ine outdoor living season is at hand. Here are six easy steps to help make your summer more enjoyable with a new concrete patio. If you're experienced, you can handle the job yourself. Other-wise relax and call your concrete contractor.




Step 1. PREPARE THE BASE - Select your patio area carethiny to be sure it's exactly when you want it. Stake out the area to help you visualize it., apparance. Remove the tulf and at least four inches of top soil. Compact loose soil with a tamper or heavy roller. Place a smooth, level one-inch layer of saud to provide firm, even support for your patio.

Step 2. SET THE FORMS -Your concrete patio can be laid out in almost any shape: square, circle, diamond, or free form. For a 4-inch thick slab. use 2x4 boards on edge, nailed to 1x2-inch stakes driven firmly into the ground. The top edge of the forms will be the surface grade of your patio. Be sure that water will drain properly.



Step 3. ORDER CONCRETE - After the base is prepared and forms set, call your local ready - mixed concrete dealer Tell him the size patio you are building and that you want to use concrete with 6 percent air-entrainment. He will deliver enough concrete to do the job Be sure to have enough help ready to place the concrete when it arrives. Wait until you are ready to place the concrete before calling the ready-mix company.

For best results keep it wet for at least six days after placing or cover it with a plastic film as shown here. Wet burlap or straw are equally good for curing. Your concrete patio should provide many seasons of enjoyment.

Boating Tips ... da McWilliams.

LANDING A FISH

Boating a fish is almost as difficult as catching one. Potential record breakers have become fiction rather breakers have become fiction rather than fact for many hapless anglers, so the fishing experts at Mercury outboards offer these tips to save a disappointing outing: first, select a long-handled net of sufficient size; never lurch or wave your arms unnecessarily when the fish gets close to the net; always put the net close to the net; always put the net in the water before the fish is brought into landing position, then pull him head first over it and lift; lift smoothly, and in one motion, bring the netted fish into the boat.






