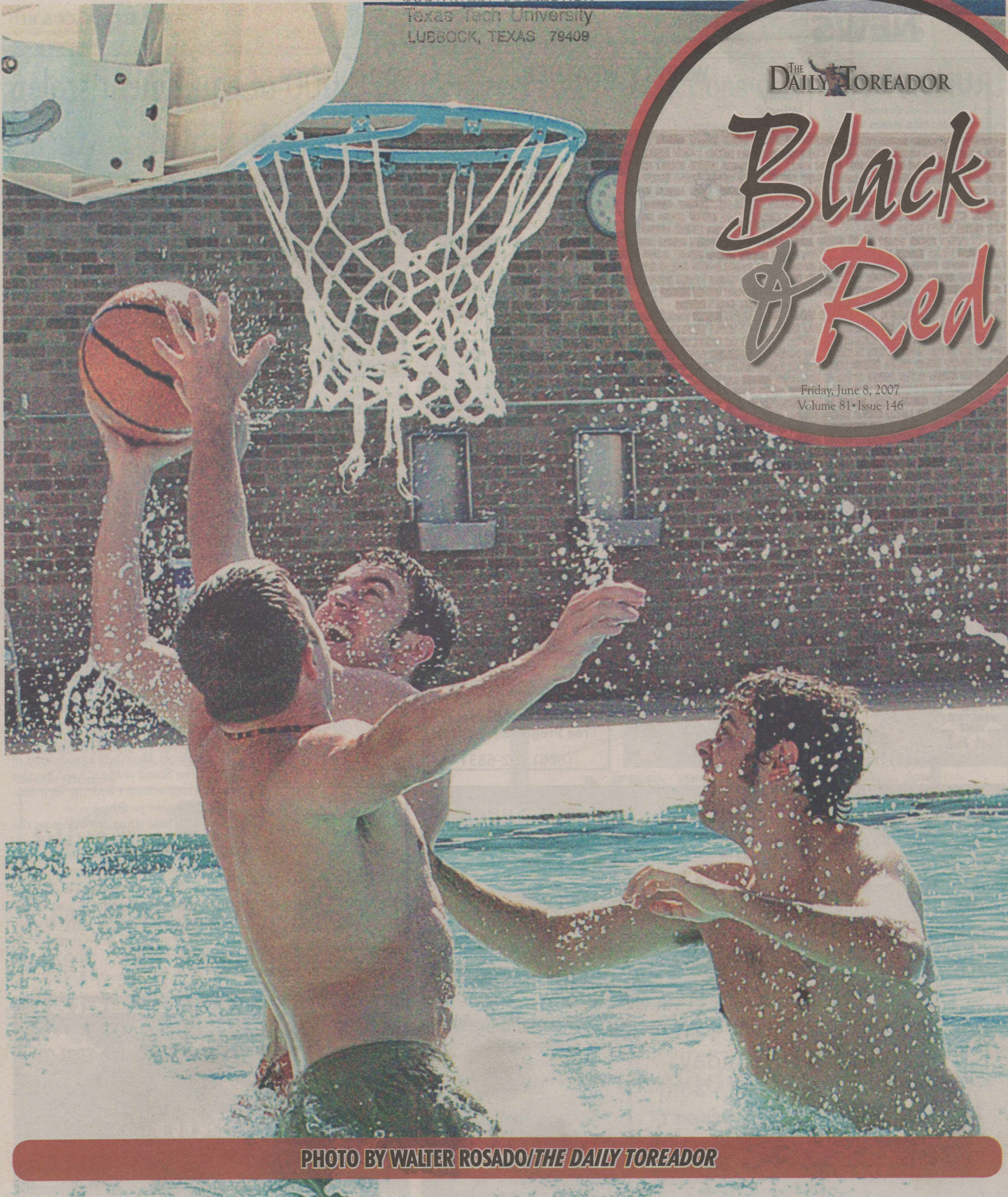

\$20,000 of equipment stolen from Tech School of Music

Roughly \$20,000 worth of music and stage equipment, partially belonging to Texas Tech's School of Music, was stolen from the Wells Fargo Amphitheater at Mackenzie Park Monday night.

The equipment was being used by Lubbock Moonlight Musicals, a production company that offers shows for the community on weekends during the summer.

Gerald Dolter, interim president of Moonlight Musicals and an associate professor of music at Tech, said the equipment had been stored in a storage shed as well as in an on-site mobile office and several of the pieces that were stolen were most likely useless to the thief.

"Ironically, only a small amount of the stolen equipment could be sold for money," Dolter said. "The receiver units are the big-ticket item, though."

The equipment was left unguarded because of Moonlight Musical's lack of funds to employ an overnight security guard. Dolter said Mackenzie Park does offer security throughout the area during production, though the guards' shifts end when the shows are over.

During the production of "Oklahoma" in the summer of 2006, cast and crew members volunteered for shifts to stay with the equipment overnight, said Dolter, who believes that method is no longer feasible.

"I would be concerned for the volunteers' safety," Dolter said. "I think anyone that wants to take anything will, at all costs."

Despite the theft, Dolter said his cast will still be able to perform this summer because of the outreach of the community.

"We are getting a big response from the community," he said. "We have had as many as ten people call to donate equipment, as well as the United Spirit Arena."

Dolter said alternative security methods will be employed and the donated equipment will be stored at an undisclosed location instead of at the amphitheater.

Tyler Bridge, a senior vocal performance major from Denton, said the theft was devastating and he is overwhelmed by the support of the community.

"Out of the ashes, comes something great," Bridge said. "It has really reinvigorated the cast and our dedication to bring family fun to the community."

Bridge is embracing the role of Rolfe in Moonlight's production of "The Sound of Music," and has also served as Raider Red, the Tech mascot for the past three years.

"These situations bring out the best in the community," Bridge said. "It is what makes Lubbock Lubbock."

Moonlight Musicals will continue performances of "The Sound of Music," which opened Memorial Day weekend, at 8 p.m. for the next two weekends.

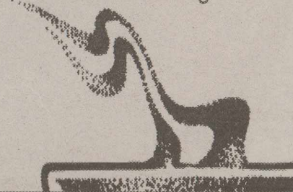

Congress eases restrictions on stem cell research

WASHINGTON (AP) — Spoiling for a veto fight, Congress cleared legislation Thursday easing restrictions on federal funding for embryonic stem cell research.

The House vote to send the measure to President Bush was 247-176, 35 short of the level needed to override a second

veto in as many years on the issue.

"For many, embryonic stem cell research is the most promising source of potential treatments and cures" for debilitating disease, said Rep. Diana DeGette, D-Colo., the bill's leading advocate.

"Unfortunately, because of the stubbornness of one man — President

Bush — these people continue to suffer as they wait," she added.

The president was unpersuaded.

"If this bill were to become law, American taxpayers would for the first time in our history be compelled to support the deliberate destruction of human embryos," he said.

TCU professor arrested after allegations of threats

FORT WORTH (AP) — A Texas Christian University psychology professor was in jail Thursday without bond, accused of threatening people and hinting about bringing a sub-machine gun to campus.

Charles Frederick Bond Jr., 53, was arrested at his home Friday and charged with making a terroristic threat, a Class B misdemeanor punishable by up to 180 days in jail.

A psychologist was expected to evaluate him Thursday, officials said, and a hearing set for next week will determine the conditions of his bail.

In a news release, TCU officials said Bond has exhibited "extremely inappropriate conduct and made threatening remarks to some campus members."

According to a Fort Worth police incident report, TCU police obtained

a "harassment" warrant for Bond's arrest Friday, and Fort Worth officers met them at Bond's home to assist.

Americans need solutions not politicians: 4 fit the bill

Hooray! I finally found four potential presidential candidates for whom I'd love to cast my vote — and two are Republicans. This week's debates were quite illuminating. Things could get shaken up soon with entrances by Fred Thompson, Newt Gingrich or Al Gore, but for now, there's more than enough action.

Six of the 10 Republican candidates have no chance. Of the remaining four, Rudy Giuliani once again displayed his listless and empty "Terrorists hate me" rhetoric most Republicans will ignore once they remember Giuliani's spicy extramarital affair and his liberal social positions.

Thankfully, Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., and former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee gave answers that were reasonable, authentic and, at times, inspirational. Huckabee, an ordained Baptist minister, said being pro-life is more than being anti-abortion. "We

shouldn't allow a child to live under a bridge or in the back seat of a car," he said. "It should never be acceptable to us that people are treated as expendable — any people."

It was McCain, however, who stood above the rest. Unlike most of the Republican candidates, McCain truly understands how the government works. He defended the immigration bill, which is wildly unpopular among Republicans for not treating immigrants like trash, as being a product of what we expect Congress to do — compromise and find solutions. He spoke eloquently of Iraq and American values without spewing talking points. As fellow columnist Trey Caliva told me during the debate, the Straight Talk Express is back.

As for the Democratic debates,

we're seeing the same thing that is happening in the Republican ones. Some "get it," and some — like Barack Obama — don't.

Sen. Hillary Clinton, D-N.Y., and Sen. Joe Biden, D-Del., are the only Democratic candidates who have enough experience in government and politics to understand you have to compromise sometimes. You have to stand up to your party and say, "Yes, I'm a Democrat, but I'm first and foremost a public servant." Biden knows policy backwards and forwards and talks from the gut. Clinton speaks about Iraq and national security without fearing what the liberal wing of the Democratic party will say the next day. She radiates leadership. She and Biden know America needs toughness right now, not hand-holding and pandering.

While I don't agree with his stance, Paul has kept himself in the good graces of his voting base throughout his career, and has yet to backtrack.

While those are issues I disagree with on Paul's side, consider this, you left leaning folk out there: he wants to eliminate the Patriot Act, revamp our horrendous foreign policy, legalize medical marijuana, voted no on public school prayer during wartime or anytime and is probably one of the last few Goldwater Republicans.

For those who don't know, Barry Goldwater, before Reagan, helped revamp the Republican Party and lay the groundwork for the American public to trust in their party, leading to the landslides of Reagan and the 1966 House of Representatives Republican take over, gaining

the party 47 seats.

It's sad that a roundabout Republican, such as Paul, won't seemingly hold a chance in this country unless he bathes in crucifixes, but this is the life the right chooses to lead.

And for those on the left who are sick of their party not sticking to their guns, Ron Paul just might be the only ace choice on the right side of the spectrum.

Famed film makers bring cinematic marvels to Hub City Saturday

The forces behind Saturday Night Cinema are ushering lovers of art and film to the Firehouse Theater Saturday evening for screenings of several underground-cinema staples.

Beginning at 7 p.m., the Film as Artistic Expression exhibition will be presented to Hub City viewers by the Louise Hopkins Underwood Center for the Arts and the Flatland Film Festival Steering Committee free of charge. The event, which is centered upon the creations of film-makers Matthew Barney and Kenneth Anger, features four films spanning a 50-year period.

"This is truly an event that takes film as artistic achievement," said Rob Weiner, Saturday Night Cinema's film curator. "Leave pre-conceived notions at the door. Don't try to think about it too much; go and enjoy the visuals."

The first segment of the event is a screening of a film clip entitled "The Order," a single piece of the epic "Cremaster Cycle." Barney's complete project includes a five-piece compilation of cinematic art that took nearly a decade to complete as well as sculptures and photographs.

"Matthew Barney is a huge deal," said Dawn Wolf-Taylor, coordinator of education, programs and exhibits and the Underwood Center for the Arts.

Wolf-Taylor said she already

has seen some of Barney's work at a screening in Santa Fe, N.M., and she feels the artist's body of work appeals to audiences seeking cinema that defies convention.

"A lot of people want to see something besides 'Spiderman,'" she said. "(Barney's work) is just crazy, just a lot of fun and very important artistically.

Wolf-Taylor said her husband, Chris Taylor, will deliver a lecture deciphering some of the layers of symbolism that define Barney's work.

Three short films created by Anger introduce the second segment of the night's events, according to a press release.

"I understand that Barney was very much inspired by Kenneth Anger," Wolf-Taylor said.

While Barney's project was pieced together in the last decade, the trio of Anger films span the 50s, 60s and 70s.

"(Saturday's event showcases) the evolution of underground

film," Weiner said. "Film as art — in some sense, that's pure cinema."

Weiner said some movie-goers may recognize Anger's work not from his cinematic creations but from his famed publications unearthing the secrets of Tinseltown such as "Hollywood Babylon: The Legendary Underground Classic of Hollywood's Darkest and Best Kept Secrets."

Weiner said Saturday's Film as Artistic Expression exhibition presents Hub City residents with a unique opportunity to enjoy visual marvels while simultaneously receiving an education.

"Part of the idea to let people know Lubbock is not a cultural back water," he said. "Lubbockites are not as stupid and culturally backward as one might think."

7 Red Raiders advance after first day of NCAA Championships

After the first day of the 2007 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, seven Texas Tech athletes remain in contention for

individual national titles.

Senior Marlon Odom qualified for the finals in the 110-meter hurdles after placing second in the prelims

and finishing fifth in the semi-finals. Odom's prelim time of 13.52 seconds broke his previous school record of 13.54 seconds, which he set at the NCAA Midwest Regional May 26. The 110-meter hurdles final Friday will be the last outdoor event of Odom's collegiate career.

Senior Seth Harris cleared a height of 16-10.7 to advance to the men's pole-vault final. Senior Zach Glavash competed Thursday in the 800-meter-run semi-finals after placing third in the prelims with a time of 1 minute, 48.4 seconds. Results for the semi-final were not available

at press time. The 800-meter final is set to take place Saturday.

Sally Kipyego is on the heels of her fourth and fifth individual titles of the year. Kipyego finished second behind Irene Kimaiyo with a time of 16:3.39 in the 5,000-meter-run prelims. Kimaiyo finished first in 16:3.32; both times were good enough to advance her to the finals.

Kipyego competed in the 10,000-meter-run finals Thursday, but results were not available at press time.

Sophomore D'Andra Carter advanced to the finals in the women's discus, finishing first in the opening round with a throw of 177-11. Senior Lacy Wilson qualified for the finals in the women's high jump after clearing a height of 5-10.75. This year is Wilson's third-consecutive year at the outdoor championships but her first time advancing to the high jump finals.

Tech golf falters at Nationals, Floren earns All-America honors

The Texas Tech men's golf team wrapped up its spring season June 1 at the NCAA Championships at the Golden Horseshoe Golf Club in Williamsburg, Va.

The Red Raiders participated in the first round of the championship but were not able to advance to the second round of play. Tech finished in 28th place, finishing ahead of the University of New Mexico and Auburn University.

"All-in-all, I was proud of the effort, and at least this time the result showed it," Tech Coach Greg Sands said in a press release. "Two-over was at least a competitive round and the guys battled to the end. I knew it would be a great experience for all the players."

Senior golfer Oscar Floren led the Red Raiders in the tournament, narrowly missing the final round as an individual by three strokes. Sophomores Santiago Rivas and Garrett Merrell also participated in the tournament, along with freshmen Matt Smith and Will Griffin.

Floren led the Red Raiders throughout the season as well as though the entirety of his career at Tech. He was named to the PING All-America Honorable Mention team for his efforts this year, making him the first golfer in Tech history to receive the honor for multiple seasons. Floren was named to the PING All-America First Team in 2006.

"I know some other guys have won conference championships and reached

All-America status, but Oscar's a two-time All-American and is the first guy to be first-team," Sands said in a press release. "I may be biased, but he may be the most decorated golfer in Tech history, and if he's not, it's certainly debatable. He will certainly be missed."

Floren emerged as a team leader this season by finishing in the top 10 in seven-straight tournaments this season. His 12-event stroke average of 71.26 earned him a 32nd ranking nationally.

Throughout his career at Tech, Floren has racked up three individual wins along with eight top-five finishes, 23 top-10 finishes, and 29 top-20 finishes.
