DALLAS, July 15.—"Ride, Ranger, Ride" the song which Governor James V. Allred has approved as the official Ranger-Texas Centennial Song will be used as the theme song for a new picture of the same title to be produced by Republic Pictures in Hollywood.

The song was written by Vern Spencer and will be featured by Gene Autry who will play the lead in the new film. Governor Allred first heard the song when he attended the Rose Bowl game last New Year's Day. He was so impressed with it that he later wired his approval of the tune as the official Ranger-Centennial song.

HOME COMING SERVICES AT M.E. CHURCH SUNDAY

Rev. O. M. Addison to Be Principal Speaker

Opening services Sunday morning at eleven o'clock, members and pastors of the Quitaque Methodist Church will observe Annual Homecoming Day, Rev. G. L. Kever, local pastor, announced Tuesday.

Rev. O. M. Addison, pastor of the Tenth Street Methodist Church in Amarillo, and formerly pastor of the local church, will be present and deliver the sermon at the eleven o'clock hour.

Rev. C. A. Pipkin, retired pastor now living in Matador, and one of the first regular pastors of the Quitaque church, has been extended an invitation to speak here at the eight o'clock service Sunday evening, Rev. Kever stated, but he has not yet accepted the invitation.

"All former members and pastors of the local church are extended a general invitation to be present next Sunday for the Homecoming service," Rev. Kever said.

A special program is being arranged Sunday morning. Rev. Addison will be the principal speaker at that time, while special music and features will make up the program. A brief history of the Quitaque church, its pastors, and progress since its organization in 1902, will be presented in connection with the morning program. Rev. Kever announced.

Final arrangements for Sunday's program have not been completed, but special preparations are being made for the annual Homecoming observance.

Sunday school classes will meet as usual at ten o'clock Sunday morning, the pastor stated, urging all members and friends of the church to be present. A number of visitors are expected, including several former pastors.

Absentee Voting To Close On Next Tuesday

Absentee ballots, to be counted in the July 25th primary election, must be mailed or on file at the County Clerk's office on or before July 21, Sheriff N. R. Honea warned Briscoe voters today.

Qualified voters who expect to cast ballots in the primary election on July 25th, and who expect to be out of the county on that date, should secure a ballot from the office of the Clerk at Silverton before the 21st. Voters now out of the county temporarily who expect to vote in the election, may secure ballots by mail.

Absentee ballots will be accepted if mailed by the 21st of July, it is understood. To be counted, all absentee votes must be in the Clerk's office in time for delivery to the polls on July 25th.

Due to the recent changes in the election law, Honea added, it is advisable that all those who consider themselves legally qualified voters, but who have neither poll tax receipt nor exemption certificate, apply for ballots to the election judge on July 25th.

This opinion was given in regard to citizens who may be voting for the first time at 21, and to those who are more than sixty years of age or are exempted from payment of poll taxes for some other cause, who have not secured exemption certificates.

In such cases, the matter of eligibility will be left in the hands of the election judges, it has been decreed. Sheriff Honea was supported in this opinion by County Attorney, C. D. Norrid, who expressed the same opinion some time ago.

The man with the most decided opinion has usually had the least experience.

Coach and Second Grade Teacher are Elected Monday

Selection of a Coach and Grade school teacher, filling two positions left open by recent resignations on the Quitaque School faculty for the 1936-37 term, were made Monday evening by the Board of Trustees, completing the faculty for the coming school year, Supt. E. W. Scheid announced Tuesday.

Roy Morris, head coach at Hamlin High School for the past seven years, was named as coach of High school athletics and instructor in Mathematics, to complete the High School faculty.

Morris was named to fill the position left vacant by the resignation of Ernest Wallace, Tulia, who resigned following his election here early in May to return to Tulia High School.

A graduate from Hardin Simmons University at Abilene, Morris has established a fine record as coach and athletic director at Hamlin during the past seven years.

Miss Maudie Meredith, Floydada, will succeed Mrs. Noman Hamilton, recently resigned due to ill health, as a member of the grade school faculty, and will teach the second grade.

Miss Meredith receives her degree from West Texas State Teachers College of Canyon this summer, Supt. Scheid announced.

Highway Program of Beautification Is Progressing

Mrs. W. Coffee, Jr., chairman on Highway Beautification for Briscoe County states that a highway roadside park has just been completed on Highway 86 between Silverton and Quitaque.

Geo. Sherrard, highway foreman for this section, was in charge of the construction of a fireplace, table, benches, and trash burner. Early this year year trees and flowers were planted. The State Highway department has planted large quantities of wild flower seed along the highways.

The State Highway Department has also erected a Centennial Historical Monument of Briscoe County. This monument is located one mile east of Silverton. It has a concrete base with Texas granite top and bronze tablet with the history of Briscoe County inscribed on it.

It is encouraging that the Highway Department of Texas finally has turned to highway beautification as a part of its program.

Harvest is nearing the close. Wheat has been an agreeable surprise to nearly every one who planted. The yield has been higher than the guesses were before harvest started. The reverse of this is usually true.

Wheat prices continue to hold a little above a dollar and this compensates some what for the shortness of the crop.

Work Sheets & Land Measuring
Our work sheets have gone to the state board to be worked over. We wouldn't be surprised if lots of them were to be sent back for correction, but we will be disappointed if they ALL come back.

In as much as we have until July 31st to do our planting and plowing of diverted acres, there will be no measuring done until after July 31.

The Moisture

Brief showers Wednesday afternoon brought more than two-tenths of an inch of rain to this immediate territory, and halted steadily rising temperatures that had reached well above the hundred mark during one of the hottest days of the current year. Twenty-one one-hundredths of an inch of moisture was measured on the Weather Bureau gauge here late Wednesday. As the Post goes to press, no reports are available on the extend of the rainfall in other sections.

Small States That Experience Needed For New Set-Ups

Senator Clint C. Small stressed the need for "experience and level-headed statesmanship" in administering the farm program when the AAA setup is turned over to the state in his campaign speeches this week, his friends here said today.

While he fired frequent blasts at his opponent, charging him with failure to offer a constructive platform and with conducting a campaign of "villification", Senator Small devoted most of his time to outlining an agricultural program which he considers essential to farm recovery.

He reiterated statements that he approved a law which would require not only attorneys but all members of the two houses of the Legislature and all state officials, including the Governor of Texas, to file an affidavit as to their business connections in regards to representing special interests.

"I voted against one resolution in the Senate because I considered it discriminatory in that it included 'no one but attorneys,'" he said. "However, I immediately offered a second resolution which included all members of both houses and all state officials. It was passed in the Senate but was killed in the House."

Senator Small declared that he is in favor of legislation to protect the small business man and said he would propose a bill at the next session of the Legislature which will prohibit secret rebates and discounts allegedly made to national firms.

A whirlwind campaign during the next ten days is in sight with friends still predicting a three to one victory for him. Small will speak in every county in the 31st Senatorial District, he announced.

FOUR H CLUB BOYS LEAVE TODAY FOR SHORT COURSE

To Attend Texas Centennial at Dallas on Trip

Twenty-two boys from Briscoe County 4-H Clubs, accompanied by Finley R. White, County Agent, and two sponsors, Dan Dean of Antelope Flat and Clyde Hutsell of Silverton will leave this afternoon (Thursday) for the Texas Centennial Exposition at Dallas and the Future Farm Short Course at Texas A & M. V. announced this week.

The group plans to make the trip by truck, traveling at night, to Friday and Saturday at the Centennial, leaving Dallas Sunday for College Station to be present for opening of the Short Course Sunday morning.

Special low rates, including room and meals and admission to the grounds and exhibits at Dallas, are offered 4-H Club members over the entire state this week.

Funds for the trip have been raised by the club boys through a series of entertainments during the past two weeks.

A Community Pie Supper and Political speaking on the lawn of the First Methodist Church Saturday evening, presented under the auspices of the Quitaque 4-H Club netted more than forty dollars, which will be used to pay expenses of seven boys from this community.

Candidates for all county and precinct offices were invited to speak as a feature of the evening's entertainment, and Rev. A. A. Peacock of Silverton addressed the group in the interest of Governor James V. Allred's campaign for re-election.

Mr. White, county agent and director of Briscoe 4-H clubs, expressed his appreciation to the candidates for their interest and financial support at the pie supper here Saturday evening. Bill Dunne of Silverton was auctioneer.

Members of the Quitaque 4-H club who are planning to make the trip to Dallas and College Station are: C. T. Rucker, Jr., William Rucker, Orville and W. L. Graham, Jack Hall, Leroy Cupell and Jack Powell.

The group will return Saturday, July 25th, according to present plans, immediately following the close of the five-day short course at A & M Friday.

First Year's Work of Resettlement Brings Increase in Livestock

An increase in the amount of livestock owned by low-income farmers is one result of the first year's work of the Resettlement Administration, which ended with the month of June. Official summaries received by Geo. Hulse, county supervisor, covering the period to May 1, show that Resettlement borrowers in Briscoe County purchased 97 horses and 15 mules, 28 dairy cattle, 28 hogs, and 435 chickens.

These livestock purchases accounted for \$11,128 of the \$34,262 loaned in this county. The loans were made to 92 families, of which 87 were white. They included 384 persons. The average loan was \$412.00 per family. Loans for machinery totaled \$2,310.00, harness \$260.00, food \$9,312.00, clothing \$2,300.00, feed for livestock \$3,339.00, seed \$1,897.00.

Loans bear 5 per cent interest, and are repayable in one to five years, depending upon the kind of goods purchased. Twenty-five per cent of similar loans made by the Texas rural rehabilitation corporation in 1935 have already been repaid, although loans were made only to those farmers who had been denied credit by all other agencies.

**SENATOR SMALL'S SELECTIVE
SALES TAX**

Papa's darling, who wears a \$500 fur coat, the son, who drives a super-eight motor car, and the play-boy, who spends a thousand dollars for fishing tackle, are the ones who ought to pay the pensions, according to Senator Clint Small.

That is the reason he has advocated a selective sales tax.

Small is the only member of the Legislature who wrote a tax measure which would provide funds for immediate payment in full of the old age assistance. This he proposed to do with a 25 to 35 per cent increase in the tax on oil, gas and sulphur and on corporations and insurance companies. A one per cent sales tax, in addition, on the NON-ESSENTIALS of life would have amply provided pension money.

"There is no reason why the woman who wears a calico dress should help pay these people who so richly deserve the old age assistance," Senator Small has declared. "The woman who wears a fur coat, the man who drives a high powered motor car on his way to fish with expensive equipment are the people who must bear that burden."

He wrote the omnibus tax bill, placing a high levy on natural resources and on corporations and insurance companies, and passed it through the Senate at the last session of the Legislature. The House permitted it to die so there lies the blame.

Senator Small, in proposing a selective sales tax, said he would fight any attempt to pass a general sales tax such as might be made to include ordinary clothing, foods, medicine or other essential articles. Only the luxury purchase would be taxed.

Our Senator considers this an equitable distribution of the tax burden. The man of modest means will not be hurt while at the same time no Texas industry would be driven out of business by out-of-state competition.

It is a tax program that deserves consideration when Briscoe County voters go to the polls July 25. We commend it because it seems the most logical solution to the state's financial difficulties.

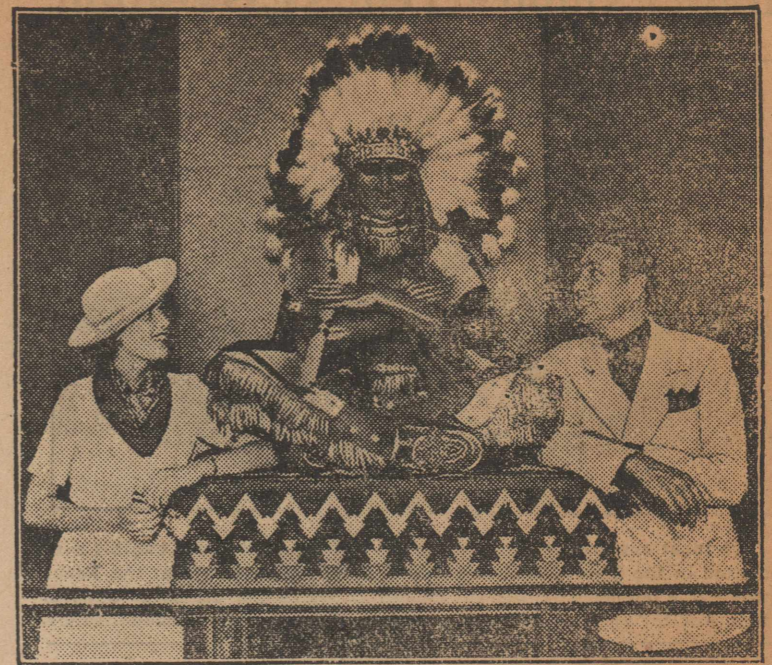

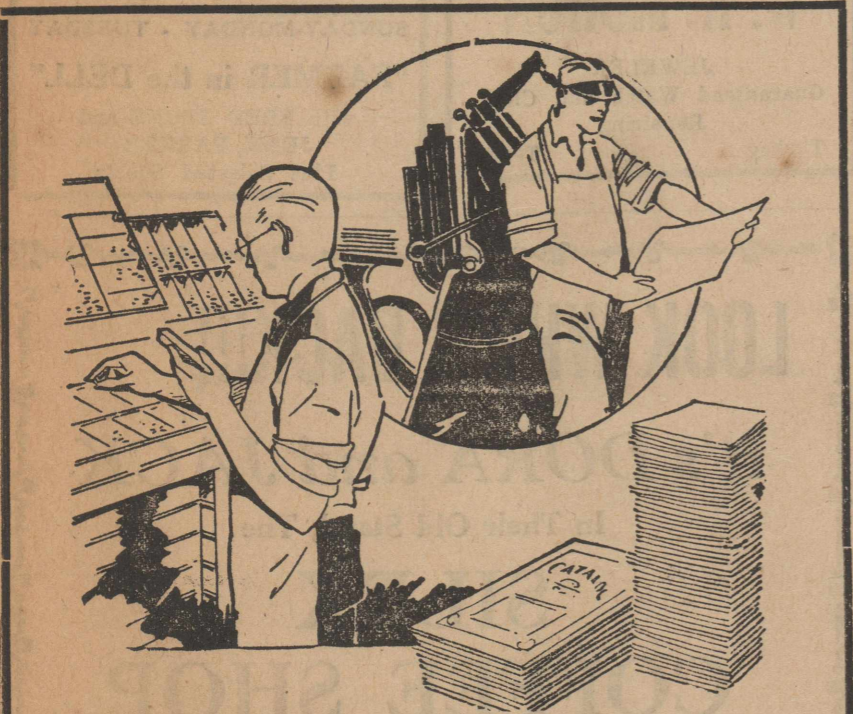

COMMERCIAL FAILURES DECLINE IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, July 14.—Commercial failures in Texas declined sharply during June in comparison with both the preceding month and the corresponding month last year, according to the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. Moreover, there was a substantial decline in failures during the first half of the year in comparison with the like period a year ago, the report says.

As reported by Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., the number of failures in Texas during June declined 44 per cent from May and 47 per cent from June, 1935. During the first six months the number of failures was 21 per cent under the comparable period last year. Liabilities were down 30.4 per cent from May, '36 per cent from June last year, and during the first six months of last year.

JUNE CIGARETTE TAX COLLECTIONS UP

June cigarette tax collections broke all previous records with total collections of \$564,700, an increase of \$69,598 over May and \$159,297 over June of 1935.

Figured on a per capita basis, the collections representing a lot of smoke in Texas, involving 384,086,000 cigarettes, or 64 "fags" for each man, woman and child in the state.

During the year ending July 30, 1936, cigarette tax collections were up to \$1,082,662 over the previous year.

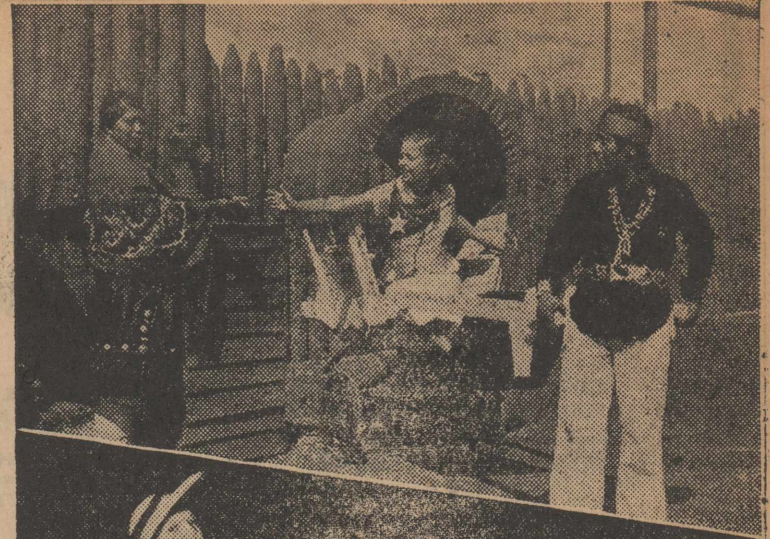
