Buck Wood Is Back In Civies

J. H. "Buck" Wood, pharmacist mate second class USNR, is home from the Pacific war, after serving since January 27, 1943, with the Navy, Marines, and even with the Army.

Buck has been at the Pearl Harbor Naval Hospital in Hawaii and at the naval dispensary in downtown Honolulu. At the hospital, he became intimately acquainted with the tragedy of war as casualties poured in by air from Saipan and other bloody battles.

He became well acquainted with the Hawaiian scene, and found time to learn the mode of life on the islands. It's beautiful, all right, but after a few months the beauty palls and one is more than glad to get away. He bore out the testimony of J. R. King, who had a letter in last week's Journal telling about the crowded conditions of the islands.

After entering the service in Dallas Wood was sent San Diego Naval Hospital and transferred later to the Marine Corps. Later he was stationed at San Bruno, Calif. He was billed for New Guinea, but orders were changed to send him to "W" instead. He was with an Army medical party for a time, also.

Buck returned to the U. S. on the famous Aircraft Hornet, landing in California October 22. The Hornet carried a number of wounded men and many passengers.

From San Francisco Wood went by ship to San Pedro on October 29 and received his honorable discharge there November 4.

His wife, Mrs. Josephine Wood, has resided here while he was in service, and is employed in the office of the C & H Chevrolet Company. The couple have lived in Muleshoe the last 10 years. They plan a trip soon to Dill, Oklahoma, where they are to visit his father, S. C. Wood. Buck formerly was employed here with the Western Drug Company.

Lubbock SS Board Has 6th Birthday

November 13 marked the sixth anniversary of the opening of the Lubbock Social Security Board office, located at 1311 Texas Avenue. The office was established for the purpose of issuing social security personal numbers, and furnishing information and assistance in the filing of claims for old-age and survivors insurance benefits under provisions of the Social Security Act.

"Early in the program our biggest job was issuing account numbers," said Sam Leifeste, manager of the Lubbock office. "Although issuing these numbers still involves considerable time in this office owing to the fact that new workers are entering the labor market daily, our biggest job now is taking claims for benefits. Another special service is to the returning soldier who has social security problems to solve, and to each we give careful personal attention," he continued.

The claims department pays out each month in the Lubbock area about 11 thousand dollars. The majority of these monthly payments are being made to widows and their children, based on wages earned by the husband.

At present, only workers in commerce and industry are included under the old-age and survivors insurance sections of the Social Security Act. The Board has this year recommended that coverage be extended to about 20 million workers who are now excluded, including farmers, farm workers, self-employed, and other non-covered groups.

CO. AGENT GIVES CROP OUTLOOK

College Station.—Farm folks in Bailey County, which rubs shoulders with New Mexico, can hold their heads high if and when other counties boss of big crops.

County Agricultural Agent J. E. Adams reports modestly that Bailey has completed a successful vegetable harvest. He quotes the rail-62 carloads of potatoes were shipped from Muleshoe, the county seat alone. He also quotes the Muleshoe freight agent that many additional carloads were loaded at other shipping points where icing could be made. Furthermore, truckers hauled out an unknown amount.

This was the situation at the end of June.

Meanwhile the canning plant at Muleshoe earned 28,000 acres of green beans for military and civilian consumption. The onion crop, Mr. Adams estimates, also may require the services of 62 freight cars to get it to market. Looking ahead, he reports that a farmer who is growing 52 acres of asparagus is expecting quite a labor problem when cutting sprouts commences next spring. That suggests another big crop ahead.

The outlook for big yields out in the fields also is good. Rain on September 29 justifies doubling an earlier estimate of a 200 carload shipment of grain sorghum. Mr.

Adams reports. Prospects for bundle feed for roughage were more than 100 per cent brighter than in the third week in September.

Practically every acre of an 887 acre certified seed farm in the southwestern corner of the county will produce seed this year for planting in 1946. New varieties of combine hedges are expected to yield 1,500 pounds of seed an acre in spite of the drought. A handful of foundation Sooner mole planted the same day and on the same plot with German millet promises a suitable type for dry years. Its early heads are maturing along with the millet.

Rounding up his survey, Mr. Adams says about one half of the wheat on the 80,000 acres seeded in Bailey County is above ground.

He believes that the soaking rain will bring up the remainder soon and will, perhaps, encourage farmers to plant wheat on the estimated 67,000 acres still barren. He adds that this would help control wind erosion.

Sidelights From Washington

According to the Weather Bureau, the sun will rise in Washington on November 15th at 6:51 A. M. and set at 4:54 P. M., Eastern Standard Time.

War time was never the misfit in Washington that it was in West Texas, the reason being that West Texas is on the very western edge of the central time zone. Except for the convenience of having all Texas

in the same zone, much of West Texas would perhaps be better served if it were in the western zone. In fact, much of West Texas is in the western zone prior to March 4, 1921, when an act of Congress placed all Texas in the same zone. The central standard time zone extends cross country from Knoxville, Tennessee, to El Paso, Texas, a distance of 1533 miles.

The Interstate Commerce Commission in Washington has authority to change the time zone boundaries in all states except Texas, Oklahoma, and Idaho. In these three states, specific acts of Congress fix the time zone boundary lines.

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INDUSTRIAL STATE

In Rhode Island, most highly industrialized state in the Union, more than half the population is employed in manufacturing, 134 per thousand compared to 49 for the Nation. The state leads in per capita wealth in the business \$248 per person. Converted to civilian needs, it will continue to produce resources to add to National wealth guaranteeing Victory Bonds.

U. S. Treasury Department

On December 29th, Texas will again get national recognition on a postage stamp. It will be a 3 cent stamp, commemorating the one hundred years of statehood since our entry into the union in 1845. The design will soon be announced.

This is a fast moving world, and most people do not take time to give attention to the designs, colors, and printing on postage stamps; the usual thought being that a stamp is a stamp, not a thing of beauty, an object of curiosity, or a thumb-nail story or lesson. I have become somewhat interested in stamps because occasionally a young stamp collector form our District writes me and asks me to send him any unusual stamps that show up on my incoming mail. Occasionally someone will address a letter to me, using a new stamp on the first day of its issue, which is cancelled across the face: "First Day Cover" letter to Members of Congress as a gesture of good will. One of his jobs

was making and keeping friends in Congress.

Since January, 1940, there have been issued 84 varieties of stamps, 27 of them in the 3 cent classification. Among the most interesting stamps issued in recent years from an educational standpoint was the series of 35 stamps issued in 1940, memorializing outstanding Americans in the different arts and sciences. The 3 cent Corrogiator stamp was one of the most expressive of the war.

The new 3 cent Army stamp is not so colorful as the Two Jima stamp, honoring the Marines. Very attractive in blue background is the 3 cent Navy Stamp which is just now getting into wide circulation. The new Coast Guard stamp will put in its appearance this week. The stamp honoring the Merchant Marine, to come later, will complete the Armed Forces Series.

For some unknown reason, the image of President Coolidge, the man who was so devoted to economy is on the \$5.00 stamp, the stamp of highest denomination.

During 1941, while I was serving on the Appropriations Subcommittee that handled appropriations for the Post Office Department, we effected a saving of \$100,000 annually by changing the 6 cent airmail stamp from a two color stamp of red and blue to a single color in red, thereby eliminating one operation in the printing of the stamp. The American people will use approximately twenty billion postage stamps in 1945.

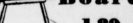

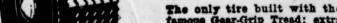

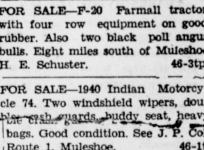
