HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS WIN FOUR GAMES

Quitauque High School's Pantherettes and Panthers continue undefeated in district competition as each team won two games the past week.

The local teams drove to Flomot last Friday night for a doubleheader. The Pantherettes took an easy 63-18 victory but the Panthers had to work for a 67-54 decision over the hustling Longhorns.

The Pantherettes took an 18-4 first period lead and extended it to 40-10 at half-time and Coach Gene King started running in the reserves at that point and all the team saw action before the game was over.

Patricia Brunson sparked the win by tossing in 21 points in the first half of play. She did not play the second half. Devorah McKay fired in 17 points for runnerup honors; Jill Johnson found the range for 10; Jerry Beth Grundy added 6 to the total. Barbara Reagan, 3 and Carol Myers, Lynette Taylor and Renee McKay each had 2 points in the scoring column. Gwen McKay and Charlene Bailey saw considerable action at guard positions.

The Panthers had to come from behind to win their tilt with the Longhorns. Coach King did not start his two top-pointmakers, Jamie Johnson and Eddie Monk, both of whom were a bit crippled, but the Longhorns battled the Panthers on even terms the first half, trailing 15-16 at the end of the first period and owning a 30-28 lead over Quitauque at halftime.

Coach King started his usual starters the second half and they soon took the lead over Flomot and led 48-38 at the end of the third period of play.

Jamie Johnson and Monte Stephens shared scoring honors for the Panthers with 16 points each. Eddie Monk and Warren Merrell each dropped 11 points with Larry Tipton notching 7 and Dale Ramsey and Lonnie McDonald, 3 each. Calvert of the Longhorns won scoring honors for the night, however, with 20 points.

The Quitauque teams had to battle for their lives at Turkey Tuesday night. Both the local teams had beaten Turkey without too much trouble earlier in the season but such was not the case Tuesday night. Neither the Panthers or Pantherettes were playing near their capabilities, however.

The Pantherettes started well and owned a 16-8 lead at the end of the first quarter, made it 15-8, then before the Quitauque girls were able to score again, Turkey had gone ahead 20-15 and time had run out in the first half. The Pantherettes had scored only one point in the second quarter.

In the third quarter the Pantherettes shut out the Turkettes until they had gone ahead 23-20 and the two teams played even until the closing seconds of the third quarter when the Turkey team took a two point lead. The Pantherettes were three points behind with less than two minutes of time left and Carol Myers popped the nets with a 15-foot winning basket with only about 8 seconds of time left. Patricia Brunson canted 21 points. Carol Myers 11 and Jill Johnson 5.

The Panthers also had to come from behind to edge the Turks in the second half. The Quitauque team led 18-13 at the first stop but trailed the Turks 29-30 at half time. The score was tied five time during the third quarter, winding up 46-46 at the three-quarter mark. The Panthers went on to win a 64-58 decision to keep their district record clean.

Friday night of this week the teams go to Estelline for a pair of games. The Estelline girls were riding in first place in the district until they were upset by the Pantherettes a couple of weeks ago and those Estelline girls will be out for revenge and will be double-tough to beat on their home court.

Next Tuesday night the local teams host the Lakeview teams in the next-to-last regular season's games.

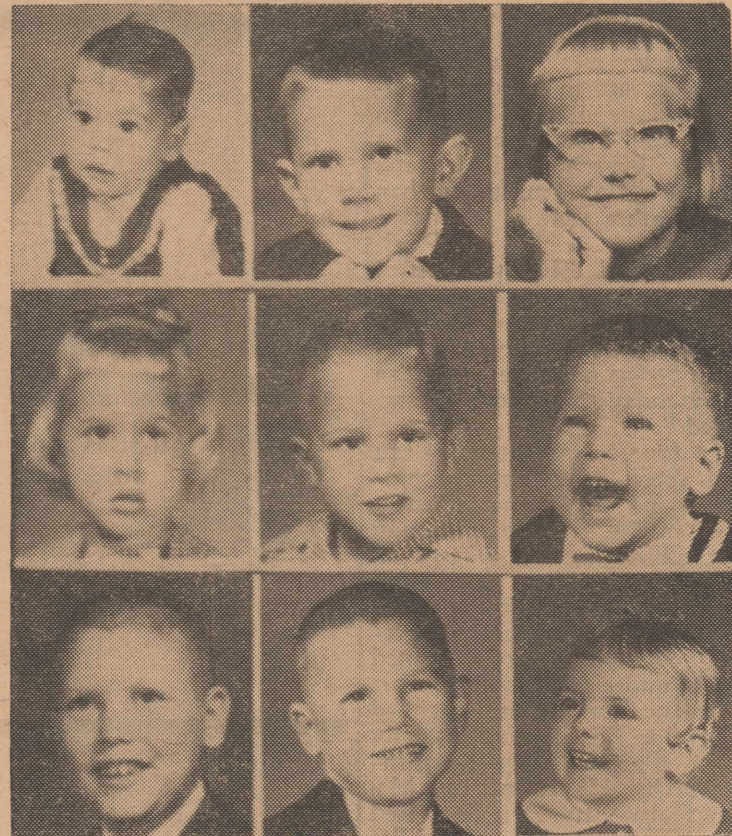

HOUSE SPEAKER BARNES NAMES COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS

AUSTIN — House Speaker Ben Barnes announced his committee appointments today for the 59th session of the Texas Legislature.

Representative Ralph Wayne of Plainview received the following appointments: Rules; Conservation and Reclamation; State Schools and Hospitals; Aeronautics; and Penitentiaries. Wayne's appointment to these major committees of the House means that he will have an extremely busy work-session.

His appointment to the Committee on Rules is indicative of the confidence Speaker Barnes has in Representative Wayne. The Rules Committee, considered by many the major House Committee, is composed of only eleven members. These members will have jurisdiction over the rules of the House, the Joint Rules, and all amendments proposed to either; and it has the special duty to assist in expediting the business of the House, and to assist the Speaker when called on by him, in deciding the recognition for suspensions and such other matters concerning the Rules and orderly procedure of the House as might be assigned by the Speaker.

Wayne, whose interest in water conservation was evidenced by his work on the Running Water Draw Project, requested the Conservation and Reclamation Committee and was assigned membership on this committee. This committee has jurisdiction over all matters relating to the conservation of the natural resources of the State, to the storing, taking, control and use of flood and surplus waters for irrigation, as well as the improvements of rivers, harbors and flooded districts. Wayne is already involved in co-sponsoring legislation pertaining to water conservation throughout the entire State.

MEMPHIS AND STAMFORD PCA'S TO MERGE

A merger of the Stamford and Memphis Production Credit Associations was approved by the stockholders of the two agricultural credit cooperatives in meetings held recently in the two towns. The new organization being created by the consolidation of these two PCA's will be known as the Rolling Plains Production Credit Association, with the headquarters office to be located in Stamford. All other offices presently serving the membership of the two associations will be maintained as they now are. These offices are located in Anson, Haskell, Matador, Memphis, Paducah, Spur and Wellington. The official date of the merger has been set for February 28, 1965 and when it becomes effective will create one of the largest Production Credit As-

sociations, area wide, in Texas. The counties making up this area are: Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Haskell, Hardeman, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Motley, Shackelford, Stonewall, and that portion of Briscoe lying below the Caprock.

The Board of Directors now serving the two associations will be consolidated into a 10-man board upon merger and will serve until the next annual stockholders meeting which will be held in 1966. C. G. Burson, Sr. of Haskell is President of the Stamford Board of Directors and J. C. Emmert is President of the Memphis Board of Directors.

The personnel presently in each office will continue: Billy Ray Jones, Assistant Manager, Edna Richardson, Ass't. Treasurer, Beatrice Baker, Clerk, and Vada Tidwell, Clerk, Memphis; Ward Rattan, Field Manager and Helen Meyers, Clerk, Matador.

James Van Pelt, who had been manager of the Memphis Association, resigned as of January 15, 1965, to take a position with the Amarillo PCA. J. L. OUR MILITARY SUPREMACY

In the fast pace of headline-catching events during Inaugural Week, many Americans may have missed the substance of President Johnson's message to Congress on the current state of our Nation's defenses.

For friend and foe alike, the message was clear: Our military forces are supreme and unparalleled and we mean to keep them that way. "I am able to report to you that the United States today is stronger militarily than at any other time in our peacetime history. . . . the President declared. "For the past 4 years, the focus of our national effort has been upon assuring an undisputable margin of superiority for our defenses. I can report today that effort has succeeded."

In four years, Americans can note these milestones of progress—and our enemies abroad, who might be contemplating new adventures in a test of arms, also can give them sober study: Our tactical nuclear power on alert has increased threefold; our special forces, trained for the undeclared, twilight wars of today, have been expanded eightfold; our combat - ready Army divisions have been increased by 45 percent; our Marine Corps has been increased by 15,000 men; our airlift capacity to move these troops

anywhere in the world has been doubled; our Tactical Air Force firepower to support these divisions in the field has increased 100 percent. Remember: This strength has been developed to support our basic military strategy, a strategy of strength and

This melt-in-your-mouth pineapple cheese cake heart carries its own special Valentine message. A rich cream cheese filling, baked in a graham cracker crust, is topped with a golden crushed pineapple glaze. The cool, refreshing flavor of canned pineapple is just right for this festive dessert. Keep the recipe handy to use year 'round. A regular cheese cake pan may be used instead of the heart shaped mold.

DELUXE PINEAPPLE CHEESE CAKE

2 cups fine graham cracker crumbs	3 eggs
1/4 cup softened butter	1 teaspoon vanilla
3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar	1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin
3 (8-ounce) packages cream cheese	1 (1-pound 4 1/2-ounce) can crushed pineapple

Blend together graham cracker crumbs, butter and 2 tablespoons sugar; press firmly in bottom and sides of heart shaped pan or mold. Thoroughly beat cream cheese with eggs, 3/4 cup sugar and vanilla; pour into graham cracker crust. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Chill. Invert onto lightly greased cookie sheet, then onto serving plate. Sprinkle gelatin over 1/2 cup syrup drained from pineapple; place over low heat stirring until gelatin dissolves. Cool until slightly thickened. Spoon drained pineapple over cake top and spread with gelatin glaze. Chill thoroughly. Makes 1 cheese cake.

readiness, capable of encountering aggression with appropriate force from ballistic missiles to guerilla bands.

Supporting our defenses at this level of preparedness costs approximately half of all the money we Americans pay in taxes. But Congress and the country know that our security and continued sovereignty depend on vast expenditures—and will for the foreseeable future. As the President said, . . . We—and free men everywhere—have proved preparedness to be 'the most effective means of preserving peace.'

Our defense dollars are to be spent, according to the President's plan for the next fiscal year, on further increases in missile strength as well as further technological improvements and research and development. Major new developments to begin include these: A new missile system, the Poseidon (with double the payload of the Polaris), to increase the striking power of our nuclear submarines; new payloads for strategic missiles;

a new short-range attack missile, the SRAM; improved ability to concentrate U. S. military power rapidly, by expanding airlift and sealtift capability and increase the amount of prepositioned equipment; stepped-up efforts to protect our people, cities, and industry should a war be forced upon us; and continued research and development into systems providing protection against missiles and bomber attacks.

We all know that the United States is the leader of Free World forces arrayed against a treacherous enemy. International Communism may be deterred from overt aggression by the knowledge of America's military might, but despite serious problems created by ideological differences the Red-dominated nations are bent on world conquest by whatever means they determine will succeed. Thus, the struggle involves more than military might. The moral and economic vitality of Freedom will continue to be tested.

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Many farmers over the irrigated belt of Texas have been watering their crops for years. James Valliant, Water Engineer for the High Plains Research Foundation, reports there is a large difference in the returns due to the way a farmer irrigates his crops.

Valliant's research has proved that time of irrigation on the crops grown in this area is more important than just putting on water. Due to the physiological growth of the plants, there are times when the water is more beneficial than at other times. Proper timing of irrigation in balance with the correct fertilizer level appears to be one of the answers to maintaining high yields on less water and with added income. James states that high yields

alone might not make the most money. With his research at the High Plains Research Foundation, James is working toward the most economical return per dollar invested. With this in mind, Valliant's research is geared toward developing the highest practical irrigation efficiency in the production of crops.

Irrigation methods developed by the Foundation are based on the stage of growth of the crop and its water requirement at that stage. This along with the proper fertilizer balance will give the farmer the highest net return per dollar invested.

In a recent study at the Foundation, Valliant found three irrigations, including preplant, along with the proper fertilizer, gave the highest return in net dollars with grain sorghum. Plots with additional irrigations had higher yields, but lower net returns.

The Foundation's irrigation research program under Valliant has been extended to cover all of the principal crops grown in Texas. With each of the different crops timing of the irrigation water has made the difference of profit or loss.

"If we as farmers wish to maintain our present high standard of agricultural economy, we must get the maximum efficiency from our ground water for irrigation," Jim Valliant says. "This would mean to maintain a practical efficient irrigation program which can only be obtained by proper timing of irrigation based on the stage of development of the plant."
