IT IS DIFFICULT to say which is getting the most coffee-cup discussion in Baird this week -- the basketball season or the approaching visit by exchange students from Peru.

Few, if any, events in Baird's history have drawn more cooperative effort from the entire community than the program for this weekend.

We wish it could be possible for this exchange student idea to become a permanent one, with students from Peru coming here one year and students from Baird visiting in South America the next.

Very likely it would be impossible to exchange groups of 100 or so on an annual basis, but it might be possible to arrange for groups of 10 or 15.

Perhaps some day such a program will be possible.

THAT VICTORY AT Cross Plains Tuesday night all but assured the Baird Bearetttes their third straight trip to the basketball playoffs.

The girls have only to beat either Albany or Clyde to clinch the district championship. The road is considerably rougher for the boys, who must win both remaining games to keep a shot at the playoffs.

A playoff for the boys crown is looming more likely. Either Baird or Eastland must lose if the other is to take an undisputed championship.

Much the same situation exists in District 9-A, where the race is tight in both divisions. Added to that is an officiating dispute which has already caused one protest to be filed.

Should the chips fall right, it is possible Baird might play early in bi-district for both boys and girls. But it is much too early to begin speculating on that -- especially in the boys race.

IN TODAY'S ISSUE of The Star is the announcement by C. H. Lunsford that he will not seek re-election in the April city election. In making the announcement he said he wished to make his intentions clear now to encourage others to consider making the race.

We hope several Baird residents will be interested enough in their city government to run for this council vacancy. Having more than one candidate for a council slot is a healthy sign.

THIS WEEK HAS been something of an anniversary for Star Dust. This is column No. 53 under that name for us to write -- which means we are starting on our second year.

Peruvian Visitors Due Here Friday

Baird makes its bid at improving inter-American understanding this weekend with approximately 100 students and sponsors due in for a three-day visit from Lima, Peru.

A whirl of activities will greet the visitors when they arrive here Friday afternoon. Events will continue until the group leaves Sunday morning on the return trip to San Antonio.

In San Antonio

The party arrived in San Antonio by air Wednesday. Along with a small group from San Antonio, they will travel by bus and private car from the Alamo City to Baird.

Serving as official "international hostesses" for the visitors

while they are in Baird will be Mrs. W. P. Brightwell and Mrs. A. E. Dyer Sr. But virtually the entire community has pitched in to help in preparing for the exchange visit.

Approximately 50 Baird families have offered lodging for the visitors. Mrs. Dyer and Mrs. Brightwell have requested that a representative of each home be at Baird High School at 4 p. m. Friday to be assigned a guest or guests.

Short welcoming ceremonies will greet the caravan, which is expected in Baird about 2:30 p. m. Friday. After that, the entire party will visit Baird Public Schools.

The school tour is expected to

wind up about 4 p. m., with the "matching" of guests and hosts to begin immediately. Each Baird host will receive a schedule showing times and places of all events planned for the three days.

A break is planned between the school tour and the 5:30 p. m. dinner Friday, to allow the guests time for a short rest in their host's home.

The Friday night dinner will not be open to the public, since attendance is limited by the number of seats in the school cafeteria.

Dinner Program

James Paul Shanks will be master of ceremonies for the Friday night dinner and the Rev. Homer Salley will give the invocation. Opening the program will be group singing of the U. S. and Peru national anthems. Mrs. Vida Hill will be accompanist.

Giving short welcoming talks to the visitors will be County Judge Byron Richardson, Baird Mayor J. L. Ault, Jack Scott of Cross Plains, Rupert Jackson of Baird, School Board President James Snyder, and Mrs. Archie Nichols, Baird High Spanish Club sponsor.

Also speaking will be Mrs. Brightwell, Mrs. Dyer, and Mrs. Preston H. Dial, international affairs chairman of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and president of the Pan-American Council.

Response will be by Mrs. Carmela Russell de Orbegoso, who heads the Interchange of Students and Friendship Between Peru and Texas (Asociacion de Hermanos Peruanos-Texanos).

Special Music

Special music for the dinner will be a trio from Baird Elementary School, and by the Baird High FFA Band.

Members of the trio are Rea Corn, Marian Odum and Ada Black, with Mrs. Sidney Foy as accompanist. They will sing "San Antonio to Peru," and "Red Wing."

FFA band members include Bill Seelig, Bill Moore, B. P. Stephenson, Bill Bollinger, Pat Saddler and Hal Miller.

After the dinner the visitors will be guests at the Baird-Albany basketball games in the Bear gymnasium.

Highlights of the Saturday schedule will include a roundup and barbecue on the Dyer ranch, and a square dance exhibition in the Baird High gym. The roundup will begin about 11 a. m., with the barbecue to follow.

The square dance program will be open to the public, with a small admission fee to be charged.

Students from Peru had originally been expected to arrive in San Antonio at least a week before their visit to Baird. They are scheduled to return to San Antonio Sunday for a longer stay there.

Lunsford Won't Ask Re-election

City Councilman C. H. Lunsford announced this week he will not be a candidate for re-election in the April 6 Baird city election.

"I will have to be away from Baird a good part of the time this year, so I do not feel that the service I could give would justify asking for another term in office," he said.

He is currently serving his first term on the council. His term expires this year along with terms of Sam Gilliland and Irvin Corn.

Filing deadline for the election is March 7.

Lunsford said, "I have enjoyed serving the people of Baird for the past two years as a councilman, and I wish to thank everyone who helped elect me and supported me during my tenure in this office."

County Boundary Dispute Rocks Toward April or May Trial Date

A suit over disputed boundary lines involving Callahan, Coleman and Taylor counties, may come to trial in April or May, barring unexpected developments.

Judge Truman Roberts conducted a pre-trial hearing on the suit Saturday in 52nd District Court in Comanche.

Attorneys were given until Feb. 15 to file additional pleadings in the matter, and were instructed to meet and prepare an agreed statement of facts in the matter.

Representing principals in the suit at the pre-trial hearing were James Paul Shanks, Callahan County attorney; Jim Jefferey, Taylor County attorney; and Hal Woodward of Cole-

man, who has been retained to represent Coleman county.

Also at the Saturday hearing, attorneys reached a tentative agreement for a court trial rather than a jury trial.

The case was filed in Comanche County since it could not be filed in a county who shares a boundary with any of the three involved in the dispute.

Involved in the dispute is a strip ranging from 400 to 850 feet in width along the 25-mile Callahan-Coleman boundary, and a strip about 400 feet wide on the 4½-mile Taylor-Coleman boundary.

Taxes on land in the area claimed by Callahan and Coleman counties run about \$100 a year, and about \$20 a year on the area claimed by Taylor and Coleman counties.

Coleman County, in its suit, asks the court to declare its claimed boundary lines as the correct line.

Shanks said there is no direct precedent in the case in Texas history.

Coleman County has reportedly spent about half of the \$10,000 allocated to the case by the commissioners court, including hiring of an attorney and a surveyor. Callahan and Taylor county attorneys are handling the case for their respective counties.

In the junior show, Rickey Joy had the second place summer yearling Charlalse steer; Benny Brame showed the third place animal in that division; and Bill Moore had the fourth place yearling steer.

The steers are scheduled for sale this Friday.

Stepped-Up Garbage Collection Program to Begin Here March 1

An ordinance setting up new regulations for trash and garbage collection in Baird has been approved by the city council and will go into effect March 1.

City officials cited two reasons for the new, more rigid regulations. One is to enable the city to provide more efficient, dependable garbage collection, while the other is to cooperate with the State Health Dept. in attempting to eliminate flies and various diseases caused by open garbage cans.

Major provisions of the ordinance -- which is printed in full elsewhere in this edition -- include requirements of galvanized metal garbage cans, two pickups per week when weather permits, and a monthly residential fee of \$1 per family.

Regulations ordered by the new ordinance include:

1. One or more galvanized metal garbage cans, not to exceed 32 gallons, with lid, must be provided.

2. All wet garbage shall be

wrapped in paper before being placed in container.

3. It is not necessary to burn your trash -- but if you do, burn in separate barrel.

4. All garbage cans must be at alley where easily accessible. In blocks where alleys do not exist, the cans must be at the curb in front or at the side, as the case may be.

5. Grass cuttings will be picked up if placed in container without dirt.

6. Small tree limbs, etc., will be picked up provided they are stacked near the can and cut in lengths not to exceed 3 feet.

7. Reasonable size rocks will be hauled if they are stacked near the can.

8. Large tree limbs, lumber and miscellaneous debris will be hauled when requested, but additional charges will be according to the size of the load.

9. Residential fees will be \$1 per month per family. If more than one family uses the same can, each family will be charged \$1 per month.

10. Two pickups per week will be made when weather permits.

11. Commercial fees will be \$2.50 per month with pickups three times per week, except grocery stores, cafes, etc. For these the fee will be \$3 per month with daily pickup except Sunday and holidays.

BAIRD TEAMS WIND UP HOME SLATE WITH ALBANY CAGERS FRIDAY NIGHT

Baird's Bearetttes can wrap up their third straight district crown Friday night with a victory over Albany girls. Baird will host Albany for both boys and girls games.

The games will be the final scheduled home games for Baird High School season. Monday night the teams will visit Anson for non-conference games, then next Friday, Baird will visit Clyde to wind up district play for both schools.

Bears Need Both

The Bears must win games against both Albany and Clyde to remain in contention for the District 10-A title, while the Bearetttes have a two-game lead with two games to play.

Baird teams took wins over Cross Plains Tuesday night, after beating Ranger twice last Friday.

The Bearetttes laced the Cross Plains girls by 50-28 behind the 31-point shooting of Vickey Jones. Sally Green had 12 and

Yvonne Shelnett 7 for the Bearetttes.

Darylene Hargrove's 12 points was tops for the Buffettes.

Baird stunned the Buffettes, who were primed for an upset, from the start. The Bearetttes raced to a 16-3 lead in the first quarter and made it 33-16 at halftime. The third quarter was a slow one, with each team scoring only four points, but Baird closed with a rush to score 13 in the final eight minutes to 8 for Cross Plains.

Barton Makes 21

Tommy Barton bombed in 21 points for the Bears in their 64-47 conquest of Cross Plains boys. Maxie Gordon was the only other player to hit double figures -- with 10 -- but in all eight Baird players contributed to the scoring.

The Bears outscored Cross Plains in all but the fourth period and, thanks to a red-hot second period, held a comfortable 24-17 margin at the half.

Baird's Bearetttes scored almost at will last Friday to humble the Ranger girls 69-22. Ranger played more than seven minutes without a score, finally getting two points at the buzzer ending the first quarter.

Vickey Jones had 25, Peggy Gordon had 14 and Sally Green 12 in that game. Baird's defensive corps never allowed Ranger to make a game of it.

Bears Rally

The Bears had to rally Friday night to retain their lead against Ranger. The Bulldogs came within two points of knottling the score late in the fourth period.

Bobby Black hit 31 big points to lead the way while Barton had 15 and Maxie Gordon hit 10. Melton Kennedy was tops for Ranger with 19 while high-scoring Johnny McGee was held to 12.

Baird had a slim 15-14 lead after one quarter but made it 31-24 at halftime. It was 46-40 as the fourth frame opened.

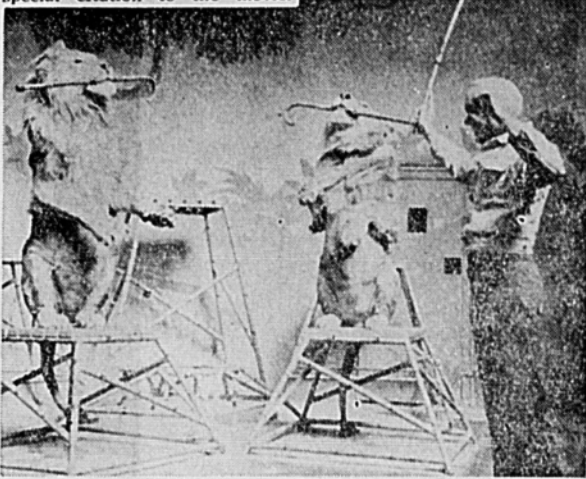

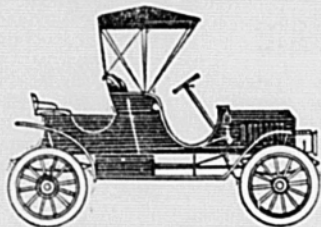

An Ordinance Defining Garbage and Refuse; Requiring Garbage To Be Placed In Metal Containers; The Disposal Of Garbage And Rubbish; Fixing A Charge For The Collecting And Disposal Of Garbage And Rubbish; Providing A Penalty For Violations Of The Provisions Of Such Ordinance; Providing A Saving Claus.

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SECTION I. Definitions.

Item 1. This ordinance shall be known as the "garbage ordinance" of the City of Baird, Texas.

Item 2. The term "premises" as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, offices, theaters, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist camps, apartments, sanitariums, rooming houses, schools, private residences, vacant lots and other places within the city limits of the City of Baird, Texas, where refuse, either garbage or rubbish, accumulates.

Item 3. The term "refuse" shall be interpreted to mean all solid wastes, including garbage and rubbish.

Item 4. The term "garbage" as used in this ordinance shall mean all putrescible wastes, except sewage and body wastes, including all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, and carcasses of small dead animals and dead fowls from any premises within the city limits.

Item 5. The term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance shall mean tin cans, bottles, papers, tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding 3 feet), papers, etc., from any premises within the city limits.

Item 6. "City Health Officer" as used here'in shall mean the City Health Officer of the City

of Baird, Texas, or his authorized agent.

SECTION II. Accumulation of Garbage and Rubbish

Item 1. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, or any place where garbage or rubbish accumulates, to provide, and at all times to maintain in good order and repair on any said premises, a portable container or containers for refuse, which shall be made of galvanized metal not easily corroddible, rodent and fly proof, with a tight-fitting lid which shall not be removed except when depositing or removing the contents of the receptacle, and with handles on the sides, and of sufficient capacity and in sufficient numbers to accommodate and securely keep all the garbage and rubbish that may accumulate between collections; provided, that each container shall have a capacity of not less than twenty gallons nor more than thirty-two gallons. Provided further all containers shall be kept clean and free from accumulation of any substance remaining attached to inside of container which would attract or breed flies, mosquitoes or any other insects.

Item 2. It shall be the duty of every person, firm, or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises to place the daily accumulation of garbage and rubbish in the container or containers required in Section 2, Item 1, and it shall be the duty of every person placing garbage in any such container to eliminate as far as possible all water and liquid from such garbage and so securely wrap garbage in paper before placing same in such container.

Item 3. All ordinary accumulations of rubbish such as tree limbs, paper boxes, and scrap lumber which cannot be conveniently placed in the containers required under this ordinance shall be gathered together, tied or sacked in compact bundles and placed in a location easily accessible for the collector.

SECTION III. Collection of Garbage and Rubbish.

Item 1. The City of Baird, Texas, shall collect from the residential areas of the city not less than twice weekly and from the business area of the city each business day, all garbage and rubbish; provided it shall be the duty of any person in possession or control of any premises to place the containers required in Item 1, Section 2, in a location easily accessible for the collector as directed by the City Health Officer.

Item 2. The places of excessive accumulations of garbage and rubbish, such as killing and dressing plants for fowl, may be excluded from the service provided by the City Garbage Department and such accumulations shall then be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge, provided, that the owner or person having such accumulations in charge shall secure from the City Health Department a written permit for removal and disposal of same. Said permit shall be issued only after said Health Officer has satisfied himself that the licensee is capable of complying with the requirements of this ordinance. The permit may be revoked by the City Health Officer when deemed necessary to the public welfare.

Item 3. Heavy dead animals, such as cows, horses, and mules, shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge and by the method directed by the City Health Officer.

Item 4. Heavy accumulations such as brush, broken concrete, ashes, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy materials shall be disposed of at the ex-

pense of the owner or person controlling same under the direction of the City Health Officer.

Item 5. Manure from cowlots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts, and other animal or fowl pens, and waste oils from garages or filling stations shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the person controlling same in the manner and by the method directed by the City Health Officer.

Item 6. The placing of garbage or rubbish or any refuse material in any street or alley within the city limits or the disposal of such refuse at any place within the city limits, except at the City Disposal Ground, or at such other place as may be directed by the City Health Officer, is prohibited.

Item 7. The meddling of refuse containers or in any way pilfering, scattering contents or junking in any alley or street within the city limits is prohibited.

Item 8. The collection of garbage or rubbish or any kind of junk within the city limits is prohibited except as provided for in Section 3, Items 2, 3, 4 and 5 of this ordinance.

SECTION IV. City Dump Ground To Be Locked.

The City of Baird maintains a Dump Ground for the purpose of disposing of the rubbish and garbage from said City and for the citizens of Baird who have additional trash they desire to haul themselves.

BEGINNING MARCH 1, 1965, the City Dump Ground gate will be locked and for citizens who have additional trash they desire to haul, it will be necessary to come to the City Hall, between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 4:00 P. M. Monday through Friday, to obtain a key.

Item 1. No heavy dead animals such as horses, cows, mules, hogs, etc., shall be placed in the City Dump Ground without a written permit by the General Superintendent of the City of Baird, who will issue detailed instructions.

Item 2. Removing junk of any kind from the City Dump Ground with out a written permit from the General Superintendent is hereby prohibited.

Item 3. The Dump Ground will be maintained in keeping with the recommendation of the City Health Officer, or his authorized agent.

Item 4. Trash and rubbish shall be dumped in the proper area as per signs indicating dumping areas.

SECTION V.

It shall be the duty of the City Health Officer of the City of Baird, Texas, or his authorized agent, and he is hereby directed, to make all necessary inspections and investigations of any and all premises to see that the terms of this ordinance are complied with.

SECTION VI.

The disposal of garbage and rubbish shall be by an approved

method of incineration (not open burning) or by landfill and cover.

SECTION VII.

There shall be charged, assessed and collected from each residential premises within the city limits the monthly amount of \$1.00 and from each business premises within said city limits the monthly amount of \$2.50 to \$3.00. The city secretary shall collect these garbage and rubbish fees either through the water department as a separate item on each water bill or by any other practicable means of collection.

SECTION VIII.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$25.00 and each day that any such person shall violate any

of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and be punishable as such.

SECTION IX.

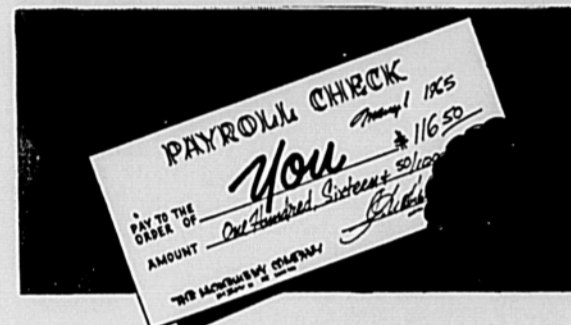
This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other sanitary ordinances or regulations of the City of Baird, Texas, unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances and regulations, in which case the terms of this ordinance shall prevail.

SECTION X.

That if any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Grain Signup Begins Monday

Feed grain producers desiring to take part in the 1965 program have been reminded by the County ASC office, of the sign-up dates - Monday, Feb. 8 through Friday, March 26.

The program for 1965 is much the same as the past programs with a few minor exceptions. Changes will be explained in detail when producers sign their agreements to participate.

A person may divert from 20 to 50 percent of the feed grain base or 25 acres, but not to exceed the total base. The lower payment rate will apply where a person diverts the minimum acreage (20 percent.). Where 40 percent or more of the base is diverted the higher rate will apply to all acreage diverted.

Where a feed grain producer is signed up in the 1965 wheat program, he may substitute feed grain for wheat or wheat for feed grain, provided he is signed up in both programs.

Poll Tax Total Hits 1,338 In Callahan

A total of 1,338 Callahan County residents paid their poll tax before the Jan. 31 deadline, according to figures compiled by assessor-collector Albert Lovell.

Seven exemption certificates were issued to county residents who have just turned 21 years of age.

The figure is the lowest for the county since 1953, when 1,336 poll taxes were paid. The 1953 figure was one of the lowest in many years in the county, Lovell said.

Last year's total was 2,218 and the 1963 total was 1,648.

Cotton Program Ruling Changed

Sign-up requirements for participating in the 1965 cotton domestic allotment program have been changed. Only farmers whose domestic allotment (smaller) is less than the effective (larger) allotment will be required to sign an agreement to be eligible for payments for reducing their acreage.

Small cotton producers, those with domestic and effective allotments that are the same, do not have to sign up to be eligible for payments.

Sign-up period begins Feb. 8 and ends on March 28.

Only payment to be earned under this program is where a person elects to reduce his planted cotton acreage for 1965 from his effective to his domestic allotment. When the effective allotment is 15 acres or less, the domestic allotment is the same as the effective allotment.

No acreage is required to be diverted under the cotton program.

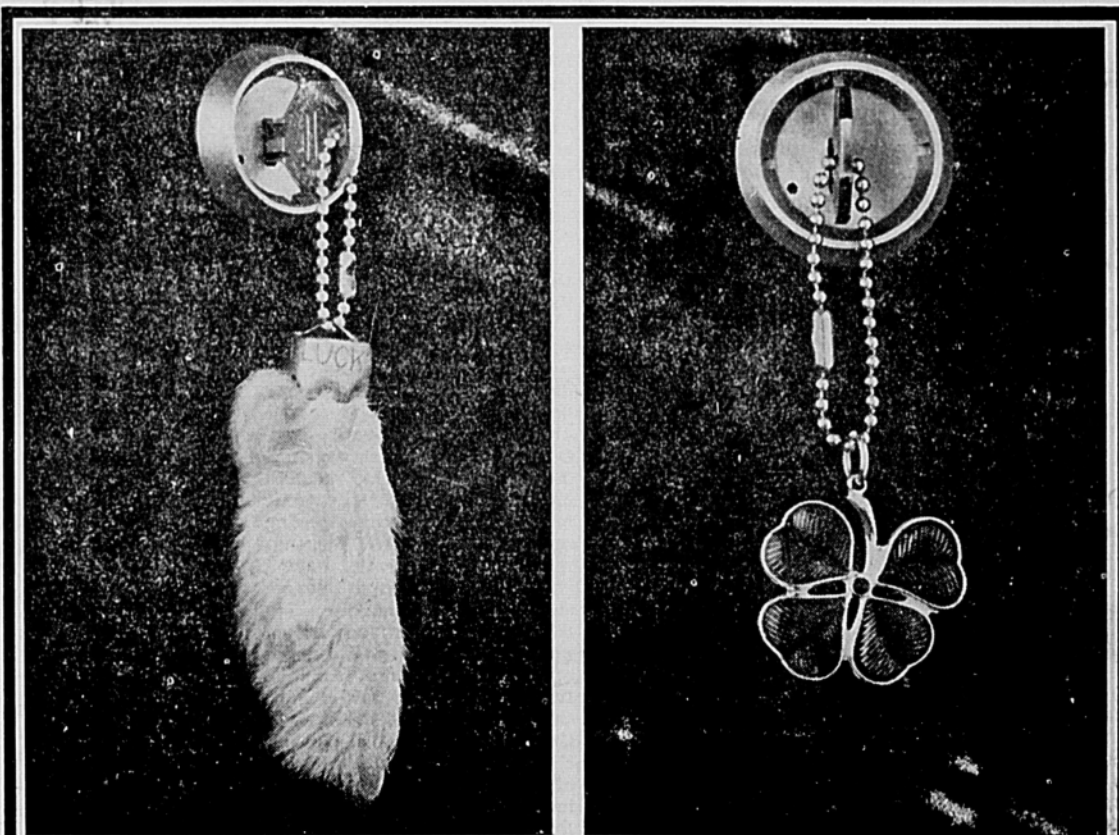
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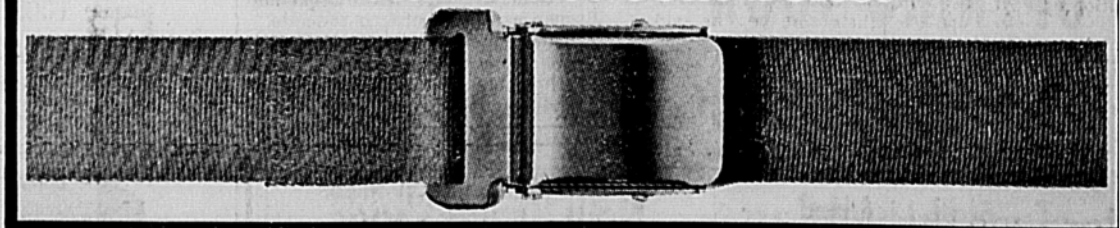

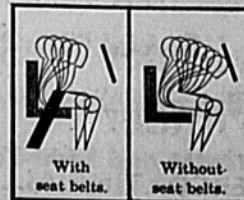

Assn. Official Cites Interest In Pooling Bill

Citizens of Callahan County, producer of some \$7.1 million worth of oil and gas a year, have a special interest in the "pooling" bill now before the Texas Legislature, James L. Sewell, Dallas, president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn. said this week.

"Although Callahan County has production, the oil men who operate here, as well as the landowners and governmental officials, are interested in securing maximum development," Sewell said. "A pooling law will encourage a more efficient and more equitable approach to development of our oil and gas resources."

A measure, supported by all segments of the Texas petroleum industry after two years of intra-industry conferences and study, was recently introduced as Senate Bill 2 by Senator Galloway Calhoun Jr. of Tyler, and as House Bill 2 by Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge.

Sewell stressed that the measure does not affect normal leasing and voluntary pooling arrangements between landowners and operators, nor does it affect in any way reservoirs discovered and produced before March 8, 1961 (date of Supreme Court decision that wells on small tracts could be produced at rates disproportionately higher than adjoining tracts).

"The pooling bill is designed to make it possible for mineral owners -- regardless of the size tract of land they may have -- to get their fair share of the oil and gas that may underly their acreage," he said.

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AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — Once upon a time we took gold out of "them thar hills." Maybe now we are putting it back.

The destination of the four truckloads of gold out of Fort Knox remains somewhat of a mystery. With the condition of our balance of payments abroad, some of us feel we should be trucking gold into Fort Knox, rather than taking it out.

It is an essential function of government to provide and maintain a stable currency. At intervals in the history of most nations this has proved a difficult job. Some nations have even fallen when the stability of their currency eroded and inflation ravaged the economy.

The law requires that the United States government keep a reserve of gold to back up its currency. Gold was chosen because it is one metal which has kept a stable value for centuries. Our government is required to buy all gold offered it at 35 per ounce.

Federal law requires the reserve to be at least 25 per cent of the amount of Federal Reserve notes (currency) and deposits. At the present time, the requirement is more than \$13 billion in gold, based on this percentage. The purpose of the requirement is to provide a brake on the amount of money issued to create confidence in the value of the dollar.

American citizens can not demand gold for dollars, but foreign governments can. The demands of a foreign government must be paid from our supply of gold in excess of the 25 per cent reserve requirement.

In the last fifteen years our short-term liabilities to foreigners callable in gold have increased from about \$13½ billion to more than \$26 billion. Our total gold holdings have decreased from about \$22 billion to around \$15 billion. Deducting the 25 per cent reserve, this leaves less than \$2 billion in "free" gold to apply against demands from foreign governments on the more than \$26 billion they hold. Only once in the last 15 years have we earned more credits abroad than we had going out. The outgo is primarily caused by imports, foreign aid, dollars invested by American business overseas, money spent for armed forces stationed in foreign countries, and tourist spending. To offset all this, American goods must be sold abroad. This has not been the case and hence the \$26 billion deficit.

Ordinarily foreign nations will not demand gold for more than

a very small percentage of United States dollars they acquire. They are satisfied as long as they have confidence in the value of the dollar, to hold these liabilities as a part of their government's reserve funds. Some countries are trying to increase their proportion of reserves they hold in gold, and for that reason are making demands on the United States for gold payments.

Since the world market price is more than the \$35 per ounce, it is cheaper to get it from the United States, which sets this price by law. The world market price at present is \$35.14 per ounce, down from \$35.19 a few weeks ago. Since our legal price is \$35 per ounce, there is little opportunity to buy gold on the world market to replace our stocks.

There is now a proposal to release the 25 per cent reserve requirement for Federal Reserve notes and deposits in order that this amount may be used to pay foreign demands and bolster confidence in the dollar.

There is no threat of a "run" by foreign nations on our gold reserve, but in considering this very complicated question the wiser course would seem to be the reduction of foreign aid spending, practice greater economy at home, collect our European debts, sell more goods abroad and assure the world the dollar will remain stable.

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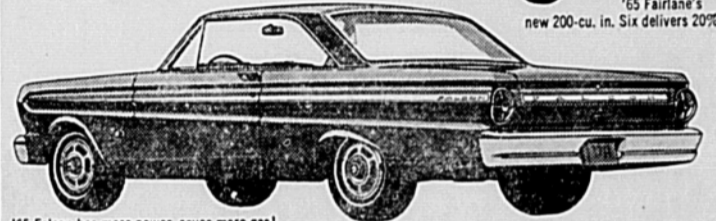
