#### Fmr. Bush officials not immune to prosecution

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama said Tuesday the United States lost "our moral bearings" with gruesome terror-suspect interrogations and left the door open to prosecuting Bush administration officials who vouched for their legality.

At the same time, Obama said the question of whether to bring charges "is going to be more of a decision for the attorney general within the parameters of various laws and I don't want to prejudge that." The president discussed the continuing issue of terrorism-era interrogation tactics with reporters as he finished an Oval Office meeting with visiting King Abdullah of Jordan.



#### First high-level Syrian visit to Iraq in decades

BAGHDAD (AP) — The prime ministers of Syria and Iraq discussed ways to prevent militants from crossing the porous border between the two countries Tuesday during the highest level Syrian visit to Iraq in almost three decades, an Iraqi government

spokesman said. Syrian Prime Minister Naji al-Otari's two-day visit to Baghdad is aimed at easing long-standing tensions between the two neighbors that flared last year when U.S. forces raided a Syrian village over the border from Iraq in an operation that targeted militants.

Geithner. 'The sense of fear and uncertainty has not gone away, but it's been joined by a new sense of anger and frustration," said Elizabeth Warren, who is also a Harvard University law professor. "People are angry that, even if they have consistently paid their bills on time and never missed a payment, their TARP-assisted banks are unilaterally raising their interest rates or slashing their credit lines."

Of the \$700 billion authorized by Congress for the Troubled Asset Relief about \$110 billion is left. With about \$25 billion expected to be repaid this year, the total available is about \$135

Some banks are maneuvering to pay back some of the bailout money, unhappy with the strings attached. But Geithner said that doesn't mean the government would necessarily accept the repayments.

These questions have to be first answered, he said: "Do the institutions themselves have enough capital to be able to lend and does the system as a whole, is it working for the American people for recovery?" A series of "stress tests" are being administered to banks by the administration to help judge

The treasury secretary said that while most banks have more than enough capital to satisfy federal regulators, a combination of factors including worries about the broader economy and the crushing weight on their balance sheets of bad loans and other toxic securities — was feeding "uncertainty about the health of individual banks."

That, in turn, "has sharply reduced lending across the financial system" and was holding back economic recovery, Geithner said.

Geithner testified on a day that saw a spate of reports suggesting the economic downturn is far from over and is growing ever more expensive.

# HSC increases NIH funding, staff

The Texas Tech Health Sciences Center will continue submitting proposals for stimulus funding related to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 this month in an effort to increase National Institutes of Health research grant funding and reach a total research expenditure projection of \$31.3 million this year.

Douglas Stocco, executive vice president for research at the Tech Health Sciences Center, said the center maintains about 45 National Institutes of Health grants, with additional funding projected follow-

increased from \$6.1 million to \$9 million from 2007 to 2008, so there was a 48 percent increase," he said. "Our total extramurally funded research went from \$14.9 million in 2007 to \$19.9 million in 2008. At the same time, our total research expenditures increased from about \$19 million to approximately \$26

Stocco said the Health Sciences

Center will submit about 121 grants directly related to the NIH stimulus funding initiative and an additional 27 grant applications during the normal submission process within the next few weeks.

According to the National Institutes of Health Web site, the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act of 2009 will provide \$8.2 billion in extramural funding to the NIH to advance scientific research through selecting peer reviewed research grant applications, funding new research applications, accelerating ongoing science supplements to current grants and to support new types of activities that meet the goals of the act.

The total amount awarded through an NIH grant may fluctuate depending on the specific scope, type and scale of the research conducted, the NIH Web site reported; however, researchers may receive between about \$30,000 and \$1 million in funding, with more or less awarded based on the specific grant application.

Stocco said the Health Sciences Center also has seen an increase in NIH grant applications because of the typically large funding size awarded and the level of peerreview present in NIH grants.

"The grants are usually bigger and they tend to create a lot of internal notice at institutions," he

said. "They are usually considered the gold standard of peer-review in terms of the R01 granting mechanism and represent the pinnacle of research excellence for many biomedical scientists. They act as a sort of barometer to indicate where an institution is in terms of

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Web site, the Research Project Grant Program, R01, is the original grant mechanism used by NIH to provide support for health-related research and development and is not limited in regard to funding.

# Colleges push tuition aid for illegal immigrants




