## Three Way School Affiliation For Its First Term Graduates, Baker Reports

### Woodrow Burkhardt At Camp Shelby

Woodrow Wilson Burkhardt, private first class, after six months service overseas in France and Germany, has arrived at Camp Shelby, Miss., with his Division, the famed 96th "Victory" and is now awaiting further assignment.

Pfc. Burkhardt is the husband of Mrs. Allene Burkhardt of Muleshoe, and a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Burkhardt, Muleshoe.

He has the E. T. O. Ribbon with two battle stars and the Combat Infantryman's Badge. Burkhardt was a rifleman with the Infantry. He entered the Army Aug. 20, '44 and had his basic training at Camp Roberts, Calif. He was a member of Company G, 378th Infantry.

## Muleshoe Man Wins Bronze Star

Pvt. First Class R. E. Jackson of Muleshoe has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in Germany on March 4, 1945, in connection with military operations against the enemy.

His citation said: When automatic and small arms fire halted his company, Pfc. Jackson, with complete disregard for his personal safety, crawled 200 yards over shell-empt terrain to a railroad track. Having placed his machine gun in position, he delivered harassing fire with such telling effect that his company was enabled to resume its advance. The outstanding courage and loyalty displayed by Pfc. Jackson reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

His wife and their little daughter live here. The baby, Lijda Mae, was born the day her soldier father arrived in England, July, 1944. The Muleshoe hero was in actual combat from December 3, '44, until V-E day.

## Lt. Hite, Earth, Is Back In The U. S.

Lt. Robert Hite, of Earth, one of the airmen who took part in Doc-little's first raid on Tokyo in 1942, was back in the U. S. this week after his liberation from a Japanese prison camp.

Lt. Hite was at one time under sentence of death but his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment by the Japanese.

Liberated with Lt. Hite were two other Doolittle fliers and this left three who fell into Japanese hands to be accounted for.

The Deputy State Superintendent of Education, E. H. Boulter, has promised the school board and superintendent of Three Way Independent School that he will give the school 15 units of affiliation with their first graduation.

Students will not be required to prepare written work to send to the State department. The Deputy State Superintendent inspects any high school requesting affiliation, in any subject and either approves or disapproves the work for affiliation.

The school will be required to meet certain standards for Boulter's promise was made upon this condition. However, Mr. Boulter will inspect the school from time to time and the school superintendent promises to meet these requirements. The Seniors need not worry at all about their work being accredited. They can enter any of our colleges the same as from any other high school in this section.

The following courses will be offered, if the demand justifies each: English I, II, III, IV, Algebra I and II, General Math, World History, American History, Civics, General Science, General Agriculture, Bookkeeping, Typing, Spanish I, II, Public Speaking, and Junior Business Training.

Other courses may be offered, depending upon the demand. If a Home Economics teacher can be found, Home Economics will be offered. The superintendent has a teacher now in mind who might be secured. Arrangements are being made for private instruction in piano.

There will be some part credit courses, such as chorus and office practice. We plan to have a school paper and a school annual. We also plan activities corresponding to any other high school.

For athletics there will be baseball, soft ball, volleyball, basketball, and track. In short, we plan to have a fully standard high school in every respect.

Teachers are about all lined up for the work at this time and everything will be up ready to start by Monday morning.

## Raymond L. Jonas Killed On Luzon

Pfc. Raymond L. Jonas, 26, was killed on Luzon in the Philippines during the last few days before the enemy surrendered, according to word received here by his wife from the War Department.

His wife is Mrs. Ester Jonas. They have a daughter, Layon, who is 3. Mrs. Jonas and the baby are now in the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Tibbets.

They live in Albuquerque, N. M., and PFC. Jonas was reared in New Mexico, but was well acquainted in Muleshoe, having visited here a number of times.

Recently, news of her husband's death did not reach Mrs. Jonas until after the Japanese had ceased fighting, and she was therefore expecting him to come home soon.

Jonas, who was serving in the Sixth Army, was killed August 3, the War Department message said. He entered the service last October and trained at Camp Hood, Texas.

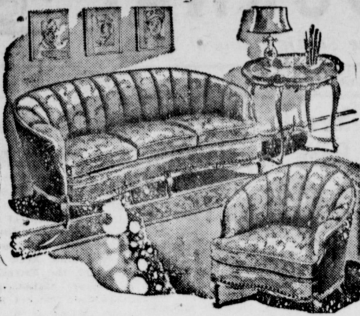

**Mail G.I. Christmas  
Gifts Overseas Early**

**C**HRISTMAS packages going to servicemen still overseas must be mailed early again this year, advises Marjorie Griffin, Rural Home editor of Capper's Farmer.

"Lists to Santa Claus from overseas servicemen are already on their way home," she writes in the nationally circulated magazine.

"Family photographs head many requests all always. Next come canned snack foods, such as nuts and olives. Books, writing portfolios, service watches, good pipes, pens, engraved identification tags and waterproof wallets rate high also."

"Mailing regulations are similar to last year. Packages must be mailed between September 15 and October 15. Boxes must be metal, wood, solid fiberboard or strong, double-faced corrugated fiberboard. Newly available will be boxes 10 by 6 by 4 inches; these will be stronger than many previously used."

"Letters from your own service folks will be the final guide to gift selection."

**Take Care of Pans**

With a little attention, kitchen utensils will serve you well for years. But if they're carelessly banged around and neglected, you'll soon be ashamed to use them, declares the Rural Home editor of Capper's Farmer, whose advice on household matters is read by 1,250,000 farm families. In general, put pans in the sink after using them. Run cold water into those used for eggs and flour mixtures; hot water will do the same; cooking food articles hard to remove. Greasy or rusty pans should be soaked in hot water.

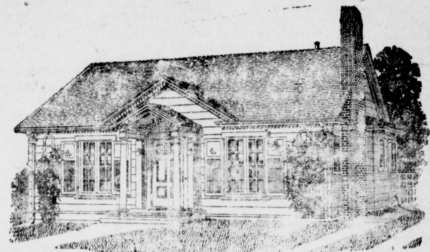

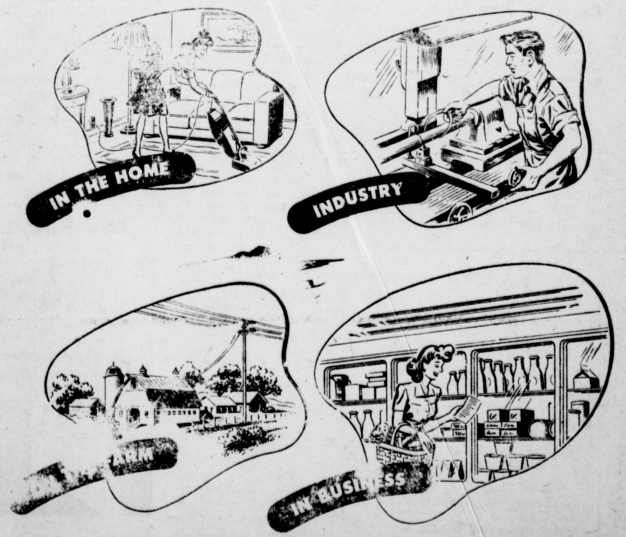

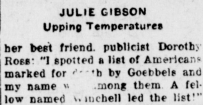

### Cauliflower, Peas Plentiful Now

Cauliflower and green peas have joined the ranks of plentiful foods and all housewives are being encouraged to keep supplies moving from markets to kitchens by buying generously and serving them often, according to C. B. Hodges, State director, Production and Marketing Administration.

"Farmers are doing a good job of producing food this year and unless civilian consumption of the fresh vegetables keeps pace with marketing, some of our supply will be wasted," he said. Both vegetables are selling at prices attractive to housewives, giving them additional incentive to keep larger supplies moving into homes, he added.

### SCHOOL CHILDREN SHOULD BE GIVEN CHECK-UP

Austin—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges the parents of all children who will respond to the school bell for the first time this year to see the child is physically fit for school duties.

"First and foremost is the need for vaccination against smallpox. Parents should see that children are vaccinated before they are one year of age; however if not done previously, at school age vaccination becomes absolutely necessary," Dr. Cox said.

Immunization against diphtheria is also highly important, Dr. Cox said. In addition he urged before you send your child to school you should take him to a physician and dentist for a thorough examination.

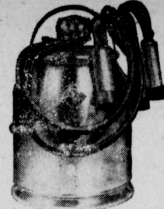

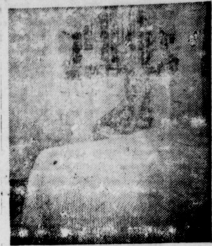

**Small Apples Are Good For Cooking**

Good things come in small packages. Ask anyone who has used small apples for cooking. She'll verify the old adage.

Miss Grace L. Patterson, County Home Demonstration Agent of Bailey County, recommends scalloped apples and sweet potatoes as a dish your family will enjoy.

And here is the simple procedure to follow in preparing this delicacy: Take cold boiled sweet potatoes. Peel them and slice them. Place the uncooked apples and sweet potatoes in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle each layer of apples with salt, sugar and fat.

Add a little water and bake for 30 to 40 minutes in a moderately hot oven. If you like, you can leave the lid off the last 15 minutes of baking and sprinkle bread crumbs on the top.

"Cr." suggests Miss Patterson, "try fried apples with onions. That's easy too, and good." Just fry sliced apples and onions with a little fat - slowly in a skillet. Be sure to stir every so often. Don't scorch them; that's bad for the flavor.

When they're nearly tender, remove the cover, and sugar and salt. Then continue cooking until the apples and onions are lightly browned. Serve at once.

If you prefer your apples straight, Miss Patterson recommends scallop-
