Man sleeping in field killed by equipment

AMARILLO (AP) — A man who was apparently sleeping in a hay field was killed when a farmer accidentally ran over him with a hay-cutting machine, authorities said.

Kevin Lynn Havran, 34, was killed Tuesday night. Medical personnel attempted to revive Havran, but he was pronounced dead at the scene. Officials are investigating why he was lying in the field

Havran's driver's license showed El Paso as his residence but he worked at the nearby Tyson Fresh Meats plant.

No one from Tyson knew Havran had gone into the field, Potter County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Paul Buckles said.

Gunman kills hostage, self in Colo. standoff

BAILEY, Colo. (AP) — A gunman took six girls hostage at the high school in this mountain town Wednesday, using them as human shields for hours before he shot and fatally wounded a girl and then killed himself as a SWAT team moved in, authorities said. The confrontation at Platte Canyon High School unfolded just a short drive away from Columbine, the site of one of the nation's deadliest school shootings. The gunman, believed to be between 30 and 50 years old, was cornered with the girls in a second-floor classroom, and he released four of them, one by one.

Taliban attacks triple since Pakistan peace deal

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) -American troops on Afghanistan's eastern frontier have seen a tripling of attacks since a truce between the Pakistani army and pro-Taliban tribesmen that was supposed to stop cross-border raids by militants, a U.S. military officer said Wednesday.

Pakistan's Foreign Ministry rejected the U.S. claim and said home-based insurgents were behind the violence in Afghanistan, where at least 25 militants were reported killed in fighting Wednesday.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House approved legislation Wednesday giving the administration authority to interrogate and prosecute terrorism detainees, moving President Bush to the edge of a pre-election victory with compromise last Thursday, and Republicans five-to-one margin, with many wanting to a key piece of his anti-terror plan.

The 253-168 vote in the House came shortly after senators agreed to limit debate on their own nearly identical bill, all but assuring its passage on Thursday.

prosecuted for war crimes.

With elections just weeks away, the debate over the legal handling of terrorists was often partisan with some Democrats contending the bill would approve torture.

"All Americans want to hold terrorists accountable, but if we try to redefine the nature of torture, whisk people into secret detention facilities and use secret evidence to convict them in special courts, our actions do in fact embolden our enemies," said Rep. Jim Moran, D-Va.

Others vehemently opposed language that would give the president wide latitude to interpret international standards of prisoner treatment and bar detainees from going to federal court to protest their treatment and detention under the right of habeas corpus. Supporters of the bill have said eliminating habeas corpus was intended to keep detainees from flooding federal courts with appeals.

The bill also gives the president the ability to interpret international standards for prisoner treatment when an act does not fall under the definition of a war crime, such as rape and torture.

"It gives too much leeway to the president," said Rep. John Murtha, D-Pa. "And I think when you tamper with the Geneva Conventions ... you hurt our ability to protect the

Republicans defended the measure as sound.

"Is it perfect? No," said Rep. Mario Diaz-Balart, R-Fla. "Do we have an obligation to pass it? Yes."

Tech play to 'Romance' audience

A tension between fantasy and reality, a mixture of Irish song and dance and a dose of mystery are all elements that come together to create "The Romance of Erin," a play written by fine arts doctoral student Jim McDermott.

The play is both McDermott's dissertation piece and his first full-length play to be produced. It will run Oct. 2-8 at the Texas Tech Lab Theater, located on 18th Street between Flint Avenue and Boston Avenue.

The play opens in a mental ward, where the title character, Erin, is being cared for by doctors and nurses. "It's more of a surrealistic, impressionistic, state-of-mind 'onstage' type of play," he said. Marshall has been working on

In their first three games, the Buffaloes' season appeared headed in a dismal direction with losses to Division I-AA Montana State and in-state rival Colorado State. However, Colorado showed promise with its performance against Georgia in Week 4 despite blowing a 13-point lead late in the fourth quarter to lose 14-13 to the Bulldogs. Colorado can salvage its season with home games against Baylor, Kansas State, Iowa State and Texas Tech — where Tech is 0-3. CU ranks 16th in the nation in rushing defense and is led by senior defensive end Abraham Wright who has 5 sacks. Colorado has yet to throw a touchdown pass and will need to get its 113th ranked offense up to part if it wants to contend its 113th-ranked offense up to par if it wants to contend.

The Bears are 1-3 after its non-conference outings and could just as easily be 4-0 heading into Big 12 play against Kansas State. The Bears had TCU on the ropes in week 1 and just missed wins against Washington State and Army. Last season, Baylor was just one win shy of bowl eligibility thanks to overtime losses against Texas A&M and Oklahoma. In 2006, the Bears new Air Raid offense has them the 14th-ranked passing team in the nation with wide receiver Trent Shelton nabbing 26 receptions for 323 yards and two scores. Big play defensive back C.J. Wilson has four interceptions with one returned for a touchdown. Look for the Bears to make noise at home with the Aggies and Sooners both traveling to Waco.

The Aggies have shown they may compete for the Big 12 South title and even the conference title with 265-pound running back Jorvorskie Lane pounding into the end zone 10 times in just four games this season, the nation's 15th-ranked offense has a formidable threat at the tailback position, including freshman blue-chipper Michael Goodson and senior Courtney Lewis sharing the rushing duties. Quarterback Stephen McGee has led the Aggies with 820 passing yards, six touchdowns and has yet to throw a pick. Complementing the Aggie offense is the play of the defense which is ranked sixth in the nation agains the pass. With games against Texas Tech, Missouri, Öklahoma and Nebraska at Kyle Field to combat their Big 12 foes, the Aggies could be battling Texas in the last game of the season for the Big 12 South title.



The return of Jarrett Hicks to the Air Raid offense against Southeastern Louisiana in Week 4 helped the Red Raiders cruise by the Lions 62-0, one week after a disastrous loss to No. 16 TCU on the road. Tech coach Mike Leach accused his team of being complacent and lacking toughness. Tech responded with a solid performance against its Division I-AA opponent Southeastern, but Leach said his team needs to play two consistent games in a row. With another tough road contest against in-state rival Texas A&M Saturday to open up conference play, the Red Raiders will need to have all three sides of the ball click together in what is seemingly one of the toughest atmospheres in the NCAA — Kyle Field.

The Tigers have the eighth-best offense in the nation with 471 yards per game and have the top defense in the nation, allowing an average of 175.3 yards per game. Quarterback Chase Daniel has tossed for 1,020 yards and nine touchdowns while throwing just two interceptions. Defensively, defensive end Brian Smith has registered six sacks for second-best in the nation while linebacker Marcus Bacon has swarmed to the ball with a team-leading 39 tackles, two interceptions and a fumble recovery. The Tigers must play at Texas Tech, Texas A&M, Nebraska and Iowa State who have combined for a

The Cyclones got their first taste of Big 12 action when they fell to the Texas Longhorns 37-14 in Austin Saturday. The week before they had to battle in-state rival Iowa on the Hawkeyes home turf and lost that contest as well. Iowa State's schedule for the remainder of Big 12 season is seemingly favorable with home games against Nebraska, Texas Tech, Kansas and Missouri and travel to Oklahoma, Kansas and Colorado. The Cyclones have yet to get their high-powered offensive trio of quarterback Bret Meyer, tailback Stevie Hicks Jr. and 6-foot-5 wideout Todd Blythe going during the first four games of the season. first four games of the season.
