

Woman sentenced for conspiracy

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A woman who pleaded guilty to a conspiracy charge in the transportation of illegal immigrants was sentenced Thursday to 10 years in prison.

The penalty given to Maria Magdelena Parra-Luna, 36, was the statutory maximum, according to the office of U.S. Attorney Johnny Sutton.

Parra-Luna was a fugitive from 2002 until May 5, 2006, when she was arrested in Texas. She pleaded guilty to the conspiracy charge in July.

CDC struggles to find source of outbreak

ATLANTA (AP) - Government scientists struggled Thursday to pinpoint the source of the first U.S. salmonella outbreak linked to peanut butter, the kid favorite packed into millions of lunchboxes every day.

Nearly 300 people in 39 states have fallen ill since August, and federal health investigators said they strongly suspect Peter Pan peanut butter and certain batches of Wal-Mart's Great Value house brand _ both manufactured by ConAgra Foods Inc.



Putin elevates defense minister

MOSCOW (AP) — President Vladimir Putin promoted his hawkish defense minister to a top government post on Thursday, a move that puts Putin's two heirs apparent on equal footing before next year's election to replace the popular leader.

Both Sergei Ivanov and the more liberal Dmitry Medvedev have received lavish coverage in the Russian media, which is strongly influenced by the Kremlin, and are seen as the chief rivals for anointment by Putin as his favored successor in the March 2008 election.



Whitmore to discuss education

Education is a hot topic in Austin. Texas Tech President Jon Whitmore is scheduled to sit on a panel to discuss programs preparing students for college as a part of a statewide education summit in Austin.

"I am going to be on a panel of university presidents to discuss ways to improve the access of colleges to students who are in kindergarten through 12th grade," Whitmore said. "We are trying to make a better connection between public schools and universities."

Whitmore said there is a new between the Tech School of Law and Estacado High School to give students a background to prepare them for both college and law school.

Tech has another program emphasizing math and science to high school students in an effort to prepare them for a degree in the math, science and engineering departments.

Whitmore said the young people of Texas will need to be well-equipped in order for the Lone Star State to thrive in the future.

"The future of Texas will depend on an even larger number of students preparing to go to college and then preparing in college to succeed in the workforce,"

Whitmore said. Others topics planned for the summit include early-childhood education, teaching young children to soar, connecting to workforce needs and No Child Left Behind.

Computer moguls Steve Jobs and Michael Dell are scheduled to sit on a panel discussing the impact of technology and how it positively affects learning.

Other notable speakers scheduled for today's education summit are former U.S. Secretary of Education Rod Paige, Ross Perot and United States Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchinson.

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said Thursday that President Bush lacks the authority to invade Iran without specific approval from Congress, a fresh challenge to the commander in chief on the eve of a symbolic vote critical of his troop buildup in Iraq.

Pelosi, D-Calif., noted that Bush consistently said he supports a diplomatic resolution to differences with Iran "and I take him at his word."





A Texas Tech researcher has contributed to recent studies that suggest global warming is mainly a result of human activity.

Katharine Hayhoe, an associate professor in the Department of Geosciences, is a member of the United Nations' Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. Hayhoe's research, along with the research of colleague Andrew analysis that has scientists from 130 countries arriving at a nearly unanimous decision.

Hayhoe said the level of certainty among scientists has been steadily rising since the 1970s because of confirmation of predictions through the scientific process. She said tests and measurements have been made concerning the rising level of the oceans, air temperatures over land, and changes in rainfall patterns.

Hayhoe said she thinks the scientific debate over the cause of global warming is over, and it has moved beyond science. The questions now lay in how global warming will affect the population in the future and how individual humans can help, she said.

Hayhoe said she has positive aspirations regarding the future, but more action is needed now rather than later.

The transition from all-gas vehicles to hybrid cars is another way to save energy and money, Hayhoe said.

"Now you can get pickups and SUVs and every type of car as a hybrid," Hayhoe said. "They use 30 to 60 percent less gas than the same non-hybrid cars.'

said while Europeans have already began to make transitions, there is a lack of legislation in the United States to proceed.

"If we wait more than 10 or 20 years before taking action on climate change, extreme measures could be required to prevent what scientists call 'dangerous human driven change," Hayhoe said.

Andrew Swift, director of Wind and Science Engineering Research Center at Tech, said the greenhouse-gas issue has been recognized in the wind-power community for years. The technology is under research at Tech, but there are roadblocks preventing its production, he said.

"One issue with restraining development of wind energy is the transmission lines in order to move that power to the connection centers," Swift said. We do have a group studying transmission."

Swift said connecting all the power groups throughout the vast panhandle is difficult to do. The codes for engineering and designs for the wind turbines are all done in European codes that do not replicate the wind elements and conditions of the Lubbock area.

He said the wind-energy farm east of Lubbock sends energy to Austin rather than Lubbock.

"I believe one of the major drivers for this technology is that this is greenhouse-gas-free, renewable energy," he said.

Tech scientist studies global warming Cold weather and icy roads not enough to cancel class

A few inches of snow is not enough to cancel classes at Texas Tech.

Tech Police Chief Ron Seacrist, President Jon Whitmore and Provost William Marcy collaborate in deciding whether or not to close or delay the opening of the university.

Seacrist said he talks with representatives from the National Weather Service, the Department of Public Safety and the Texas Department of Transportation to find out information concerning the road conditions and what the weather conditions are like in the middle of the night and the next morning. He relies on the DPS more than the other two entities.

"The only way we would close the school for an entire day is if the Department of Public Safety recommended nobody drive on the roads, except in the case of emergencies," Seacrist said.

"Compared to the snow in Western New York, an inch of snow is nothing," Brink said.

Janet May, assistant vice president of human resources, said Tech took an emergency leave from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. Nov. 30, from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. Dec. 1 and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Jan. 19 because of inclement weather.

Dewey Shroyer, managing director of grounds maintenance, said his 99 employees work through much of the night and then start sanding the roads and putting ice-melting pellets in front of doors, on stairs and in other high-traffic areas that could be covered with ice.

Dubai Ports says sale of U.S. port operations may fall apart

Ports World warned Thursday that ity's payment demands. its deal to sell off major port operations in six U.S. cities may fall apart if the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey does not drop demands for a multimillion-dollar payment.

The Port Authority, in turn, accused the two companies involved in the deal, DP World and AIG Global Investment Group, of walking away from negotiations.

DP World is trying to finish the sale of U.S. port operations it acquired last year. That acquisition caused an outcry among U.S. politicians who said control of port ates-based company could endanger national security.

The last-minute hitch in the deal to put the ports into U.S. hands prompted Sens. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., and Robert Menendez, D-N.J., to threaten political payback against the Port Authority.

"I've carried a lot of water for the Port Authority," said Menendez. "I have no intention of carrying any water for the Port Authority if they cannot consummate this deal for the national security of the people of our region and our nation."





Hardaway won't represent NBA at All-Star game after anti-gay remarks

(AP) — The NBA banished weekend in Las Vegas because of his anti-gay remarks.

All-Star games during the 1990s, was already in Las Vegas and scheduled to make a series of public appearances this week on behalf of the league. But after saying, "I hate gay people" during a radio interview, commissioner David Stern stepped in.

"We removed him from representing us because we didn't think his comments were consistent with having anything to do with us," Stern told reporters Thursday at the opening of a fan festival at a Las Vegas casino, part of the NBA's All-Star weekend.

Stern said he had not spoken with Hardaway, who left Las Vegas on Thursday, but he planned






