People of this country will further entreat Divine favor upon the universal hope for a warless world.

It is the second time in this writer's life that hope has soared in the world that permanent peace could be attained. We saw disillusionment follow in the wake of the shattering of President Wilson's splendid dream. Selfishness destroyed the best chance we have ever had to bring reality to a dream that is as old as the race, peace on earth.

Now we have been granted another chance, and are on the verge

and our allies are embarked; the achievement of an "abiding peace" must occupy our time energies, and most concentrated thought for many years to come.

Farm Machinery Industry Has Major Role in War

Agriculture is as essential to the war effort as our fighting men on the fronts and the backbone of agriculture is the farm machinery industry. Napoleon said that an army travels on its stomach, so that without food our armies could not function. Without the farm machinery industry, agriculture could not function.

The part that the farm machinery industry has played in the development of American agriculture and in the present role in the war effort is given tribute by George L. Gillette, president of the Farm Equipment Institute and vice president and general sales manager of the Minneapolis-Moline Power Implement company.

"If it were not for farm machinery, most of us would have to spend our days eking out a meager existence from the soil," Gillette says.

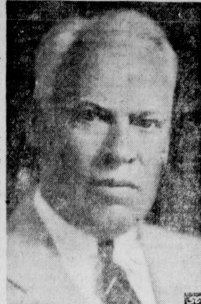
"Once it required 57 man-hours to grow and harvest an acre of wheat yielding 20 bushels. Today we can produce an acre of 20-bushel wheat with less than four man-hours of labor.

"Once there were vast stretches of eroded land that defied the farmer. Today much of this land has been reworked to produce food. All this has been possible only through advanced farm equipment.

"Much progress had been made by agriculture before 1941, but when the war came, the farmers were called upon to produce even more. Although the farm equipment manufacturers were too busy making the tools of war to manufacture any new types of farm machinery, we have continued to turn out repairs for machines already on the farm and as many complete units as government limitation orders permitted; and the American farm has demonstrated the blessing of mechanized agriculture by achieving astounding increases in food production.

"These dealers believe in the future of the American farm and equipment industry," Mr. Gillette says. "They, like the manufacturers, believe in our country's future, an America in which there will be food for all, and—with progressive agriculture as a foundation—an ever-advancing standard of living for a world at peace."

Mr. Gillette feels that all people, particularly those living in cities and towns, should realize that practically all food, clothing and other essentials come from the farms that produce these things at low cost because of the miracles accomplished by modern farm machinery.

High Volt Line Is Completed

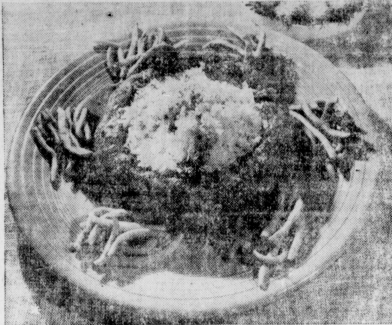

Q. How long after discharge from service can a member of the armed forces wear his uniform?
A. Regulations provide the uniform may be worn by honorably discharged personnel until they reach home, within three months, and thereafter upon occasions of ceremony.

Q. If a veteran for some reasons is not eligible for federal rehabilitation or educational training under the GI Bill is there any agency that will help him?
A. Yes, some states have set up agencies to care for such cases. Contact your nearest Disabled American Veterans service officer for this information.

Q. If a disabled veteran is employed will that interfere with his receiving government compensation?
A. If the disability is service-connected, gainful employment will not prevent payment of compensation.

Q. Can disability pension or compensation be apportioned at the request of the veteran?
A. Yes, if the amount is more than \$20 monthly it can be apportioned if the disabled veteran and his wife are not living together or for other reasons provided by law.

The Army Answers Your Questions

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as the relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters Eighth Service Command, Dallas, Texas.

Q. My husband is an Infantry Reserve officer now on active duty overseas. When he is released from the service, will he receive five hundred dollars for each year he was on active duty?

A. No. The lump sum payment of five hundred dollars to officers for each year of active service applies only to those holding commissions in the Air Corps Reserve, who are on flying status.

Q. My daughter is a WAG and she is married to a soldier. Both are overseas. Her husband has been wounded and believes he will return to this country for limited service. Could my daughter request a return to duty here, because of her husband's case?

A. Yes. Theatre commanders are authorized to return to duty in the United States any member of the Women's Army Corps who requests the return and presents satisfactory evidence that her husband has been sent back from permanent overseas assignment for such reasons as hospitalization or honorable discharge.

Q. Is it true that soldiers over 42 years of age can be discharged from the Army?

A. Yes. The War Department has announced that an enlisted man 42 years of age or over who applies will be discharged from the Army unless he is undergoing disciplinary action or requires further medical or surgical treatment. This policy does not apply to WAGs.

Q. My son wants to go to college under the G. I. Bill of Rights when he is discharged from the Army. Would he have to continue the same course of study he was following before he entered the service?

A. No. The Dupont Company has under construction at Orange, Texas, a \$20,000,000 Nylon plant.
