



the walls were about eighteen inch.s thick and were neatly plastered on the insde. The rooms were covered by means of cottonwood logs and a thatch consisting of brush and mud. There were no windows, and the doors did not exceed three feet in height. Generally there was a fire pit in each room. These rooms were rather large as compared to those of other Indian ruins and generally about '20 feet square. The floors

were paved with packed clay. The people who inhabited three ancient villages in West Texas practiced agriculture, as indicated by numerous specimans in their refuse heaps. They were also great hnuters. Numerous bones of buffalo, deer, bison, and antelope are continually beans, squashes and tomatoes there was also an abundance of wild game.

be producing the auxiliary product that they should produce. The greatest food production comes from stable water levels. We need aquatic vegeta'tions that are ordinarily found around the shores of natural fresh water lakes, and the chain of freshorganisms that come as a result of vegetation, that cannot be produced where there is constant and violent fluctation or where the flow is rapid. If the lakes are such that they w.ll not produce fish, it is not expected that they will support any considerable number of fish, however many may be poured into them. The same conditions are necessary to produce forage foods, such as minnows and many crustacea, as are required for fish production. Without the production of the foods upon which fish live, a supply produced from the outside will not permanently cure the trouble. Of course, if we could produce fish in our hatcheries to a catchable size in sufficient quanities to meet the angler's demand, and release them for immediate catching, that would be a different matter.

When a lake is construuted for hydro-electric purposes the operators should be urged to dam all creeks leading into that lake with dams that will maintan a permanent water level only slightly lower than the maxi mum water level of the lake. These areas could be used as an area for 'the hatching of fish and food to supply the connecting lake and would not be subject to damasing lowering of water. It would be wise to use the angler's license funds for this purpose if they were sufficient. Such natural fish production units would certainly be economical of operation.

It is not expected, however, that the anglers of Texas will get much development from their money, so long as only one out every six are paying any sort of license. The money the anglers are now paying would not pay for the operation of the fish hatcheries alone, much less take care of patrol and law enforcement details that are necessary to require the wextward to do what the majority are willing to do.
