
"Advance architecture classes could probably use the studio to create web designs," Wilkin said.



NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A disc jockey has sued singer Kid Rock for \$575,000, claiming the entertainer punched him at an adult entertainment club in February.

Jerry Campos, of Cedar Hill, Tenn., is seeking \$500,000 in punitive damages and \$75,000 in compensatory damages in the lawsuit filed Monday in Circuit Court.

Nick Stern, a spokesman for Kid Rock, did not return a phone call Wednesday night seeking comment.


On Monday, the performer pleaded no contest to criminal assault and was given a suspended sentence of 11 months and 29 days in jail. He also was ordered to complete eight hours of anger management classes and pay \$180 to replace Campos' eyeglasses.

The suit claims the 34-year-old singer struck Campos, 30, on the left side of his face on Feb. 16, during a 3 a.m. altercation at Christie's Cabaret downtown.



Yankees, after dry spe

NEW YORK (AP) — Jason Giambi heard the boos, and yes, they hurt.

"I'm a human being," he said, admitting the harsh treatment was no "joy, especially when you're in your home ballpark."

At last, baseball's biggest enigma had the magic moment that eluded him and the Yankees all season. His two-run, 10thinning homer off Jose Mesa, a soaring drive into the right-field upper deck, gave New York a 7-5 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates on Wednesday night.

The evening began with the Yankees unveiling the design of the new ballpark they intend to build across the street. Giambi capped it off with the type of electric ending they hope to carry with them to the new Yankee Stadium.

"I have a feeling he's going to sleep a little bit better tonight," manager Joe Torre said. "I don't care how tough you are and how you think you can insulate yourself from hearing it, but for sure you hear it and you know it's going to take some kind of toll on you."

For much of baseball, Giambi has become Mr. Steroids, partly because of his public comments, a stark contrast to surly Barry

Bonds. Giambi all but said during I just haven't quite broke out of a February news conference that he told a federal grand jury in 2003 he had used performanceenhancing drugs and was taunted at times on the road.

While fans supported him at Legends Field during spring training and at Yankee Stadium when the season began, their impatience grew with every New York loss. When Mike Gonzalez struck him out with the potential tying run on second base in the eighth inning, the boos sounded even angrier than usual, added tonnage on a not-quite-asbroad back already sagging under the weight of expectations created by his \$120 million, seven-year contract.

"Deep inside, I want to get a hit as badly as they want me to get a hit," he said. "There's going to be nobody harder in this game on myself than myself. You just keep going, and you just know you can get that chance."

Since reporting to spring training, Giambi has worked with batting coach Don Mattingly to regain the swing that earned him the AL MVP in 2000. It seems he's spent almost as many hours signing autographs in an effort to gain the public's support.

Unlike many players, he cares what the paying customers think. He wants to be liked.

"I wanted to get a hit so bad those earlier at-bats," he said. "I've been getting my hits, but

it yet. I've been hitting the ball hard, but just not quite put it all together. Tonight, for one swing, I put it all together.'

He was mobbed by teammates after giving the Yankees their first win in 31 games this year when trailing after eight innings. New York captain Derek Jeter told Giambi during the 10th inning that he would be the one to win the game.

"You hope the fans will start cheering for him," Jeter said.

In the old days, Giambi would have been intentionally walked with a runner on second and one out in a tie game in the 10th

Even with the home run, he's hitting .243 with five homers and


19 RBIs. While those flamed-out numbers are a fraction of the 30-plus homer, 100-plus RBI seasons he had from 1999-03, they're Ruthian compared to where he was in early May, when his average dipped to .195 and the Yankees asked him to consider a trip to the minor leagues.

"We've been working for that one swing to try to get it going, and tonight it happened. So hopefully, it's more to come," he said. "It's been coming. I've been getting my hits, that's not been the question. I've been raising my average, getting my walks, taking my good at-bats. That's going to be a gradual process. I just wasn't clicking. Following an 11-19 start, their worst since 1966, they won 16 of 18 to move a seasonhigh six games over .500. Then they lost 11 of 14 before beating 'the Pirates twice this week - their first consecutive wins since taking five in a row from May 22-27.

Giambi hopes his 99th homer for the Yankees will spark a transformation. It was his third gameenough - in Milwaukee flew out to winner, his second for New York.




