

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49a, section to be known as Section 49a, to read as follows:
"Section 49a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit, to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under coath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding blennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Under the latest ruling by Selective Service officials, a man may be enlisted in the Navy or Naval Reserve at any time before he is actually inducted into the Army. Men volunteering for the Navy are given the same allow-ances for their dependents as men who are being drafted. Married men may be enlisted in the Naval Reserve provided their dependents have sufficient income to support themselves until November 1, at which time the allowance for dependents of service men will be started. In addition to the opportunities the Navy offers to the unskilled man for trade training, there are many openings for men who are skilled workers in the construction trade and other men with have a trade applicable to Navy uses. Pay ranges from \$50.00 per month for apprentice seamen to \$138.00 per month for service seament of the United States are figured separately from the base pay figures quoted above. In addition to pay and allowances, all men enlisted in the Navy are entitled to room, board, clothing, and medical and dental attention when required.

All transportation and subsistence from Lubbock to the recruiting center will be paid by the government, Calloway added.
