WE HAD PLANNED to have some comment in this space this week about the drought conditions and searing heat which have been building up throughout this area in recent weeks.

But we read the comments for this week's paper made by Mrs. R. G. Edwards, our correspondent for the Eula community, and decided we wouldn't even try to picture the situation any better.

You will find her column elsewhere in this edition. We heartily suggest you pay extra attention in reading her thoughts about the hot weather. We believe everyone will find them interesting and entertaining.

SPEAKING OF DROUGHT, a meeting vital to Callahan County cattlemen is scheduled this Saturday night in the county courthouse. A story in this edition gives details about the meeting.

Those attending will determine whether or not the county will seek designation as a drought disaster county. If the request is made and granted, stockmen will be eligible to purchase grains through the emergency feed program.

Not being a cattleman, we don't propose to take sides here. But we do urge that everyone who might be affected by the program make it a point to be present for the discussion.

Cattlemen who do not take the trouble to attend certainly have no right to object to either acceptance or rejection of the program by those who are present.

This year's rodeo will feature some of the nation's top ranked negro cowboys competing in the five major rodeo events — bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, and Brahma bull riding.

Also featured will be an old favorite of area fans, Alex Alexander of Houston, Gene Autry's colored comedy clown and bull-fighter.

The rodeo will start at 8 both nights at the newly-rebuilt Sheriffs' Posse Arena on Highway 80 east of Baird.

City Figures Cite 2-Year Supply of Water in Lake

Estimates compiled by city officials here this week indicate there remains some 400 million gallons of water in Lake Baird — which should be sufficient for two years of normal use.

In addition to Lake Baird, the city has some 3 1/2 million gallons per month available in the old well field west of Baird, and also owns the original TP Lake which could be converted to domestic use at a nominal cost for pumping equipment.

Average daily use for the period from July 1, 1963 to this July 1 was approximately 200,000 gallons per day, or some 72,823,000 gallons for the year.

During the last year Baird's water consumption averaged some 6,068,583 gallons per month. The past three years monthly average is 5,071,161 gallons.

The most water used in any month during the past three years was 13,018,500 — in August, 1963.

The smallest amount of water used in any one month during

the past three year period was 2,355,100 — in December, 1962.

The most water treated at the filter plant in one day was 670,000 gallons, which came last Friday.

At present the filter plant is handling an average of 550,000 gallons daily.

In the past several years the city has increased many blocks of small lines and is still striving to bring better service where needed. At present, engineers are preparing estimates for adding additional storage and in-

creasing mains where pressure is inadequate.

If the city can see the way clear to finance the improvements, work will be started as soon as possible.

A financial blow to the city was the expense of relocating utilities in the area where Interstate 20 passes through north Baird. While the state and federal government pay most of the \$56,511.53 contract, some \$15,000 must be paid by the city. That money could have been used to improve the present water distributing system.

Substitutions Authorized for 1965 Programs

To insure the greatest amount of flexibility in farm operations, substitution between wheat and feed grains are authorized under the 1965 programs according to the Callahan County ASC office.

The substitution applies on farms only if the farm has a feed grain base, or oat-rye base, and a wheat allotment. The substitution provisions can be used by farmers who take part in both programs and make at least the minimum diversion for both wheat and feed grains.

As this year's program, marketing certificates will be issued to wheat farmers taking part, but the number of certificates allotted to a farm will not be increased because of the wheat substitution.

The total wheat production of farmers who carry out wheat program provisions will be eligible for price support loans even though the wheat acreage is in excess of the allotment because of the substitution provisions.

At present the pastry shop has doughnuts, cookies, cream puffs, fruit bars and brownies. Additional baked goods are expected to be added during the next two weeks.

Charles Lawrence is owner of the firm. There are five em-

ployes at present, in addition to Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence and their daughter, Roberta, 18.

Besides the baked goods being sold through the pastry shop, Lawrence currently distributes between 7,000 and 8,000 fried pies each week in an area from Ranger to Abilene.

With the expanded facilities, new routes are being planned with production to be increased as the routes are added.

Lawrence purchased the firm from John Weathers of Clyde some seven years ago, moving it into a 12x22 building in Baird. It has been operated there until moving into the Market St. location this month.

Seven years ago Lawrence distributed about 300 fried pies per week.

Lawrence Pastry Shop will be open from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

Class 7.—Registered gelding, any breed, three years of age and over.

Class 8.—Registered gelding, any breed, under three years of age.

Class 9.—Grade gelding under 14 hands.

Class 10.—Grade gelding 14 hands and over.

Class 11.—Showmanship.

Class 12.—Western pleasure.

Class 13.—Reining

Class 14.—Flag Race

Class 15.—Pole Bending

Class 16.—Barrel Race

Class 17.—Keyhole Race

Points will be awarded to winners in all classes to determine overall champions.

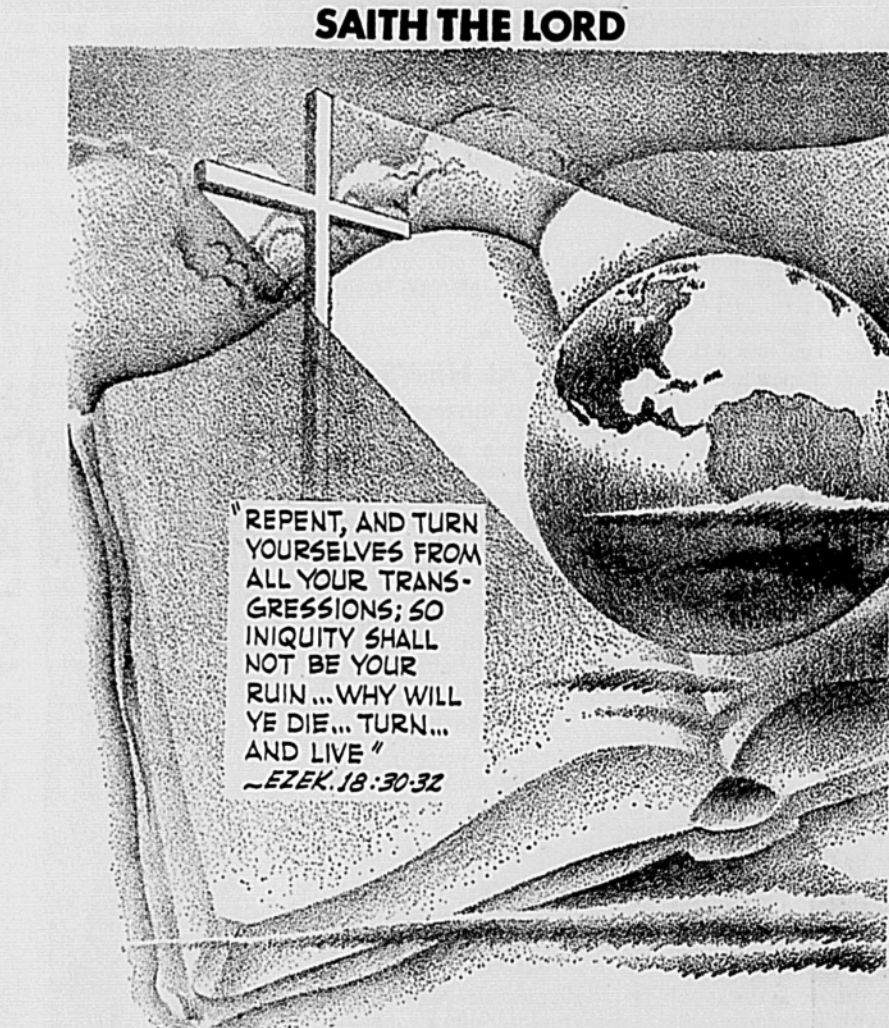

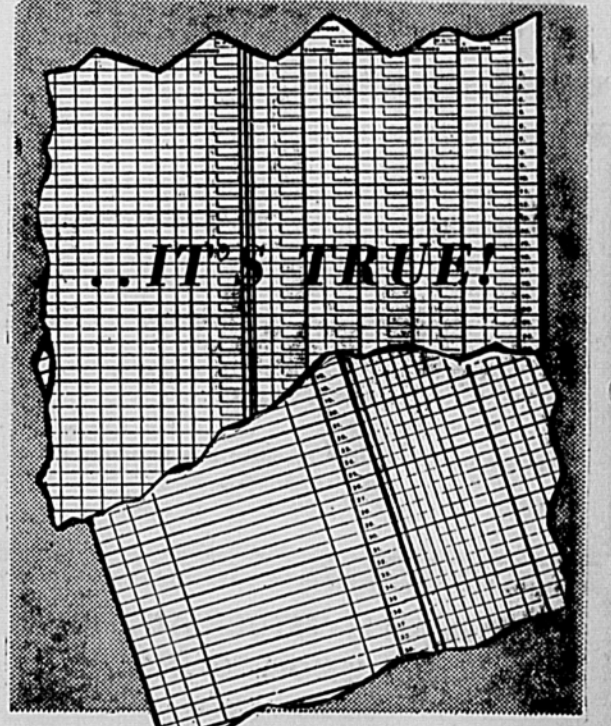
