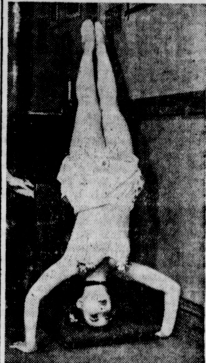

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

PROPOSING an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter. . . .

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS**  
SECTION 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article VI, and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

"SECTION 2a. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of the holding of any such election was, a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for any poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated.

"PROVIDED, however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy or Marine Corps; and provided further that all persons in the armed forces of the United States, or the component branches thereof, not members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy or Marine Corps, are hereby declared not to be disqualified from voting by reason of non-payment of subscription "fifth" of Section 1, of this Article."

"SEC. 2 The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 25, 1945, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following:

"FOR the amendment to article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch

or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service or of the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

"THOSE OPPOSED to such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"AGAINST the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamations relating to the publication of the foregoing Resolution, in the various counties of the state, and shall cause the same to be published as required by the statutes and the Constitution in connection with the submission of proposed amendments to the Constitution, to the people for their action at a statewide election. If it shall appear from the returns of the election at which the foregoing amendment to the Constitution is voted upon that a majority of the qualified voters have voted for said amendment, same shall then become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

SEC. 4. There is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay the expenses of advertising said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Sections 5a, 5b, 5c and 5d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 5a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide the payment of assistance to: (1) Needy persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are over the age of twenty-one (21) years and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

Section 1. That Sections 5a, 5b, 5c, and 5d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas

be amended and the same are hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be numbered 5a, which shall read as follows:

"SEC. 5a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and under other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature be deemed expedient for: assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5)

years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however that the amount of such assistance out of State Funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year."

Farm Building Is Now Possible

COLLEGE STATION—While most war-time restrictions on building homes and farm buildings may not be relaxed for months or even years there still are a number of improvements farm and ranch families may make now to protect their investments, to reduce depreciation, and to prevent more costly repairs later.

This list of possible repairs and alterations has been prepared by Mrs. Bernice Claylor, specialist in home improvement for the A. and M. College Extension Service. It included: Painting, outside and inside homes and farm buildings; papering, insulating and weatherstripping; replacing flashings, gutters and down spouts (where materials are available); repairing plumbing and heating appliances; recovering wire screens for windows and doors or vents—but not for porches.

It is also possible, to restore any damage from storms or any deterioration which has made a building unsafe, Mrs. Claylor says.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 PROPOSING an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas as so as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS**

SECTION 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"SECTION 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their

tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the

adjournment of any regular or called session."  
 SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office" and  
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

EACH voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

PROPOSING an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS**

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"ARTICLE 5. SEC. 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their terms of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

SEC. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members"; and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for

said election and have the same published and said election held on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

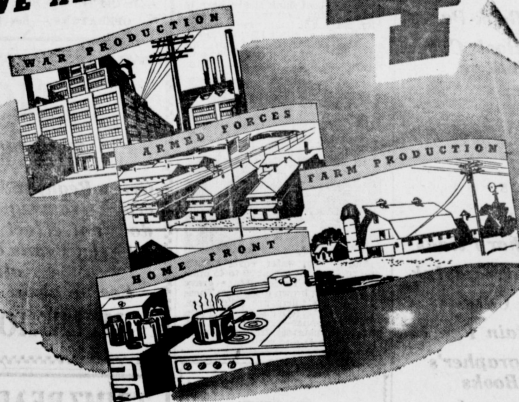

**No. 2 Potatoes Are Included In Price Support**

War Food Administration's 1945 price support program of early and intermediate Irish potatoes now include U. S. No. 2's, meeting 1-7/8 inch minimum requirements, and No. 1 size B grades, according to E. C. Munro, Acting District Representative, WFA's Office of Supply.

Before revision, price support applied only to U. S. No. 1 grade with differentials to potatoes grading not less than U. S. commercial and containing at least 30 percent of U. S. No. 1 quality, minimum of 1-7/8 inches. Potatoes grading 2's and B's were not included.

Now the support price for these two additional grades will be 50 percent of the basic price of U. S. No. 1 grade, which is \$2.30 in potato-growing counties of West Texas, Munro said. Basis is 100 pounds in new or renovated bags, sacked, inspected and loaded f. o. b. carrier in carlots. Price schedules otherwise have not changed, he continued.

Farmers offering potatoes to WFA will be required to offer all grades of a given lot, he said. U. S. No. 1 size B and U. S. No. 2 grades will not be acceptable for price support unless higher grades are offered with them, he explained.

Since the early crop now coming to market will not store satisfactorily, plans are being made to dehydrate or can all usable potatoes not needed for the armed forces and for feeding in liberated areas. Meanwhile, every effort is being made to use all potatoes for human food which are bought under the support price program, he said.

**Chicken QUERY CORNER**

How are Flank Steak Filets prepared?



Order a beef flank steak; have it scored lightly. Roll the steak crosswise, making a long, thin roll. Insert skewers at about 1 1/2-inch intervals and cut between them. Dip filets in flour. Brown slowly and thoroughly in 2 tablespoons hot lard

**Baby's Wash Needs Lukewarm Water, Plenty of Suds**



Woolens and flannels are the most difficult to wash because of shrinking. Much can be done to prevent shrinkage by following the rules of lukewarm water for washing and rinsing, with no wringing or twisting. Do not hang them on the line on a cold day.



Ironing of dresses, rompers and bibs should be done while the clothes are evenly damp. Rayon should be toned on the wrong side.



Baby's bonnets or caps may be dried to shape over a small bowl, preferably padded.

EVEN the most experienced home laundress approaches with misgivings the washing of baby's tiny garments which look so fragile, according to the Home Editor of Capper's Farmer. "But most baby things are more sturdy and serviceable than they appear and will give long-time usage under repeated washings if correctly handled," she writes in the Rural Home Department of the nationally-circulated farm magazine. "Baby's clothes should be washed as soon as they show the least sign of soil. Use lukewarm water and plenty of suds. Handle gently without twisting, pulling or rubbing. Stains should be taken care of before the garments are put into the suds. Sponge cod-liver oil and washable stains with carbon tetrachloride. Milk, egg and meat-juice spots on linen, lawn or cotton should be soaked in cold water. Stains from orange juice or prune juice may be treated by stretching the cloth tightly over a bowl and pouring on boiling water. Ordinary laundering methods usually will remove iodine stains if the garment is washed while stains are fresh."

**The Army Answers Your Questions**

Q. Our son was killed in action in France and buried there. Now that V-E Day has come, wouldn't it be possible to have his body brought back home?

A. The bodies of soldier dead buried outside the United States will not be brought back until action has ceased in all theaters of war. At that time the War Department will announce a plan for disinterment and the Quartermaster General will communicate with the next of kin of the deceased soldiers to ascertain if they wish to have the bodies returned.

Q. I understand that soldiers on pass or furlough are allowed to work at civilian jobs. Are there any restrictions on the types of work they can do?

A. The War Department policy is to encourage soldiers to use as much of their free time as they wish in essential war industries or agriculture. Employment which renders direct service to the general public is prohibited (trolley or taxicab drivers, store clerks, salesmen and waiters).

Q. My husband is an officer who has been in combat in Germany. Does the War Department policy for release of enlisted men from the service after V-E Day apply to him?

A. Only in part. Although officers will have adjusted service rating scores just as well enlisted men, this factor will be secondary, because officers have had more training, heavier responsibilities and have developed special skills and leadership capacity.

Q. Under the G. I. Bill of Rights, does the government loan a veteran money to buy a home, or is the loan made by a bank?

A. The loan is made by a bank. The government guarantees a portion of the loan and pays interest for one year on the portion it guarantees. Necessary papers for application for the government's guarantee are at the banks.

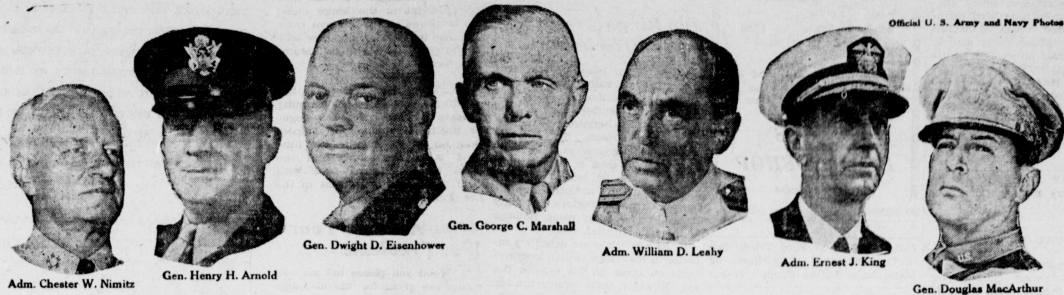

**DALLAS MAN MOVES HERE**

Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Walker, of Dallas are here for the summer months, living on their farm east of Muleshoe, heretofore the place has been devoted to vegetables but the year Walker is running row crop. They will likely return to Dallas in the fall.

**Jar Rings Are More Efficient**

Jar rings for home canning this year, through still made of synthetic and reclaimed rubber, will have better sealing quality generally and less tendency to impart off-flavors to food. This encouraging report comes as the result of cooperative tests of 1945 jar rings recently made by federal agencies and the jar ring industry. According to Grace L. Patterson, county home demonstration agent, findings of the tests in brief were:

1. New jar rings are definitely superior to 1943 rings and an improvement on those on the market last year. However, home canners are advised to continue last year's recommended practice of boiling rings 10 minutes in one quart of water containing one tablespoon of soda for each dozen rings and then rinsing in boiling water.
2. Black brown and red rings proved equally satisfactory. Color has no practical bearing on quality.

4. All jar rings in their cartons have a characteristic odor but this does not necessarily give a flavor to the foods canned.

Therefore smelling new rings is not a reliable test of whether or not they will impart off-flavor to foods.

**Army Answers Your War Problems**

Q. Would you please tell me how points are given for the discharge of soldiers?

A. To be eligible for discharge now a soldier must have at least 85 points. These points must have been earned before May 12, 1945 as follows: Service Credits—1 for each month of service since September 16, 1940. Overseas Credits—1 for each month of overseas service. Combat Credits—5 for each decoration, 5 for each bronze battle star (no credits given for theater of operations ribbons). Parenthood Credits—12 for each child under 18 (children above the number of 4778 and those born after May 12, 1945 may not be counted).

Q. My husband has been a second lieutenant for 17 months. His job calls for the rank he holds. Does this mean that as long as he is in this present position, he can't be promoted?

A. No. Any second lieutenant who completes 18 months service in that grade may be promoted to first lieutenant regardless of the grade allotted to his position, provided he is qualified for and worthy of promotion.

Q. I am a discharged soldier. I was 25 years and two months old when I was inducted. How much college training can I get under the GI Bill of Rights?

A. Since you were over 25 when inducted, you are eligible for one year of college. However, if induction interfered with your education, you may be eligible to an additional year of college for each year spent in the service.
