Election Date Set By Water District

An election to give the Kent Creek Water Control and Improvement Directors taxing authority for operation and maintenance of flood prevention structures, will be held at the R. L. Brunson home east of Quitaque on February 23. All qualified voters in the Kent Creek WCID are urged to cast their vote. Both husbands and wives who own land and reside within the WCID are eligible to vote.

The Federal Government will pay the total cost of completing the dams and all channel improvement work. Before the SCS will agree to build the needed structures, however, the local District must agree to maintain the structures. If past experience in watersheds is any guide, there will be very little maintenance needed. If taxation is ever needed it will be based on a straight per acre rate and will not exceed 13c per acre. The tax rate could be much less than 13c per acre, but the actual rate will not be known until the survey planning party can make their survey, probably starting in July or August.

Starks Jr. at Quitaque or personnel with the SCS in Silverton will also gladly discuss questions about the water shed with those interested.

WHEREAS this board is of the opinion and advises that an election for a fair and just tax should be called to obtain funds to defray the cost of repair, maintenance, operation, easements on land and administration of the district and that it be submitted that the maximum possible tax on a uniform thirteen cents (13c) per acre basis be voted on.

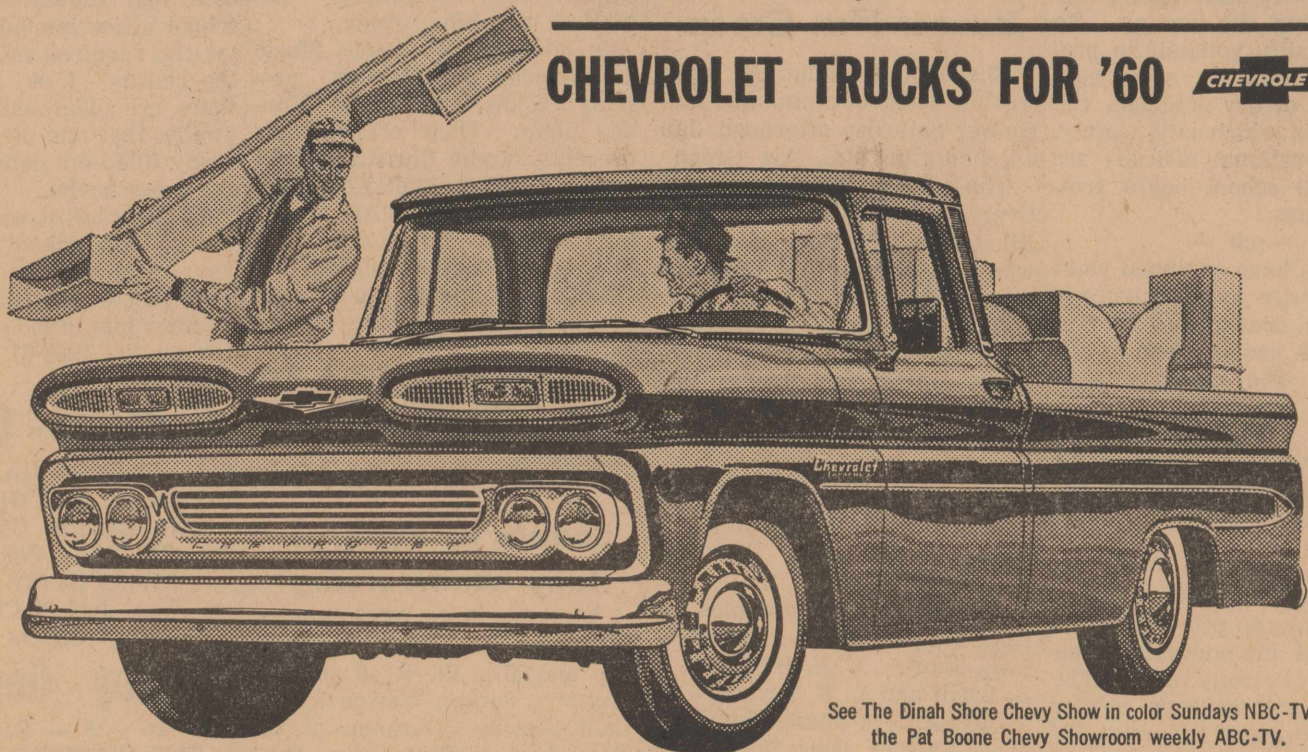

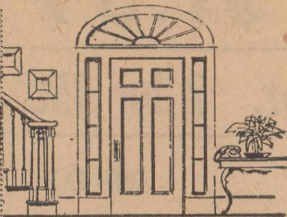
