## BEATS DROUGHT WITH SUB-IRRIGATION SYSTEM

Beating Old Man Drought is the problem which Mrs. J. A. Robertson, Home Food Supply Demonstrator for the Quitaque Home Demonstration Club, is hoping to solve with a sub-irrigation system.

Mrs. Robertson plans to make the tile herself, using one part cement to four parts of sand. One sack of cement will make 110 feet of tile, and at approximately 90¢ per sack for cement, using sand which she has, the cost will be very small in comparison to the value. In addition to requiring less time, the sub-irrigation tile will not form a crust over the garden that surface irrigation does.

## GOOD CROWDS HEAR DOSSEY AT REVIVAL

Subjects are Announced by Evangelist for Week

Rev. C. Y. Dossey, noted Baptist evangelist, arrived Sunday evening to conduct his first services in a two weeks revival meeting at the Quitaque Baptist Church, speaking before enthusiastic crowds at both morning and evening services this week.

Rev. R. Neal Greer, local pastor, recently returned from meetings at Whitesboro and Salem, opened the meeting Sunday morning, conducting the services at the eleven o'clock hour in the absence of Rev. Dossey.

Revival services are being held twice daily, morning services opening at ten o'clock, with evening services on the lawn at 8:15. Good crowds have greeted the visiting evangelist at all services this week, attendance increasing each night.

Rev. Dossey today announced the following schedule of sermon subjects for the evening services during the coming week:

Rev. Dossey is recognized throughout the state as a sincere and inspirational speaker and a capable evangelist. His messages are being well-received here, and all indications point to a successful revival meeting.

Special and choir music is under the direction of George Owens, and may be enjoyed nightly. All evening services are held out-of-doors on the well-lighted church lawn.

An invitation to the entire community was extended Tuesday by both Rev. Greer and the visiting evangelist, urging local church members and others to attend all services of the revival.

Every co-operating farmer under this new plan will receive a grant from the Government for his part in the program. ## Fire Damages Service Tailor Shop Friday

A sudden blaze resulting from a boiler explosion ravaged the Service Tailor Shop Friday afternoon, causing damages estimated at \$700, as quick work by the local fire department prevented the flames from spreading to adjoining buildings.

The explosion occurred at about four o'clock Friday afternoon, igniting gas from cleaning fluid and spreading quickly from the drying room to envelop the entire plant.

Damages to the building, property of the First National, amounted to approximately \$300, Orlin Stark, president of the Bank, estimated. Losses in damaged machinery and clothing in the plant itself, which was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Havran, were estimated at \$400.

The blaze originated in the drying room when the boiler exploded, igniting gases from the naphtha, cleaning fluid. A number of suits and dresses were destroyed in the dryer. Finished work, which was hung on a rack in the front of the shop, was saved from the flames, however.

Mrs. Havran, who was alone in the plant at the time of the explosion, stated that she had just turned off the gas flame under the boiler, and, apparently, a flash-back ignited fumes from the naphtha in the drying room.

No insurance was carried on the plant, Havran stated. Losses on the building, however, were covered by insurance.

The local Volunteer Fire Department rushed to the scene and had the flames quickly under control. The only damages to the building were on the interior, the flames never reaching the roof or outer walls of the 25-foot brick structure.

The building in which the Tailor Shop was located is a part of a block adjoining the First National Bank on First Street.

## Amarillo Tri-State Fair To Open On September 21st

AMARILLO, Aug. 18.—With increased cash premiums, more exhibit space, better amusement features and added departments, the Tri-State Fair will open its fourteenth annual exposition here, September 21.

"Interest in the 1936 exposition has started earlier than ever in the history of the association and there is every indication of a banner year for the Tri-State Fair," declared O. L. "Ted" Taylor, secretary-manager.

Gene Howe—"Old Tack"—this year is president of the Tri-State Fair.

More than 4,000 catalogs, carrying a list of premiums amounting to approximately \$20,000 and all guaranteed for payment in full, have been mailed.

Since the first catalogs were issued there has been a heavy demand for premium lists. Copies may be obtained by writing to the Tri-State Fair.

For the first time since 1932 the Tri-State Fair this year will have a full poultry department, arranged to meet the insistent demand of fanciers throughout the Southwest. Earl Curry of Amarillo will be superintendent of the department.

"To accommodate the ever-increasing crowds that attend the Tri-State Fair the association since last year's exposition has spent approximately \$35,000 in improvements," explained Mr. Taylor.

The expenditures were made principally to increase exhibit space. "The new poultry department will have a building of its own—so will the agriculture exhibits, both county and individual," explained Mr. Taylor. "The automobile building has been remodeled entirely, providing more display space for domestic arts, domestic science and other departments."

On the amusement zone this year will be the United Shows of America, which will come direct from the Michigan State Fair at Detroit, making a \$4,000 railroad jump.

The fall meet of the Tri-State Fair races will begin Friday, September 18, at an improved plant. The races will continue throughout fair week.

## SECOND PRIMARY ELECTION TO BE HELD SATURDAY

Judge and Commissioner Races Hold Spotlight

With one of the shortest ballots in years before local voters, polls will open Saturday morning at the Quitaque High School building for voting in the Second Democratic Primary or "Run-off" election.

Sweeping returns in the first primary, July 25th, left only five offices in the state, county and precinct, undecided as Texas voters polled a record ballot. A light vote is anticipated Saturday, as interest, except in scattered localities, is dropping steadily. Approximately fifteen hundred votes were cast in Briscoe County in the First Primary, while the ballot Saturday is expected to drop to around one thousand.

Contested races in one precinct and two county offices, along with two State offices, will complete the short ballot in Saturday's election.

Interest in the County political situation is focused on the race between W. W. Martin, candidate for re-election, and W. Coffee, Jr., for County Judge. In precinct 2, L. E. Graham, candidate for re-election, and W. V. Chandler enter the run-off for the Commissioner's office.

An unexpected shift in the race for County Chairman places M. C. Potter of Silverton in the run-off with Homer Sanders, leader in the first primary in July. Ernest Tibbets, present incumbent and second man in the opening primary, withdrew his name from the race, leaving Potter, third-place candidate in the July election, in the run-off with Mr. Sanders.

Only two state offices are contested in the run-off. Col. Ernest O. Thompson, with a tremendous lead over all opponents in the first primary, enters the run-off with Frank Morris in the race for Railroad Commissioner; while J. E. McDonald, present incumbent, faces a heated campaign with George B. Terrell for Commissioner of Agriculture.

Polls will open here at the High School building at eight o'clock Saturday morning, closing at seven p. m. Henry J. Bailey is election judge.

## State Rushing Payment of Old Age Pensions

"Applicants for Old Age pensions who have not yet received checks or notification may rest assured that all applications filed before July 1, if found eligible, will receive payments for each month since July 1, 1936," T. E. Darcy, Assistant Director of the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission, gave definite assurance in a recent letter from Austin headquarters.

"The Commission is doing everything humanly possible to accelerate these payments," Darcy stated. "There are nearly twice as many applicants as was at first anticipated; some two hundred thousand applicants to be investigated in compliance with State and Federal laws. This necessitates attention and exactness."

With the Assistance of check-writing and tabulating machines borrowed from the Highway Department, the state offices of the Old Age Assistance Commission are sending out fifteen hundred checks daily in payment of the huge pension allotment, Darcy stated.

While no figures are available, a number of local applicants have already received checks or notification of acceptance. According to reports, notification was received by three applicants here last week.

The Assistance Commission is facing a gigantic task in examining nearly 200,000 applications for assistance and will require time to complete the payments approved. However, each application made before the first of July will be paid for each month that has elapsed since that date.

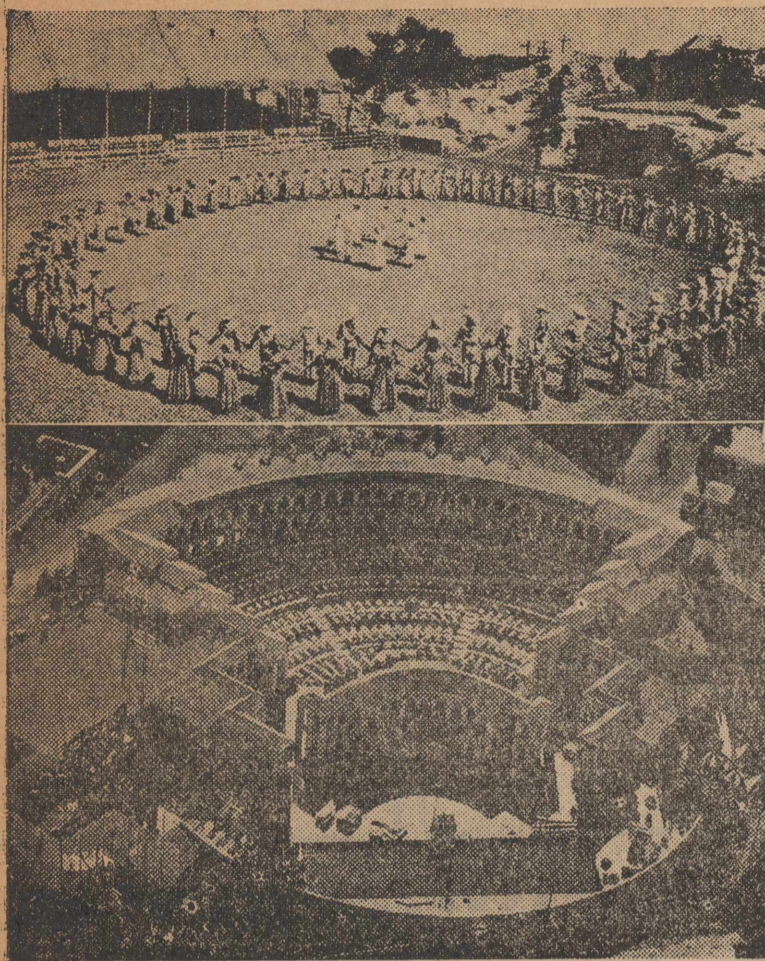

Sec. 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, and no more."

Sec. 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, and no more; reside at the Capitol of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, and with the advice of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, and no more."

Sec. 5. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION FIXING THE SALARY OF THE GOVERNOR AT TWELVE THOUSAND (\$12,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM; THE SALARY OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL AT TEN THOUSAND (\$10,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM; THE SALARY OF THE COMPTROLLER, TREASURER AND COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE AT SIX THOUSAND (\$6,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM; AND THE SALARY OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE AT SIX THOUSAND (\$6,000.00) DOLLARS PER ANNUM."

And those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 7. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

H. J. R. No. 9 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Section 26 of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 26a, providing that under no apportionment shall any county be entitled to more than seven (7) Representatives unless the population of such county shall exceed seven hundred thousand (700,000) people; providing for its submission to the voters as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 1. That Section 26, of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto Section 26a, as follows:

"Section 26a. Provided however, that no county shall be entitled to or have under any apportionment more than (7) Representatives unless the population of such county shall exceed seven hundred thousand (700,000) people as ascertained by the most recent United States Census, in which event such county shall be entitled to one additional Representative for each one hundred thousand (100,000) population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) population as shown by the latest United States Census; nor shall any district be created which would permit any county to have more than seven (7) Representatives under the conditions set forth above."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at the next General Election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, LIMITING EVERY COUNTY TO NOT MORE THAN SEVEN (7) REPRESENTATIVES UNDER ANY APPOINTMENT UNLESS SAID COUNTY SHALL HAVE A POPULATION OF MORE THAN SEVEN HUNDRED THOUSAND (700,000) PEOPLE AS ASCERTAINED BY THE MOST RECENT UNITED STATES CENSUS IN WHICH EVENT SUCH COUNTY SHALL BE ENTITLED TO ONE ADDITIONAL REPRESENTATIVE TO EACH HUNDRED THOUSAND (100,000) POPULATION IN EXCESS OF SEVEN HUNDRED THOUSAND (700,000) POPULATION."

And those opposed to said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, LIMITING EVERY COUNTY TO NOT MORE THAN SEVEN (7) REPRESENTATIVES UNDER ANY APPOINTMENT UNLESS SAID COUNTY SHALL HAVE A POPULATION OF MORE THAN SEVEN HUNDRED THOUSAND (700,000) PEOPLE AS ASCERTAINED BY THE MOST RECENT UNITED STATES CENSUS IN WHICH EVENT SUCH COUNTY SHALL BE ENTITLED TO ONE ADDITIONAL REPRESENTATIVE TO EACH HUNDRED THOUSAND (100,000) POPULATION IN EXCESS OF SEVEN HUNDRED THOUSAND (700,000) POPULATION."

If it appears from the returns of election that a majority of the voters are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas, is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

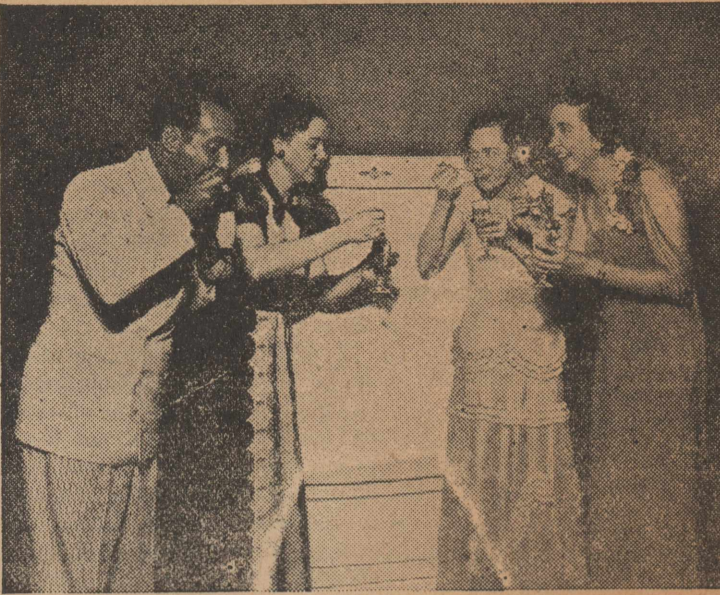
