



Bush downplays Iraq troop pullout reports

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Pentagon troop withdrawal plan is among options being considered for Iraq, the White House said Monday. President Bush said U.S. troop levels will be determined by military commanders, the new Iraqi government and conditions on the ground. Bush told reporters he would await a recommendation from Gen. George Casev. the top U.S. commander in Iraq. "And one of the things General Casey assured me of was that whatever recommendation he makes, it'll be aimed toward achieving victory," Bush said.

Bush condemns leak of terror finance info

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Monday it was "disgraceful" that the news media had disclosed a secret CIA-Treasury program to track millions of financial records in search of terrorist suspects. The White House accused The New York Times of breaking a long tradition of keeping wartime secrets. "The fact that a newspaper disclosed it makes it harder to win this war on terror," Bush said, leaning forward and jabbing his finger during a brief question-and-answer session with reporters in the Roosevelt Room.

Intelligent Bush

Despite complaints from Democrats, President's plan keeping U.S. safe

emocrats are sore losers. It's been nearly two years since President Bush defeated John Kerry in the 2004 presidential race, and Democrats still can't get over it. As their response to the loss they have chosen to attack and drag their feet to any initiative or policy the Bush Administration tries to initiate. Couple this with the fact that current members of the liberal media (i.e., The New York Times and The Washington Post) seem hell-bent on releasing every last detail they can find on the President's so-called quest to eliminate our freedoms.

The White House had asked the New York Times and The Washington Post not to release the stories, as they feared that knowledge of the program would severely hinder their collection of vital information.

However, as we've seen time and again, the news media did not see the situation the same as the White House. Once again, in their minds, they saw this vast conspiracy by President Bush to eliminate the rights of Americans, to keep tabs on our everyday movements, and to (I guess in their minds) continue to grow his power. I can't honestly say I understand what their mindset is. As Vice-President Cheney said this past weekend, "That offends me," and it should.

Last week's Time magazine ran an excerpt from an upcoming book about the intelligence community and America's response since Sept.




11. In the excerpt, author Ron Suskind gives us a glimpse into the behind-thescenes actions of the Bush Administration. In 2002, the CIA intercepted information regarding a potential terrorist attack in New York. Terrorists planned to use a home-invented device to disperse cyanide gas in the New York subway system. While this attack was eventually called off by al-Qaida's number two al-Zawahiri, this illustrates two points. First, without the intelligence community gathering information abroad, and in secrecy, potential attacks would go virtually unnoticed until too late. Second, al-Qaida is still actively and vigorously pursuing terrorist attacks against the United States.

One moment in Suskind's book stands out not only as poignant for the President, but an indication that he is neither the privacy-invader nor bumbling idiot that liberals try to cast him as. According to Suskind's book, when President Bush was briefed on the details of the New York subway attack by then-CIA director George Tenet, he said, "I mean, this is bad enough. What does calling this off say about what else they're planning?" The President had wide eyes and clinched fists, and he said, "What could be the bigger operation Zawahiri didn't want to mess up?"

That's the all-important question and the one that programs like the one tracing overseas bank accounts can, and must, answer.

By taking away the game, you're taking away a fan favorite, potential revenue

n the front page, we ran our own version of the Constitution reflecting the opinion of most students regarding the relocation of the Texas Tech-Texas A&M football game.

We the students of Texas Tech University, in order to form a more perfect agreement, establish pride, ensure local success, provide for home-field advantage, promote our beautiful campus and secure a win against our bitter rival, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the Texas Tech versus Texas A&M

As the editorial board of The Daily Toreador, we believe the site of the Texas Tech versus Texas A&M football game should be left alone. Despite prior beliefs and wants, moving the game to Dallas, in the older stadium and landmark referred to as the Cotton Bowl, will force students out of town for that major sporting event weekend, causing more time on the road, away from classes and more money spent on tickets that are not covered in our student fees. While Dallas is a great town, with excellent attractions and entertainment, the concept of establishing the game annually in Dallas is preposterous. It will take away from hundreds of thousands of dollars or even millions earned during that weekend for Lubbock and Texas Tech, regardless if the game is only played here every other year. Although Dallas has a massive alumni base for Tech, A&M overwhelms that population. As future alum, if we were to end up in the Dallas area, this would be a positive advantage for us. But also, we have to look to the future students of Tech. We have paid our money to this university, but it will seem modest when compared to the tuition rates of their graduation classes.

Goodbye home field advantage. Goodbye tailgating. Goodbye possible

With the improvements being made to our own stadium and that of Kyle Field in College Station, why not honor these venues and universities by keeping the game at their respective locations? Tech is a beautiful place, despite the wind and dust, and that takes away one weekend during the school year to show it off to our "bitter rivals." While advantages can be stated or affirmed in the process of this change, we can declare more consequences to the relocation of the game. Keep it in Lubbock and in College Station. Oklahoma and Texas may play at the Cotton Bowl during the State Fair of Texas, but some may say the rivalry in that match-up has changed since. Why follow in the footsteps of our other foes? Don't copy what they do.

Do not move the game to a meaningless location — a neutral location will kill this rivalry that has been feeding for several years.
