Summer time and cotton weather are both here. If we could persuade the weather man to give us a little water to mix with these two items we'd be setting pretty. With all the dry weather tho, our cotton crop in Briscoe is more promising just now than in any other county along the way from here to Houston.

Many places along the highways from here to Houston the crops are badly burned and in other places they have too much water. Where they have had too much the cotton stalks are almost head high with little or no fruit on them. I'm of the opinion, after seeing a great deal of the state, that Briscoe County is not a bad place in which to live and farm.

BASE BALL TOURNAMENT NEXT WEEK

First Annual Event To Start Wednesday, August 5

Opening play in Quitaque's first Annual Invitation Baseball Tournament, sponsored by the Quitaque Baseball club, will open Wednesday, August 5th, at Patterson Field, tournament play continuing through Saturday, August 8th, Manager Pete Womack of the local club announced Tuesday afternoon.

Seven strong teams from this section are expected to enter the tournament, Womack stated, and definite acceptances have been received from five to date.

Floydada, Flemot, Parnell, Edgin, and Quitaque have already signed to compete for \$50.00 in cash prizes Womack said, while bids extended to teams at Turkey and Tell have not yet been accepted.

A first prize of thirty dollars in cash will be awarded to this winning team, while a twenty dollar second prize goes to the runner-up.

Play will be conducted in elimination style, instead of the usual "round-robin," Womack stated. No consolation prizes will be awarded.

The powerful Floydada nine looms as the most formidable contender, while the Tell team, whose acceptance is pending, may offer a strong bid with the Quitaque club for prize money. Tell, league-leading Childress County club, will be ranked among the favorites if their entry is received.

Drawing for brackets has not been announced, and will not be completed until final arrangements for the tourney are made. Definite assurance was given by Manager Womack, however, that the tournament will open on schedule if only five teams are entered.

Local baseball fans will be given an opportunity to witness stellar performances on the local diamond when top-notch teams of this section clash at Patterson Field next week.

August 5th Is John Garner At Centennial

DALLAS, July 29.—Motor caravans and special trains from all sections of Texas will converge upon Dallas August 5th. The occasion will be a statewide celebration at the Cotton Bowl on the grounds of the Texas Centennial Exposition, honoring John Nance Garner, Vice President of the United States, Texas' most distinguished citizen.

Indications are that one of the largest crowds Dallas has entertained since the Exposition began on June 6th will be here. Advance information from strategic population centers indicates the crowd will equal and perhaps exceed that of opening day, and also that on the occasion of the visit of President Roosevelt.

Under the direction of the State Commission of Control letters have gone forward to officials and civic leaders in all the larger cities and towns asking that motor caravans be formed, timed to reach Dallas during the morning or early afternoon of August 5.

Within the next few days a proclamation will be issued by Governor James V. Allred setting apart August 5 as "John Nance Garner Day" at the Exposition. The proclamation will recite that the sage of Uvalde is the State's most distinguished son, prominent in the councils of his government and of his party, and that this will mark the first opportunity of residents of his native State to pay him homage en masse.

R. F. Williams Buried Friday At Amarillo

Last rites for Robert F. (Bob) Williams, 57, well-known local business man, were conducted at the N. S. Griggs and Sons Funeral Chapel at Amarillo Friday afternoon, with Rev. O. M. Addison, pastor of the Tenth Street Methodist Church of that city, and former Quitaque pastor, in charge of the services.

Pall-bearers were Ed Grundy, Jim Stell, Grover Grundy, J. T. Persons, Gene Berry, and C. R. Badgett, all of Quitaque.

Interment was made at the Llano Cemetery in Amarillo following the services at the Chapel.

Mr. Williams died early Thursday morning at an Amarillo hospital after a period of protracted ill-health.

A resident of Quitaque for the past eight years, Mr. Williams had been employed during that time as book-keeper and cotton buyer at local gins. He was taken to Amarillo for treatment two weeks ago from Silverton, where he was employed this summer as book-keeper at the Silverton Grain Elevator Company. He had been in bad health, suffering from heart trouble and an extremely nervous condition, following injuries received in an automobile accident near here last Christmas.

Mr. Williams was fifty seven years of age at the time of his death.

Born in Navarro County, Texas, in 1879, he was married to Miss Alice Tinkle on May 12, 1897. He came to the Panhandle with his family in 1925, living for a short time in Amarillo, and has made his home in Quitaque for the past eight years.

He was a member of the Quitaque Methodist Church, having professed faith in Christ and joined the church following his marriage; and was a member of the Masonic fraternity.

Mr. Williams is survived by his wife, Mrs. Alice Williams; a daughter, Marjorie; two sons, Fred F. and Clyde W. Williams of Amarillo; two brothers, W. H. Williams of Earth, and C. O. Williams of Corsicana; and two sisters, Mrs. Will Davis of Fort Worth and Mrs. John Allen of Corsicana.

"Bob Williams was a loyal citizen, a kind and considerate husband and father, a good neighbor, and, with all, a good man," was the tribute paid him by Rev. Addison at funeral services Friday.

A beautiful floral offering was contributed by many friends of the deceased.

HEAVY VOTE CAST SATURDAY IN PRIMARY

Two County Offices In Run-off On Aug. 22

Approximately fifteen hundred voters cast ballots at Briscoe County polls in the first Democratic Primary election Saturday to make clean sweep in all but two county races, leaving only two county offices to be contested in the secondary primary on August 22nd.

The vote was the largest cast in several years, totalling 1498, was far below the number expected since over 1600 voters were registered in this county. Four hundred and seventy-five votes were polled the Quitaque box.

In the hotly contested County Judge's race, W. W. Martin, present incumbent, and W. Coffee, Jr., entered the run-off, Coffee leading with 625, Martin second with 568, and J. W. Lyon, Jr., in third place with 327. In a close ballot for Commissioner from this precinct, L. E. Graham and Vaughn Chandler entered the run-off, with W. P. Hawkins a close third.

In general, the primary election favored present incumbents in county, district and state offices. R. E. Douglas, County Clerk, and Miss Lizzie Gregg, Treasurer, were returned to office without opposition; Sheriff N. R. (Jake) Honea won by a large margin over G. W. Lee; and County Attorney C. W. Norrid won in a close race with C. D. Wright.

In district races, State Senator Clint C. Small appeared certain of victory over Curtis Douglass of Panhandle, as returns Wednesday were very nearly complete. Small led in one of the most hotly contested races in the state by a margin of 1,936 votes, with only Roberts and Parmer Counties reporting incomplete. Senator Small's vote totalled 25,995, with Douglass 24,071. Douglass carried in this county by approximately 100 votes.

A. B. Tarwater, veteran member of the State Legislature, was returned to office by a 3-1 margin over Syl Berkenfield, his Castro County opponent, according to late returns.

Marvin Jones was returned to Congress by a tremendous majority over John R. Miller, Townsend candidate, of Borger. Latest returns gave Jones 21,449, with Miller far behind at 9,168.

S. J. R. No. 26
A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Section II of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles, composed of three members, whose terms of office shall be for a period of six years, one to be appointed by the Governor, one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, such appointments to be with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present; and so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall have the power on the recommendation and advice of the majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons and to remit fines and forfeitures, and, with the advice and consent of the Legislature, to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons in cases of treason; and to provide that the Governor shall have power to grant one reprieve in any capital case not to exceed thirty (30) days; and shall have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons; and to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to regulate procedure before the Board and to enact parole laws; and to provide for an election for such proposed constitutional amendment, and to make an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section I. That Section II of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section II. There is hereby created a Board of Pardons and Paroles, to be composed of three members, who shall have been residents of the State of Texas for a period of not less than two years immediately preceding such appointment, each of whom shall hold office for a term of six years; provided that of the members of the first board appointed, one shall serve for two years, one for four years and one for six years from the first day of February, 1937, and they shall cast lots for their respective terms. One member of said Board shall be appointed by the Governor, one member by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas and one member by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals; the appointments of all members of said Board shall be made with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present. Each vacancy shall be filled by the respective appointing power that theretofore made the appointment to such position and the appointive powers shall have the authority to make recess appointments until the convening of the Senate. In all criminal cases, except treason and impeachment, the Governor shall have the power, after conviction, on the written signed recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, or a majority thereof, to grant reprieves and commutations of punishment and pardons; and under such rules as the Legislature may prescribe, and upon the written recommendation and advice of a majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, he shall have the power to remit fines and forfeitures. The Governor shall have the power to grant one reprieve in any capital case for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days; and he shall have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons. With the advice and consent of the Legislature, he may grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons in cases of treason. The Legislature shall have power to regulate procedure before the Board of Pardons and Paroles and shall require it to keep record of its actions and the reasons therefor, and shall have authority to enact parole laws."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State who are qualified to vote on proposed constitutional amendments at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1936, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the amendment of Section II of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles, and to make the Governor's pardoning power subject to recommendation of said Board, except in cases of treason the Governor may grant reprieves, commutations and pardons with the advice and consent of the Legislature."

Section 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the above proposed amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. The above is a true and correct copy.

Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that the amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1937."

Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, and no more."

Section 23. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, and no more; reside at the Capitol of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Section 24. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, and with the advice of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, and no more."

Section 25. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION FIXING THE SALARY OF THE GOVERNOR AT TWELVE THOUSAND (\$12,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM; THE SALARY OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL AT TEN THOUSAND (\$10,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM; THE SALARY OF THE COMPTROLLER, TREASURER AND COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE AT SIX THOUSAND (\$6,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM, AND THE SALARY OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE AT SIX THOUSAND (\$6,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM."

And those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION FIXING THE SALARY OF THE GOVERNOR AT TWELVE THOUSAND (\$12,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM; THE SALARY OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL AT TEN THOUSAND (\$10,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM; THE SALARY OF THE COMPTROLLER, TREASURER AND COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE AT SIX THOUSAND (\$6,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM, AND THE SALARY OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE AT SIX THOUSAND (\$6,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 6. The Governor of the State if Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 7. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury

to pay for the expenses of said publication and election. The above is a true and correct copy.

A FARMER'S LIFE

FLOYDADA—I believe the records will prove that last week, 25 kids and grown-ups from this neighborhood took the cheapest and finest vacation imaginable.

We went in a big truck and took our own bedding and camped where and when we pleased.

Leaving here Wednesday we went through Plainview, Clovis, Roswell, and spent the last part of the night in Artesa, New Mexico. Thursday from 10:30 a. m. to 4 p. m. we marched through the Carlsbad Caverns. Came back to Carlsbad and went swimming, then spent Thursday night there. Friday morning we came back to the Bottomless Lakes near Roswell and spent three hours swimming and boat riding there. Friday evening we started for Texas and spent the last part of the night at home.

Three days camping in which we comfortably (more or less) rode 700 miles, and the entire eats and truck fare cost only \$2.00 each! Can you beat it?

We paid four cents per mile for the truck expenses, or \$28. We carried food from home valued at \$11—such as eggs, bacon, butter, jelly, fried chicken, pickles, etc.—then bought \$11 worth of fresh fruits, bread, pork and beans, bologna sausage, etc. We surely did fare fine.

How about the cavern? It would be foolish to try to describe in a few words what the Divine took millions of our time years to develop.

You will lose your voice and will mainly think of the two adjectives, 'wonderful!' and 'grand!' It is slightly like walking along a narrow river bed with high walls surrounding every form of beautiful trees, waterfalls and colored rocks, statues, etc. Then if somebody were suddenly to hit you with a hammer, supposed to knock you out but you refused to lie down and in your stupor you would continue to walk down the river bed—but behold! Everything has turned to solid rock. Where the sky had been there is a forest growing upside down. As the 'nigger' says, you know you are not there but you are! You start up the river and there is a partition, beautiful curtains but they are solid rock. You pass under them and there the river suddenly starts down through rocks, but look again! It isn't flowing, it is frozen but it is not the color of ice! You are the only living thing in there. You know you are not rational and that you are just seeing things and you begin to realize that you don't belong there.

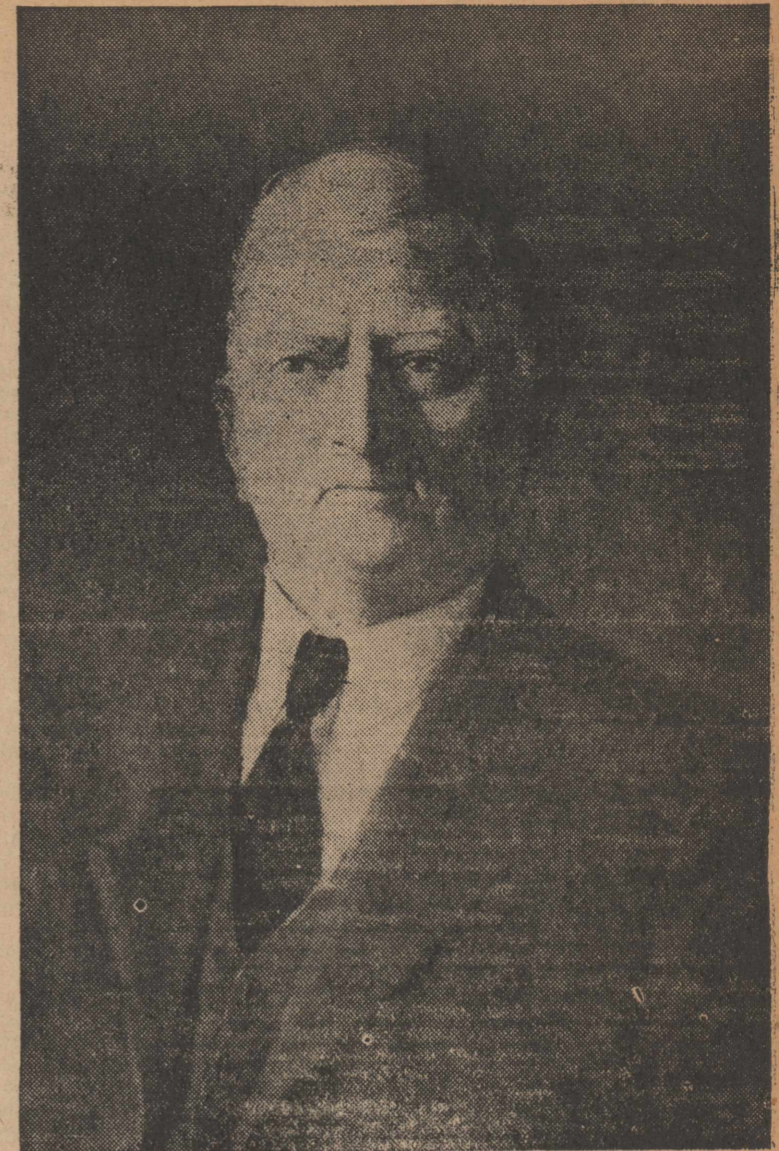
