





companies selling college degrees with no required coursework may sound like a tempting alternative.

Sites like this offer everything from college transcripts to doctoral degrees, utilizing what the site claims is a legal loophole from it could be immediate grounds for purchase is made, according one degree-granting institutions.

Tech staff-members said the degrees offered by sites like these hold little merit, especially when compared to degrees from an accredited institution like Texas Tech.

Dale Ganus, associate director in the Office of Admissions at Tech, said students trying to use their bought transcripts to gain credit for courses would run into problems.

"If they're not accredited they won't get anything here," he said. "That would probably be the same from any university in the country.'

The degrees offered from the Web site come from institutions that lack national accreditation, which, Ganus said, most schools do not accept coursework from when looking at a student's transcript.

Ganus said the legal loophole used by the site may simply be that the institutions have the right to produce the transcripts and degrees on whatever terms they want since the schools are not accredited.

"Basically what's happening is the student fills out all the information and sends it in, and they're going to create a transcript for the student," he said. "All they're doing is reproducing."

Bobbie Latham, an associate registrar at Tech, said that prospective students' transcripts from other institutions are checked thoroughly with help of Internet services.

"We check every single transcript that comes in with the higher educating body," she said. "We also have various Web sites we use to check for fraudulent credentials."

Latham also said that Tech disregards any coursework from unaccredited institutions.
