1964 breakaway of a faction Mugabe came to rule. Mugabe charged that Nko-

mo was too soft on white rule. But an underlying factor was - and is - tribal. Mugabe's adherents mostly are from Shona-speaking tribes which form the

bulk of the population. Nkomo's main support is from the Sindebele-speaking Matabeles and Kalangas. The Matabeles, an offshoot of the Zu-

lu nation, invaded this country from

South Africa in the 1800s, slaying men of the Shona tribes and taking their women as wives. Today the Matabeles and Kalangas - Nkomo is a Kalanga - make up about 20 percent of the population.

The Matabele raids still rankle among Shona-speaking tribesmen. "ZANLA kept telling us they would

kill all the men and take the women just like the Matabele did," said Shieka Buklalo, a refugee living at Kezi village. Mrs. Buklalo said she and her five children fled because of ZANLA harass-

ment and lived three weeks in the bush "like animals, covered with ticks" until they reached the village. Lucia Myo, another refugee, said, "I ran away because they made me sing

from sunrise to sunset. I couldn't sing in

Shona. Sometimes I refused. I was kicked in the stomach and for two weeks I passed urine full of blood."

Black nationalists blame a traditional white policy of divide-and-rule for much

of the factional fighting.

They point to former white Prime Minister Ian Smith's attempts to wean Nkomo from the Patriotic Front alliance, once meeting Nkomo in secret. Mugabe made no attempt to conceal his anger when the news leaked.

Nkomo aides say Rhodesian troops stole ZIPRA uniforms during raids into Zambia and many have used them to impersonate Nkomo's guerrillas in order to increase friction between the two groups.

To this day, many whites harbor the hope that Rodesia's security forces will team up with Nkomo's more conventionlas of the more militant Mugabe.

"Nkomo and Mugabe look forward to the day when they fight each other open-ly," said one senior intelligence man. 'All attempts at unity are cosmetic. For one thing, their followers would never al-

One recent incident, though, raises some hope that the country may be spared a new civil war.

At a cease-fire camp housing guerrillas of both armies, gunfire broke out for two minutes, causing no casualties.

Ranch Life **Keeps Boys** On Track

STURGIS, N.D. (AP) - The 15-yearold boy was a runaway, a truant from school, a thief and armed robber, a tough young kid from the city, and there were tears in his eyes as he spoke to the priest about the death of a newborn colt.

"I stayed with her all night, but she died while I was holding her," he told the Rev. Dale Kutil, the Roman Catholic priest who is executive director of the non-sectarian Sky Ranch for Boys, near

"The boy was beside himself with grief," Kutil, 33, recalls. "When he came to us, he prided himself on his 'I don't care' attitude. Now, after many months, he cared, he loved.

The experience was a lot like having something stolen, Kutil explained to the

"The stealer takes away something that someone owns and wants, and maybe loves - and it hurts," Kutil said.

The lesson was not lost on the youngster, one of 64 boys aged 10 to 18 who come from all over the country to live on the 3,000-acre spread in a remote ranchland section of South Dakota.

The essence of rehabilitation at Sky Ranch is learning what love and responsibility are and how they work in human relationships, according to Kutil. He

"Each boy is responsible not only for his own behavior, but for the behavior of the entire group.

The ranch was founded in 1960 when shine a year, according to Lam Penjor, another priest, the late Don Murray, took the Secretary of Bhutan's Planning Comeight teen-age boys in need of rehabilitamission tion onto a ranch. He felt they could learn to live with one another - and with society - more easily in a place free from the pressures that were disturbing them.

But in a matter of months the rancher who had allowed the group to use the land decided to sell out, in effect evicting Murray and the youngsters.

Father Murray was asked to give an invocation at a liquor industry convention," Kutil recalls. "It was there he told the group his problem, and the liquor executives decided to 'adopt' Sky Ranch as their charity.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) - He fashioned his first custom pool cue from a 2by-4 and a broomstick handle and earned \$35 for his handiwork. Today, Bob Meucci creates them from exotic woods inlaid with precious and semiprecious stones and they command as much as \$5,000. Our cues are the most beautiful in

the world," the owner of Meucci Originals said. Meucci, 36, went to work in his fath-

er's tool and die shop in Glenview, Ill., when he was 12. About seven years later he became shop foreman and discovered custom pool-cue making.

One day I went with a friend to pick up his custom pool cue," Meucci said. 'He paid a guy \$65 and it started me to thinking, 'Here he's getting \$65 for a 57inch piece of wood.' Right then, I knew that was for me.

Meucci said "by my fourth cue I was as good as the master cue makers. News of his skill spread by word-ofmouth and he worked for six custom-cue companies before he moved to Memphis five years ago.

Meucci and a seven-man staff turn out more than 10,000 standard-model twopiece cues a year ranging in price from \$35 to \$700

The custom-made cues — like a \$5,000 one recently ordered by Minnesota Fats - are created by Meucci himself. He turns out about 100 a year from ebony. zebra, cocobolo, mozambique, ippi, osage and orange woods and intricately inlays them with ivory, silver, gold, opals, rubies, sapphires and diamonds.

But who shells out \$1,000 or more for a pool stick?

Eighty percent of the world champs use our cues," said Meucci, who has customers as far away as Italy and Japan.

Pool great Willie Mosconi and the reigning kings of the billiard table, Larry Hubbart and Buddy Hall, are among his clientele.



The Soviet presence in Ethiopia on the Horn of Africa and in South Yemen on the southwestern tip of the Arabian Peninsula afford Kremlin military strategists the opportunity - in the event of a serious East-West crisis - to block the flow of Western oil from Saudi Arabian ports on the Red Sea. Ethiopia and South Yemen, on opposite shores, control the narrow Bab el Mandeb Strait at the southern end of the Red Sea.

if not unthinkable, before the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan in late December and early January. In the U.N. General Assembly, Arab

and African countries voted overwhelmingly (38-4) for a resolution demanding the immediate withdrawal of foreign troops from Afghanistan. The supporters of the resolution included Iraq, an oilrich Arab socialist state that is bound to Moscow by a treaty of friendship and cooperation. Only the Kremlin's staunchest supporters in the region - South Yemen. Ethiopia, Angola and Mozambique voted with the Soviet bloc. Other pro-Soviet states abstained or absented themselves from the voting.

Foreign ministers of Islamic nations. meeting at Islamabad, Pakistan, last month condemned by consensus Soviet military actions in Afghanistan and the Horn of Africa while downplaying criticism of the United States in its dispute with Iran's Islamic republic.

Besides Afghanistan and the Horn of Africa, the only place in the region where the Soviets seem to be making dramatic progress at present, is in Syria. That Arab socialist state, however, is internally restive and locked in a bitter feud with its hardline neighbor, Iraq.

While relying on Soviet arms, Syria gets much of its financial support from conservative Saudi Arabia and cannot placed in the same camp as Ethiopia, Angola and South Yemen

This is the extent of the Soviet mili-

tary presence in the Middle East and Af-

SOUTH YEMEN - Soviet patrol planes fly regularly from this lone Arab Marxist state to keep watch on U.S. warships in the Indian Ocean and Arabian Sea. There are an estimated 500 Cuban advisers with South Yemen's paramilitary militia and 2,000 Soviet experts attached to South Yemen's 20,800-man armed forces. A Yemeni guerrilla campaign in southern Saudi Arabia could seriously undermine the Saudi monarchy and threaten the kingdom's eastern oil fields, say Western diplomats on the Ara-

ETHIOPIA - A staunch ally of the United States during the reign of the late Emperor Haile Selassie, Ethiopia now is squarely in the Soviet camp. The military government of Mengistu Haile Mariam is propped up by 1,400 Soviet and East European military advisers as well as 16,500 Cuban troops. The Cubans and Russians poured in when Mengistu was seriously threatened by separatist guerrillas in the Ogaden region in the south and Eritrea Province in the North. The Soviet Union demonstrated its ability to airlift troops in the operation, flying the Cubans chiefly northward from Angola.

Despite the Cuban-Soviet presence. however, Ethiopia is still plagued by the Eritrean and Ogaden guerrillas.

ANGOLA - The collapse of Portugal's African empire four years ago, provided an even earlier demonstration of Soviet airlift capability. More than 12,000 Cuban troops and Soviet arms were flown in to tip the balance of power in Angola's civil war in favor of Agostinho Neto's Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola. According to U.S. estimates, there are now 19,000 Cubans and 1,300 Soviet-bloc military advisers still in the West African country. Angola's Marxist government recently has made overtures to the West for development aid and pro-Western guerrillas remain a source of resistance in the south.

SYRIA - Fears of another Israeli invasion and terrorist attacks by religious extremists have brought the Syrians closer to Moscow. The Russians have about 2,000 military advisers and 1,000 civilian technicians in Syria and sources in Damascus, the capital, say they expect new Soviet military supplies to be forthcom-

The Russians also have gained varying degrees of influence in Algeria and Libya in North Africa and in Guinea. Zambia and Mozambique in sub-Saharan

Soviet influence also is growing in three former French colonies — the People's Republics of the Congo, Benin and Madagascar.

Soviet military advisers have helped to train the air force of non-aligned Tan-The Soviet-armed Algerians are sup-

porting Polisario guerrillas fighting against Morocco's annexation of the former Spanish Sahara.

Libya, which accepted some 3,000 Russian advisers, has been blamed by pro-Western Tunisia for a guerrilla attack on the southern Tunisian city of Gafsa late last month.

The Russians actually have been maintaining a relatively low profile in Africa and the Middle East since their Ethiopian and Angolan successes. But their potential for deeper penetration - with the help of Cuban and East European

surrogates - remains high. Defense Secretary Brown has noted that tens of thousands of Soviet bloc and Cuban military personnel are active in

more than 20 African countries. Western observers in Kenya say there also is substantial non-military penetration by the Soviet Union in Africa. Moscow claims government-level cooperation agreements with about 25 black African countries and 13,000 Africans have received diplomas from Soviet universi-

On the negative or doubtful side of

the Soviet balance sheet: -Egypt, Sudan, Somalia, and Ghana have reduced or completely shaken off Soviet influence and turned westward. Egypt, now at peace with Israel, recently expelled the last of the Russian experts.

who once numbered up to 20,000. -In Uganda, Idi Amin, an erstwhile friend of the Kremlin, was overthrown last year despite last-ditch efforts by pro-Soviet Libya to save him.

-Zaire, with the help of Western and moderate African states, beat back an invasion by Katangan insurgents from Angola several years ago.

-Iraq, despite its friendship treaty with Moscow, has purged communists from the government and armed forces, condemned the intervention in Afghanistan and turned to Western Europe to diversify its armaments, once almost exclusively Soviet-supplied.

 If British peace efforts succeed, Rhodesia is likely to be eliminated as a potential field for Soviet-Cuban military involvement in southern Africa.

Newsprint Produced From Sugar Cane

HAVANA (AP) - While some experts predict a shortage of newsprint, particularly in Third World countries, by the early 1980s, an encouraging development has recently taken place in Cuba with the inauguration of a plant to produce newsprint from bagasse, the fibers from processed sugar cane.

Cuba was chosen for the project, financed by the U.N. Development Program, since it is one of the largest sugar producers in the world and accumulates some seven million dry tons of bagasse fiber annually

At present it is necessary to mix wood fiber with bagasse to produce newsprint of the strength and quality needed for high-speed presses, but experts are looking toward the day when newsprint may be produced solely from bagasse, thus averting the chance of a newsprint short-

Grand Juries Will Hear Politicians' Testimony

By The Associated Press

At least 21 political figures and union officials from Louisiana and Texas are going before federal grand juries this week to discuss the FBI's so-called Brilab investigation — a "scam" involving alleged kickbacks to influence insurance purchases by government agencies in four states.

Among those called to testify are Louisiana Gov. Edwin Edwards and Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton. Not all the public officials are believed to be targets of the investigation.

Brilab is the FBI code name for an undercover investigation, or scam, in which agents used the services of a twiceconvicted California insurance consultant to make bribe money available to labor and government officials responsible for insurance contracts, sources said.

Clayton has acknowledged receiving 'a stack of \$100 bills," but he denied it was a bribe. An Oklahoma state Senate leader also was given \$5,000 from agents posing as insurance company representa-

The investigation also involves an attempt to obtain more favorable immigration treatment for reputed New Orleans crime syndicate boss Carlos Marcello, the New York Times said today.

Brilab is the second major undercover FBI investigation to surface within two weeks. Both have been reported before any charges were leveled by the government - drawing sharp criticism.

"We're kind of in the first stages of McCarthyism," said Senate Ethics Committee member David Pryor, D-Ark., whose home state is among those involved in Brilab.

Under the chamber proposal, both individuals and companies would be allowed to use small-claims courts, but company complaints could not take up more than half the courts' time and could not be heard on Saturday or in the

At present, according to Mrs. Peterson, small-claims courts are "heavily used" by landlords, finance companies and other businesses trying to collect what they say are overdue bills. "In fact," Mrs. Peterson says, "one judge estimated that 95 percent of the cases he heard were brought by business estab-

The MCI Telecommunications Corp. announced a new long distance tele-phone service now available in Lubbock at a news conference this morning.

Jerry Gibson, sales manager for MCI. said the service will be available in the residential as well as the business tele-

phone market. MCI entered the Lubbock market on ly a month ago, and until the past weekend was limited to only intrastate calls. Gibson said. Now the service is available

In each local market, MCI buys some local numbers from Southwestern Bell, Gibson said. Subscribers to the MCI long distance service are each assigned a five digit code number. When subscribers wish to make a long distance phone call, they call up one of the local numbers, and punch in their five-digit code and the number they wish to call, Gibson said. The system works only with push button telephones, he said.

The fee for residential use is \$10 per month, Gibson said. Because the rates are lower than Bell's long distance rates, a residential user who makes \$20-25 worth of long distance calls will probably break even, he said.


Business subscribers have a choice of

paying a \$10 monthly fee or guaranteeing a minimum of \$75 monthly long distance usage, he said. The fee is waived if the

subscriber guarantees usage.

No equipment is installed on customer premises, Gibson said. There are no installation fees and the customer pays





Trucks To Maintain

the light truck market after a decade of explosive growth, but U.S. automakers already are talking recovery.

At the least, they expect to hold prof-itable gains made during the 1970s, when cargo-haulers and four-wheel drive vehicles became rugged, civilized or luxurious status symbols.

You can recall just a few years back when a truck was a truck was a truck and you never saw them parked at the country club," said Donald A. Bouchard, truck sales manager for Chevrolet.'

Bouchard and other truck executives are bullish on the future for sales of vans, pickup trucks, four-wheel drive vehicles and other pleasure or utility craft despite last year's market collapse.

We don't expect the light truck market to continue to grow at the rate it did in the 1970s; that was an expansionary period that moved light trucks into new markets," said Bennett E. Bidwell, vice president of the car and truck group at Ford Motor Co. "We do, however, expect light trucks to continue to outperform the car market.

Last year's slump was deep. After averaging growth of about 9 percent a year through most of the past decade, sales of vans dropped 28.1 percent in 1979 from the previous year and pickup truck sales were off 19.9 percent.

Responding to that dropoff, which was attributed largely to the spring gasoline crunch and climbing fuel prices, the four major U.S. automakers have been cutting back heavily on light truck production. In January, assemblies were off 52.2 percent, far greater than car assembly curtailments.

Most automakers believe 1979, with its large increases in gasoline prices and consequent rush on small cars, transformed the industry permanently and gave automakers more incentive to push for fuel economy.

That fuel-consciousness will affect the truck market, too, industry executives believe, but it will be a little more difficult because you're still going to have to have the ability to carry cargo, Bouchard In the next few years, he said, trucks

will be offered with new engines, particularly fuel-stingy diesels, and some body configurations will change. But they will not lose their appeal, he said. Bouchard predicted Chevrolet will be

selling 1.7 million trucks a year by mid-

Ford's Bidwell noted that the light truck market has become as varied as the car market. "That diversification will continue," he said, "and no doubt will

A.D. Imber, Chrysler Corp. truck sales manager, said he believes public response to the most recent auto and recreational vehicle shows may indicate the market is on the upswing.

"Sales of light duty trucks have been off sharply over previous years, but we at Chrysler believe we have the promotions in place now that will break the logiam and stir new interest in the light duty segment of the market," Imber said.

'Although we don't expect the truck market to return to the record levels of 1978, we are a lot more optimistic about it now than we were a month ago," he

The light truck market was stable from World War II up to 160, with unit volumes ranging around 500,000 a year despite the strong growth of the car mar-

That changed in the 1970s, when truck volumes grew at a faster rate than car sales. In 1978, 3,670,897 trucks were shipped from U.S. plants.

Breakouts Rampant At Jail

GRAHAM (AP) - Four years ago, Graham's new \$350,000 jail was hailed as the latest in modern criminology. But today it's a source of embarrassment after nine escapes in less than two years.

The Graham-Young County Law Enorcement Center "is a joke here and it's joke all over the United States," says Police Chief Bill Paul.

"I don't even want to go to town because when I'm seen, I'm laughed at and ridiculed," says County Commissioner Glenn Denny. "I'd like to crawl into a ole and hide.

Sixteen inmates have escaped from the 12-prisoner jail in less than two years. Captured inmates scheme to find new ways to get out.

'You come and go as you please." said David "Rooster" Bowman. He and Jeff Lamb have escaped three times in recent months. "I remember telling (authorities) this place reminded me of a

Recaptured last week, Bowman and Lamb are now in the Dallas County jail. The walls of their cells are papered with newspaper clippings about their escapades. At a court hearing they once wore T-shirts emblazoned with "Escapee from the Young County Jail."

Each is charged with attempted murder, several counts of burglary and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, according to Young County District Attorney

"Breaking out of there is easy," Lamb said. "Like taking candy from a baby."

It is also easy to sneak around inside the jail, they said, and some inmates use crawlspaces above the ceilings to get into the women's cell for sex

Officials say the jail was badly designed and shoddily constructed. It has long vertical windows and there are no bars in the cells. Even after angular bars were installed at the windows, inmates could smash "shatterproof" glass and wiggle free, authorities said.

There's a 3-foot crawlspace between the roof and the ceiling, which can be lifted easily from the wall.

SANTA FE, N.M. (UPI) - The upper chamber of the Legislature may not be too willing to take immediate action on the \$83 million price tag placed on last week's New Mexico State Penitentiary uprising, the costliest prison riot in U.S.

By a vote of 63-0, the House Sunday approved a bill appropriating that amount to rebuild devastated facilities and add a new prison following what one legislator called the "tragic mess." Thirty-three inmates were slain and 89 people

In Portland, the caucus had all the trappings of a political convention. The only thing missing was the balloons.

The band played and the crowd cheered as 2,000 local Democrats packed the Portland High School auditorium to register their choices for the party's next presidential nominee.

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) - It used to be known as "rock-ribbed Republican Maine." a GOP bastion if ever there was

But Republicans were forgotten voters when the national political spotlight focused Sunday on Maine's Democratic caucuses, the second key test for that party's presidential candidates.

The GOP's municipal caucuses, meanwhile, have gone virtually unnot-

The reason for the imbalance is simple: Democrats broke with tradition this year and decided to consolidate their caucuses on a single day, Iowa-style. The Republicans may hold their meetings

anytime from mid-January to April 1. Democratic candidates or their surrogates had been campaigning in Maine on a daily basis in recent weeks, while few Republican contenders made more than an occasional side trip across the border from New Hampshire.

While the 2,247 state convention delegates selected at the Democratic caucuses are bound to support a specific presidential candidate, the 2,000 or so GOP delegates are all uncommitted. The caucuses are the first step in determining the makeup)of Maine's delegations to the Republican and Democratic national

Also, while Republicans traditionally dominated the state's political scene, Democrats recently surpassed the GOP in total enrollments after three decades

Republicans admit that the Democrats pulled a coup of sorts by establishing a uniform caucus date and making Maine the second state battleground, scheduled between the lead-off Iowa cau-

Hampshire primary. "It's certainly apparent that they're taking the political play away from the Republicans, during this week anyway," acknowledged Maine Senate President Joseph Sewall.

Sewall and Hattie Bickmore, the Republican state chairwoman, have hopes the GOP will revise its procedures in 1984, shifting either to a one-day caucus or perhaps narrowing the caucus period to one week

And Mrs. Bickmore suggested nationinterest in the Democratic precinct meetings helped generate interest in the Republican caucuses.

'It hasn't hurt us," she said. "But I wish it was us, too. I can't deny that."

The Moslem militants holding the 50 American hostages for 100 days have said they would free the Americans if the shah returned to Iran to stand trial for injustices committed during his reign.

But the shah is not about to do so. He said in a rare television interview. "I have been accused of many things, but stupidity isn't one of them.

The 60-year-old dictator, who ruled 35 million people from his Peacock Throne for nearly four decades, fit the part of the international playboy, posing in the 1950s with glamorous wife Sorava on skis in Switzerland

With third wife Farah Diba, he hosted chaotic international film festivals.

A year of bloody street riots ended the monarchy he traced back 2,500 years, and brought home the 79-year-old Moslem religious leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini he had banished 14 years be-

The shah, together with Empress Farah and their children, flew into exile Jan. 16, 1979, first to Egypt at the invitation of President Anwar Sadat, then to Morocco and last March to the Bahamas.

When they flew to Mexico June 10, it appeared the shah had found a permanent home. But on Oct. 22, President Carter permitted him to fly to New York for what was called urgent medical treatment for cancer

The move drew violent protests from Tehran and 13 days later led to the seizure of hostages at the American Embassy in the Iranian capital.

Told he no longer was welcome in Mexico, the shah left New York Dec 2 for a U.S. Air Force medical facility near San Antonio, and on Dec. 15 flew to Panama, a haven arranged under pressure



"We feel that we have been abandoned by our government and the American people," wrote Ode, a retired foreign service officer from Falls Church, Va., who was serving temporarily in the embassy when it was seized 100 days ago.

In his letter to the Post, dated Dec. 26 and received several weeks later. Ode said his captors did not allow him any news. "We have no idea of what is being done," he wrote. "We are being kept in semi-darkened rooms. Our hands are tied day and night. ... In 53 days, I have been given only three brief exercise periods in the fresh air and only four tasteless and unripe oranges; two hard-boiled eggs, one small bottle of fresh milk and a few pressed dates to supplement an other wise monotonous and too starchy diet."

Iranians Used Television To Alter Opinion In U.S.

NEW YORK (AP) - From that day in November when Iranian militants took over the U.S. embassy in Tehran, it was clear they intended to use television to influence American opinion.

"The Iranians' knowledge of television and its impact in this country was extreme," William Small, the president of NBC News, said the other day, noting that the lapse between broadcast of a story here and reaction from Iran often was a matter of minutes.

That unprecedented relationship was, in the next 100 days, to result in conflict and confusion, involving the TV networks, the U.S. government and Iran's leaders, often all three simultaneously.

For the first month or so, Americans were treated each night to film from Iran showing anti-American demonstrators outside the U.S. embassy, frequently threatening the welfare of the threescore hostages inside.

Hodding Carter, a State Department spokesman, stepped into the sensitive area early in December when he criticized the networks for broadcasting interviews with the Ayatollah Ruhollah

Both Arledge and Leonard said NBC had given too much control over the broadcast to the Iranians.



We are in the LAST HOURS of this age. According to scripture, we shall see the return of the Lord and the pouring out of God's judgment upon the earth. SCRIPTURAL SIGNS THAT WOULD HERALD

THE END OF THE AGE

(1) The nation Israel: Thousands of years ago, Old
Testament prophets foretold the scattering of the
Lews among the nations of the world.

Jews among the nations of the world:

Moses wrote: "And the Lord shall scatter thee among all people, from the one end of the earth even

unto the other...

And among these nations shalt thou find no ease, neither shall the sole of thy foot have rest: but the Lord shall give thee there a trembling heart, and fail-

ing of eyes, and sorrow of mind.

And thy life shall hang in doubt before thee; and thou shalt fear day and night, and shalt have none as-

surance of thy life." (Deut. 28: 64-66)
History testifies to the fulfillment of this prophecy.
The Jews have been slaughtered by the millions during these past 2,000 years. Only recently the world witnessed the extermination of 6,000,000 Jews under Adolf Hitler.

Yet, the Old Testament abounds in prophecies that at some future date, once again the Jews would return to their ancient homeland and, once again, would possess Jerusalem:

"Behold, I will take the children of Israel from among the nations, to which they are gone, and will gather them on every side, and bring them into their own land. And I will make them one nation in the land upon the mountains of Israel..." (Eze. 37:21)

On May 15, 1948, once again, after 2,000 years the Jews are back in their homeland. In June of 1967, once again, after over 2,300 years, the Jews once again control Jerusalem. The Bible makes it clear that these events would occur in the closing days of history, just before the return of Jesus and the gathering together of the armies of the world to the Middle East, where God will pour out His judgment. Speaking through the prophet Joel, God says:

"For, behold, in those days, and in that time, when I shall bring again the captivity of Judah and Jerusalem, I will also gather all nations, and will bring them down into the Valley of Jehoshaphat, and will judge them there for my people and for my heritage Israel, whom they have scattered among the nations...." (Joel 3:1-2)

(2) The invasion of Israel by Russia and her allies: Ezekiel, in the 37th chapter, foretold the return of the Jews to Israel in the latter days. Remember, the nation was not called Israel until 1948. Ezekiel said the Jews would return and the nation would be called Israel.

Then in the 38th chapter Ezekiel talls of a military invasion of Israel in the latter days' (the days just preceding Christ's return to earth):

"Gog, of the land of Magog, the chief prince of Meshech and Tubal ... I will bring thee forth and all thine army ... and many peoples with the ... in the latter years thou shalt come into the land that is brought back from the sword, and is gathered out of many peoples, against the mountains of Israel, which have been always waste; but it is brought forth out of the nations ... it shall be in the latter days." (Eze. 38:2-16)

Gog is the name given to the head of this nation. Magog. Meshech, and Tubal were all early descendants of Noah mentioned in Genesis 10. History records that these individuals, with their tribes, migrated to and settled in the land of modern day Russia after God scattered the peoples from the tower of Babel. Ezekiel tells us three times that this nation will come out of the north parts, literally "the uttermost parts of the north." Look at a map. To the uttermost north of Israel lies Russia.

Ezekiel ever lists the allies that will come with Russia:

(a) Gomer and all its hordes: Gomer, early descendent of Noah, and his peoples settled in Eastern Europe. Today this includes East Germany and the Warsaw Pack Nations, who, with the aid of Russia, are building up militarily in preparation for the great invasion into the Middle East.

(b) Lybia: (Put) There is little doubt that the Lybia of Ezekiel's prophecy is the Lybia of North Africa, at the present time an ally of Russia.

(c) Ethiopia: The Ethiopia (Cush) of Ezekiels prophecy is the Ethiopia of North Africa. It came as no surprise to Bible studying Christians when Ethiopia fell some 2 years ago and became sided with Rus-

(d) Persia: The country of Persia changed its name to Iran in 1935. At the time of Ezekiels prophecy, Persia included Iraq, Afghanistan, etc., already in the Soviet camp. But, in the main, Persia is Iran. Once again, the turmoil in Iran is no surprise to the Bible studying Christian. Iran must go into the Soviet camp.

(e) Togarmah: Togarmah not only includes Asiatic

portions of Russia, but also the country of Turkey. At this hour we read of the revolutionary activities taking place in Turkey. Turkey must fall to the Soviets.

More than 2,000 years ago, the prophets recorded the aligning of the nations that would herald the darkest hours of the earth's history, culminating in the end of the age and the return of Christ.

Today we read about the great offensive military build-up of Soviet Russia and her allies. The most extensive peacetime preparations for war ever undertaken by any nation in history are taking place at the present time in the Soviet Union, according to our military and political leaders. NATO military leaders have warned that by 1981-82 Russia will have her military divisions at peak strength and the west had better be prepared. Military leaders concede that Soviet Russia's military build-up is targeted against the oil rich Middle east. The Massachusettes Institute of Technology (MIT) oil report warns, after years of research, that by as early as 1981 we may be plunged into a world oil crisis, leading to global war.

Ezekiel 38:13 lists several nations that will protest this great military invasion. Sheba and Dedan are among these, which today is the country of Saudia Arabia, the oil capital of the world. Time is running out. Soon Russia will make that military invasion prophesied over 2,000 years ago.

(3) The rise of a 10 nation political alliance in Western Europe: Both the book of Daniel and the book of Revelation speak of an alliance of 10 nations that will arise in the latter days and which will be in existence at the time of Christ's return.

In Daniel 2:31-45 and Daniel 7:1-28, God reveals to Daniel the four world empires that will pass across the stage of world history, culminating in the outpouring of God's judgment upon the earth and the return of Jesus Christ.

We will use Nebuchadnezzar's dream, in Daniel 2 in which he saw a huge image of a man. The head of gold, God reveals, is Nebuchadnezzar and the empire of Babylon. The breast and arms of silver represent the second empire, which proved to be Medo-Persia. The belly and thigh of bronze represent the third empire, which proved to be Greece. (Daniel 8:20-21) The legs of iron represented the fourth empire, which history proved to be Rome. but, as represented by the feet and 10 toes, there would be 10 nations to arise out of the ruins of the Roman empire. The Bible says: "And in the days of these kings shall the God of heaven set up a kingdom, which shall never be destroyed..." (Daniel 2:44)

As we look at the stage of the world, and study the prophecies dealing with how the nations would be aligned at the time of the end, there is only one place to look for the 10 nation alliance to arise, the ruins of the Roman empire that today make up Western Europe.

Coinciding with the rise of Israel and the rise of Russia and her allies, we look to Western Europe and right before our eyes, ten nations now make up the European Common Market, and are moving rapidly towards political unification. It is from among these ten nations that will arise the coming world leader, the Antichrist, who will be Satan's puppet during the seven-year period of judgment soon to fall upon the earth.

The stage is now just about set for the holocaust to come. Time is running out.

(4) A world-wide military build-up: (The Bible tells us that in the latter days, just before the outpouring of God's judgment, that God will call all the nations to "arm to the teeth"; there would be a world-wide arms race.

Speaking through the prophet Joel: "Proclaim this among the nations: Prepare war, wake up the mighty men, let all he men of war draw near; let them come up: Beat kyour plowshares into swords, and your pruning hooks into spears; let the weak say, I am strong. Let the nations be wakened, and come up to the Valley of Jehoshaphat; for there will I sit to judge all the nations round about." (Joel 3:9-10, 12)

Instead of spending money on food production, so desparately needed in the world today, the nations will be engaged in a mad weapons race.

In May of 1978, many of the nations of the world met in New York to discuss ways to stop the world-wide arms race. We learned from this meeting that \$400 billion a year is being spent on weapons by the nations of the world or \$1,000,000 a minute.

Sakharov, father of the Russian H-bomb said: "The pulling of a few levers, the pushing of a few buttons, and the throwing of a few switches would result in the complete annihilation of every living thing upon the earth." This brings to mind the words of Jesus, as He spoke of the last 3½ years of the 7 year period of judgment to come upon the earth: "For then shall be great tribulation, such as was not since the beginning of the world to this time, no, nor ever shall be. An except those days should be shortened, there should no flesh be saved ..." (Matthew 24:21-22)

Never before has the world been divided into armed camps on the scale of today. The day is rapidly approaching when God will draw the armies of the world into the Middle East for the last great war of history. At this very hour we see Russia encircling the oil fields of the Middle East.

Space does not allow to go into the multitudes of other prophecies, coming to pass right before our eyes. Judgment is soon to be poured out upon the earth, 7 years of judgment according to the scriptures. The Bibles says that God "hath appointed a day, in which he will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom he hath ordained."

The horror of those soon approaching days is summed up in one scripture: "And in those days shall men seek death, and shall not find it; and shall desire to die, and death shall flee from them." (Rev. 9:6)

Nuclear war seems vividly described in the Bible. The prophet Zechariah in describing those 7 years of tribulation upon the earth said: "Behold, the day of the Lord cometh the Lord will smite all the people that have fought against Jerusalem; their flesh

shall consume away while they stand on their feet, and their eyes shall consume away in their holes." Scientists who have studies the atomic bomb explosions on Nagasaki and Hiroshima, Japan say this is a precise description of what happened to many of the victims of the 1945 bombings.

The prophet Malachi wrote: "For, behold, the day cometh that shall burn like an oven..."

The prophet Isaiah wrote: "....therefore, the inhabitants of the earth are burned and few men left."

Peter wrote: "...the elements shall melt with fer-

Peter wrote: "...the elements shall melt with fervent heat; the earth also, and the works that are in it shall be burned up."

Revelation 9:16 says: "one-third of mankind was killed by the three plagues of fire."

According to the book of Revelation, billions of people will be destroyed. No wonder the prophet Jeremiah wrote: "And the slain of the Lord shall be at the day from one end of the earth even unto the other end of the earth; they shall not be lamented, neither gathered, nor buried; they shall be refuse upon the ground." (Jer. 25:33)

GOD, SPEAKING THROUGH THE PROPHET ISAIAH, WARNED OVER 2000 YEARS AGO: "NOW, THEREFORE, BE YE NOT SCOFFERS....FOR I HAVE HEARD FROM THE LORD GOD OF HOSTS A DESTRUCTION, EVEN DETERMINED UPON THE WHOLE EARTH." (Isaiah 28-22)

(5) World-wide judgment will come suddenly: Jesus said: "For as a snare shall it come on all them that dwell on the face of the earth." (Luke 21:25) The apostle Paul wrote: "For when they (the non-Christians) shall say, Peace and safety, then sudden destruction cometh upon them as travail upon a woman with child, and they shall not escape." (I Thess. 5:3)

Again, Jesus said: "But as the days of Noah were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be. For as in the days that were before the flood they were eating and drinking marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noah entered into the ark, And knew not until the flood came, and took them all away, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be." (Matthew 24: 37-39)

People will be going about their everyday business then BAM!, judgment will strike suddenly.

(6) If you are saved, a born-again Christian, God will remove you from the earth before the 7 years of judgment strike the earth: The Bible teaches that there will be one group of individuals that will not experience physical death, those Christians that are alive on earth just before the 7 years of judgment fall upon the earth. The Bible says: "For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first; Then we who are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air; and so shall we ever be with the Lord." Earl Scudday Linebacking Blues

THIS IS A TIME of evaluation for the Dallas Cowboys. The coaches are meeting daily to discuss personnel and planning for the next campaign. After the assistants offer their views, then head coach Tom Landry makes his decisions.

Details of the deliberations are top secret, for now, although fans will see some of the results during the next few months. The bottom line will be revealed in Cowboy trades and at the NFL draft late in April.

Observers do not need inside information to know that the Cowboys' linebacking corps is undergoing close scrutiny. There is no way for Dallas officials to conceal the fact that the 'Pokes have gone from riches to rags in that department during the last half-dozen years.

It wasn't long ago that the Cowboys had one of the best groups of linebackers around. Chuck Howley was an All-Pro on the weak side of the defense, with fiery Lee Roy Jordan patrolling the middle. Steady Dave Edwards was like a piece of the Rock on the strong side.

No wonder the Cowboys led the NFL in rushing defense year after year, with those three fellows backing up a front four that included Bob Lilly, Jethro Pugh, George Andrie and Larry Cole.

LANDRY KNEW THEY could not play forever, of course, so as early as 1972 he began to search for replacements. Eight years and a dozen high draft choices later, he's still looking.

In '72 Landry used four of his top picks on linebackers: John Babinecz of Villanova, Mike Keller of Michigan, Tim Kearney of Northern Michigan and Charles

Zapiec of Penn State Out of that bunch, Cowboy fans speculated, surely a couple of really good ones

would emerge. Landry thought so, too. But it didn't turn out like that. Several were on the roster for a year or two, then were cut or traded because they never developed as expected. So it was back to the ol' drawing board for the 'Pokes.

Landry took a chance on Rice's controversial Rodrigo Barnes in 1973, but the talented linebacker didn't fit into the Dallas organization and soon was off to gree-

Landry tried again in 1974, drafting UCLA linebacker Calvin Peterson and Livingston's Ken Hutcherson. Peterson had injury problems and finally was taken by Tampa Bay in the expansion draft. Hutcherson was a very popular member of the Cowboys, but never was anything but a journeyman performer

NO MATTER. EVERYONE knew 1975 was going to be a vintage year for linebackers. Throw a rock any direction and you were bound to hit another Dick Butkus or Sam Huff. Even the Cowboys couldn't miss in a situation like that.

Landry used his two first-round draft picks to tab All-America defensive end Randy White of Maryland and linebacker Thomas Henderson of Langston. Landry planned to convert White to a Butkus-type middle linebacker, and the speedy Henderson was a natural to replace D.D. Lewis on the weak side.

Dallas also got Arizona State's Bob Breunig in the third round and Tennessee State's Michael Hegman in the seventh. Both had solid linebacking backgrounds

Landry's dreams soon were dashed, however. White had trouble learning to play linebacker and, after a couple of disappointing seasons, went back into the defensive line. Breunig took over on the strong side when Edwards retired, then moved to the middle when Jordan hung 'em up. Despite Pro Bowl honors last season, Breunig is not a great athlete and never will be.

Henderson finally became a starter on the strong side, more by default than his own achievement, but was plagued by inconsistency and a questionable attitude. He made some great plays and some burnmers before he was booted off the squad

Hegman never has developed into the type of player that the coaches envisioned. He has physical ability and intelligence, but lacks something.

SO WHAT CAN Landry and the Cowboys do to remedy the situation? It won't be easy. The 'Pokes traded away their top two choices in the upcoming

draft for John Dutton, so they have no hopes of getting the cream of the new crop. Even if they eventually get a No. 2 pick for Henderson, which is a possibility, that still is a long way from the top dozen players in the country. Otis Wilson of Louisville, who may be the best linebacker prospect around, wants to be a Cow-

boy. But some NFL team will grab him before the Cowboys get their turn. Dallas scouts have been beating the bushes from Rhode Island University to the Oregon College of Education in a supreme effort to find some talented linebackers who might still be around when Landry gets to pick. They know where the boys

But getting them is another matter, and even then the battle isn't over. Remember Babinecz and Keller and Kearney?







Rich Get Richer: Borg Wins Slam

BOCA WEST, Fla. (AP) - Not only does Bjorn Borg own a private island, a home in Monte Carlo and a multimillion dollar bank account; the 23-year-old Swede also "owns" Vitas Gerulaitis and the \$300,000 Grand Slam of Tennis.

Borg captured his fourth straight title here Sunday by pounding out a 6-1, 5-7, 6-1 victory over Gerulaitis in a match worth \$150,000, the biggest prize in tennis.

That brought Borg's career record to 16-0 against Gerulaitis, a flashy New Yorker who took home \$75,000. It also added to Borg's stash of four Wimbledon titles, four French Opens, two Italian Opens and one Grand Prix Masters champi-

Borg also happens to own an island in the Baltic Sea off the southern coast of Sweden. International Management Group, which handles his affairs, estimates he's the highest paid athlete in the world. In 1979, he earned \$3 million, half from prize money and half from endorsements.

Borg, the world's No. 1 ranked player, was at home on the slow, clay surface, spraying his savage top-spin ground strokes all over the court. The quick Gerulai-tis, ranked No. 4, covered the court well, but his aggressive charges to the net were often answered by scything Borg passing shots.

'On this court, when you come in it must be an almost perfect approach shot," said Borg, who ripped 24 winners off his bullet forehand and two-fisted backhand. "Vitas came in on not such good shots, and I had an easy time making passing

Gerulaitis, who wasn't helped by an erratic forehand and seven double faults,

appeared unsure whether to battle Borg from the baseline or the net. Vitas might prefer a faster surface," Borg said. "He's a guy who likes to come in a lot (to the net). He's aggressive and on this surface you have to be a little more

Gerblaitis, who lost to Borg in straight sets in the finals of last month's Masters in New York, said he's run out of game plans for the steady Swede

"When you come to the net, he passes you; when he needs a big serve he gets it — he just plays the big points well," he said.

As for his 16-match losing streak, Gerulaitis said, "It's a little frustrating, but he is the No. 1 player in the world. If I lost to No. 600 I'd really be ticked off." In Sunday's consolation match of the four-man event, John McEnroe outlasted Guillermo Vilas 7-5 in a tiebreaker and posted an 8-7 victory. The two left-handers were scheduled to play a two-of-three match, but it was shortened because of rain

and to allow the final to go at 4 p.m. Each earned \$37,500. The \$300,000 event is a showcase for the winners of the previous year's Grand Slam tournaments. Borg triumphed at Wimbledon and the French Open, McEnroe won the U.S. Open and Vilas captured the Australian Open. Gerulaitis qualified by winning the Italian Open, a qualifying event only when one player wins more than

one of the tournaments In a \$125,000 women's tournament finals Sunday in Los Angeles, Martina Navratilova defeated Tracy Austin 6-2, 6-0. Miss Navratilova, the top-ranked women's tennis player in the world who has lost only two sets in 57 singles and doubles sets played so far in 1980, brushed aside the second-ranked Miss Austin in 45 minutes.





Drug Testing Under Way At Lake Placid

LAKE PLACID, N.Y. (AP) - International Olympic Committee rules regarding use of drugs are so complex that an athlete who walks into a Lake Placid drugstore seeking relief from the common cold could select a remedy off the shelf which would result in his disqualifi-

"There is one well-known cold capsule which contains ephedrine, and that substance is banned by the IOC." noted Arnold H. Beckett, a member of the IOC's Medical Commission.

The case of swimmer Rick DeMont, who was stripped of the gold medal he asthma medication prescribed by his doctor, dramatized the problems faced by Olympic athletes.

In most instances, however, the use of banned drugs is intentional, and it is the job of the Olympic drug-testing center to detect those abuses.

Anabolic steroids recently emerged as the main target of medical officials. Athletes were first tested for anabolic steroids at the 1976 Summer Games in Montreal, and eight competitors were found to have such substances in their urine Three others were found to have amphetamines. By contrast, only one positive drug test occurred at the Winter Games earlier that year in Innsbruck.

While officials don't expect to find many instances of anabolic steroids in athletes at Lake Placid, another harmful substance is beginning to replace it.

Testosterone is being used in much the same way as anabolic steroids, but there's nothing we can do about it since it's not currently an illegal substance,' Beckett said Sunday during a media tour of the Olympic doping center here.

Anabolic steroids, which are modified

male hormones, allegedly are used by

enhancing muscle development as well as for increasing aggressiveness and com-petitiveness. Prolonged use can result in bone deformities, prostate problems, tumors and impotence, Beckett said.

Testosterone - the male sex hormone which exists naturally in the body - can produce the same effects and result in the same dangers when massive doses are taken, he said.

Beckett, a professor of medicinal chemistry at the University of London. said officials now are able to detect levels of testosterone which are higher than the normal body levels, and that legislation may be forthcoming to prevent its use. "I would expect that we'll be able to deal with it in about two years," he said. It's becoming an alarming problem."
The 26-member medical staff at Lake

Placid is prepared to take urine samples from about 50 athletes a day during the Games, testing those samples for traces of some 200 banned substances. As a general rule, the top four finishers in each Olympic event, along with two other competitors selected at random, will be tested, said Robert Dugal, the director of drug testing.



Bean Outsmarts Trevino To Win Championship

HONOLULU (AP) — Lee Trevino der-par 266. ranks second on the all-time money-winning golf list but he admits, "I'm not a long hitter off the tees."

He figured that in his 1980 debut he could beat one of the long-hitting leaders, but not both of them, and the Merry Mexican from Dallas was dead right.

Andy Bean, all 6-foot-4 and 210 pounds of him, won the \$325,000 Hawaiian Open Sunday by shooting birdies on all four of the par 5 holes for a final round 66 and a tournament record 22-un-

Bean, from Haines City, Fla., birdied the first three holes Sunday at the Waialae Country Club course, and left 210pound George Burns far behind.

The two long-hitters had been tied at the end of the third round at 200 and Trevino figured he could beat one of

"Long hitters can make a mistake and figure they have four long par five holes to make it up," said Trevino, who has won \$2 million plus in PGA events.

He did outscore Burns, the winner of the Bing Crosby the previous week, but the two-time U.S. Open champion could not overhaul Bean.

Trevino came close before taking two strokes to get out of the trap for a bogey on the 16th hole and then watched Bean sink a 50-foot putt for a birdie on the

Both birdied the 18th and Trevino finished second by three strokes at 269, actually the third best round ever shot in

the 15-year history of the Hawaiian Open.

Bean's 266, worth \$58,500, was one stroke better than Hubie Green shot here a year ago in winning his second straight Hawaiian title.

"I wasn't thinking about records, I was thinking about birdies and I knew I had to get a lot of them with the course in such good shape and the great weather," said the 26-year-old Bean. "I got my momentum going and that 17th hole didn't hurt anything. I actually was

trying to two-putt, but the ball just went in. Things happen like that sometimes."

The pros now head for Tucson, Ariz., where long-hitting Jack Nicklaus returns to the tour. Then it's on to Los Angeles, where the Western tour ends before the pros go to Florida.

Trevino collected \$35,100 for his second-place finish on a round "when I didn't play too well from tee to green but putted well."

PGA's Identity Crisis Hurts TV

HONOLULU (AP) - With the age, 87 of them technicians, he said. Hawaiian Open in town and winding up Sunday, some questions are being asked about the PGA Tour and its television fu-

They came in a lead column by Rick Woodson, sports editor of the Honolulu Advertiser, who wrote Sunday that the tour looks healthy on the surface, but deeper down is suffering from audience loss. He quoted Art Watson, president of NBC sports, as saying it costs \$800,000 to \$1 million to televise a PGA tournament, and that the network sent a high-powered team here for the Hawaiian Open. NBC brought in 110 people for the cover-

'This is a key year," Watson was quoted as saying. "The ratings were down last year and we were somewhat disappointed. That's why we've put all of

our big guns on it. We're putting a great

deal into our coverage this year.' He added that golf is a personality sport and one problem is that there are so many new people on the tour.

Noting that golf is the most expensive production, Woodson wrote that "with poor ratings, it is hardly worth it. And if the situation doesn't improve this year, then there will be a crunch and the touring pros will feel it ... their profession is suffering from a severe identity crisis. Things have changed since Arnold Palmer and TV teamed up to capture the nation's imagination two decades ago."



Security Increased By Robert Mugabe

rilla leader Robert Mugabe summoned his advisers today to discuss increasing protection for himself after escaping the cond attempt on his life in five days

Mugabe, the Marxist who appears to be the leader in the election campaign, had just finished addressing a rally and was on his way to the airport in Fort Victoria, 150 miles south of Salisbury, when a 90-pound bomb was detonated by remote control just after his car passed

Four junior officials of his party whose car was blown off the road were slightly injured.

Police said they found the trip wire for the bomb inside a culvert 32 yards away. The explosion blasted a crater in the road 10 feet deep and 16 feet wide.

Rhodesian forces launched a search for the attackers and Mugabe flew back to his home in suburban Salisbury, where he was under heavy guard. Early last Wednesday he escaped unharmed when a hand grenade was thrown into the yard of his home, but an official of his party, his wife and their infant daughter were badly burned when fire bombs were thrown into their home.

The bombing Sunday was the 11th attack on a political figure since Lord Soames, the interim British governor, restored British rule over Rhodesia Dec. Parliament Feb. 27-29.

Despite the attempts on Mugabe Soames blames most of the campaign violence on members of his Zimbabwe African National Union, or ZANU. On Sunday, he barred the party treasurer, Enos Nkala, from campaigning because he said in a speech that the guerrilla war would resume unless ZANU won the election. Soames said this was an incitement to violence, but he did not cancel his candidacy

Mugabe told the rally in Fort Victoria that Soames' new powers to ban candidates and parties accused of violence were unconstitutional, and he reiterated he would send his guerrillas back to war if his party was banned in any electoral district.

He charged that Soames wants "to ban us to tip the scales in favor of our op-ponents. That is what he wants to do. He and the British government want to see Muzorewa win.

Former Prime Minister Abel Muzorewa is the most moderate of the three leading black candidates in the election that will establish black-majority rule and independence recognized by Britain, the colonial power. The third man is Joshua Nkomo, co-leader with Mugabe of the Patriotic Front guerrilla alliance that fought a seven-year war against white control of Rhodesia.

Co-Founder To Resign From Peace Movement

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI) -Betty Williams, one of the founders of the Northern Ireland peace movement and co-winner of the 1977 Nobel peace prize, has resigned from the movement after a bitter internal split.

Mrs. Williams' resignation, three and a half years after she and Mairead Corrigan founded the group in August 1976, poses serious financial problems for the group and leaves its Executive Commit-

Although details of the split were not disclosed, it appeared clear that Mrs. Williams and Miss Corrigan had fallen

Mrs. Williams resigned over the weekend following a bitter attack on her and the group's chairman, former Unionist politician Peter McLachlan by Ciaran McKeown, who helped found the organi-

McLachlan also resigned.

Mrs. Williams and McLchlan were to address their supporters in Belfast tonight to consider setting up a new peace

Evacuation Forced By Dam Break

KEENESBURG, Colo. (AP) - About 100 ranch and farm residents were kept away from their homes in northeastern Colorado today, as a half-mile-wide ribbon of muddy water stretched 81/2 miles from broken Prospect Valley Dam to a smaller, downstream irrigation dam.

There was speculation that burrowing animals caused the breach that buckled the concrete-lined earthen Prospect dam on Sunday.

The main concern today was whether Lord Reservoir dam - where the water from Prospect gathered — would hold. It was nearly full when the Prospect dam-

On Sunday night, sheriff's deputies went door-to-door throughout the ruralarea below Lord, warning the residents in a 10-square-mile area of the danger 'At this point, as far as we can tell,

the situation has stabilized," said Dave Holm, emergency services officer for the Weld County Sheriff's Department.

When the Prospect dam broke about 2 p.m. Sunday, water rushed along the course of a canal to Lord Reservoir. En route, it inundated several county roads and Colorado 52. They remained closed, and a Denver traffic-helicopter reporter said eight farms were surrounded by wa-

A spokesman for the Colorado State tate of Lord Reservoir dam depended on how much ice melted during the day. Temperatures in the area dipped to about 10 degrees Sunday night, coating the nearly-full reservoir with ice.

We first found they were going into Kennedy after noon (Sunday) on the basis of an amended flight plan filed out of Gander, Newfoundland, where they normally refuel," he said.

Prosecutor Says Bundy Admitted To Murders

Bundy, the convicted killer who faces a third death sentence, admitted last spring to three murders but ruined his chance to avoid the electric chair by trying to outwit prosecutors, a state attorney says. "I obviously deemed him to be a very

manipulative person and vowed at that point in time that if he wanted a trial, he was going to get it," State Attorney Jerry Blair said Sunday in a telephone inter-

Blair said that during an abortive plea-bargaining attempt last May, Bundy signed a statement admitting he murdered two Florida State University sorority sisters and a North Florida schoolgirl.

In a trial that ended in Orlando last week, Blair helped win a conviction against Bundy in the kidnap-murder of 12-year-old Kimberly Diane Leach of Lake City in February 1978.

Bundy faces sentencing Tuesday in the Leach case. The former law student was condemned to death last July for the Tallahassee murders of Chi Omega sorority sisters Lisa Levy and Margaret Bow-

In the plea-bargaining statement, Bundy "acknowledged guilt to everything he was charged with in both cases' Blair said in a telephone interview from his North Florida home. In return, "the

The prosecutor said guilty pleas would have put the 33-year-old Bundy behind bars with no chance of parole for at least 75 years.

Blair said he was sure Bundy's unsuccessful bid to drop Minvera was part of a scheme to have any guilty plea overturned on appeal.

"I'm equally sure he would not have raised the issue until the passage of several years," in hopes the state's case would be weakened by the death of witnesses and the loss of evidence, the prosecutor said.

"We obviously were not going to en-ter into such a plea bargain," Blair said.

He said Bundy's maneuvering "said a great deal about his personality and character," revealing another side to Bundy, who helped defend himself against charges he garrotted the sorority sisters with pantyhose and brutalized Miss Leach before ditching her body in an abandoned hog shed.

Obviously, the jury had no difficulty believing this bright, articulate person was capable of these things." Blair said.

Sniper Attack Injures Man

A 24-year-old Lubbock man was wounded by an apparent sniper early this morning while walking to his residence.

Frederick Michael Myers, who was shot once in the leg in front of his 2020-B 16th St. apartment about 12:30 a.m. today, was treated and released at Methodist Hospital.

Myers' female companion told police the shot sounded as if it came from the victim's upstairs apartment. However, the woman said she helped the victim to his residence and found it unoccupied. Myers' companion then went to a nearby house where police were called.

A woman living near the victim said she had earlier heard what sounded like gunshots, according to reports. Myers and his friend said they did not know who had fired the shot. Attending doctors told police the angle the bullet passed through Myers' leg near the knee indicated the gunman was shooting from

above at the man and woman. The wound was from a .22-caliber bullet, reports state.

In other activity, a 23-year-old Ralls man was arrested shortly after midnight Sunday after he allegedly threatened to shoot two employees at a club in the 1700-block of Fourth Street after being told to leave the nightspot.

Club manager Arther Flores told pol-ice the man had been bothering female customers and was ordered to leave. Two employees followed the man out to the parking lot where the man allegedly displayed a pistol and threatened to shoot

The employees, also armed, said they fired a warning shot above the man, which prompted him to run north on Avenue R. The man was apprehended behind a restaurant at Third Street and Avenue R and taken to the county jail, where he was booked on suspicion of unlawfully carrying a weapon.

Three men who reportedly ignored a police officer's repeated orders to leave the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center about 9 p.m. Sunday were eventually ar-rested for alleged criminal trespassing.

The suspects, two Amherst men, ages 21 and 27, and a 19-year-old Hereford man, allegedly were causing a disturb-ance at the "World of Wheels" show at

day, a company spokesman said.

The rebates will extend through
March 22, giving buyers \$500 back on
Ford Thunderbids and the similar Mercury Cougar XR-7 and \$300 on the Ford Fairmont and its twin, the Mercury Ze-In California only, \$400 will be given

on the Ford Mustang and Mercury Capri family. Cars from both the 1979 and 1980

model years will be eligible with no restriction on engine size. The Thunderbird and Cougar are in-

termediates introduced in their latest reincarnation last fall. The Fairmont and Zephyr are compacts introduced as 1978 models and the Mustang and Capri are subcompacts introduced as 1979s. About 150,000 eligible cars are availa-

ble for rebates, according to the spokesman, who asked that hi name not be used. He said the formal announcement of the plan was slated for later in the day at a convention of the National Automobile Dealers Association in New Orleans.

General Motors Corp. began offering \$500 rebates on certain models on Feb. 1. Chrysler Corp. was the first to give rebates, \$400 last summer and \$300 in November and December.

LONDON (AP) - Gold prices climbed above \$700 an ounce in Europe today, while the dollar sagged on world currency markets.

Gold closed in Zurich at \$713.50 an ounce, up \$25 from Friday's close. In London, gold gained \$13.50 from last Friday's closing price to end the trading day at \$711 an ounce. Dealers said trading was busy, but not

as hectic as it was in January's gold rush. Sharps Pixley, a London firm, steered clear of a forecasting a trend in its latest monthly report because the market "is at the mercy of extreme political influences." "Certainly the overheated conditions

of much of January have abated somewhat," the report said. "But the market continues to be very erratic and we have yet to see the end of sudden and violent price swings." European currency dealers said U.S. dollar trading was quiet and uneventful.

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) - At age 79, Walter L. Welch refuses to let the passage of time dull his lifelong passion for sound and recording. Nor will he allow rare recordings to deteriorate with age.

He has invented, and is continually improving, a re-recording system to re-trieve the "live" sounds of the original artist without the distortions of artificial amplification. Welch and his assistant, William Storm, spend their days in the basement of one of the university's older buildings surrounded by vast piles of records, miles of cataloged tapes and an antique-lover's paradise of original Edison recording equipment, the earliest model dated 1888.

"In other words," Welch says, "the preserved live sound can only be as good as the audio recording equipment and engineers of the time."

The university's Audio Archives began in the early 1960s with the purchase of some 100,000 items from brothers Max and Joseph Bell, owners of Bell Music Box in New York City.


They contain some fine examples of early audio engineering art, including works of singers Enrico Caruso and Nellie Melba and pianist Jan Paderewski. There is also much spoken history: the voices of Florence Nightingale, Oscar Wilde, Mahatma Gandhi and Aimee

Semple McPherson are just a few of the hundreds of voices of literary and political personalities stored there.

Plans call for many of the re-recorded works to be reproduced on cassettes and made available to students and research-

ers in the university's libraries. Welch, author of "From Tinfoil to Stereo: Evolution of the Phonograph,' has achieved international renown and his help is sought by museums, collectors and governments throughout the world.

DEAR READER — You refrained from telling me what your age is but it really doesn't matter because people can have memory problems at any age. It is not necessarily a sign of old age. That's why we have to be caeful about deciding that an older person who has trouble remembering things has this problem simply because of age. There are a lot of reasons for such difficulties.

Since we do see this rather commonly in people as they get older, though, we tend to associate it with age. I included quite a bit of information on this problem in The Health Letter number 14-2, The Aging Mind. I am sending you a copy that has

some suggestions in it about what you can do in reference to your memory. Other readers who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it. Some people seem to be able to remember things more easily than others but a lot of this is training. If you've never learned to play the piano, you may not do very well if you sit down to play. The same thing is true in training the memory. If you haven't made any real effort to train it, it may not work so well.

I would suggest that you start a regular program of exercising your mind and developing your memory. Start learning to remember lists of things. I have included in The Health Letter I've sent you the idea of using word associations. Start memorizing poems, quotations or other things. Try to picture things as you see them. In fact, you might be wise to go by the bookstore and pick up a good book on memory training.

I do think it's very important for people to start training their memory when they're young. The higher the development of their memory and mental faculties, the longer they will serve them well as they get older.

I often think one of our best examples of this is some of the great musicians who have lived to quite old age and still are able to remember and play musical scores with unequalled skill. That's because they trained their memories and continued to work the memory system so it continues to function for them for years.

Basically, the mind is a lot like muscles and it can be trained in almost everyone. Sometimes it's easier to train the mind of some people than it is others, just as it's easier for some people to learn to become a skilled musician than it is for others.

Sometimes a person may have too much to remember. A good example is the busy executive. He usually has a secretary to remember the more routine things for him while he remembers the big things.

Reformed Shortchange Artist Demonstrates Trade Secrets

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) — Cashiers, beware of the shortchangers, warns one shortchanger who says she is reforming. She told her story to the Chattanooga News-Free Press, on the condition that the newspaper not identify her.

She proposes to conduct clinics at businesses — charging a fee — to show employees how to guard against short-changers.

She said she had learned shortchanging in a Los Angeles bar and had done it for 14 years without getting caught, claiming to have made more than \$100,-

The woman recounted one of her typical flimflams:

The shortchanger walks up to the counter carrying an item, in this case one costing less than a dollar. She pays for it with a \$10 bill — holding several other \$1 bills in a pocket.

The cashier returns change and the shortchanger, in pocketing the silver, seemingly discovers the \$1 bills in her pocket and turns them in for a \$10 bill.

Combining the \$5 bill and four ones she received as change from the cashier with the assorted singles from her pocket, the shortchanger counts off a \$5 and four \$1 bills and gives them to the cashier for the \$10 bill.

But the set-up has just begun. Having

taken the \$10 bill, the flimflammer says she's afraid she shortchanged the cashier and asks the cashier to count what the trickster knows to be nine dollars.

"Oh well, here's a ten and a one to go with that, just give me a twenty," is the usual line.

If it's been a success, the cashier accepts the \$10 and \$1 bills, puts them with the \$5 and four \$1 bills and gives the shortchanger a \$20 bill.

Even? Not quite. The cashier has been shortchanged \$10 minus what was paid for the original item.

"I used to wait until the lunch rush was tapering off, when I knew there would be \$20s in the register," she said.

She said managers fighting the problem must convince employees that it exists, since the cashier is usually unaware of the deficit until the money and register tape are matched at day's end. "The most important rule is one transaction at a time," she said. "When I

pay for my Coke, you should give me change and shut the register, no matter what I say or do to keep you from doing it."

A second rule: "Never take money out of the register until you have my money in hand."

Her victims, she said, are the agreeable, those she believes she can catch off-

Grady Nutt Admits Name Apt

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — While everyone else in high school was sowing wild oats, Grady Nutt was still hunting for the feed store.

"I never did find it," said Nutt, a minister-comedian who says the second "t" in his name makes him different from the rest of us

Now a regular on the "Hee Haw" television show, the humorist from Louisville keeps audiences howling with stories about Southern Baptists and the Southern way of life.

Nutt began playing to audiences at 4 when his mother hoisted him onto a chair to take part in a gospel-singing hour over KGNC Radio in Amarillo.

Coached by his mother, Nutt had

mastered more than 300 hymns by the time he started school. She also taught him that a quip or a pun could turn aside his father's wrath.

Two weeks after his 13th birthday.

Nutt was licensed as a Baptist minister.

"According to Texas law, I could perform marriages when I was in the eighth grade," he said. "I never did but the fact that I could made me popular in high

School."

Nutt completed four years at Baylor
University in Waco, became a church
youth director and in 1960 moved with
his wife and two small sons to Louisville,
where he enrolled at Southern Baptist

Theological Seminary.

"After graduation, they gave me a job as assistant to the president," Nutt said.
"I loved the public-relations part of the job, but couldn't get the hang of being an administrator."

His reputation as a speaker led to 11 appearances on "The Mike Douglas Show" and opened the doors to entertainment.

When I told my congregation at Graefenburg, Ky, that I was leaving the ministry, they stood up and cheered.

"For a moment, I thought they were happy to see me go, but they explained they were behind me 100 percent," he said.

Nutt's mixture of religion and comedy

has worked well. In addition to the TV show, he averages 18 to 20 speaking engagements a month. Weekends are kept free to be with his family in Louisville.

Nutt's fourth book, an autobiography,

"So Good, So Far," is a "tribute to people in my life who have been patient with me," he said.

At 45, Nutt doesn't believe his present

career has diminished his responsibilities to be a practicing Christian. "I'm really a good-natured religious Nutt" heads.
