### Moussaoui jury has no verdict after Day 2

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — Jurors in the trial of Zacarias Moussaoui completed their second day of deliberations Tuesday without deciding whether the Sept. 11 conspirator should receive a death sentence or life in prison.

They went home after working 6 3/4 hours, bringing their total deliberations over two days to 9 3/4 hours. They will return Wednesday morning.

Earlier in the day, they asked for but were denied a dictionary.

Judge Leonie Brinkema told them that sending a dictionary in would be like adding evidence in the case, but she invited them to come back if they had questions about specific definitions. They asked no additional questions Tuesday.

### 30 arrests made in Egypt resort attack

DAHAB, Egypt (AP) — Egyptian authorities, already struggling with elusive terror cells in the rugged Sinai Peninsula, moved quickly Tuesday — arresting 30 men in the triple bombings that ripped apart a crowded resort town, killing 24 on a tranquil holiday evening.

Many frightened tourists fled Sinai coastal resorts where two previous bomb attacks — like the Dahab blasts — bore the hallmarks of al-Qaida-linked groups that appear to have a free hand to continue operations in the barren, backward and extremely rugged Sinai Peninsula.

Egyptian authorities appeared increasingly frustrated by the ease with which terrorists continue to hit the country's vital tourism industry.

# Iraq terror chief shows his face

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Terror mastermind Abu Musab al-Zarqawi revealed his face for the first time Tuesday in a dramatic video in which he dismissed Iraq's new government as an American "stooge" and called it a "poisoned dagger" in the heart of the Muslim world.

The video, in which he also warned of more attacks to come, was posted on the Internet only days after a breakthrough in Iraq's political process allowing its Shiite, Sunni and Kurdish leaders to start assembling a government.

It also followed a high-profile audiotape from Osama bin Laden and seemed a deliberate attempt by al-Zarqawi to reclaim the spotlight following months of taking a lower profile amid criticism of bombings against civilians. It was his first message since January.

A U.S. counterterrorism official, speaking on condition of anonymity in compliance with office policy, said analysts believe al-Zarqawi is







How well do students know their rights? Surprisingly and disappointingly, not very well.

A majority of students don't know everything the First Amendment entails, or, worse, believe it gives us too much protection. Ironic, is it not? According to MS-NBC, when students were enlightened as to the exact text of the First Amendment, one in three thought the amendment went "too" and you have the right to a hearing. far" concerning the rights it guarantees, giving people too much leverage.

Lack of familiarity with your rights becomes a problem when dealing with any form of authority or law enforcement. We are taught at a young age that we should always be honest. You absolutely have the right to know the officer's information, and should take note of the name and badge number.

We have to take full responsibility for our education and bills and an endless amount of other things as college students. Everyone is entitled to due process under the Fourteenth Amendment. This means you, as a student, have the right to be treated fairly by people in positions of authority. If you are in danger of being suspended from school, you have the right to know the exact charges that you are facing

# More than 400,000 port workers to undergo terror background checks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Answering the Bush administration said Tuesday it will conduct background checks on an estimated a terrorist threat.

Names of employees who work in the most sensitive areas of ports will be matched against government terror watch lists and immigration databases, Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff said. Additionally, the Homeland Security Department will issue tamper-resistant identification cards to roughly 750,000 workers — including truckers — that enter the United States at seaports. and rail employees — who have unrestricted access to ports.

The announcement drew tepid praise from Rep. Bennie G. Thompson, D-Miss., the top Democrat on the House Homeland Security

"I find the timing of this announcement very convenient seeing as Congress is considering a port security bill tomorrow," said Thompson, who also said Homeland Security should have issued the ID cards three years ago. "It appears that DHS steps up to the plate to protect our national security only when the cameras are rolling and the whole world is watching."

The added scrutiny will not immediately include a criminal background check for workers, although Chertoff said that might happen in the future. The Transportation Security Adthe background checks, he said.

The Bush administration has been under 400,000 port workers to ensure they do not pose fire for months about what critics call gaping holes in security measures at ports, which were highlighted after a Dubai company's purchase of a British firm gave it control of six American ports. An outcry in the Congress led the Dubai company, DP World, to decide to sell the U.S. operations to an American firm.

Democrats have lambasted Homeland Security for failing to screen and inspect all cargo

At a separate news conference earlier, Democrats pushed for legislation by Sen. Robert Menendez, D-N.J., which would provide \$185 million more in port security funding as part of a massive spending bill the Senate is considering. That legislation also would require that Homeland Security submit a plan to Congress laying out how it would accomplish 100 percent scanning of cargo containers within five years.

Homeland Security treats port security like a "neglected stepchild," said Sen. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y.

Chertoff bristled at the suggestion that port security is not a priority. He said the administration has proposed up to \$9 billion in spending to protect ports through the Coast Guard, Customs and Border Protection and state grants.

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Duke University lacrosse player charged with raping a stripper in North Carolina was ordered Tuesday to stand trial in Washington on an unrelated assault charge from last fall.

The assault charge against Collin Finnerty, 19, could have been dismissed if he completed 25 hours of community service and stayed out of trouble, but a Washington judge decided his arrest in the rape case violated that agreement.

Finnerty and two friends are accused of punching a man after he told them to "stop calling him gay and other derogatory names, according to court documents.

Finnerty remains free pending a July 10 trial in the Washington case. He could get up to six months in jail and a fine of up to \$1,000 if convicted of simple assault.

Judge John Bayly also set a 9 p.m. curfew, ordered him to report by phone to court officials every Friday, and required that he stay
