AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS

BY THE BRISCOE COUNTY AGENT

Time drags on and still those rains haven't come. If Briscoe county produces very much wheat this year its going to have to rain in the next thirty or forty minutes.

In order to hurry up that rain we suggest that school close immediately and commencement exercises be started. It always rains commencement week.

Our wheat withstood the blizzard and finally outlived the green bugs, but it looks like now the dry weather is rapidly getting the best of it. I don't think its hardly fair for the drought to take advantage of poor little frozen, greenbug eaten wheat like this, but there doesn't seem to be much I can do about it. With the 1939 crop it will be different too. Uncle Sam is instituting an insurance program for wheat in 1939. This insurance will guarantee up to 75c of a normal crop regardless of hail, freeze, greenbugs, dry weather or anything. More detailed information will be given on this Insurance Program in the near future. Briscoe county's premium rate is 1.1 bushel per acre to insure 75 per cent of a normal crop.

Gypsy Woman Is Indicted For Robbery

Grasshopper Survey For Briscoe County

Two weeks ago a survey was made in Briscoe county to determine the extent of grasshopper infestation in the county.

This survey was under the supervision of Mr Hugh Clearman, with the Bureau of Entomology cooperating with the county agent. The survey covered all that part of Briscoe county under the hill and a large part of the Plains section of the county.

According to Mr Clearman's report, the farmers and ranchers of Briscoe county are likely to have some serious damage from the hoppers this season. The report shows light to very heavy infestations everywhere in the county where inspections were made. Heaviest infestation appears in the Antelope Flat and Gasoline communities.

Arrangements have been made thru the Texas Extension Service cooperating with the U. S. D. A. to secure poison to combat grasshoppers in Briscoe county this year. The U. S. D. A. furnishes all the poison, one half the bran and does the mixing. The farmers and ranchers who use the poison are required to furnish half the bran and put out the poison bait. In other words if you have grass hoppers and want to poison them and you figure you need 200 lbs of poison bait, it will be necessary for you to furnish 100 lbs of bran to match the 100 lbs the government will furnish.

Briscoe county will receive a joint shipment of poison and bran with Hall county—shipment being made to Memphis, Texas. We expect this bran to arrive this week in Memphis. As soon as it arrives, Briscoe county will truck over to Silverton her part of the materials.

A mixing station will be set up at Silverton to prepare the poison bait for distribution in Briscoe county. Instructions on how to apply this poison bait will be given each man as he receives his poison.

In estimating the amount of poison bait you will need you are to figure on 5 lbs of poison bait per acre of infested territory.

Farmers and ranchers are urged to keep a close watch on their farms and ranches (especially along the turn rows and near the wooded sections) for grasshopper infestations. Please report any findings to your county agent—Finley White.

We expect to be ready to distribute poison bait by May 16. By getting the job done early we can get the hoppers before they leave the places where they hatched out.

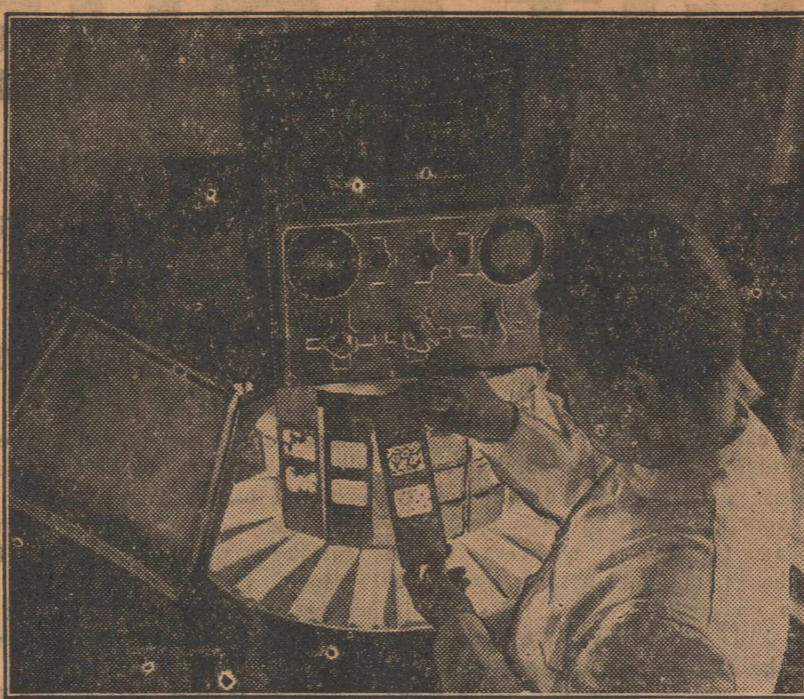

Consumers Information reports, to test colorfastness of fabrics, so that manufacturers can make sure in advance that their materials won't fade in the sun. Women never used to be sure that their dresses and draperies would retain their original

brilliance until they had actually been exposed to sunlight. But through the use of this machine, developed by industrial research experts, it is now possible to tell whether dyed fabrics will hold their color. This is just one more of the many examples of how industry helps the consumer.

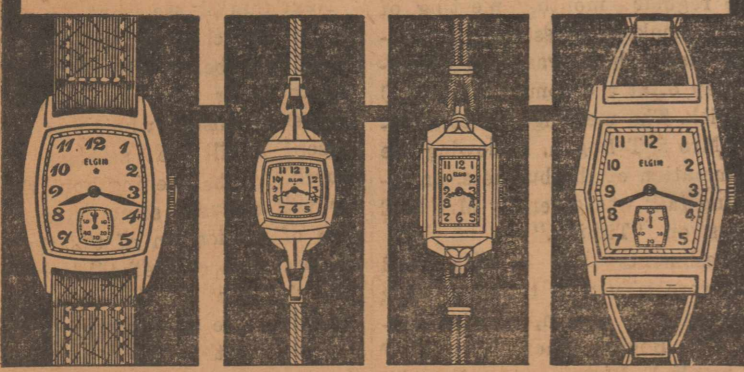

AMENDMENTS TO THE NEW FARM ACT

College Station—Amendments to the new farm act provide a reserve of 4 percent which will be added to the cotton acreage allotment of each state and that farm cotton allotments in necessary cases shall be raised to a minimum level, according to Geo. W Slaughter, Wharton, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee.

The total increase in allotments due to the amendments may exceed 2 million acres, he said. The original acreage allotment for 1938 was 26,300,000 acres. In Texas the additional allotment will amount to around 380,000 acres.

The 4 percent reserve will be used to assure minimum allotments to small cotton farms, provide additional acreages on farms on which allotments were materially reduced because of an unusually large number of small farms in the county, and to provide representative allotments to counties or farms which otherwise would receive allotments which are low in comparison with the amounts allotted to producers in similar areas and in comparison with their usual cotton acreages.

The amendments also provide that if the allotment to any farm is less than 50 percent of the sum of the

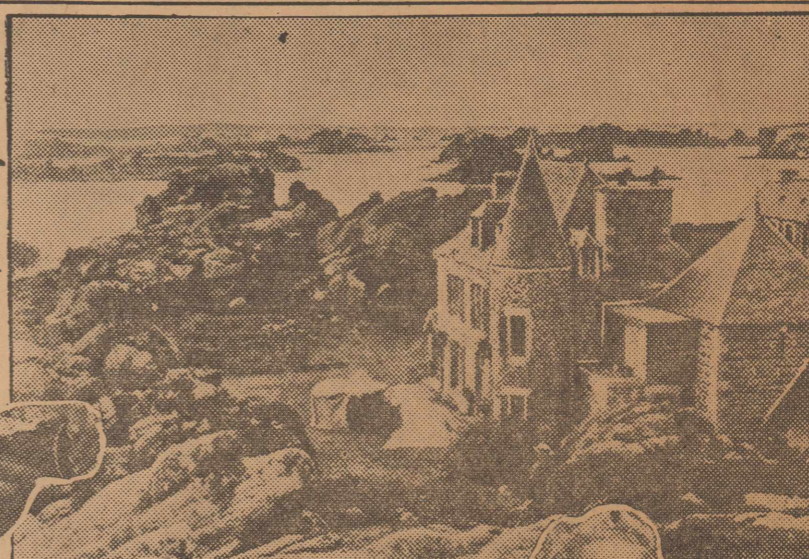

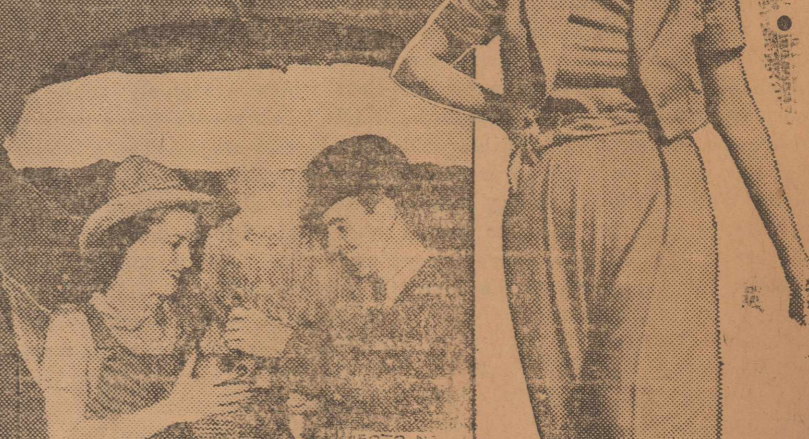

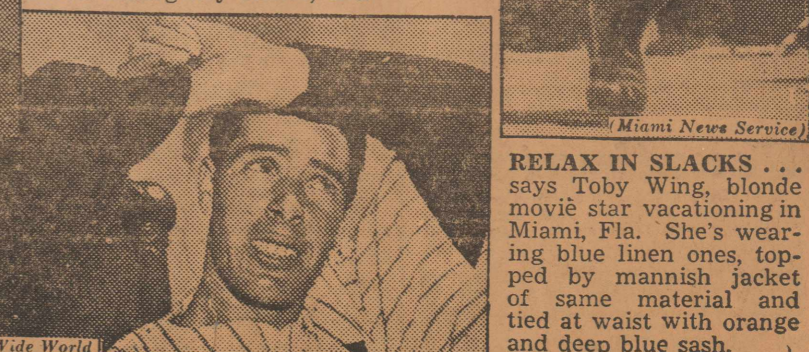

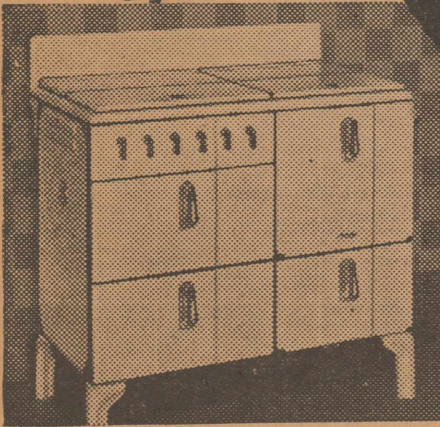
