LOCAL CITIZENS RECEIVE STATE CHARTER, PURCHASE ACERAGE

BAIRD — The City Land Company of Baird, Inc., has received their Charter from the State of Texas. This Corporation was formed to purchase and develop an area north of IH 20, which will offer commercial, residential and industrial sites.

Contract for purchase has been signed by the local group and Curtis Jones of Mercedes, formerly of Baird. This covers approximately 53 acres of land east of FM Road 2047, running to the north line of this tract and the east line to the old Gunn road. The property has about 1800 feet of IH20 frontage.

Work on this project has been in progress for some time and

negotiations with Mr. Jones since September 1969.

The local group decided to seek a State Corporation Charter in a recent meeting at which time Incorporators were named, all presently in the organization group. Officers and Directors were also named. Incorporators are: Howard Farmer, Fred Goble, Jimmy Godfrey, Jon Hardwick, J. Rupert Jackson, S. L. McElroy, Charles Reeves, D. L. Robinson, Curtis Sutphen, Steve Warren, R. C. Wristen.

Officers of the Corporation are: President, Charles Reeves; Vice President, Curtis Sutphen; Secretary-Treasurer, Howard Farmer. Directors are: Fred Goble, Jimmy Godfrey, S. L. McElroy and R. C. Wristen.

Others have expressed interest, and this being an open stock corporation, anyone interested can now join the project with the same consideration as Incorporators. Work on the Corporation was completed in order to speed up the Charter and be prepared to contract with the seller. Other citizens are urged to work with the Corporation now. Some have made inquiry and they should see one of the Officers or Directors immediately.

The real purpose of the City Land Company of Baird, Inc., is to have available land, locally owned and controlled to offer, at realistic values for development to any interested buyer, locally or out of town, and to attempt to get something underway in our community.

The cause of all this erroneous jargon is man's denominational concept of the church. What man is really asking is, "What denomination do you belong to?" But, this is not the Biblical concept of the church at all. The New Testament church is the body of Christ, the bride of Christ and the kingdom of God. If a man is a member of it, he has no earthly reason for being a member of a denomination.

AUSTIN — Top Texas officials have agreed on general outlines of a plan to combat the rising problem of drug abuse.

Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin and House Speaker Gus Mutscher are united in a statewide concentration of effort. Plan was announced after a meeting of the four in Smith's office last week. Texas Justice Council will serve as coordinator.

Coordinated law enforcement action will first be called on to try and dry up the sources of dangerous drugs.

Top priority is given a "total education" campaign for youth, adults, teachers and law enforcement personnel on drug dangers and possible solutions to the problem.

Task forces will be named to develop effective concepts and action programs in enforcement and education.

Leaders agreed on this immediate-action program:

One-day seminars for Texas law officers and prosecutors.

Exchange of vital information with Mexico.

Assistance through the Justice Council to implement school education.

Review of successful narcotics programs in other states.

Greater assistance to local enforcement and prosecuting agencies in evidence analysis.

Gathering of statistics in major cities on drug-related crime.

Creation of a model drug information office.

Narcotics strike forces will include local, state and federal personnel, military manpower and use of helicopter patrols along the Rio Grande.

Another task force will attempt to explore causes of drug use and to evaluate proposed research and rehabilitation programs as well as to implement educational programs in schools.

State officials will meet here March 13 with aides to U. S. Atty. Gen. John Mitchell. They will explore federal support possible under remedial programs and the uniform controlled dangerous substances act now before congress.

TOLL ROADS PROPOSED — In a surprise session with the State Highway Commission, Texas Turnpike Authority proposed that preliminary studies be made for the development of a massive toll road network estimated to cost more than \$135 million.

Last year the Legislature authorized the agency, subject to the Highway Department's permission, to spend money for investigating the feasibility of additional pay-road projects.

Turnpike Authority asked the Commission to let it make exploratory studies of the following projects:

An 83-mile, \$50 million mid-Texas turnpike from Hillsboro to Interstate 45 near Center-ville, to provide a direct freeway from Dallas-Fort Worth to Houston-Beaumont areas.

A 20-mile, \$40 million Dallas-Fort Worth - Trinity turnpike connecting Dallas and Fort Worth parallel to the present turnpike by way of the projected Greater Southwest International airport between the two cities.

An 8.8 mile, \$18 million airport tollway connecting LBJ Freeway in Dallas to the new airport estimated for completion in 1973.

A \$20 million toll road in San Antonio to follow the route of long-delayed U. S. 281 North Expressway.

A 1.2 mile, \$7 million toll bridge across Mountain Creek Lake in Dallas County connecting the Oak Cliff and Arlington areas.

A turnpike from downtown Houston to Intercontinental Airport and possibly other facilities in the state's largest city.

Preliminary studies will take six to nine months. Feasibility surveys may follow where rea-

sonable promise is shown for the projects.

Savings Bonds Reach 5% Of Sales Goal

According to Howard Farmer, Chairman of Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee, the 1970 Savings Bonds goal for Callahan County is \$130,000. January sales totaled \$6,252 for 5 per cent of the sales goal.

The 1970 sales goal for Texas is \$179.9 million. During the month sales were \$15,862,542 with 9 per cent of the state's goal achieved.

The Treasury Department announced that sales over the nation totaled \$407 million -- 3.8 per cent below January a year ago. Exchanges of Series E and Series H Savings Bonds during the month amounted to \$172 million -- 3 per cent above the \$16.7 million exchanged in January 1969.

MOON OVERSHADOWS EARTH ON MARCH 7 SOLAR ECLIPSE

WASHINGTON — The mid-day sun will disappear and the shadow of the moon will darken the Earth March 7 in what will be the most-studied solar eclipse in history.

Thousands of astronomers and other scientists will train shielded telescopes and cameras skyward. The eclipse will streak a shadow path 100 miles across southern Mexico, the Gulf, northern Florida, eastern Georgia and the Carolinas, and the tip of Virginia before heading out to sea, touching Nantucket Island on the way.

It will be the last solar eclipse visible along the Eastern Seaboard this century, although eclipses of the sun will cross from Alaska to Labrador in 1972 and across the northwestern United States in 1979.

Parents should keep their children under close surveillance during the March 7 eclipse, the American Association of Ophthalmology warns. You can see the eclipse better by not watching it. Instead do as the experts do -- watch the image of the eclipse by using a pinhole device.

A projector for use in watching the eclipse may be made with two pieces of white cardboard. A pin hole or pencil hole in the top cardboard will project and focus the image of the eclipse on the second cardboard. Size of the image may be changed by altering distances between cardboards. DO NOT look at the sun through the

pin hole.
 This permanent impairment of vision is entirely preventable if adults will protect themselves and their children from exposure.

Top Dressing Time For Small Grains

BAIRD — Top dressing time for small grains is at hand and a job that should be done on time, reminds County Agent Gregory Gergross. Adequate soil moisture, at the time of application, usually insure a good response from the plant food.

If early planted small grains have been grazed, it is reasonable to expect that all or most of the originally applied nitrogen has been used by the crop. If forage yields have been checked, or a protein analysis obtained, it is fairly easy to determine how much nitrogen has been used by the crop so far.

As a general rule, points out the county agent, for every ton of 12.5 percent protein forage produced, 40 pounds of nitrogen are required.

Top dressing should be done within the next month with 30 to 50 pounds of nitrogen per acre depending upon the condition of the crop and earlier fertilization. Application should be made as soon as field conditions permit, advised the county agent.

Nitrogen rates of 60 pounds or less per acre do not increase the chances of nitrate poisoning in livestock. Cloudy weather, on the other hand, is the chief contributing factor to excessive nitrates in plants.

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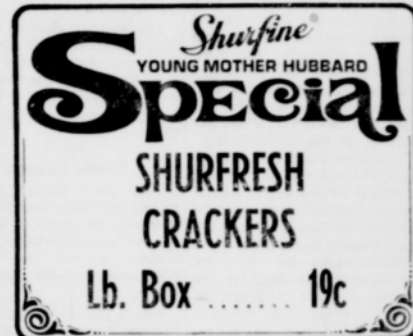
