#### **ANNIVERSARY OF THE GI BILL**

Twenty years ago, American GI's were consolidating their foothold in Normandy battling north of Rofe in Italy, pressing the South Pacific campaign against the Japanese. On June 22 1944, President Roosevelt signed into law the "GI Bill of Rights," a measure approved unanimously by both houses of Congress and surely one of the most historic legislative measures ever enacted. Its impact was great on millions of veterans and their families-and on our national way of life.

More than 16,500,000 Americans were eventually under arms in World War II. Although the war was a long way from won in 1944, the people, their Con'gress, and leaders of veterans' organizations recognizel the need to provide a program serving as a buffer against. possible economic and social chaos in the post-war period.

In 1944 public opinion was near unanimous in its support for the "Serviceman's Readjustment Act," as the GI Bill was formally titled. Americans could envision the prospect of a million men, a month passing thru separation centers and heading for home.
