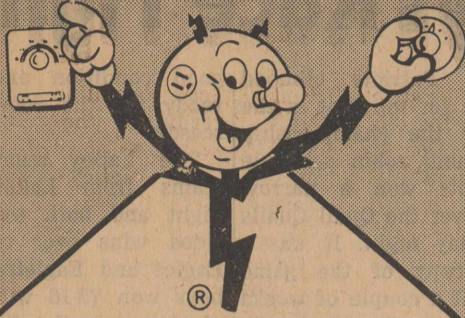
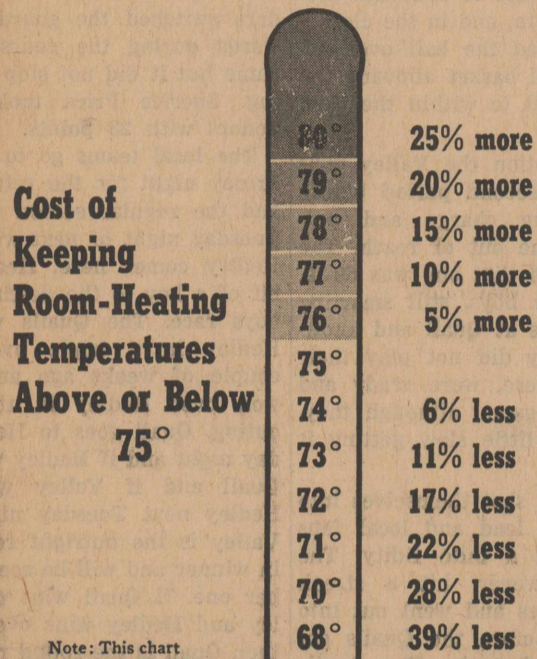

Campaign Goal Listed By Heart Association

The Briscoe County Heart Association has announced a 1976 campaign goal of \$1000. The Heart Fund drive will be conducted nationwide and in Briscoe County during February.

Mrs. Flute (Junis) Hutsell, Heart Fund Campaign Chairman, said the money collected will support research, educational and community programs sponsored by the Heart Association.

"The number of deaths caused by heart and blood vessel diseases — particularly heart attack and stroke — is overwhelming," Mrs. Hutsell said. "They claim over a million lives a year."

"The Heart Association is working to reduce these deaths. Research is unravelling some of the mysteries which eventually will lead to new methods of treatment and prevention and, hopefully, cures. Educational and community programs are being held here and across the country to make residents aware of heart disease and provide up-to-date, heart saving information." Mrs. Hutsell added that although the American Heart Association has scored major achievements in combating the nation's number one killer, more help is needed to reduce the death toll due to cardiovascular diseases.

Briscoe County's bicentennial tree has been planted on the yard of the Briscoe County courthouse in Silverton.

This bicentennial event was sponsored by the Briscoe County Historical Survey Committee, the Texas Forest Service and the Texas Forestry Association.

Known as "The Liberty Tree," the Texas pecan was donated by the Texas Forest Service, which is offering similar plantings to each county in the state.

The Texas pecan is a new variety which grows well throughout the state. "Liberty Tree" commemorative stamped postal envelopes are now being sold at the post offices.

The bicentennial pecan is called a liberty tree after the elm in colonial Boston, where the first act of public resistance occurred in 1765, the hanging in effigy of a stamp tax officer. The tree became a symbol of resistance to British rule and many towns planted or dedicated their own liberty trees.

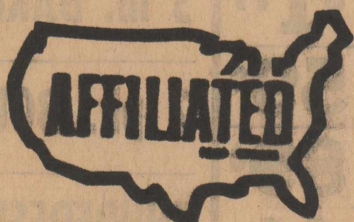

CLIMATE IS WARM IN HARRAL AUDITORIUM
No matter what the climate is outside Wayland Baptist College's Harral Auditorium this week, the inside will sway with tropical breezes carrying native tunes and the aroma of coconuts.
Harral Auditorium will be the setting for the recreation of Rodgers and Hammerstein's Broadway musical, "South Pacific." It will be presented by Wayland's Division of Fine Arts during the Homecoming weekend, February 12-14.
"South Pacific," which opened in 1949, is probably the most universally admired achievement of Rodgers and Hammerstein. In a realistic wartime setting, they created a warm, credible romance between a worldly French planter and a naive Army nurse from Little Rock, while managing to keep this somewhat idyllic relationship in perfect balance with the far-from-idyllic circumstances that brought them together.
The production will be under the direction of Roland Myers, professor of drama, and will be performed at :30 p.m. on February 12-13 and at 1:30 p.m. on February 14. Tickets will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students.
The cast will be headed by John Burke, sophomore, in the character of Emile de Bacque, a French planter who transplanted himself to an island in the South Pacific where he captures the heart of Army nurse Nellis Forbush, played by Carolyn Murphee, a junior. Thirty-nine other students will complete the cast.
