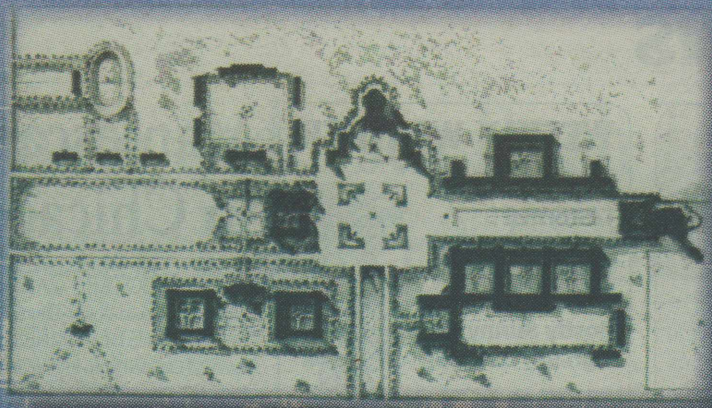


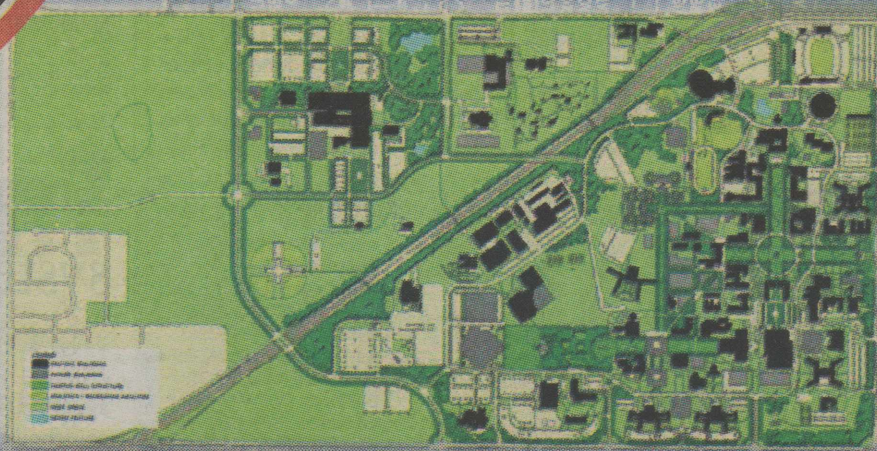
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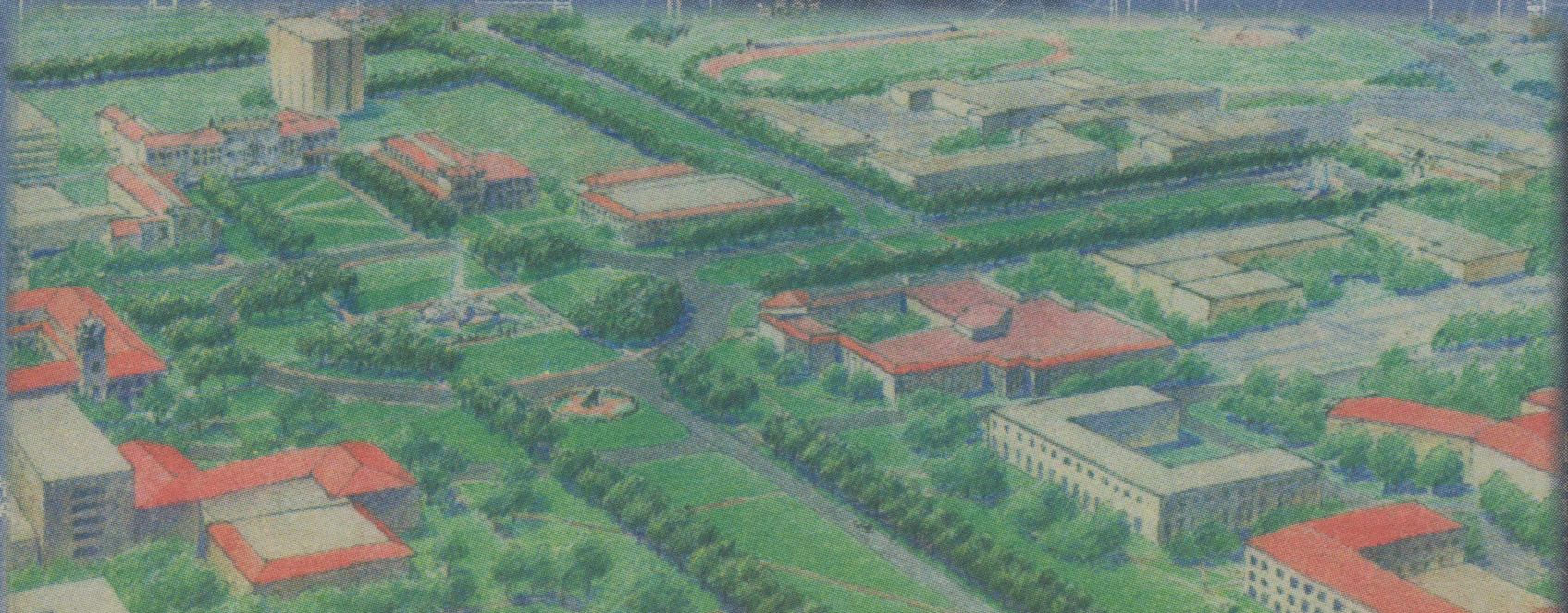

Man escapes in Chicago

CHICAGO (AP) — A federal courthouse was locked down Thursday and the courtrooms sealed after officials announced a man had escaped from U.S. marshals inside the building.

Officials announced over intercoms that they were searching floor-by-floor. It wasn't immediately clear if the man was armed.

Larnell Rogers, who was accused of lying to an ATF agent and scheduled to appear in court, fled after learning a warrant had been issued for his arrest, U.S. Marshals spokesman Kim Widup said. Authorities instructed court officials to lock all doors in the Everett M. Dirksen Federal Building "out of an abundance of caution," Widup said.

U.S. missile defense limited, rejects talk of pre-emptive strike

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — The United States said Thursday that a U.S. missile-defense system under development has "limited operational capability" to protect against weapons such as the long-range missile North Korea is said to be near firing.

National Security Adviser Stephen Hadley underscored U.S. calls for North Korea to abandon any plans for testing the missile believed capable of reaching U.S. soil.

"We're watching it very carefully and preparations are very far along," Hadley said when asked about South Korea's assessment that a launch was not imminent.

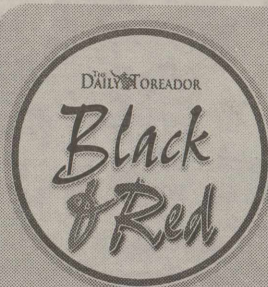
"So you could, from a capability standpoint, have a launch," Hadley said. "Now what they intend to do — which is what a lot of people are trying to read — of course we don't know. What we hope they will do is give it up and not launch."

Troubled NO criminal justice system struggles to rebound

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The criminal justice system was ravaged by Hurricane Katrina. The courthouse was flooded. Files were ruined, evidence contaminated. Judges and lawyers lost their offices and homes. Witnesses and victims fled for their lives.

Ten months later, this vision of legal hell is slowly being cleared away. Judges are back in court and trials have begun.

It's going to take much longer to fix a system whose long-neglected flaws were ruthlessly exposed by Katrina.

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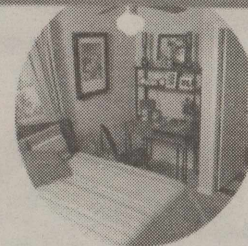
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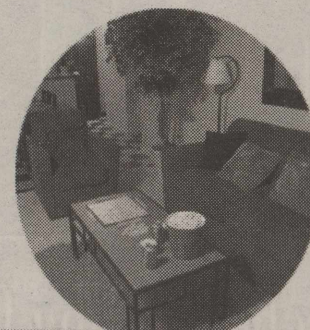
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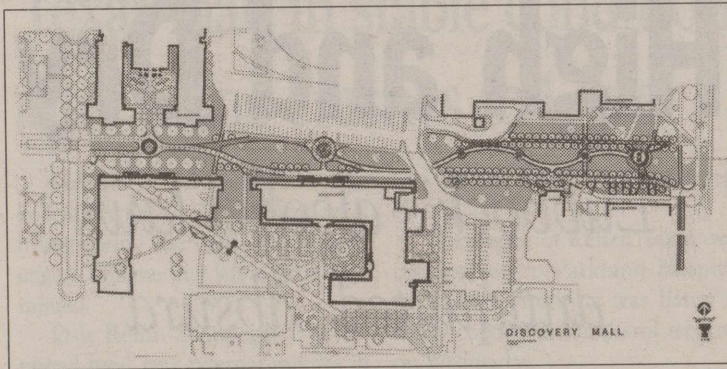

Construction at Tech to accommodate a more pedestrian-friendly campus

In an attempt to solidify a more pedestrian-friendly environment for Texas Tech students and faculty, Facilities Planning and Construction has slated three projects to improve that atmosphere around campus.

Those who have walked near Pfluger Fountain within the past week may have witnessed workers eliminating the fully matured trees around Memorial Circle and the planting of their younger replacements in the four quadrants of the circle.

This project, along with the Scholarship Donor Recognition Walk, is among the three projects that are currently under renovation, with the third being the Discovery Mall. These projects are what the facilities committee envisioned when they had the campus master plan adopted by the Board of Regents in November of 1997.

The 2006 senior graduating class, with aid of the Student Government Association, donated 80 Oak trees for planting at Memorial Circle. The oaks replace the Siberian Elms previously inhabiting the circle because the elm trees have been ravaged from inclement weather and disease throughout the years.

"What's happened is that the trees that were there over the years have either had disease and were removed," said Theresa Drowell, as-

sociate vice chancellor of Facilities Planning and Construction. "Because they are kind of a weak wood tree, that all of our windstorms that we've had and the ice storms that we've had over the last 20 years, have really hurt those trees."

Drowell said the oaks should create a canopy of shade over the quadrants in the circle and eventually add a fall, rustic feel — a setting she said the circle has yet to provide.

"I really think that as they mature, they are going to create a beautiful canopy," Drowell said. "They are going to create a beautiful shaded space that people can enjoy, and over time, we'll be able to get benches in there where people can sit and read or visit with someone."

Included with the tree restoration, the Scholarship Walk is currently being constructed at the south edge of Memorial Circle. The walk will be a path of granite bands with the engraved names of the donors who aided the project funding.

"Here at the Administration Building, when you walk across the street toward the circle, right there at that point, up to the Pfluger Fountain

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Senate endorses Bush Iraq policy, rejecting Democrats' withdrawal plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The GOP-controlled Senate gave an election-year endorsement to President Bush's Iraq policy on Thursday, soundly rejecting Democratic demands to withdraw troops from the three-year-old war that has grown increasingly unpopular.

Vice President Dick Cheney criticized the Democrats' position, saying on CNN, "Absolutely the worst possible thing we could do at this point would be to validate and encourage the terrorists by doing exactly what they want us to do, which is to leave."

But Senate Democratic leader Harry Reid of Nevada said, "Demanding a change of course is not irresponsible. It's not unpatriotic. It is the right thing to do." He criticized Bush and Republicans in Congress as being "content with no plan and no end in sight."

The administration has repeatedly said that U.S. troops will stay in Iraq until Iraqi security forces can defend the country against a lethal insurgency that rose up after the 2003 U.S.-led invasion toppled

Saddam Hussein.

In back-to-back votes, the Senate agreed with the president and turned back two Democratic proposals to begin withdrawing most of the 127,000 American forces in the war zone.

The first, offered by Sen. John Kerry and supported by 12 other Democrats but no Republicans, would have required the administration to start pulling troops out by year's end. It also would have set a deadline of July 2007 for all combat forces to leave.

"Redeploying United States troops is necessary," said Kerry, D-Mass.

Most senators didn't agree, and the proposal fell on a 86-13 vote.

Minutes later, the Senate defeated by 60-39 a resolution to urge the administration to begin "a phased redeployment of U.S. forces" sometime this year. The resolution would not have set a deadline for the end of the U.S. presence in Iraq.

That vote was largely along party lines.

Siding with all but one Republican were six Democrats — Sens. Mark Dayton of Minnesota, Mary Landrieu

of Louisiana, Mark Pryor of Arkansas, and three running for re-election this fall: Joe Lieberman of Connecticut, Bill Nelson of Florida and Ben Nelson of Nebraska.

Sen. Lincoln Chafee, who also is in the midst of a difficult re-election campaign, was the only Republican supporter of the resolution.

Despite the Democratic defections, Reid said his rank-and-file were united. "Every Democrat agrees that the direction of the war in Iraq must change, and change now," he said.

Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist of Tennessee, for his part, said Democrats backed "cut and run" plans for surrender. "The Senate defeated a bad policy that threatens our national security and poses unacceptable risks to Americans," Frist said.

The maneuvering occurred on a \$517 billion military measure that the Senate later passed 96-0.

At a Pentagon briefing, the top U.S. commander in Iraq said he expected reductions in U.S. forces this year but did not agree with congressional efforts to put a timetable on the effort.

Making sense of Texas toll debate

(U-WIRE) AUSTIN — The debate over Central Texas toll roads consists of a whole lot of pandering with a dash of shrieking, and the main reason the debate has sunk so low is the influence of the Austin Toll Party and its founder, Sal Costello.

While citizens ought to be engaged in transportation planning, they ought also to act with reason and thoughtfulness, consider arguments about costs and benefits, and refrain from inane attacks. The Austin Toll Party has failed to do any of this. Instead, it has added confusion and mischaracterization to the issue and has fed off knee-jerk reactions to sustain its ill-advised agenda. Costello would have you believe that among the freedoms that Travis and Bowie died for is the right to drive anywhere across the state without having to toss in a nickel.

The Toll Party has managed to align disparate groups of voters, including anti-tax conservatives and pro-environment liberals. It has done this by creating a unified issue — being anti-toll-roads — through confounding two separate issues — being anti-toll and being anti-roads. Both issues have their merits but should be addressed separately.

Good reasons for being anti-roads include the environmental impact of laying more concrete, and the potential for corruption and sweetheart deals to donors or relatives of policymakers. The Toll Party even throws a bone by saying it doesn't oppose "traditional" toll roads, only the new-fangled monstrosities called "double-tax tolls."

That's hard to believe. Would they have the same level of support opposing the Trans Texas Corridor if it was a freeway instead of a tollway? Where was their opposition over the I-35/Ben

White interchange, a project with loads of concrete and a potential boondoggle to builders, but one that had the good fortune of not being tolled? No opposition this shrill has arisen over any non-toll roads in the past. By leeching off of the anti-roads sentiment, the Austin Toll Party is mischaracterizing its true aim of trying to avoid having to pay tolls on highways, wherever they are or however they are built.

Framing the debate as being just anti-toll instead of also anti-road would help the Austin Toll Party, since there are plenty of good arguments against tolling roads. Toll roads are likely to be regressive, since the poor will have to pay just as much as the rich to drive. The Toll Party, though, prefers to focus on the argument that tolls are a "double tax," despite the fact that this argument is so much baloney it hurts me every time I hear it.

Lubbock's alcohol laws antiquated, absurd

It may come as a surprise that Lubbock is known to some for the unique wine that comes from this region. Of course, Lubbockites aren't actually allowed to drink the stuff, heaven forbid — at least we're not allowed to buy a bottle inside the city limits.

In fact, despite the award-winning wine industry in these parts, Lubbock is the largest city in the U.S. to not allow packaged alcohol sales inside the city limits.

These prohibition-reminiscent laws steeped in the belief that alcohol is sinful and generally bad for society are just one more example of government trying to control what we can and cannot do as individuals. Worse, they are ineffective at making our roads any safer, and are basically just plain ridiculous.

I mean seriously, what kind of city thinks it's OK to sell firearms but not a bottle of white wine to cook chicken piccata with?

In a recent study of 39,000 alcohol-related accidents in Kentucky published in Accidents, Analysis and Prevention, analysts found that residents of dry counties were actually more likely to be involved in alcohol-related traffic accidents. The study concluded that prohibiting alcohol within city or county limits does not improve traffic safety.

One possible reason for this is that when people drive farther from their homes to get alcohol, the chance of exposure to impaired driving increases.

This makes sense when you think about it; how many alcoholics do you know that are: A) deterred whatsoever by the 20-minute drive to the Strip to get

alcohol, or B) will actually wait 20 minutes to finish driving home before they kick a beer back?

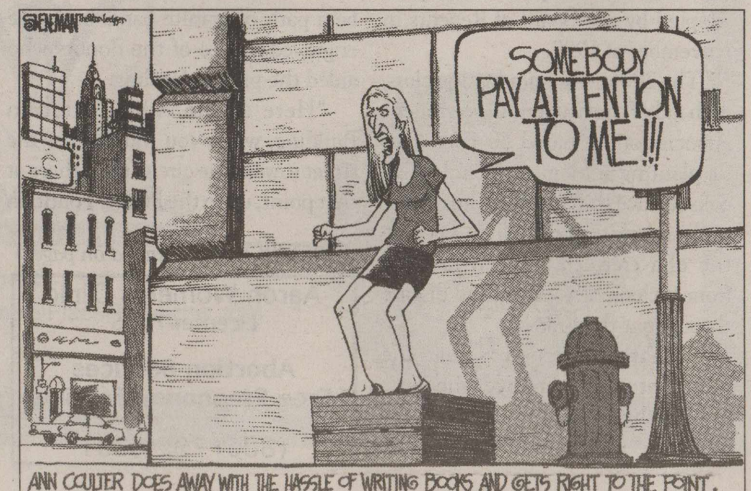
What are city legislators afraid might happen if people were actually allowed to buy a six-pack or a bottle of wine at the grocery store? Some people are truly shocked at the very idea of having an alcohol aisle next to the chips.

It's as if people truly believe that by allowing people to buy alcohol inside the city rather than outside, we will create a sinful society full of beggars and drunks. They believe that somehow, if we can just keep alcohol beyond the city limits, the world will be a better place.

In fact, though, there are entire continents (Europe for example) where wine is almost as popular as Coca-Cola as the beverage of choice, and numerous cities (like Dallas, Odessa and Austin for example) all allow people to pick up some alcohol along with their eggs and bread.

Shockingly, these places are somehow just as wholesome and clean as Lubbock. The only difference is they're just a little bit freer.

Texas man in stable condition after plane crashes in Okla.

MARIETTA, Okla. (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration is investigating the crash of a single-engine airplane that left a Texas man injured.

Dale Robin Spannagel, 39, sustained head and external injuries in the Tuesday night accident north of the McGehee Airstrip near Marietta, the Oklahoma Highway Patrol reported.

As Spannagel was taking off from the airstrip, the 1965 Cessna 172 fixed wing plane he was piloting failed to

gain altitude and struck a tree, troopers said.

Spannagel, of Keller, Texas, was transported to Parkland Hospital in Dallas, where he was listed in stable condition, the patrol reported on Wednesday.

Douglas Richard, a passenger from Haslet, Texas, was treated at a Marietta hospital and released.

The FAA's Oklahoma City Flight Standards district office will investigate the crash, officials said.

Galveston officer indicted after woman says he attacked her

GALVESTON (AP) — A Galveston police officer has been indicted on aggravated kidnapping charges after he was accused of taking a woman to a secluded area of a beach, handcuffing her and forcing her to perform sex acts.

Kenneth Deshun Woods, 27, has been placed on administrative leave without pay following his arrest last week and his

indictment Wednesday.

The 43-year-old woman told police she was sitting in her parked car on Galveston's East Beach about 4:30 a.m. May 27 when a police officer in uniform drove up in his patrol car. According to police reports, the officer drove her to a secluded area of the beach, handcuffed her and forced her to perform unspecified sex acts.

Perry requests drought relief

AUSTIN (AP) — Ten of 24 Texas counties hit by drought conditions this year are still awaiting word on disaster relief assistance from federal officials, state officials said Thursday.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has already approved

assistance for the other 14 counties, a news release from Gov. Rick Perry's office said. The pending requests are for Dimmit, Duval, Kenedy, Kleberg, La Salle, Live Oak, Mason, McMullen, Nolan and Pecos counties.

The agriculture department has

approved assistance for Armstrong, Bosque, Brewster, Calhoun, Frio, Gillespie, Hamilton, Johnson, McLennan, Oldham, Potter, Runnels, Taylor and Terrell counties.

In 2005, the USDA approved assistance for all but nine of Texas' 254 counties.

Friedman, Strayhorn on ballot as independents

AUSTIN (AP) — Maverick candidates for governor Kinky Friedman and Carole Keeton Strayhorn got the news they'd been waiting for Thursday — that they each collected enough voter signatures to make the November election ballot.

The announcement by Texas Secretary of State Roger Williams sets up a historic four-way race for the fall election with the two independents, Republican Gov. Rick Perry and Democrat Chris Bell.

The last independent candidate elected Texas governor was Sam Houston in 1859.

Both Strayhorn and Friedman turned in far more petition names than the 45,540 required by the May 11 deadline.

The signatures had to be from registered Texas voters who did not cast ballots in the Republican or Democratic primaries this spring. Strayhorn submitted some 223,000 signatures, and Friedman submitted 169,574.

Both campaigns acknowledged some signatures probably

wouldn't hold up during verification but predicted they would have enough to make the ballot. Those signing the independents' petitions could only sign for one of the two candidates.

The Texas Secretary of State's Office began making final checks of the signatures Monday after the petition names were entered into an electronic database by the private firm TELA Technologies.

State election officials cross-checked to make sure none were duplicated on both petitions. They also checked to see if the names are on voter registration rolls and determined whether the voters cast primary ballots.

Earlier this year, Strayhorn sued the secretary of state claiming that his plan for examining the signatures individually was discriminatory. Strayhorn's campaign wanted state election officials to do a faster statistical sampling of signatures, in which only a portion of the total names would have to be scrutinized.

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7 Marines, 1 sailor charged with murdering Iraqi man

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (AP)— The wife of one of seven Marines charged along with a sailor with premeditated murder in the shooting death of an Iraqi man said Thursday that her husband was shocked by the allegations.

"He's just a great person, a great father, a great husband and a great Marine. His being in prison doesn't make any sense," Erica Thomas told CBS's "The Early Show."

She said her husband, Marine Cpl. Trent D. Thomas, sounded scared at first and had been going through a roller coaster of emotions.

"It's been a rough two or three years for him, but he's a tough guy and I know we'll get through this," she said.

Thomas and the other servicemen were charged Wednesday in the death of Hashim Ibrahim Awad, who was pulled from his home and shot while U.S. troops hunted for insurgents. They could face the death penalty if convicted.

All eight also were charged with kidnapping. Other charges include conspiracy, larceny and providing false official statements.

Col. Stewart Navarre, chief of staff for Marine Corps Installations West, announced the charges at Camp Pendleton Marine Corps base, where the eight are being held. The troops are members of the Pendleton-based 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines Regiment.

The case is separate from the alleged killing by other Marines of 24 Iraqi civilians in the western Iraqi city of Haditha last November. A pair of investigations related to

that case are still under way, and no criminal charges have been filed.

The U.S. military in Iraq announced that murder charges were filed against a fourth Army soldier in the shooting deaths May 9 of three civilians who had been detained by U.S. troops.

Some or all of the troops being held at Camp Pendleton could face the death penalty, though Navarre said "it's far too early to speculate on that right now."

Lt. Gen. John Sattler, the senior commander at Pendleton, will decide whether and how to proceed with preliminary hearings known in the military justice system as Article 32 proceedings. That in turn could lead to courts-martial for some or all of the men.

All eight have hired private attorneys and also have been given military defense lawyers.

The Pentagon began investigating shortly after Awad was killed April 26 in Hamdania, west of Baghdad.

A charging document provided to The Associated Press by Jane Siegel, an attorney for Marine Pfc. John J. Jodka, alleges that the Iraqi was shot by five of the Marines and that an AK-47 assault rifle was placed in the victim's hands, apparently to make it appear he was an insurgent.

A senior Pentagon official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the matter publicly, has said a shovel was also planted at the scene to make it appear the man was trying to plant an explosive device.

will be the Scholarship Walk," Drewell said. "It's a very wide walk and it's brick and concrete and granite. It will have some lights on the pathway on both sides."

The Discovery Mall is an east/west corridor, linking the engineering key with the clock tower at the Grover E. Murray Residence Hall. The north/south corridor will link the Carpenter Wells and Murray complexes with the English and Philosophy buildings.

"So what that does is just continue that pedestrian feel to the campus, get the pedestrians out of the way of cars, just reduce the conflict," Drewell said. "We're trying to provide the bicycle paths and everything along with this program. Some of it takes a little bit more time as money becomes available, but the intention is that the students and faculty can traverse across the campus in a safe manner."

These three projects are part of a four-project bid for the Tech campus, with the fourth being the construction of the Memorial Garden on the northeast side of the Preston Smith Library on the Health Sciences Center campus.

Combined, the four projects cost \$673,000. The tree-planting project, with a cost of \$70,000 and the Scholar-

ship Walk with a cost of \$130,000, began June 6 and are scheduled for an Oct. 3 completion date. The Discovery Mall, costing \$332,000, is to begin July 6 with a completion date set for Jan. 2. The HSC Memorial Garden, with a cost of \$141,000, is set to start Aug. 5 with its completion March 3.

Drewell said the cost of these projects will not add additional fees toward tuition because all the funds were donated to the university.

With the completion of these projects, Drewell said she feels the campus is on the right track to creating a safer venue for pedestrians in the future, and that the campus will provide a more studious and memorable atmosphere for current and prospective students.

"I know everybody's upset about seeing the trees coming down," the vice chancellor said. "I hope they realize that with what we're planning that we're not just tearing them down, we're planting something to replace, and a lot more of them, and really, we're building upon the history and the heritage of the university."

"As they grow, they'll come to realize that it's a good thing. I think it's the right path. I think the university has a great vision for the future of the campus, to provide the facilities and the environment that allows the students to study and get their degree, and move on in life."

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Jury selection beginning in Yates retrial

HOUSTON (AP) — Some of the 120 potential jurors in the second murder trial of Andrea Yates questioned the state's legal definition of insanity Thursday as jury selection began.

Several said they disagreed with the insanity defense in general. The suburban Houston woman who drowned her five children in the family bathtub five years ago this week is once again pleading innocent by reason of insanity.

State district Judge Belinda Hill began the proceedings by questioning the jury pool as a group, and attorneys were to begin individual questioning in the afternoon.

Yates, wearing a dark blue flowered dress, stood after her defense team was introduced to the jury pool, smiled slightly and quietly said, "Good morning," before sitting down. She sat quietly throughout the morning, frequently gazing toward the judge.

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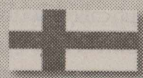
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At least 'Fast' lives up to name

Thankfully "The Fast and the Furious: Tokyo Drift" lives up to its name. The film is only a little over an hour and a half long.

The second sequel to the 2001 racing film plays like a porno for car enthusiasts. It's loud with Kid Rock music serenading race scenes, and in the end is about as intelligent as the people who gather in front of a television every Sunday to watch a shiny car go around in circles for four hours.

Universal Studios just does not know when to stop beating a dead horse. They're stretching the "Bring it On" franchise into a third film, but unlike the brainless cheerleading film, "The Fast and the Furious" is getting the grand treatment of being unveiled in theaters instead of direct-to-video.

Justin Lin directs the film and though he has mild talent, the movie serves one purpose, action. I love action movies. A new type of racing rules the street scene in Tokyo: drifting. It's where the

car drifts out of control for turns. Americans call it fishtailing.

Black gets drawn into this world and gets into a love triangle with the wrong person. Sound familiar? Why does the main character always have to get into a love triangle? Why can't he just drop the girl and pick up one of the million other Japanese girls hanging all over him?

There are a lot of questions this movie raises. When will Zachery Ty Bryan ("Home Improvement") stop playing a high school student? Since when did "off the hook" become a reason for doing dangerous things? And why is it that not one police officer shows up the entire time they are racing in Tokyo?

The movie, hopefully, will serve as the end of the franchise; sort of like a rotten cherry on top of melted ice cream.

Musicians fill air with sounds from the streets of New Orleans, jazz

The dampened canal-like streets of New Orleans may be hundreds of miles away, but the sounds that have made the region popular filled the Lubbock air Thursday night.

Twenty musicians, including Texas Tech professor Alan Shinn, performed in the 23rd Annual Jazz Festival at Tech.

"Jazz is truly America's music," Shinn said.

The music that was born in the United States never will be as popular as some other mainstream music, Shinn said, but in Lubbock, the sound has formed a following.

"I think once you hear good jazz you're taken to it," Shinn said.

The festival, which is based around the summer music program at Tech, was held in the Hemmle Recital Hall on campus. However, for future jazz festivals, such as the music department's larger, all-day festival in the spring, Shinn is looking at area theaters for a suitable venue.

The summer time recital typically does not bring in many guest performers, if any at all, but on Thursday night, Reggie Thomas joined the Tech musicians on the piano.

Thomas, who has a CD out now called *Ivories on the Avenue*, won second place in 1994 for the Ameri-

can Jazz Piano Competition.

"We put on the concert for Tech and the local community," Shinn said.

One thing he has noticed throughout the years is a steady increase in jazz from the Lubbock citizens.

"I think (Lubbock citizens) are just looking for something else," Shinn said.

Brad Leali, director of jazz studies at Tech, said putting on the concert is extremely important because it is a way for the jazz department to connect with the community.

"I think people enjoy good music," he said.

The concert, which consisted of three sets, each set being about 35 minutes long, is a way for the Tech jazz program to simply entertain the community, Leali said.

The department did not charge admission to the event, they never do, and in the end as long as the people had a good time, then Shinn and Leali knew they did a good job.

Both men performed along with the big band during the concert.

Leali said one of his main goals for the evening was to get as many people as possible out to the festival.

The department puts on five jazz festivals every year, and in the spring, Shinn is hoping to bring more mainstream artists to perform.

Lowe gets approval for dream Montecito estate

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — Rob Lowe narrowly won approval from planners for a massive dream estate on his \$8.5 million Montecito lot despite a neighbor's complaint the mansion would spoil his panoramic

ocean view.

"I've always been a big believer in the process. I'm obviously pleased with the outcome," the 42-year-old former star of "The West Wing" said after Wednesday's 3-2 vote by the Montecito Planning Commission.

The vote came after a daylong commission debate over whether the proposed 14,260-square-foot estate would overwhelm the Picacho Lane neighborhood, which is also home to mystery writer Sue Grafton.

Lowe's proposal calls for a 24-foot-high privacy hedge that would screen the estate from neighbor Fred Gluck, former head of the international consulting firm McKinsey & Co. Gluck said the hedge would partially block views of the Pacific.

Seals, Rumph commit to Lady Raiders, Curry

Kristy Curry has spiced up the start of the Lady Raiders 2007-08 season with her first commitments as coach.

South Plains College Lady Texans' Dominic Seals and Alana Rumph orally committed last week to play for Curry and the Red Raiders.

Seals, a 6-foot-2 post from Dallas, committed and signed with Tech originally during her senior season at Lincoln High School, but because of her grades, opted for the junior college route in Levelland.

But Seals said she wanted to stick with her first commitment, despite thoughts of transferring to Louisiana Tech. After the departure of Marsha Sharp and the hiring of Curry, Seals said her high school coach told her that Curry was an acceptable coach to play for, so she made her decision to stick with Tech.

"If you commit to something, stay with it," Seals said. "Plus, I wanted to stay in Texas. I was going to go to Louisiana Tech, but then they had some issues with other schools, so Tech was all the way."

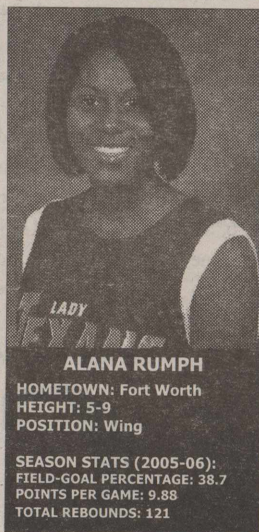
Rumph, a 5-foot-9 wing from Keller Fossil Ridge in Fort Worth, said she admires the atmosphere the Big 12 brings to the collegiate level, and because of her admiration for Curry, she said it will be the best opportunity for her to play.

"I like Coach Curry a lot," Rumph said. "I've always wanted to play in the Big 12. It's a good opportunity, for me to play at Tech, because they are in the Big 12."

The two teammates, in their first season at South Plains, helped the Lady Texans finish 25-6 en route to an appearance in the regional final.

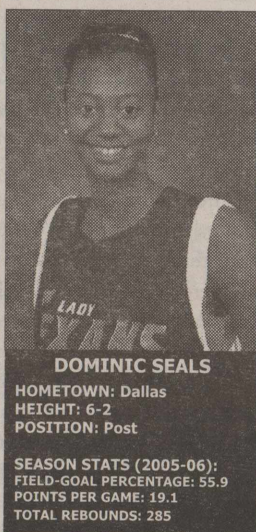
Seals led the Lady Texans with 19.1 points and 9.2 rebounds per game. She also shot 55.9 percent from the field and blocked 56 shots — all team highs. She finished the 2005-06 season with First-Team All Conference accolades in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference and with a spot on the Region V All-Region Team. Seals started all 31 games for the Lady Texans.

After her stellar freshman season, Seals said she was recruited by several other Division I institutions including Big 12 foes

Oklahoma and Oklahoma State.

Rumph, an honorable mention for the All-Conference Team, averaged 9.9 points and 4.5 rebounds per game while shooting 38.7 percent from the field in 25 games.

The two each said the transition to Division I and the Big 12 will be easier since they are current teammates and have built chemistry.

"Well, I think that both of us will become better players," Rumph said. "It'll be easier because we already have chemistry. We'll be going to a bigger school and already know one another and be able to help each other out."

"Things should be positive between us," Seals said. "It's just that when we go over there, well just over there and handle our business."

The two will not be official Lady Raiders until they each sign a letter of intent. They will have their chance to do so during an early signing day period in November.

Raiders put on watch list

Sixteen athletes from nine Big 12 schools, including two Red Raiders, have been named to two 2006 NCAA football preseason watch lists.

Tech senior offensive lineman Manuel Ramirez is among the 54 athletes named in the preseason list for the Outland Trophy — awarded at the end of each collegiate football regular season to either the best offensive or defensive lineman.

Senior defensive end/linebacker Keyunta Dawson received preseason accolades for the Bronco Nagurski Trophy, which is awarded to the top defensive player in the nation. Fifty-six athletes from around the country were included in the Nagurski watch list.

According to a press release by the Football Writer's Association of America, the Outland Trophy

has been awarded to the top offensive or defensive lineman in the nation since 1946.

The FWAA All-American Committee selects the Nagurski winner from the 11-man All-American Defensive Team at the end of each season.

Players can be added and dropped throughout the course of the season.

Minnesota offensive lineman Greg Eslinger and Louisville defensive end Elvis Dumer-vil were the 2005 recipients of the two trophies.

Nebraska owns the record for the most winners of the Outland Trophy with seven and former Cornhusker center Dave Rimington is the only player to have claimed the award twice.

The Outland Trophy will be awarded Dec. 7 in Orlando, Fla., during the 2006 ESPN Home Depot College Football Awards Show.

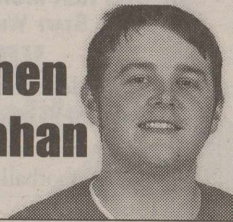

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Knicks fire Brown, Thomas takes over

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Knicks put Larry Brown out of his coaching misery Thursday, ending weeks of uncertainty by firing the Hall of Fame coach with four years and a reported \$40 million left on his contract. President and general manager Isiah Thomas will replace Brown as coach.

In Brown's one season in New York, the Knicks stumbled to a 23-59 record — second worst in the NBA and matching the most losses in club history — while Brown publicly feuded with Stephon Marbury and other players.

But the postseason may have been even more difficult for Brown.

His coaching status had been in limbo since reports surfaced in May that owner James Dolan was looking to buy out Brown's contract. It was at about that time that Brown called himself a "dead man walking" because of the uncertainty.

Brown's agent, Joe Glass, had said he wouldn't accept a buyout, so the Knicks took their time with the decision. That created an awkward situation in which Brown was running the Knicks' workouts of draft prospects without knowing what role he had within the organization. The draft is Wednesday.

"No one in our organization is

happy with last season and we all accept responsibility for our performance," Thomas said in a statement released by the Knicks. "This has been a difficult time for the entire organization and our fans.

"Larry Brown is a great coach, but for various reasons, bringing him to the Knicks did not turn out the way we had hoped and we wish him the best in the future."

It's the second straight ugly ending for Brown, who was bought out by the Pistons last season despite leading Detroit to the NBA finals, winning one title, in both of his seasons there.
