### GE NUMBER OF NEEDY FAMILIES IN COUNTY

A number of families who have declared eligible for direct relief in Briscoe county has increased 72 families in November to 82 in December. In July there only 38 needy families listed in the county.

The large increase is caused primarily by the completion of most of the arduous work hereabouts. A large number of the families are those of farmers whose landrills, be it of reduced acreage have decided to work their land themselves.

The WPA work in the county has placed on a changed schedule of curtailed funds. The funds for WPA work had diminished to such extent that the work would have stopped very soon if continued on the former schedule and in order to stretch the money over a longer period and give as many families as possible assistance, regardless of how small the work is being rotated to those certified for WPA work.

Working on this changed schedule does not provide sufficient funds for relief and must be augmented to meet the need.

As far as the Post has been able to learn there was very little done in community last year toward giving Christmas cheer to the needy in our midst. In fact from information gleaned at that time there was a little need of assistance and we are sure that aid was rendered where it was needed.

However, this year it would be well to have organizations in the community inquire into the situation fully remembering that "it is more blessed to give than to receive."

### LOSS HAND

Edward Wright, about 32 years old, brother of Mrs M O Holloman of Quitaque, lost his right hand in a gas explosion last Friday, the result necessitating amputation of the hand below the elbow. Wright was injured when he was repairing some post holes on his farm near Lampasas when the accident occurred, the charge completely blowing off the hand, a small piece of one being all that could be found.

## AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS

BY THE BRISCOE COUNTY AGENT

Well, Santa is just around the corner! We wonder if he's going to stay around that corner as long as prosperity has.

As the Christmas season approaches we all begin to wonder what we've done with our money. We wake up to the realization that we haven't saved any of it. When the time of the year arrives we start begin thinking about an inventory. Lets take stock of what we've done during the past twelve months. Lets be careful to use the mistakes we've made as stepping stones to better things for another year.

**Wheat Measurements**

The supervisors are making rapid progress in checking the 39 wheat acreage. It will be appreciated by the supervisors as well as the office if the farm operators will be present when the supervisors measure the farms.

If you are long on seed what it will be necessary for you to either seed 20 percent by weight of barley or rye in these excess acres or plow them up. This job should be done prior to December 15. It is hoped that everyone who wants to comply will be in line before the dead line.

**Feed From 1938 Retired Acres**

Much argument has been heard on both sides of the question as to whether or not it is permissible to sell the feed produced on retired acres. This column has advised that it could be sold and later warned that

it could not be sold, bartered or traded.

Now we come forth with this "red hot" information fresh from headquarters:

Feed produced on retired acres CAN be sold. The only catch in this is that it must not be thrashed for feed nor put in a silo. Otherwise you are free to get all you can for your "Government" feed. This means too that you can take in stock for pasturage on government acres.

**Marketing Quotas for 1939**

Saturday, December 10 is the day for voting on 1939 marketing quotas. Voting places for this county will be (1) Silverton in the district court room, (2) Quitaque in the City Hall. Antelope Flat at the school house. It is hoped that every man or woman who planted cotton in 1938 will go to the polls Saturday and vote. It matters not how you vote—just vote your feelings. A poll tax receipt is not necessary for you to vote.

The marketing quotas for 1939 will not be in force unless 66 2/3 of those voting are favorable to the quotas. If we do not have marketing quotas for '39 there will be no loan on cotton nor will there be any subsidy paid on cotton. If marketing quotas are in force for '39 there will be a loan (if the price goes below 52 percent of parity) and there will be a parity payment. There will also be a 15 dollar per bale penalty against the fellow who over plants his allotment if marketing quotas are voted in.



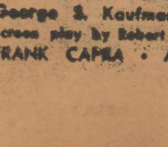

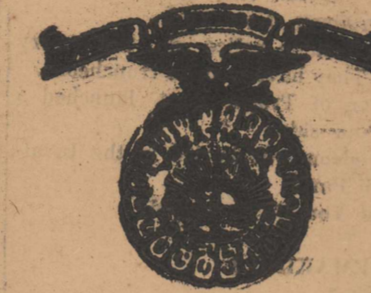
