EXECUTIVE ORDERS

What are Executive orders? Sometimes referred to as "Presi-'dential Directives," these orders initate actions by government departments and agencies. Virtually every American is affected by them. I've often been asked about them by folks in the Panhandle. Here's a report:

George Washington issued the first Executive Order on June 8, 1889, when he asked heads of Executive Departments affairs connected with their depowers is implied the authority E. Chandlers. exercised by presidents through history to issue Executive Orders. Under the Constitution. the President is vested with the executive power; the power to preserve, protect and defend the Constitution; and the power to see that the laws are faithfully executed. Presidents have based the authority for Executive Or-! ders on all these grounds, most often the latter.

There has been a tendency in this century for Presidents to guide Executive Branch policies by using Executive Orders. Most have been routine in nature. One order, for example. provided for the appointment of a charwoman in a local post office. Although the nectarines are peeled in this case, it isn't necessary to remove their thin, smooth skins for most uses. The fuzz-free skin makes nectarines a favorite for out-of-hand eating.

Juicy, red-and-gold fresh nectarines from California are found in markets from late June into September. Savor their sunny flavor and fragrance regularly during their all-too-fleeting season.

NECTARINE MINT BAVARIAN 2 packages (3 oz. each) lemon gelatin cups boiling water cups cold water to 1 teaspoon peppermint extract or 3 tablespoons

1/3 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon

3 tablespoons lemon juice 3 large fresh nectarines ½ pint whipping cream

creme de menthe Dissolve gelatin in boiling water; stir in cold water, peppermint extract, salt, lemon rind and 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Chill until mixture mounds on spoon. Peel and slice nectarines. Brush 6 slices with remaining lemon juice; chop other slices coarsely. Whip cream; fold into gelatin mixture. Fold in chopped nectarines. Turn into 6-cup mold; chill until firm. Unmold and top with reserved nectarine slices. If desired, garnish with maraschino cherry and additional nectarine slices. Makes 10 servings.


