Bailey County Launches Drive For \$160,000 In Bonds

Bailey Co. Electric Cooperative Is Planning Large Extensions In Area.

Electric service will be extended to 187 miles of power into Bailey County, on Nov. 10, 1939. The first lines served only 127 consumers. In six years, the power system has grown to 486 miles of distribution lines serving 988 consumers in Bailey, Castro, Lamb, Cochran and Parmar Counties.

"Since our first lines were energized, vast strides have been made in the application of electric power to farming operations," Mr. Ewell said.

"During the war years, farmers along our lines have put electricity to work at a great variety of farm tasks, reducing labor requirements and adding to farm profits. Electric water pumps provide water for livestock and poultry as well as for household use, milking machines, chick brooders and milk coolers, separators and feed mills have definitely proved their worth on many of the farms our co-op serves. This has been especially true on the great majority of the 200 farms connected to our lines between 1942 and V-E Day, under special War Production Board regulations—all owing us to extend services to farmers able to use electrical equipment to save labor or increase production."

"It will probably be some time before manufacturers can turn out enough electrical equipment to meet the pent-up demand on electrified farms throughout the country," Ewell continued. However, the Bailey County Electric Co-op will do everything possible to help its members get the equipment they need, throughout established dealers in this territory, as fast as it appears on the market."

Ewell anticipates a great demand for water pumps, bathroom installations, new refrigerators, or quick-freeze units, and other farm equipment, as well as for radios, washers, vacuum cleaners, and toasters, fans, irons and other small appliances.

The Bailey County Electric Co-op has been allocated loans of \$386,000 by the Rural Electrification Administration to finance its lines and other facilities. It has drawn advances of \$8,774.27 of a total fund of \$100,000. The co-op is making contracted interest and principal payments on its REA loans, according to Mr. Ewell, and in addition has paid \$4,864.58 on principal in advance of due dates, as a cushion of credit in preparation for the final authorization and maintenance requirements in the future.

Lots Bought For Local Creamery

R. L. Brown, the land man, said today he had sold a city lot here to Dudley Malone, of Hereford, who announced his intention to place a creamery and ice cream manufacturing plant on it.

Mr. Brown said Malone formerly lived in Muleshoe, and recently has been in the creamery business at Hereford.

Coming of a creamery to Muleshoe is good news to all. It is part of a project of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, which has seen the need for such an enterprise.

Mr. Malone does not own a herd of dairy cows, but buys whole milk from other producers, and this will provide a badly needed whole milk market in Muleshoe.

A lot on the northwest corner of the courthouse square, next to the Odd Fellows new lodge home was reported bought by Mr. Malone.

City Planners Are Employed

Employment of Koch & Fowler, Consulting Engineers, of Dallas, to blue print Muleshoe's future expansion and growth, was announced this morning by Mayor R. L. Brown.

The City Commission entered into a contract with the city planning experts after lengthy correspondence with them and after a considerable study of local problems had been made by the City Planning Board, which is composed of the city commission and representatives of other local organizations and institutions.

O. H. Koch of the Dallas firm is to have charge of the Muleshoe planning work. He came here last Friday and at a luncheon of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, described the work and gave members an idea of what can be done by intelligent city planning.

Muleshoe probably is one of the first towns of the size to employ a city planner, although city planning in the cities is a familiar story. It seemed wise to the city dads to make plans now, just as the city is small and is beginning what will likely be a period of unprecedented development.

Sgt. Thomson Gets Discharge

FIFTH AIR FORCES COMMAND, OKINAWA, RYUKYU ISLANDS.

After more than 16 months overseas, Sgt. Courtney H. Thomson of Muleshoe has returned to the U. S. under the provisions for 40 years of age. He served as a welder with an Ordnance Unit of the Fifth Air Service Command.

During his tour of duty, Sgt. Thomson has served in Australia, the Philippine Islands, and Okinawa.

Prior to his entry into the armed forces, he worked as a welder. He is authorized to wear the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon with two bronze stars for his participation in the New Guinea and Luzon Campaigns. He is also authorized to wear the Philippine Liberation Ribbon with one bronze star for participation against the enemy. He wears the Good Conduct Medal.

Community Quotas Assigned And Dist. Leaders Named In Loan Drive

Bailey County is organized as never before to assure the success of the Victory Loan Drive, with community quotas assigned and district committees named, according to announcement of the County Co-chairmen, E. R. Hart and Jesse M. Osborn of Muleshoe.

The county's overall quota is set at \$160,000, of which some \$70,000 is expected to be subscribed in E Bonds, bought by individuals.

The Victory Loan will be the last of the war financing drives to be staged by the United States Treasury, and is the eighth such drive. In the Seventh Loan, staged in the spring, Bailey County nearly doubled its assigned quota.

The Victory Loan officially opened October 29, and will continue through December 31.

The County War Finance Committee has broken the county quota down into quotas for the various school districts.

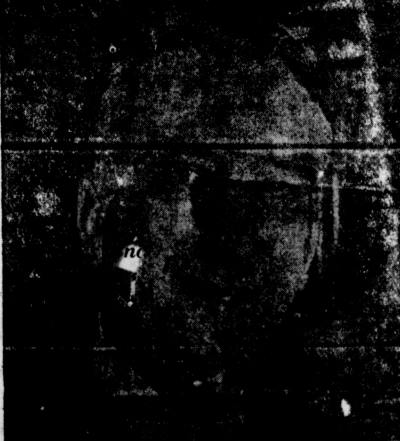

Sidelights From Washington

Figures make dry reading, but I believe the following will be of interest. A few days ago the House, on the recommendation of the Appropriations Committee, rescinded 52 billion dollars in appropriations—money, which had heretofore been approved for war spending. The biggest slice was recovered from the Army—thirty billion dollars. From the Navy seventeen billion dollars was recovered. The remaining amounts were subtracted from other agencies.

In the money, World War I cost us 26 billion dollars. Total expendi-

tures for World War II, including national defense just prior to the war, will exceed three billion dollars. The amount of money being recovered as a result of the end of the war is twice as much as the cost of world war I. And these figures do not take into account the greatest cost, the cost in human life.

Recently a visitor from Lubbock told me that he planned to attend the Sunday morning service at a certain Washington church. I cautioned him to arrive at the church by ten thirty or he probably could not get a seat. He later reported that he followed my instructions, but was only able to get standing room in the rear of the church.

The minister of this church began last Sunday a system whereby he will conduct two identical services on Sunday mornings, one at nine o'clock and one at eleven. This practice is already being followed by a few other churches in the city. There are many churches in the city where people have diffi-

culty in getting seats at the 11 o'clock hour. But unfortunately the people of Washington are not breaking any records for church attendance. Only eighty thousand out of a population of well over one million in metropolitan Washington attend church on Sunday. According to a report recently made, twenty three percent of the white children of public school age attend religious services on Sunday; the attendance rate for the negro children is thirty percent. There are five hundred churches in Washington, of which one hundred and sixty one are colored.

For weeks there has not been an issue of a Washington paper that did not carry some kind of story in regard to the atomic bomb. Many have been the speculations as to the future of the bomb. One editorial writer has this to say: "The atomic bomb is here to stay—but are we?"

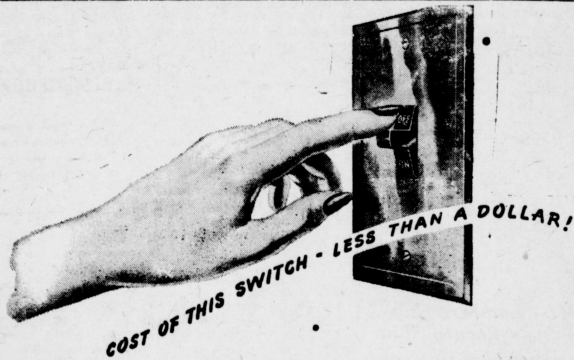

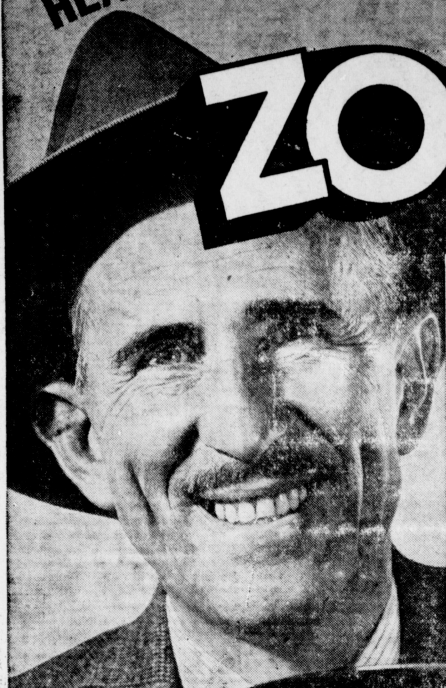

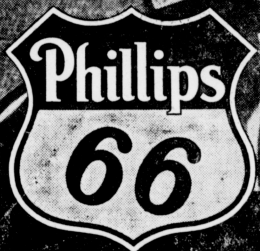

BLACKWATER VALLEY Soil Conservation District News

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS B. H. Black, W. R. Carter, Paul M. Carmickle, Virgil Nowell.

The District Supervisors met in the office of the Soil Conservation Service October 22 to discuss along with other matters, the purchasing of terracing equipment for use by cooperators.

The board asked N. S. Abbott, Work Unit Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, to contact Mr. John Sharp, Secretary-Treasurer, Hall County Soil Conservation District, relative to shopmade 28-inch and 32-inch disc terracer attachments for tractors. The Hall County district has operated this type of terracing equipment more economically and built more miles of terraces in less time than with other types of terracing equipment tried.

"This equipment can be made available to cooperators of this district, the cost of terracing would be reduced considerably and more farmers could terrace," said Ray Carter, chairman of the board. "There are several thousand acres of land in this county that should be terraced and saved from erosion," Carter continued.

New Enlistments Are Authorized

Men from 17 years of age to 34 years may enlist in the regular Army, providing the 17 year olds have the consent of their parents or guardians. The men who enlist for the first time are also authorized an automatic promotion of one grade at the completion of six months service. The advantages of the GI Bill of Rights and free post-privileges are extended. In accordance with the Act, men enlisting will receive a monthly family allowance for their dependents. 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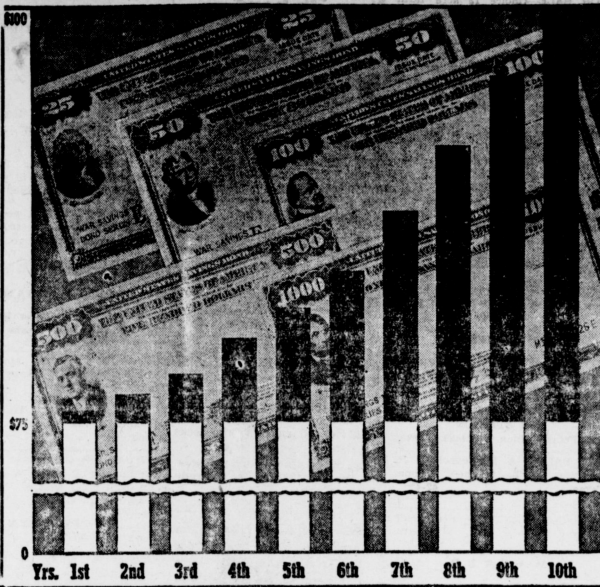
