**HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE**

By ARTHUR E. COOK  
 National and Olympic Rifle Champion



**Where To Shoot**  
 Finding a safe place to shoot is most important. A safe shooter is a skillful shooter—he knows where every bullet is going and he has a backstop behind his target to stop the bullet. This applies both to hunting and target shooting. And no matter what kind of shooting you intend to do, get your practice on the target range. It is the only good way to learn the basics.  
 For beginners I recommend firing at 50 feet, the standard indoor distance. Later you can increase to 50 and 100 yards, the standard outdoor distances. The illustration at left above shows a safe bullet stop for a 50-foot range in your basement or shed. Fill a large packing box or crib with sand and place it in front of a solid brick or masonry wall. Board-up all windows with steel or one-inch hardwood. Reinforce the front of the box and arrange lights as shown. Sand about eighteen inches from front to back will stop .22 caliber bullets, but remember to repack it regularly.  
 Outdoors select a steep hill or bank which is free from rocks and hang your target in front of it. Build a simple frame to hold your target; don't tack it to a tree or the bullets will ricochet dangerously.  
 Best of all join or form a rifle club in your community or school and build a real range. You will quickly become safe and skillful.  
 (This instruction based on the booklet, "HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE," published by The National Rifle Association, Washington, D. C.)  
**Never point your gun muzzle at anything you do not intend to shoot!**

**CROP Food Helps Homeless Girl, 4**



Four-year-old Ursula Gramarok, one of the millions of refugee children in Germany, has no home of her own. But she does have some of the food every day. She gets it at the Grubweg church home, which is supplied from contributions which were made by American farmers in this and 25 other states to the Christian Rural Overseas program (CROP).  
 In the year ending June 1, a total of 75,668,581 pounds of farm commodities had been contributed for distribution in 22 of the 43 nations served by CROP's sponsoring agencies: Catholic Rural Life, Church World Service (22 Protestant denominations), and Lutheran World Relief. Gifts in kind included 28,975,504 pounds of wheat for 38% of the total, 22,061,357 pounds of corn for 28%, and 13,185,661 pounds of beans for 17%.  
 Meanwhile, plans are well advanced for extending the CROP drive nationwide this year. Already, organizations have been set up in 20 states, and 11 others are in the process of organization for harvest season campaigns.

**Windy Sure "Stopped The Show"**

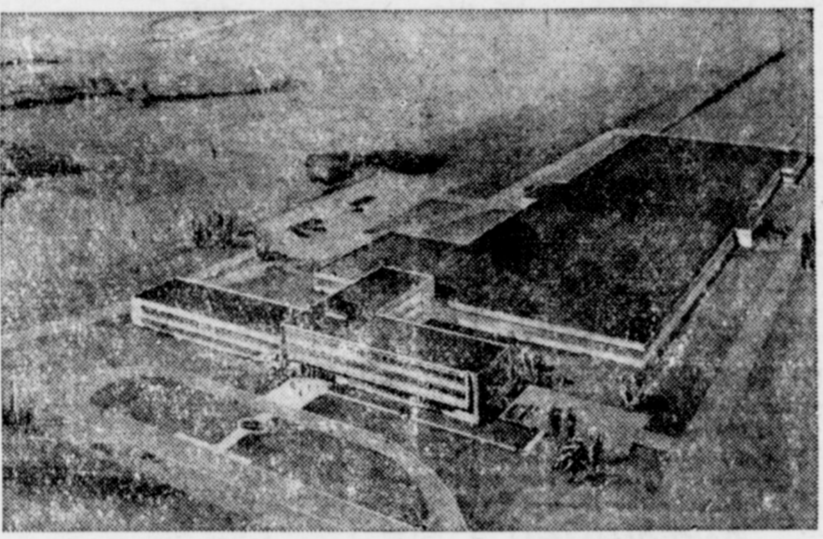
The other night a bunch of us were over at Judge Cunningham's watching a swell vaudeville program on his new television set. It came in fine, but just once, the screen got a little streaky.

 Dusting would be a good idea in his opinion. Best results have been obtained locally with the solution known as 3-5-40, he said. Mr. Adams spent a goodly amount of time in the south part of the county investigating insect damage last week.  
 He hasn't seen any aphids or flea hoppers in serious numbers, but he says they are present and advised a sharp lookout. Lamb County farmers have reported considerable activity by these insects, he said.

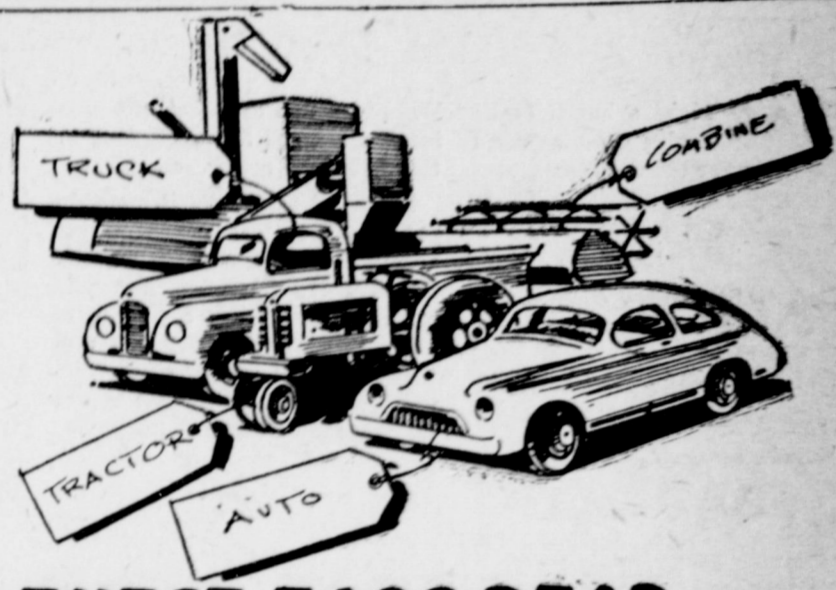

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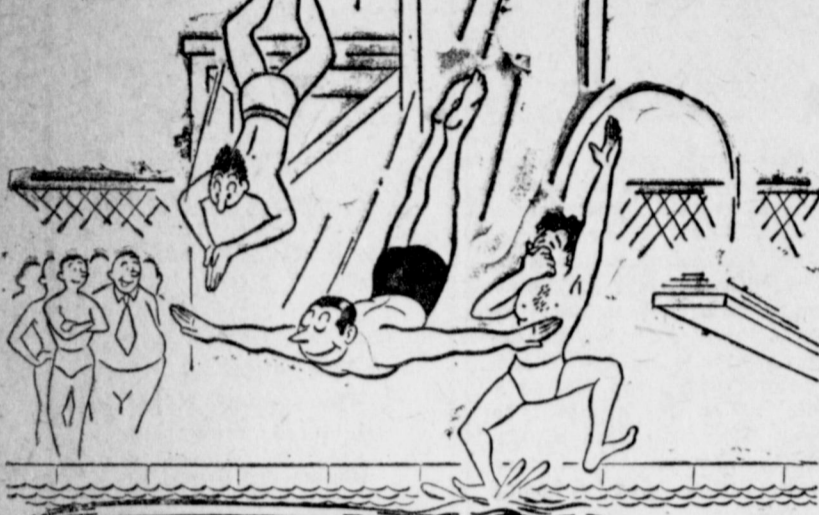



**Giles Says Procedure For Acquiring Land Under Vet Program To Be Kept Simple**

(Editor's Note: This is the concluding article of a series of three by Bascom Giles explaining the newly created Veterans' Land Board Program.)

In keeping with the terms of the legislation creating the Texas Veterans' Land Board, its administration and operating policies will be kept as simple as the problems of this huge program will permit.

The fact that approximately 13,000 veterans have already contacted this office for information on the working details of the plan indicates the commendable desire of veterans to own a farm or ranch home under the idea originally conceived by the author five years ago.

Paper work involving application to participate has been cut to the minimum. Each successive step has been shorn of all encumbering delays.

For example, proof of the applicant's eligibility can be established by submitting a certified copy of his honorable discharge plus substantiation that the applicant was a resident of Texas at the time he entered military service and is still a legal resident at the time of application for land program benefits. For those taking advantage of the 90 day priority offered those who have a service-connected disability sustained in combat, certification of such must accompany the application.

Each veteran will be limited to one purchase not exceeding \$7,500 cost to the Board. He will be required to pay not less than five per cent down and execute an on-or-before note for 40 years at three per cent interest for the balance.

Should a purchaser desire to acquire a tract of land costing NOT more than \$10,000 he will be required to pay the difference between \$7,500 and the purchase price plus the five per cent down payment on the \$7,500 loan.

He shall have served not less than 90 days on active duty in some branch of the armed service between September 16, 1940 and December 31, 1946, unless discharged sooner for service-connected disabilities. A certified copy of the applicant's honorable discharge will be required to be filed with application. In addition, a veteran who leases his land for oil or gas must apply one-half of all bonus and rentals to the retirement of his debt.

The veterans will NOT be required to live upon the property but he will NOT be permitted to dispose of it for a period of three years.

Payments of principle on note with interest will be made on a semi-annual basis. Each veteran will receive a contract of sale from the state and upon final payment he or she will be granted absolute title.

Failure to make payments when due, permits the Board to revoke the contract of purchase and to forfeit the land which can then be offered for resale to other veterans.

A veteran may reinstate his land which has been forfeited, up to the announced date of resale by payment of a penalty and placing account in good standing.

The Board in its first meeting named Alvis Vandygriff as executive secretary.

Vandygriff, an attorney, who hails from Ennis, Texas, has been serving as Chief Clerk of the General Land Office. He is a veteran of World War II having served as a Major in the Army Air Force. He was selected by the Board to direct the administrative machinery of the new program on the basis of his long experience in the Land Office where the offices and records of the program will be maintained.

**Girlstown Is Placed At Morton**

Site for the proposed Girlstown USA was more particularly determined as the legal instrument conveying 1336.5 acres to the project was filed by T. B. Duggan, Lubbock philanthropist in Cochran county clerk's office.

Duggan also contributed \$20,000 to the project to finance the building of a 28 bed dormitory. At present the home for otherwise homeless girls is located at Buffalo Gap, Texas and facilities are available for only 12 girls.

Miss Amelia Anthony, trustee and founder of Girlstown, explained that the gift would finance the start of a long range project to be patterned after Boys Ranch which is located near Tascosa.

The founder hoped that completion of the dormitory would be reached within 90 days. Girls of school age will attend the Whiteface public schools. Eleven of the twelve girls now in Girlstown are of school age.

The land is located due south of Whiteface in Cochran county, about eight miles to the site of the proposed headquarters.
