

In recent experiments at both College Station and Lubbock with the
harvesting of cotton mechanically, it
was found that the cotton should be
dry and practically free of green leaves
and green unopen bolls, and the harvested cotton should not be placed on
damp ground for any great length of
time prior to ginning. Cotton which
had not fully matured and which contained a high percentage of moisture
in the form of green leaves and green
unopen bolls when piled in the field
was damaged by heating, the temperature in some cases being as high as
149 degrees F. This resulted in the destruction of the germinating power of
the costonseed and the fat contents
