## PLANS FOR TRIP TO CENTENNIAL ABOUT COMPLETE

### Reservations for Trip Must be Made by Monday

Just one week from tomorrow, the Quitauque Senior Class, with delegates from Quitauque, Silvertown, Flomot, and nearby communities, will leave for the Texas Centennial Exposition at Dallas. The return trip will be made Sunday, November 8th.

A special rate of \$3.15 for the round trip over the Fort Worth and Denver is causing the late interest in Texas' 100th Birthday. It is estimated that between 150 and 225 people from here and neighboring town and communities will be on the train.

A special rate for room, board and admission tickets have been made to the school children. This low rate will enable students to see the world's fair for approximately \$6.00, including transportation. Adults who make the trip will have to pay regular rates at the Centennial, according to information received by Supt. E. W. Scheid. However, according to those who have attended the Centennial, rates are very reasonable.

Citizens who wish to make the trip are requested to make their reservations on or before Monday, November 2nd. Tickets may be purchased from Supt. Scheid at the High School or C. B. McDonald at the Quitauque Post. This is being done so Fort Worth and Denver officials will have time to get special equipment here for the train. The train will leave Quitauque at 12:05 p. m. Friday, November 6, arriving in Dallas around nine o'clock that evening.

The school will resume no official responsibility for students going to the Centennial outside of the Senior Class, however, all who wish to make the trip may go with the group, receiving the same rates and accommodations as the Class. Miss Yvonne Thomas and Mr. Scheid will represent the faculty on this trip.

## Winter Arrives In Quitauque with Snow and Rain

Old Man Winter served notice last week and this that he is here for his annual visit. Fires were extremely pleasant and overcoats proved very popular in and around Quitauque. Everyone seems to have forgotten those long hot days of last July and August.

Cotton and feed harvest came to a standstill during the past week, and very little work has been done in the fields.

Moisture recorded during the past week was .58, making a total for the month of October thus far at 1.47. Rain, totalling .46 was recorded last Wednesday night, and early Sunday morning another .12 was measured.

A light snow, the first of the season, fell last Thursday morning, mostly melting as it fell.

Farwers state that this moisture was not needed at this time, and only served to delay cotton harvest and other work in the fields. Very little damage to crops was reported.

The rain and cold wave was reported over the entire Panhandle and most of Texas.

## CATTLE EXPORTED BEEF IS IMPORTED

Although Texas is the nation's largest beef cattle producing state with approximately 7,222,369 beef animals on the ranges in the state, Texas ships cattle to the corn belt for fattening and slaughtering and imports much of the beef consumed in the state, data compiled by the Texas Planning Board discloses.

## Urges Grading of Texas Farm and Ranch Products

AUSTIN, Oct. 28.—Grading of Texas farm and ranch products to U. S. specifications, thus assuring a wider and better market for Texas commodities, was a step nearer realization this week as the Texas Planning Board's land use committee adopted a resolution urging the planning board to draft a bill providing for the grading of Texas agricultural products.

C. E. McCormick, of the state department of agriculture, told the committee that grading permitted a wider distribution of farm produce because the more perishable lots may be sold without waste in near-by markets or used for by-product purposes, leaving the remainder for shipment to more remote points, and that properly graded products can be held safely in storage, thus extending the market season. Mr. McCormick also said that certain classes of buyers are attracted who do not handle products of indeterminate quality.

According to Mr. McCormick, Texas ranks third in the total shipments of fruits and vegetables among the states, and this year ranks second in the production of citrus fruits. Thus, for the first time, Texas passes California as a citrus producing State.

## FEWER PERSONS CERTIFIED FOR WORKS PROGRAM JOBS

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 27—There are 26,000 fewer persons certified as in need of jobs on the Federal Works Program in Texas than there were in Texas six months ago, it has been announced by H. P. Drought, state works progress administrator.

Current figures place the number of needy persons eligible for employment on the Works Program at 144,358. At the end of April there were 170,386 persons certified for such employment.

## LARGE BALLOT TO FACE VOTERS NEXT TUESDAY

### National Officers and 6 Amendments to be Selected

A ballot nearly as large as a news paper page will be placed before the voters in the General Election Tuesday. Seven columns of names, with six parties, and a column for Independent candidates, are on the 1936 ballot.

Parties with candidates on the ballot are Democratic, Republican, Socialist, Communist, Union and Prohibition. The seventh column is for the Independent candidates. Five candidates for Governor of the State of Texas are on the ballot.

In addition to the candidates on the ballot, six proposed constitutional amendments will face the voters. Amendments are: No. 1, for establishing State Dispensary System having exclusive sale of distilled liquors; No. 2, providing for a retirement fund for persons employed in public schools supported by the state; No. 3, providing for payment of Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State; No. 4, to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles; No. 5, raising the salary of the Governor and certain other officers of the State; and, No. 6, limiting Representatives in thickly populated counties.

The Quitauque election will be held at the City Hall, with the polls opening at 8 o'clock in the morning, closing at 7 in the afternoon. Owing to the large ballot, and the interest in the presidential election, a heavy vote is expected. In order to aid the local election judges, all who possible can, are requested to vote as early as possible. A record vote is expected throughout the entire United States.

## DEPARTMENT STORE SALES SHOW GAIN IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, Oct. 26.—Dollar sales of department stores in Texas during September increased substantially over the like month last year and the gain in sales from August to September was greater than the average seasonal gain between the two months, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Reports from 87 representative establishments show total gains of 16.7 per cent over September last year. The increase from August to September was 40.3 per cent against an average seasonal gain of 35.8 per cent. During the first 9 months of the year aggregate sales increased 16.6 per cent over those of the corresponding period last year.

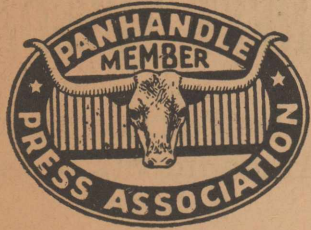

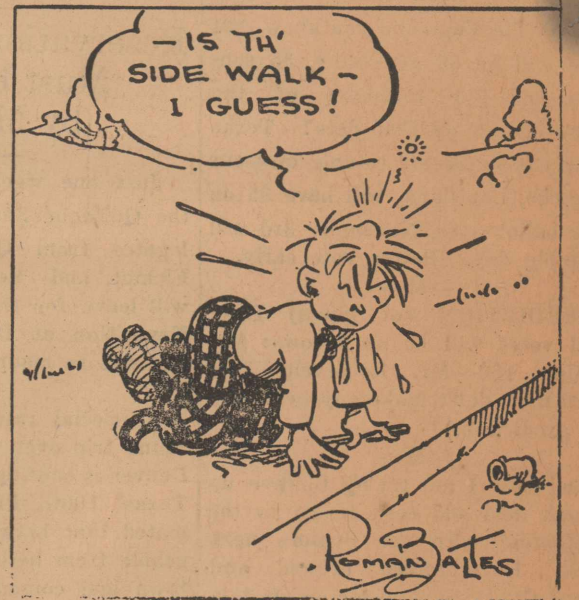

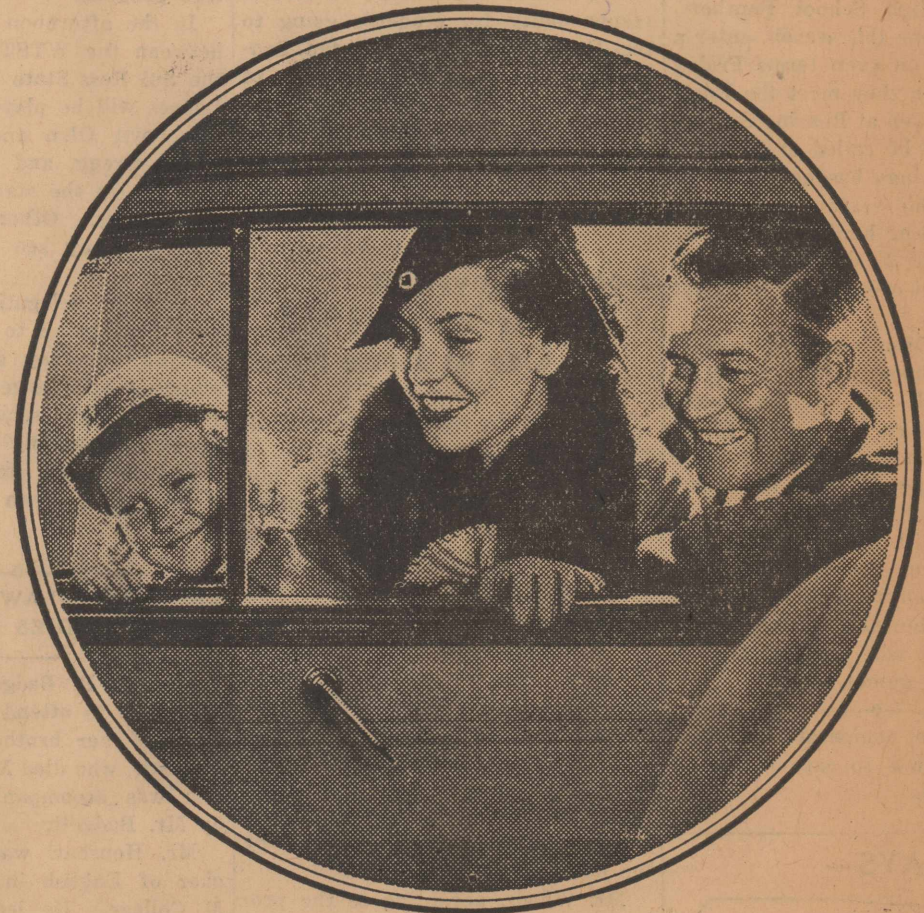

## Home Demonstrator News

### Bed Rooms

The Club Women of Briscoe County have started on a new demonstration and are showing a great deal of interest in bed room improvement. The demonstration on bed rooms will be carried on parallel with the farm food supply which the women have been working on for the past few months.

The first consideration in planning any bed room is its purpose. Bed rooms are set aside primarily for rest, and since good health depends so largely on comfortable sleep and relaxation, physical comfort is of bedrooms should provide facilities

the utmost importance. In addition, for dressing, which include bathing arrangements if these are not taken care of by a bath room. The storage of clothes and an opportunity for quiet reading or study should be provided for also.

The bed will be the first consideration in the new demonstration, and candle wick bedspreads will be the first work done. Candle wick embroidery is one of the pioneer arts handed down through generations since colonial days. The increased appreciation of the Early American arts and crafts have brought with it a revival of interest in candle wicking or tufting. It is particularly adapted for decorating bed spreads but it may be used very effectively on other articles such as draperies, chair cushions, slip covers, dresser scarfs and luncheon set. Very attractive and practical lounging robes can be made from domestic in an all-over pattern. In addition to their attractiveness, candle wick spreads are very practical, for the are inexpensive and easy to make, it is a simple matter to keep them clean and they grow more beautiful with laundering and use.

### Pantry News

"Where there is a will, there is a way," says Mrs. J. A. Robertson, home food supply demonstrator for the Quitaque Home Demonstration Club, as she proudly displayed her pantry which she is filling the 4-H pantry way.

Because of the extended drought, it looked as if Mrs. Robertson would not have a sufficient amount of vegetables to fill her canning budget, but by canning peas for one of her neighbors, she was able to can 71 quarts for herself. In addition to her peas, Mrs. Robertson has also filled a number of jars with tomatoes and greens since the rains, and is still canning.

### Another New Pantry

At a cost of nothing but the labor, which her husband did, Mrs. Bud McMinn, Rock Creek Home Demonstration Club Cooperator, has a new pantry.

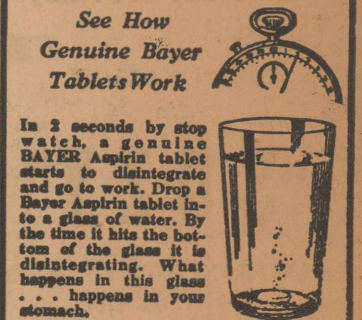

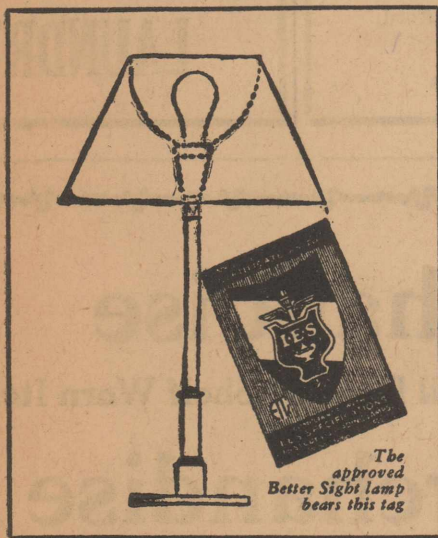

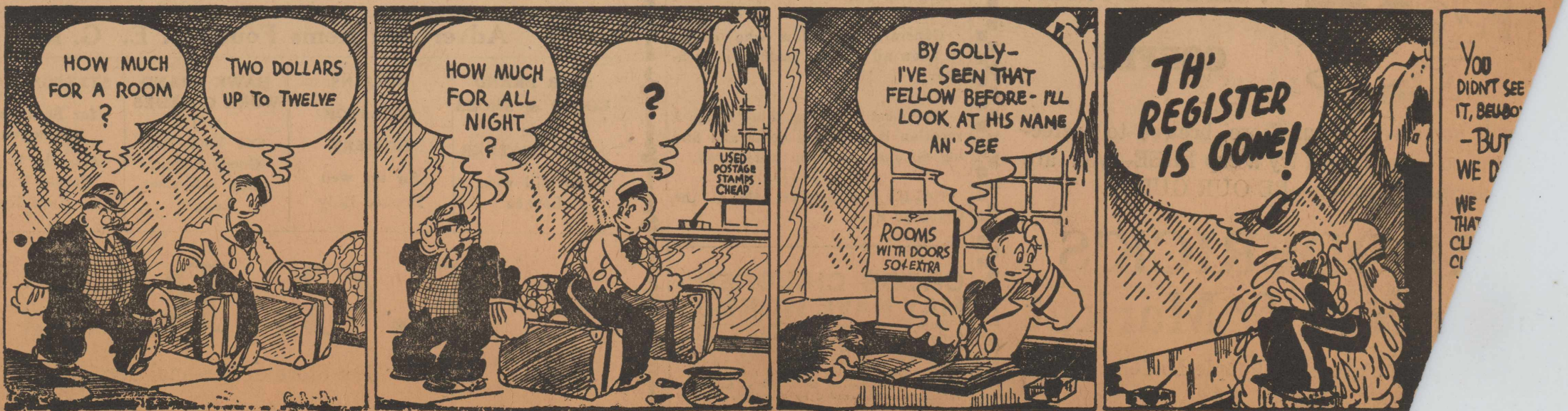

**DEATH STALKS THE HIGHWAYS**



Hays, Kans.—A statewide movement to enact legislation which will seek to curb the serious increase in the destruction of life and property is spurred on daily by such sordid scenes of truck and motor car disasters as shown above. In this head-on collision ten miles west of Hays the occupant of the motor car was killed and the truck driver received serious bruises and cuts. In every community there is developing a determined effort to regulate speed, size of trucks, more rigid inspection of brakes, lights and other equipment and more equitable taxation for the upkeep of state highways.

**The Proposed Constitutional Amendments**

H. J. R. No. 9 (No. 6)

Limiting the representation of larger cities is the clear intent of H. J. R. No. 9 relating to the apportionment of State Representatives for the counties of this State whose population exceeds seven hundred thousand (700,000) people, B. P. Matocha, Secretary of State, declares.

It is provided by this Amendment that no county in this State shall be entitled to or have under any apportionment more than seven (7) Representatives in the State Legislature unless the population of such county shall exceed seven hundred thousand (700,000) people as ascertained by the most recent United States Census.

In the event a county shall have a population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) people, then such county shall be entitled to one additional Representative for each one hundred thousand (100,000) population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) population as shown by the latest United States Census.

This Amendment also provides that no district shall be created which would permit any county to have more than seven (7) Representatives except under the above conditions.

Simply speaking, H. J. R. No. 9 would limit the number of Representatives in the State Legislature to not more than seven (7) from any county, unless that county had a population of more than seven hundred thousand (700,000). In that case, one more would be allowed for every one hundred thousand (100,000) above the seven hundred thousand (700,000).

sell pretty soon—but not much turkey. Turkeys should be getting a good mash now with wheat and barley grain as a supplement—and plenty of milk, too, if you have it. The Thanksgiving market will soon open, but if those turkeys aren't finished and ready for the market, it will pay you to hold them over for the Xmas market—if you'll feed them.
