Public Service Co. Spending Huge Sum To Care for Future Plains Needs

To assure the South Plains and eastern New Mexico an adequate supply of electric power ahead of the region's rapidly expanding agriculture, industry and REA systems on the South Plains, the Southwestern Public Service Company has well underway one of the largest power plant and transmission line construction programs ever built at one time in this territory.

To assist the company in securing critical materials and to keep the expansion program on schedule, the War Production Board has recently increased priority ratings for purchase and installation of the necessary generating equipment. In outlining the company's program, Horace Taylor, the manager here, stated that work already started and work approved would cost in excess of two and one-half million dollars for the South Plains, an equal amount will also be spent in other parts of the company's system.

A new steam turbo-generator 10,000 kilowatts (13,400 H. P.) capacity is to be installed at the company's Denver City plant along with auxiliaries consisting of a 150,000 pound per hour capacity steam boiler and a cooling tower of 20,000 gallons of cooling water per minute. Additional electric equipment will also be installed at the plant substation for delivery of power into the company's transmission system. Total capacity of the Denver City plant when the new turbine is installed will be 17,000 kilowatts (23,450 H. P.).

Denver City plant is connected by transmission lines with the company's Tucco, Clovis, and other plants in the area. A new 5,000 kilowatt (6,700 H. P.) turbo-generator is also being installed in the Clovis generating plant and has previously been announced. Work is nearing completion on a new 68,000 volt transmission line increasing the capacity of the connections between the Denver City, Clovis, and Tucco plants.

Work is also well along on the high strength transmission line from the company's Amarillo generating plant through Canyon to Hereford. The new line from Amarillo to Hereford is constructed with a substation capacity of 8,000 kilowatts (11,070 H. P.) and is expected to be placed in operation about May 1. New generating capacity for the South Plains and eastern New Mexico at the Denver City and Clovis plants totals 15,000 kilowatts (20,100 H. P.) and with the 8,000 kilowatts (10,720 H. P.) available over the Amarillo-Canyon-Hereford transmission line total capacity for this region will now be 23,000 kilowatts (30,820 H. P.). Other construction underway and previously announced consists of a new transmission line from Plainview to the Aiken REA substation. A new transmission line from Clovis will increase the capacity into Portales. Several of the company's distribution substations are being enlarged to meet the present and future needs for electric power throughout this section.

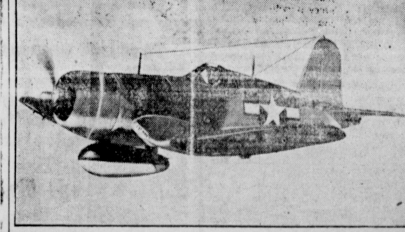

Time Now To Plant Roses

Roses will do better if you set them out in ground which has been sodded with grass from three to five years. This advice comes from Grace L. Patterson, Bailey County home demonstration agent, who adds this reminder: Be sure your bushes come from a reliable nursery. You can set out your roses now, or any time soon, as long as the ground is not frozen.

Here are some other suggestions for timely landscaping jobs from Miss Patterson: Don't be left for removing unattractive and unhealthy shrubs and replacing them with better ones. This should be done before the growing season.

Folks with little room for vegetables, such as town and city dwellers, may want to grow a few vegetables as part of the landscape plan. If so, they'd better get busy now pruning the roots and tops of nearby shrubs. That way they can make room for plantings.

Among those Miss Patterson lists as suitable for planting now in the most of Texas are roots or seed of asparagus, seed of endive, carrots, lettuce, quard, turnips, and some others.

If you have a late freeze, some limbs of shrubs may be injured. But don't rush right out and cut them off, the specialist warns. Leave them on for a while as protection from further cold snaps.

Now about care of your shrubs: You'd better examine flowering quince, gardenias, roses, and wax leaf ligustrum for scale. That goes, too, for peach and plum trees. You can find out about methods of treatment from your county Extension Service agents.

And when your shrubs, trees or roses have abnormally yellow leaves try this corrective treatment. Use one cup of iron sulfate (or copperas) to each fifteen square feet of soil about the plant—and remember, that's one cup of iron sulfate mixed in with the soil around the tree or shrub.

Should those landscape reminders keep you busy until next month.

Memorial Service at West Camp for Sgt. Justice

Sgt. Stephen Dence Justice, a paratrooper who lost his life on the Belgian front on October 28, 1944, after serving in North Africa, at the Anzio beachhead, and in France, was honored with a mass memorial service that filled West School auditorium with grieving friends and relatives, Sunday afternoon, February 4.

Sgt. Justice attended Farwell high school, volunteered for service in 1942, and was among the first contingents to land in North Africa.

His battalion, the 509th Parachute Infantry, was cited by Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark on behalf of the President after the battalion had fought tenaciously in a vital sector of Italy against great odds.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Justice, five sisters, and four brothers, three of whom are also in the service.

 corn

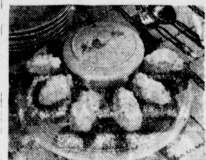

India Curry Sauce Peps Up Cauliflower



Crown a plump head of cauliflower with teasing India curry sauce containing onion and apple and you'll add unsuspected newness and pleasure to a cold-weather meal.

That's a tip to home-makers given by Marjorie Griffin, Home Editor of nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer. Parsley or watercress garnish will give color, she says, while curry powder and tabasco sauce will pep up the blandest cauliflower.

India Curry Sauce
 2 tbsp. butter 1 tbsp. curry powder
 1/2 cup minced onion 1/2 cup Parsley
 1/2 cup diced apple 1/2 cup cauliflower water
 1/2 tsp. salt

Melt butter and add onion and apple; cook slowly until tender. Add salt, curry powder and flour, stirring until well blended. Slowly add cauliflower cooking water, stirring constantly. Cook over low heat about 7 minutes. Pour sauce over a head of cooked cauliflower, garnish with parsley, and serve at once. Serves 6.

How To Keep Lard from Getting Rancid Or Scorched Told by Miss Patterson

Scorched lard or rancid fat can never be reclaimed for use in cooking. So folks who are rendering lard these winter days should use all possible care in preparing a high quality product. For one thing, when fat is rancid or is scorched, it's hard to digest. Not

question from Miss Grace Patterson, county home demonstration agent. She says that exposure to excess heat, air, light, and moisture are some of the factors. Metals such as tin, zinc, or iron hasten rancidity, too.

Likely you are familiar with the equipment needed for rendering fat. First, a large kettle of aluminum, stainless steel or enamel. It's better not to use an iron wash pot unless that is all that you have. Iron is better than a copper or zinc container. You'll need also a hard wooden stirring paddle. Do not use pine or cedar, for either will affect the flavor. An ax handle will be all right if it's thoroughly clean.

We can't give the full details on selection and preparation of fat and the rendering process in this article. You can get these directions by writing at the county agent's office. But we can warn you about letting the fat get too hot during the rendering or in storage. When you stir the fat, as long as the steam rises off the surface you are safe. The danger begins when all the water evaporates and steam stops rising from the fat. The heat should then be reduced considerably otherwise you are likely to scorch your lard.

Now for some tips on storage. Put your lard in dry, clean cans. Pack them full and seal them air tight. These should be placed in a dark cool place. Should you have room in your freezer locker box, home made lard will keep perfectly stored there.

Colored Cotton

We are in receipt of a letter from Fred A. Koppin, of Litchfield, Minn., in which he enclosed a clipping from the Minneapolis Tribune about colored cotton. We print here the article:

Russia has just announced publicly that it is now producing naturally colored cotton in shades of green, rose, lemon and brown. All kinds of fascinating possibilities suggest themselves as one studies this interesting development in the textile field.

It is reasonable to assume that American resourcefulness will bring us the same product if a market develops for it. We wonder, however, what the reaction of an Alabama cotton farmer would be if, upon returning to his fields after a rainstorm, he found his crop had "run".

Perhaps sprinkling a little powdered soap over the cotton before a rain would result in pre-shrinking it. But it may be going a little too far to suggest mixing dress patterns with the seed prior to planting.

Approximately 21 times as much plant food is washed away by erosion yearly as is taken out of the soil by plants.

Army Answers Your War Problems

Q. If a soldier is declared missing in action, will his children receive insurance, overseas pay and social security benefits?

A. Since a soldier listed as missing in action is presumed still to be alive, no insurance will be paid to his beneficiaries. Overseas pay is a portion of a soldier's salary and is not paid to his dependents in any event. Social security benefits are given to a soldier's children and their guardian only after the soldier's death and then only if he was eligible to receive them at the time of his entry into service.

Q. Our son was killed in action and buried overseas. We plan to have his body returned when possible. Is it ethical to have memorial services held for him now?

Will the government furnish a

flag if we do?
A. It is keeping to hold memorial services now. A flag is furnished, however, only when the body is present for funeral services and burial.

Q. I was discharged from the Army in January and would like to go to college under the G. I. Bill of Rights. Where can I obtain some information on colleges to attend and courses to take?

A. Write the American Schools and Colleges Association, either at 30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York 20, New York, or at 921 Marshall Field Annex, Chicago, Ill.

Q. My husband is in the Army overseas. I am not listed on his identification tags as the person to be notified in case of an emergency. Could he change this?

A. Yes. Soldier may change his emergency addressee at any time by filling out a new form to be filed with The Adjutant General.

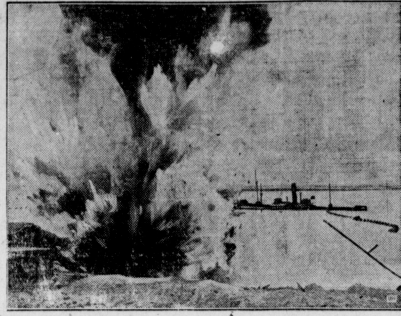

Washington—According to recent announcement by the War Department the families of military personnel are cautioned NOT to write letters to anyone listed as "Missing in Action."

The War Department warns that the well-meaning efforts to communicate with a soldier may endanger his life, since soldiers missing in action may have escaped or may not have been picked up by the enemy.

In such case he may be still at large in enemy territory. If the soldiers family attempts to write through the medium of the International Red Cross Directory Service, their letters would serve only to notify the enemy that the soldier is free in their territory.
