Judges: Guantanamo prisoners can't use courts to challenge detentions

WASHINGTON (AP) - In victory for President Bush, a divided ederal appeals court ruled Tuesday hat Guantanamo Bay detainees challenge their indefinite imprisonment. A Supreme Court appeal was promised.

Court of Appeals for the D.C.
Circuit dismisses hundreds of cases filed by foreign-born detainees in federal court and also threatens to strip away court access to millions of lawful permanent residents ca rently in the United States.
It upholds a key provision of ilitary Commissions Act, which Bush pushed through Congress last year to set up a Defense Depart year to set up a Defense Depart-

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) - A BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) - A a tanker carrying chlorine gas Tuesday, killing nine people and filling hospital beds with more than 150 wheezing and frightened villagers after noxious plumes of Baghdad.

The attack was part of a string of blasts - including a suicide bomber whok killed seven mourners at a funeral - that further rattled officials marking the first week of a major security crackdown seek-
ing to calm the blood-soaked city. U.S. forces, meanwhile, called in airstrikes during intense clashes against insurgents in strongholds northwest of Baghdad.
With the death toll in the Baghdad area climbing above
100 since Sunday, Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki tried to court some rare upbeat publicity with an even rarer event - leaving his heavily guarded quarters for a visit to the city's streets and markets. The fanfare of the security plan's launch Feb. 14 has been
swept aside by a steady roll of swept aside by a steady roll oni
attacks, most blamed on Sunni extremists targeting the majority Shiites. Many Sunnis believe they are being sidelined by al-Malik's government and under growing threat from Shiite militias, which the prime minister refus confront.

Hospitals were soon flooded with terrified people - including many children - complaining of
breathing problems, vomiting and stanging eyes. Most of the people treated were released after several hours and there was no apparent life-threatening cases, hospital officials said.
Chlorine gas in low exposure irritates the respiratory system,
eyes and skin. Higher levels can eyes and skin. Higher levels can
lead to accumulation of fluid in the lungs and other symptoms, and death is possible with heavy exposure, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Police Department said all violations of city ordinances are Class Cmisdemeanors. However, according to Chapter 243 of the
local government code, sexually oriented local government code, sexually oriented
violations are bumped up to a Class A misdemeanor.
Stevens said the ciry govermment code

According to the Texas penal code, a person charged with C Class A misdemeanor can face a fine notto exceed $\$ 4,000$ and
a one-vear-or-less jail sentence. a one-year-or-less jail sentence.

| Jake's Sports Cafe manager were arrested was not because of the new sexual business ordinance but because the owners of the bar did not file for a proper permit. <br> "The city ordinance does not prohibit these businesses from having a sexually oriented business," Stevens said. "It seeks to regulate these businesses, the same way most cities do. Even in Las Vegas, a business must be properly zoned or have a permit.
