

IF PERSUASION FAILS:

New Wage, Price Controls Hinted

By SAM DAWSON NEW YORK (AP) — Both government and business are moving warily into the new economic climate that 1966 promises. It seems sure to be different from the last five years. Adjustments will have to be made by both government and business, and likely by consumers too.

President Johnson in his new federal budget already unveiled and in his economic message today outlines the steps by which the government proposes to keep prosperity rolling while restraining its exuberance.

Smaller Deficit
The restraints mean taking more money out of paychecks in the months ahead and out of corporate cash tills. The budget also proposes a smaller U.S. Treasury deficit, watering down that form of stimulant. And, more important perhaps, the President warns of more drastic steps of business, labor or the consumer get out of line and head for a speculative binge.

Business and labor are faced with new adjustments to government wage guidelines, on price and heavy trading on the exchanges also focus attention on what the stock market could do to the expanding economy.

Ahead also may be closer government supervision of upward changes in prices and wages. And there is the outside possibility that if either business or labor balk a showdown might bring congressional action turning voluntary guideposts as to how high prices can go, how high wages can go, into fixed rules set by congress.

Controls Tighter
Another phase of the new climate in 1966 is the tightening this year of the 1965 controls called voluntary, on corporate investment, overseas, and bank loans to foreigners. The aim is keep the dollar sound in international financial dealing, and thus help in preserving its purchasing power at home. This is an important phase of the war against possible inflation, or further loss of the dollar's buying power.

All this may develop before 1966 is over. But stressed this week are the specific moves being made by Washington, or requested of congress, to hold the economy in line without stunting on finances for the Viet Nam war or upsetting prospects of still better times at home.

Interest Rates Up
Restraints already in effect include: Rising interest rates, as initiated early in December by the Federal Reserve Board; higher Social Security tax rates that cut take-home pay for employees and raise labor costs for employers, since both pay more into the Treasury this year; Higher costs of borrowing and less cash in hand are supposed to check speculative or all-out spending spree.

Asked of Congress, and considered likely to be passed, are rescinding excise tax cuts on autos and phone fares that took effect Jan. 1, an increase in the airline passenger ticket tax, increased withholding on pay-

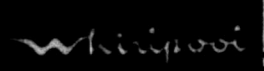

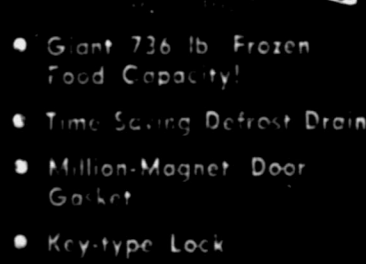


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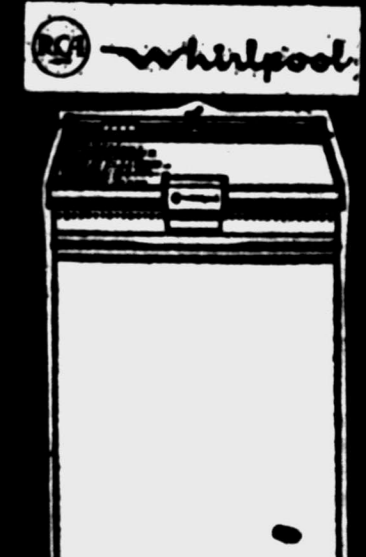

Some Symptoms Of Executive Stress Listed

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Know what executive stress is?

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King Hears Slum Life Complaints

By WILLIAM J. CONWAY (CHICAGO AP) — Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. says Chicago has the same problems that set off race riots in the Watts area of California last August.

King, organizing a drive against slum conditions in Chicago, listened to complaints about slum life Wednesday night. Then he said, "Many things you said tonight I heard in the same kind of session in Watts. The power structure better pay attention."

"The same problems that existed and still exist in Watts exist in Chicago today. If something isn't done in a hurry, we can see a darker night of social disruption."

Moved Into Flat
King moved into a \$60-a-month slum flat on Chicago's West Side Wednesday and told residents, "We'll have to have rent strikes to dramatize our problems."

King plans to organize a union of slum dwellers to bargain with landlords as a first step of a showdown that could possibly lead to rent strikes in March or later.

King spent most of Wednesday night at a session in the East Club of the Brighton on the West Side. A crowd of 400 turned out to listen and a dozen complaints about the way of life in the East Side Negroes dominated the audience, but there was a sprinkling of whites.

Martina Henry, with two small children, said she has been in the slum for 10 years.

Stout Woman
Mills, a stout woman in a light-colored sweater, said, "I'm not going to pay rent where there are rats and roaches. I'm going to throw out my keys."

She drew a burst of applause. Rudy Howard, a Marshall High School student, said the school was built for 2,000 and it now has 4,000 enrollees.

The key to Negroes getting ahead is education and I'm not getting a proper education," he said. "I'm sick of it."

He also touched off applause. Leo McCarty, wearing a denim jacket and denim pants, said, "I don't like a precinct captain. I don't see until election night with \$2 in his hand."

King said that he will spend two or three days a week in Chicago and later spend most of his time here as his campaign picks up momentum.

Negroes Pay More
In commenting on his rent, King said, "Negroes pay an average of \$20 more for comparable apartments than whites."

In a related development, a state legislator said Wednesday that King's landlord will be subpoenaed by a legislative commission investigating slum housing.

Rep. Robert E. Mann (D-Chicago) said landlord Alvin Shavin and his company records will be subpoenaed for a March 2 appearance before the legislative commission on low-income housing.

Theme of the two-day series of lectures and discussions will be "The Education of Women for Social and Political Leadership." Invited to attend were approximately 30 Texas women leaders and delegated women students from Southwest Conference schools.

Crews Are Patching Damaged City Streets

City paving crews Wednesday began filling chockholes caused by the city's prolonged freeze.

However, Ralph Campbell, superintendent of public works, does not think paving damage will be extensive. "The snow didn't melt and thaw repeatedly during the last week," Campbell said. "We are quite sure we did have some damage but not a great deal. It will be another day or two before we can get the snow off the streets."

Crews were doing patchwork Wednesday on thoroughfares which are free of snow.

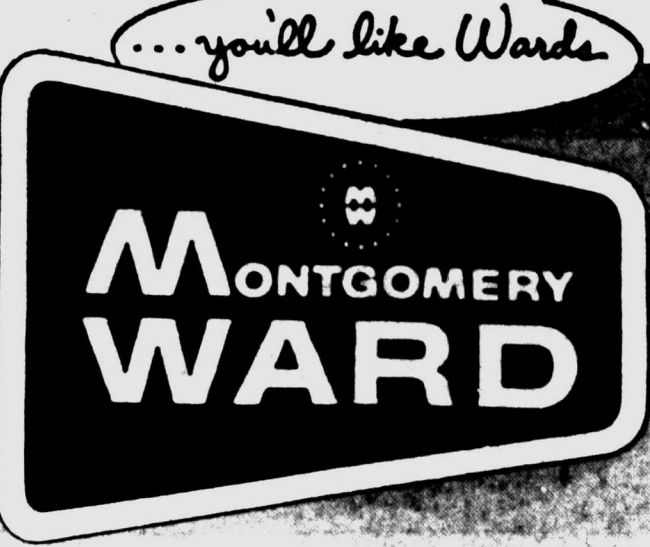
Rusk Issues Warning After Red Meeting

HIGH COURT TO DECIDE

Question Of Poll Tax Is As Old As Country

By BARRY SCHWEID. WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress could have saved the Supreme Court a lot of trouble last year. But it chose to pass the buck instead, and so the nine justices are wrestling with a problem as old as this country. Is the right to vote fundamental or does it spring from the states?

To the Justice Department the franchise is a fundamental right implicit in the First Amendment's guarantees of political expression and in other provisions of the Constitution as well. "Vestigial Right" To the state of Virginia "it is a state-created right" and one of the few "vestigial rights" of the state in an era of increasing federal power.

These historical arguments go to the heart of the justices' current problem. Laying on the constitutionality of the Virginia poll tax. Their decision may, for all practical purposes, finally put the old arguments to rest. If the court rules that the state may not tax a head tax in voting, much of the emotion will have been squeezed out of the arguments. But the court can reach a narrower decision — or toss the problem back into the laps of lower courts.

Had Lot To Say When Congress wrote the voting rights law last year it had a lot to say about poll taxes. According to section 10. They impose unreasonable financial hardships upon poor people, they do not bear a reasonable relationship to conduct of elections, in some areas they deny the right to vote because of race. Further, Congress directed the attorney general to go to court to test state laws which make payment of a poll tax a precondition to voting.

But Congress did not outlaw the poll tax as a qualification for voting in state elections, as the 24th Amendment did in 1961 for federal elections. Five States And so the poll tax as a voting qualification remains on the books in Virginia, Alabama, Texas, Mississippi and Vermont. Because it does, U.S. Solicitor General Thurgood Marshall told the Supreme Court this week thousands of newly registered Negroes in Mississippi and Alabama who did not pay their poll tax still would be able to vote. The poll tax, he said, is "the one weapon remaining" to bar them.

Board Is Given Airliner Report

Airport Board members heard briefing today by city aviation director Ed Colby, who said new airlines carrying up to 600 passengers near the speed of sound should be operating on major trunk lines by 1970. As a result of speed and capacity in the new transport, air fares probably will drop about 35 per cent, Colby said. In addition, present big jet transports like the Boeing 707 and Douglas DC-8 will be shifted to runs through intermediate points such as Lubbock, he said. In other business, the board reviewed a number of business transactions, deferred action on repairs estimated at \$14,000 to the airport water tower pending study, and discussed but took no action on the airport's crowded parking lot.

Statistics On Labor Tell "Less And Less" NEW YORK (AP) — Statistics on national unemployment are "telling us less and less," says the new U. S. commissioner of labor statistics, Arthur M. Ross. He said job statistics are more valuable in terms of areas. For instance, he said, the unemployment rate in the Great Lakes area was "two per cent or less," compared with the national figure of about four per cent.

AT TECH Undergrad Signup Ends. Texas Tech officials estimated an enrollment of well over 15,000 registration of undergraduate students came to a close on the campus at noon today. No official count was available, but earlier the enrollment had been anticipated to reach a record-breaking 15,900. Enrollment for all undergraduate students was expected to be completed today, with no late registration planned. Graduate students will be allowed to register between 8 a.m. and noon Saturday. Dean of Admissions Floyd Boze said late Wednesday that 2,007 students had already completed all phases of enrollment for the spring semester, including payment of fees. If the expected 15,900 complete registration today, the figure would compare with the 1965 spring semester record of 12,280. Tech had a record enrollment of 16,205 students for the fall semester, but enrollment figures normally decrease in the spring. Classes for the spring term start Friday.

Students Tour Texas Education Agency. Approximately 450 Carrington Thompson Junior High School social studies students toured facilities at the two Texas Education Agency offices in Lubbock today. The classes, which were taken by bus to the offices during regular class periods, were able to make the tour through the budgetary allowances in Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The students discussed economics in classes Wednesday, citing their needs and ambitions, then learning what earning power they would need to fulfill these needs and ambitions. The tour today was to acquaint the students with the demand for unskilled labor versus skilled labor. During the tour the students heard a short talk by agency officials.

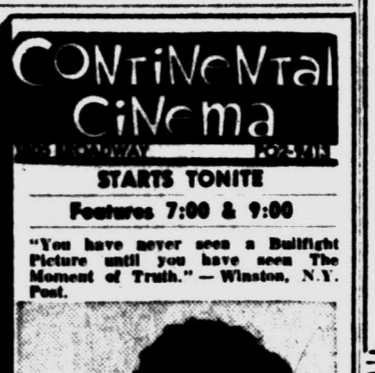

HONEY REVENUE. AUSTIN (UPI) — Texas produced 13,944,000 pounds of honey last year, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported Tuesday. Production was up 16 per cent over 1964, with 248,000 colonies of bees averaging eight pounds more at 56 pounds of honey each.

High-Flying Potato May Unlock Secret Of Stimulus Regulating Growth Gland

By WILLIAM J. SCHIFFEL (AP) — A common potato that sells for pennies a pound is going to be carried into space soon by a multimillion-dollar rocket to search for what scientists hope will be a key to biological mystery.

Hoping to discover that key, Space Defense Corp. in suburban Birmingham, Mich., in conjunction with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, plans to orbit the potato within the next two years.

Called "Spudnik," the high-flying potato project space we get away from the exertion of all earth-bound forces," Pine said. "We have a virtually empty environment, and if standard biorthymicity occurs we can be relatively sure the cause is inside the cell."

But why a potato? Pine says, "What's more simple than a potato? It is one of the most homogeneous masses

Scientists have for several months tested a potato encased in an aluminum alloy container like the one which will take it into space. The container is a self-contained unit capable of measuring the potato's intake of oxygen and expulsion of carbon dioxide to within 12-millionths of a centimeter — less than one-10th the size of a pinpoint.

Pine and Dan Foster, another scientist, says results of their tests so far tend to back up the theory of outside influence on cellular activity. But they're not drawing any conclusions yet.

Texas Port Shut Down By Pickets

BEAUMONT (AP) — Four men, admittedly acting on their own in grievances against stevedore firms, kept the Port of Beaumont shut down for the fourth straight day today.

Officials said the action of the four pickets might result in a railroad embargo on the port. A federal mediator scheduled meetings today with the pickets, members of the new Clerks, Checkers and Tallymen's Local 1924 of the International Longshoremen's Association, and with the stevedore firms.

The pickets are John Young, Floyd Scott Jr., James Phillips and Donald McAlister.

John Groh, port manager, and Don Powell, coordinator for Continental Grain Co., predicted a rail embargo.

Cars Tied Up

An estimated 1,300 rail cars filled with grain are tied up unable to unload because a grain elevator is filled.

Two ships at the Continental Grain Co. wharf are waiting for the strike to end so they can be loaded. Another ship steamed out of Beaumont Wednesday after waiting in vain for the work stoppage to end.

The tied up vessels are the Amazonian from Peru and the Otto Springorum from Germany.

Traffic is being rerouted to other ports. Houston is handling diverted military cargo shipments.

The pickets contend that the stevedoring firms hire ILA members of other locals to perform jobs done by the clerks, checkers and tallymen prior to formation of the new union last Nov. 1.

Ordered As Needed

One of the stevedoring firms denied that their contract had been violated by the companies. A spokesman for the firm said men are to be ordered as needed and all clerks, checkers and tallymen have been employed through the business manager of the local.

Although the strike was not authorized, other members of the ILA have refused to cross picket lines.

Groh said no advance notice of the work stoppage was given shippers or the port authority. He said a lawyer for the port authority has been asked to investigate and take any legal steps necessary.

Government Case In Cattle Plot Being Presented

TOPEKA, Kan. (UPI) — Three witnesses remained today before the government concludes its case against five men charged with mail fraud in a cattle sale scheme.

The government contends the defendants, operators of a now defunct American Hereford Farms, used exaggerated descriptions of cattle to convince cattlemen across the country to buy calves from the firm.

Charged with 14 counts of mail fraud and one count of committing fraud are Jerry Anden, 28, and Stephen Speers, 37, both of Kansas City, Mo.; Emory Anden Jr., 31, of Monessen, Pa.; Emory Anden Sr., 52, of Belle Vernon, Pa.; and James Sidny, also known as Jim Sidny, 40, of Houston.

Mostly Customers

The government subpoenaed more than 150 persons to testify, most of them customers dissatisfied with stock they bought from the defendants. Most of the witnesses have stated the cattle they received were underweight, poor quality and crossed.

All had to pay a 10 per cent down payment. Many said they never received either the cattle or a return of the down payment.

The government was expected to conclude its case today, after which the defense will initiate its proceedings.

Oil Storage Field Blaze Fatal To Man

FARMINGTON, N.M. (UPI) — Firemen kept watch today to insure a fire at an oil storage field near Farmington which killed one man did not flare up again.

Dead from third degree burns which covered his body is truck driver Philip Mitchell, 37, of Flora Vista, N.M.

Injured and hospitalized in fair condition at the San Juan County General Hospital at Farmington was E. G. Matthews, 31, of Aztec, also a truck driver.

Mitchell and Matthews were sitting in their trucks near a storage area when fire broke out late Wednesday in an Inland Crude Oil Co. storage tank.

Running Along Road

A State Policeman who saw Mitchell running alongside a road shortly after the fire broke out said he was covered with flames and most of his clothing was burned. Mitchell died late Wednesday at San Juan County Hospital.

The flames roared through five storage tanks, causing an estimated \$60,000 damage before it subsided. Inland owner Clyde Lamar of Farmington said.

Fire trucks from Farmington, Kitland and from two oil companies attempted to douse the blaze but lack of water hampered efforts.

Five Tanks Razed

Firefighters finally decided to let the blaze burn itself out. Lamar said the fire completely razed the five storage tanks, destroying 4,000 barrels of crude oil. He said the cause still was undetermined. "We just don't know the cause yet," Lamar added.

He said Matthews "seemed to be okay" with burns about the face and neck.

Mitchell and Matthews were both employed by the trucking company owned by Lamar.

Man Wanted In Death Of Child Surrenders

SAN ANTONIO (UPI) — Alberto Sanchez, 22, who was wanted by Toledo, Ohio authorities in connection with the murder of his 2-year-old child, surrendered today to Bexar County sheriff's deputies.

CHIEF SURGEON FEELS HE HAS ADEQUATE PERSONNEL, SUPPLIES

Viet Nam Wounded Assured Of Top Medical Attention

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Col. Spurgeon Neel is a happy man. He has the tools to do his job—save the lives of wounded U.S. and Vietnamese soldiers in Viet Nam.

Neel, chief surgeon for the Military Assistance Command-Viet Nam (MACV), feels that he has a more than adequate supply of necessities needed for healing—well trained, dedicated doctors and nurses and excellent medical supplies.

He is free, too, of the usual military red tape. His only boss here is Gen. William C. Westmoreland, U.S. military commander in Viet Nam.

An ebullient, loquacious man, Neel has first call on anything in the U.S. Army Medical Corps.

Doctor Supply Good
The supply of doctors to treat wounded Americans is good, he says. "We are in excellent shape—both qualitatively and

quantitatively." Military spokesmen estimate there are well over 300 Army doctors and more than 200 Army nurses in South Viet Nam. The Air Force and Navy likely have 150 additional doctors and about 100 nurses.

In Viet Nam Neel has two mobile army surgical hospitals, three field hospitals and two evacuation hospitals. The Navy has its 3rd Medical Battalion with C Company at Da Nang, the "Charley Med" that has taken care of so many wounded Marines.

In addition, the Korean division has an evacuation hospital of 400 beds, 26 doctors and 234 nurses.

Working with the medical people in Viet Nam but not under MACV control, are six military hospitals in Japan, one on Okinawa and one at Clark Air Force Base Hospital in the Philippines.

Neel says he sometimes has an unusual problem: overreaction to his requests by authorities in the United States. Sometime ago he asked for a flight surgeon, and they sent out a man who had been instrumental in flight-surgeon training at Ft. Rucker, Ala.

"I was glad to have him, and he was enthusiastic about coming," Neel said, "but actually it would have been better if he had kept on training other flight surgeons at home."

Neel does have other problems, of course, mainly concerned with logistics. Although he has first priority in the Army Medical Corps, there is still the problem of getting supplies to their destinations at the proper time.

The death rate for soldiers arriving at forward hospitals in World War I was 8 1/2 per cent. By World War II this had dropped to 4 1/2 per cent, and only 2 1/2 per cent of the soldiers reaching forward hospitals in Korea died.

In Viet Nam the ratio has been 1 per cent or a trifle less.

Could Easily Change
Neel is proud of the low rate, but he realizes it could easily change if the Viet Cong start throwing large masses of troops into battle or bring in heavy artillery or air attacks.

"Actually, we haven't been strained too much yet," Neel says. "Our build-up has been gradual enough that we could pretty well project our medical needs and keep up with them. It hasn't been like Korea, where we found ourselves smack in the middle of a war one Sunday."

Beside the first-rate personnel available to him, Neel believes two factors have been important in the reduced death rate: improved anesthetics and techniques and the ability to provide whole blood to surgeons near the fighting.

Amputations have been greatly reduced by improvements in vascular surgery and the fact that more surgeons can now perform such operations involving the blood vessels.

"In Korea at one time we had only one man in one hospital who was an expert at this," he says. "Now vascular surgery is performed at every military hospital. We also have plastic tubing now that we can use as 'spare parts' in replacing damaged arteries and veins."

Swift Movement
Swift movement of wounded men from the battlefield improves the chance of survival. In Korea only 10 per cent of the wounded men were taken out by helicopter. Here it's 90 per cent.

The titles "field" and "evacuation" hospital mean little in Viet Nam. The 85th Evacuation at Qui Nhon on the central coast, for example, handled many of the first cavalrymen wounded in the Ia Drang fighting, and by no means all of them were evacuated. And the 85th currently is treating about 300 serious malaria cases, most of whom will be returned to

duty from the hospital.

Two of the six U.S. military hospitals in Japan handle most of the Vietnamese casualties that arrive in that country. They are Johnson Hospital and Camp Drake, both run by the Army and both recently renovated.

About 1,000 evacuees are in the facilities in Japan, but only 15 per cent are men wounded in battle. The others are sick or were injured outside combat.

Expected To Return
Only the less serious cases among evacuees are taken to Japan. They are men who are expected to be returned to duty. Serious cases or those, for example, requiring plastic surgery, are flown on to the United States.

U.S. medical authorities in Japan say their supplies and personnel are adequate.

The U.S. Army Hospital on Okinawa has been expanded from 350 to 500 beds. The hospital has a sufficient staff, its

administrators say.

One of the key out-country hospitals handling wounded is Clark Air Base Hospital near Manila. At Clark some casualties remain, but others, usually critical cases that can be moved, are quickly transferred to other military hospitals in the Pacific area, including Honolulu and Formosa. Some are sent directly to the United States.

There are no serious shortages at Clark, but during such major battles as Ia Drang the hospital was jammed, and doctors and nurses sometimes worked for 48 hours without sleep.

Most Serious Problem
The most serious problem confronting Army doctors is wounded who require brain surgery. There are not many brain surgeons in the Army.

Some U.S. doctors are attached to South Vietnamese units, and many American physicians serve as advisers to the

Vietnamese. U.S. medical personnel also hold clinics in every village the Army passes through, passing out medical supplies and treating everything from a scratch to surgery. Individual treatments, a spokesman says, average 20,000 to 30,000 a week.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A special White House adviser has given Congress a glowing report on the U.S. communications satellite system but warned that Russia may soon set up its own, perhaps for propaganda use.

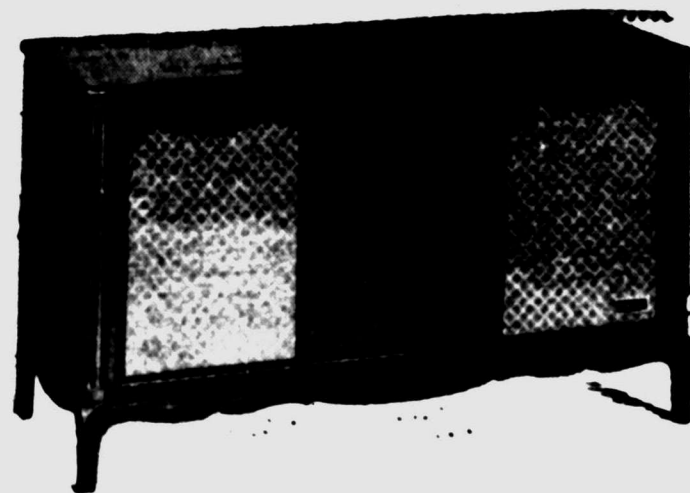

Sylvia Caduff's Dream Of Conducting Symphony Orchestra Is Now Reality

NEW YORK (AP) — Everybody tried to talk Sylvia Caduff out of her dream of conducting symphony orchestras. A woman looks ungainly on a podium, they told her in her home town of Chur, Switzerland.

How could she get the men in the orchestra to take her direction, asked friends in Lucerne where she was studying piano. What audience would treat her seriously?

As a clincher they always

ended triumphantly: Name just one woman conductor on the staff of a major symphony orchestra.

Now the slim brunette has an answer: Sylvia Caduff, with the New York Philharmonic, an assistant conductor to Leonard Bernstein.

"I'm so happy, so happy," she says, which just about takes care of her working English vocabulary at the moment. She hopes to be proficient, though by next fall when her stints in New York begin.

Sylvia, 28, was a piano teacher in Lucerne — a fine profession for a woman, everybody thought — until she came to New York early in January for the Dmitri Mitropoulos International Competition.

"I brought my little fur lion along," she said through an interpreter. "I had it with me when I was studying conducting in Berlin at the Conservatory and with Herbert von Karajan from 1962-64. I think it brings me luck."

She also carried the baton she

had used in reaching the finals in a couple of international conducting competitions in Italy and Denmark. She would rather borrow someone's toothbrush than use another baton.

The Mitropoulos competition started with 34 contestants from 18 countries, including two women — Sylvia and one from Peru.

Only Sylvia and six young men survived the finals, in Carnegie Hall before a capacity crowd.

Lubbock Trade Group Discusses Possibility

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The possibility of purchasing Mexican raw material for use in Texas plants is being discussed here by a 12-member trade commission from Lubbock, the first such group from Texas to visit Mexico under sponsorship of the U. S. government.

The week-long tour is being sponsored by the U. S. Commerce Department and members are business leaders from Lubbock.

Also discussed was a possible visit to Lubbock by the famous Mexican Folklore Ballet and the addition of more Mexican scholarships to the Texas Tech program. Only one student is now attending the Lubbock school on such a basis.

Robert L. Reinhardt, executive vice president of the Hancock Manufacturing Co., head of the mission, said it is the first planned annual trade mission to Mexico.

Reinhardt said he believes Lubbock industrialists would merge with Mexican groups to set up plants and factories in Mexico.

The group will visit Monterrey and Torreon and return home Sunday. They arrived in Mexico City Sunday.

'Invisible Death' Has Taken Heavy Toll

Carbon monoxide is a cold-weather killer which can turn warm, comfortable homes into death chambers.

Colorless and odorless, it already has taken a heavy toll and has left a few Lubbock and South Plains residents with a warning.

Its alias is "Invisible Death." Just 10 years ago this month a young Lubbock couple was married on a Saturday night unaware that tragedy awaited them less than two days later.

Relatives of the couple found their bodies the following Monday morning in their honeymoon apartment here, the oxygen consumed and the dwelling filled

with deadly carbon monoxide. Ill from the gas, the couple apparently decided to lie down during the night.

They fell into a deep sleep, never aware of the cause of their illness.

Just last weekend Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Williams of Lubbock

Old Doctor Book Gives Recipe For Longevity

By PATRICIA McCORMICK NEW YORK (UPI) — For health's sake, hop out of bed when the sun comes up. Rush to the woodpile and saw for half an hour.

Once you've earned your breakfast—have it. A crust of bread. Eat it fast and then dash to your job, earn seven cents a day and learn to live on it.

The recipe for longevity is in a family doctor book published in 1844. The folks of the times also were advised to "abstain from medicine."

But don't laugh. About the only thing changed about the recommendations through the years are the size of the breakfast. The view of medicine, and the day's pay of seven pennies.

Exercise Recommended
Exercise in the morning comes highly recommended. Ditto for living within one's income. "Learn to live" on your earnings, the oldtime book preached.

Medical folklore, according to the American Medical Association's "Today's Health Guide," seems somewhat rib-ticking but there are plenty of myths even in contemporary times.

Some of the old beliefs include the following:
—For backache, do somersaults as the whippoorwill calls.

—Passing the patient through a horse collar three times cures whooping cough.

—Every baby requires the sacrifice of a tooth. Lost by the mother, you see, as a part of the strain of pregnancy.

Common contemporary misconceptions, meanwhile, go like this:
—Bread breath means disease.

—Pimples and boils mean bad blood. (They are due to outside infections.)

Other Superstitions
—You feed a cold and starve a fever.

—Fish, by the way, isn't a brain food; sweets are not the sole cause of tooth decay.

Lemons, tomatoes, oranges and grapefruit do not cause acidity of the body. Fat people are not necessarily carefree and jolly.

Punctures from rusty nails are no more dangerous than punctures from clean nails. The danger lies in the germs that either one may introduce.

Premature baldness in men is not caused by wearing hats.

"Old superstitions, unlike old soldiers, do not fade away," the medical historians remind. They are replaced by new superstitions and new misconceptions.

For one, some women today are afraid to cook with aluminum cooking utensils because they fear poisoning the food.

And many mothers live in fear because their child has a heart murmur. Most heart murmurs are harmless, science has proved.

LIVES ARE CHANGED

Best-Seller *Miffs* Citizens Of Farm Town In Kansas

By ROBERT PEARMAN Copyright, Kansas City Star GARDEN CITY, Kan. (AP)—They are just ordinary people once touched by tragedy. And they generally had succeeded in resuming the simplicity of their comfortable lives on the high plains of western Kansas.

The young man in overalls, "the first to see them alive," sparks fly from his welder's torch.

Common Bond—The former postmistress—she saw the ambulances, four of them, come down the road from the Clutter farm—crowds the open gas heater in the abandoned dance hall where she lives.

The former deputy sheriff presided over the full where the killers awaited trial, waits for the quiet down before the hissing radio in the Garden City police headquarters.

These three, and many other Finney County residents, although their paths may seldom cross, find themselves bound together in a common bond.

Based On Murders—All are characters in the best-selling book on the American literary scene, Truman Capote's "In Cold Blood."

The author's assertion the book is "a true account of a multiple murder and its consequences." It is a study of the number of four members of the Herbert W. Clutter family of Holcomb, Kan., seven miles west of Garden City, Nov. 15, 1959, and the investigation, trial and punishment that followed.

Henry Edward Smith and Richard Eugene Hickock, both ex-convicts, were hanged in April 1965 for the murders.

The are light of public attention falls upon each of the characters now with more intensity than it did when the events were played out six years ago.

Reactions Vary—Their reactions, like those of the community who are not a part of the book, are split down the middle.

Some are unabashed admirers of Capote and of his book, unequivocal witnesses to its accuracy.

Others, who they do not feel free to dispute Capote's literary achievements, claim the book is inaccurate, and they wish, out loud, that "In Cold Blood" had never been written.

I feel that Capote's account of what happened is very accurate," says Alvin Dewey, the Kansas Bureau of Investigation agent who is a key figure in the book.

Get Legal Release—He put things in there that to other people make good reading but the people who were actually involved know that he exaggerated a little bit," said Bobby Rupp of Holcomb, last person to see the Clutter family before the killers struck.

"I wish now, Bobby added thoughtfully, "that I had never signed that paper. I don't like all of this publicity."

"That paper" is a legal release, which Capote's attorney quietly procured from most of the people named in the book.

Money, the average said to be about \$50, was paid to those who signed.

"Fifty dollars, that's what I

was paid," said Myrtle Clare, former postmistress of Holcomb. "It was the easiest \$50 I ever got."

Inaccurate Description—Capote wrote of Mrs. Clare: "She is a stout, trouser-wearing, woolen-shirted, cowboy booted, ginger-colored, ginger-tempered woman of unrevealed age but promptly revealed opinions, most of which are pronounced in a voice of rooster crow allude and penetration."

Mrs. Clare, a neat, trim, motherly-looking woman, dressed for the street in a stylish suit, hovered near the fire in her apartment.

Told that she would have been hard to recognize from Capote's description, Mrs. Clare insisted she was every bit as tacky as the author described her.

In those days at the postoffice, "I did wear jeans quite a bit," she said. "But if I had known what he was going to write, I'd have combed my hair and pulled up my pants."

Minority Opinion—She attests, with minor reservations, to the book's accuracy.

Well, he put in a few words, but well, yes, it happened pretty much that way."

She adds, however, that her opinion is a minority one in Holcomb.

"They don't like it," Mrs. Clare reported of others in the community. "They think it's terrible, being brought up again. They don't care for it."

Bobby Rupp's criticism is specific.

He makes me out to be some kind of great athletic star and really I was just an average small town basketball player. And he has me always punning back and forth to the Clutter place. I didn't do that."

Rupp, now married, was the high school beau of Nancy Clutter. He watched television at the Clutter home until about 10:30 o'clock on the night of the murders.

"A Nightmare"—No excessive named in the book has read it.

"I didn't read it because I didn't want to refresh my recollections of the situation that existed then or of the things that happened," said Arthur Fleming, the attorney who defended Perry Smith. "It was a nightmare all the way through."

Two other Garden City attorneys, Passator Logan Green, and Harrison Smith, who defended Hickock, are enthusiastic boosters of the book.

The accuracy is astounding, absolutely," Green said. "I think he was very fair to all parties concerned."

I felt that he was kind to all the people involved," said Smith.

Lives Changed—In a dozen little ways lives have been changed by what people here refer to simply as "the book."

A couple from Iowa visited Myrt Clare and posed for a picture with her in front of the Holcomb postoffice. Harrison Smith has heard from friends he lost track of years ago. S. J. Wasinger, a druggist, will sell 500 copies of "the book", by far the biggest sale any book has ever had in Garden City.

Alvin Dewey, the Kansas Bureau of Investigation agent, and his wife, Marie, like to believe that their lives haven't changed. But in fact the Deweys and Capote, a jet set swinger, are the best of friends. Last fall in New York, the writer gave a dazzling party where the Deweys met Mrs. John F. Kennedy, Leonard Bernstein, Bennett Cerf and others.

Arrived in 1959 Dewey knew Truman Capote was "some kind of writer", but he had never read any of his books when Capote turned up in Garden City in November 1959. "I noticed him, sure," Dewey said. "The way he talked. His continental dress."

Other Finney County residents are less sophisticated in describing their reaction to Capote.

"What did you think of him?" a visitor asked.

"Well, I'd sure hate to tell you," was the hesitant reply.

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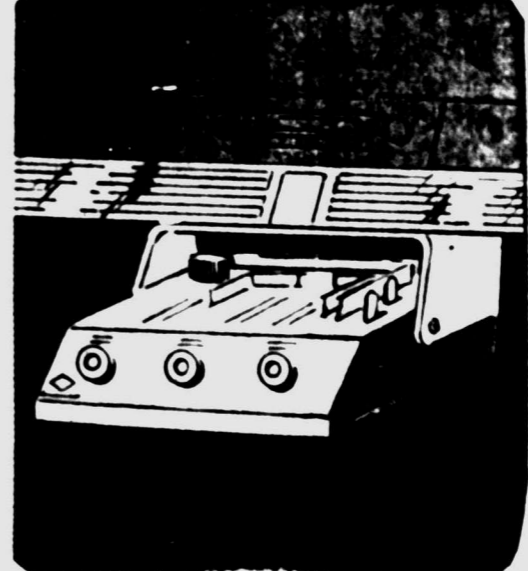

**Thousands Are Still Jailed
Each Year In England For
Failure To Pay Off Debts**

LONDON (AP) — If you still
read Dickens and squirm at old
movies showing squalid debtors'
cells, you should know that Eng-
lish judges still send thousands
of people to prison every year
for failure to pay debts.

Judges now are more lenient
than in Dickens' day, even if
some of the creditors are not.
Judges first use the threat of
prison as a deterrent for chronic
debtors. The system is to
threaten the debtor with jail
first and then, through him, put
pressure on wife, relatives and
friends to find the money to
save him.

Thousands Are Jailed
An expert who recently inves-
tigated the situation reported:
"Every day in every county
court in England hundreds of
judgments are heard in which
creditors seek to enforce pay-
ment of judgment debts, even to
the point of having the debtor
committed in prison. Every
year county court judges make
approximately 100,000 commit-
ment orders, out of which some
7,000 debtors actually spend an
average of 16 days in prison."

The Debtors Act of 1869 was
popularly believed to have end-
ed the era of the debtors' cell,
but the expert added:

"The bad old days are not
gone forever. But today, if a
court is satisfied that the debtor
has the means to pay but will
not pay the judgment debt, the
court at the instance of the
creditor must hold the debtor to
be in contempt of court and im-
prison him for a maximum of
six weeks. The contempt is
purged only by payment of the
debt."

Uniform Process
The process is fairly uniform.
A debt collector enters the wit-
ness box and tells the county
judge what the debtor's position
is, where he works and what he
earns. The judge looks into a
record book indicating the
amount of the debt and when
the debtor was ordered to pay.
The debtor, and frequently his
wife, relates the travails of their
household. If it becomes clear
that the troubled family still

should be able to pay, they are
ordered to do so.

The law demands in such cir-
cumstances that the debtor
should be imprisoned. But the
order committing him is sus-
pended if the debtor pays the
arrears plus the court fees in
perhaps three monthly install-
ments. In most cases this
works.

But then the debtor is apt to
be in debt to get out of debt. As
one judge put it, the poor guy
"paddle all their lives ankle
deep in debt." This judge had
sympathy even for chronic deb-
tors and thought social reform-
ers should do something.

"One can only hope for the
day that England will follow the
example of other civilized coun-
tries and at least do away with
the judgment summons and im-
prisonment for debt," he said.

Report False,
Officials Say**

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — The
U.S. Coast Guard said Thurs-
day that a report of a missing
plane with 40 persons aboard
off the Yucatan Coast of
Mexico apparently was er-
roneous.

A mysterious distress mes-
sage had been received Wed-
nesday night by a Mexican
naval station at Progreso,
Mex., setting off a flurry of
activity. The message identified
the plane as a DC-3 carrying 40
persons and having a registra-
tion No. W40K-36.

Not Authorized
"Those in a hurry are unau-
thorized for any country," the
New Orleans Coast Guard re-
ported.

The Coast Guard said its
initial report was received from
Brownwood, Tex., where a
citizen told the Federal Avia-
tion Agency (FAA) he heard
the distress signal on a citizen's
band radio.

The FAA notified the Coast
Guard.

An airliner would not carry
citizens' band radio, the Coast
Guard said.

The Coast Guard also said 40
persons could not get aboard a
commercial DC-3.

**\$8 Million Grant
Slated For MIT**

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) —
The Ford Foundation announced
today an \$8-million grant to the
Massachusetts Institute of Tech-
nology for MIT's work in inter-
national fields.

MIT said the grant marks a
significant change in the tradi-
tional role of the school as a
technological institute.

The grant includes \$4.5 mil-
lion to be used over five years
for teaching and research and
\$3.5 million to endow seven pro-
fessorships in such areas as
political science, economics, con-
temporary history, manage-
ment and urban planning.

A major portion of the grant
will be used to support research
in political science and econom-
ics, with support also going to
the school of engineering.

"Kind" Bean Is Reported By Researcher

 DURHAM, N.H. (AP)—Gas-
 tomically speaking, a Uni-
 versity of New Hampshire re-
 searcher reports he has ac-
 cidentally discovered the quality
 of a bean that isn't mean.
 Prof. Radelite B. Pike adds
 that even those with poor diges-
 tive facilities can enjoy the less
 gaseous bean. He said that the
 bean still may be too delicate
 for commercial eating.

Likes Baked Beans

Pike's field is horticulture,
 but he digressed into vegetables
 because of a trait he shares
 with many in New England—a
 liking for baked beans.

"We've had this particular
 kind of bean for almost two cen-
 turies," said Pike, a native of
 Lubec, Maine.

"But we didn't know they pos-
 sessed this rare quality," he
 said.

Pike said his great-great-
 grandfathers, John Clark, got the
 beans from the Passamaquoddy
 Indians.

"We always raised them on
 our farm in Lubec and the
 beans resemble Jacob's cattle
 beans very much," Pike said.

Crossed Beans

However, the yield of Pike's
 bean was poor and he crossed it
 with a black Mexican bean to
 get an extraordinary second
 generation.

The discovery was made after
 a youngster, who wasn't sup-
 posed to eat any kind of heavy
 food because of stomach disor-
 der, ate some of the beans.

"He had no trouble eating
 them," Pike said. "We then
 continued testing and found that
 there must be a genetic thing
 that made them less gaseous."

"My brother will send any-
 body who wants a package of
 seeds—as long as they last,"
 Pike said.

His brother, Sumner T. Pike,
 former chairman of the U.S.
 Atomic Energy Commission,
 lives in Lubec.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new
 order restricting enlistment of
 draftees in the National Guard
 and Reserves is aimed at hal-
 ling the siphoning of men avail-
 able for filling draft quotas, de-
 fense officials said today.

The Guard and Reserves have
 other manpower sources avail-
 able to them without drawing on
 youths already tapped for in-
 duction, the officials said.

This was the explanation given
 in a response to questions
 about a Selective Service bulletin
 instructing local draft
 boards that young men under
 orders for induction no longer
 shall be allowed to sign up for
 the Guard and Reserves.

Escapes Active Duty

By joining the Army Guard or
 Reserves, a young man can es-
 cape two years of active duty.
 Instead, he serves only from
 four to 10 months in uniform
 getting his basic training and
 then, as a civilian, performs the
 remainder of his obligation, to-
 taling six years, by drilling with
 his Guard or Reserve unit.

The Selective Service bulletin,
 distributed last week, permits
 cancellation of induction orders
 only for youths enlisting in the
 regular Army, Navy, Marines
 or Air Force.

The Defense Department
 said it was recognized "that
 Selective Service" boards had

some problem in their pipeline
 process with people scheduled
 for induction who were siphoned
 off by enlistment into the Re-
 serve-Guard, while on the other
 hand there are otherwise ade-
 quate manpower supplies for
 fulfilling Reserve-Guard and
 Reserve enlistees.

There have been indications
 that this situation may not ease
 until late this year, when much
 of the regular Army buildup will
 have been completed.

Until that backlog eases many
 Reserve assigned to a "select
 force" have reached their fully
 authorized strength and are tak-
 ing in no more volunteers.

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Falcons' New Coach To Build Tough Defense First

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — The new head coach of the Atlanta Falcons sometimes goes by the name of J. Jones.

By now, those interested in National Football League affairs know that the Falcons' man is Norb Hecker.

He used the name 'J. Jones' to keep secret Falcon owner Rankin Smith's selection of a new head coach.

"I felt like agent 007 coming into Atlanta," said Hecker, 38,

who for the past six years has been assistant coach with the Green Bay Packers. "I thought the game was up on an airplane when a stewardess recognized me and said 'hello, Mr. Hecker.' But no one else found out."

Hecker wasted little time getting to work. He started calling friends Wednesday afternoon in a search for five assistant coaches.

He said he doesn't plan to move his wife and five children

to Atlanta until school is out "because I'm going to be so busy I wouldn't have time to spend with them anyway."

Hecker was first contacted by the Falcons last Saturday, and was told Tuesday to fly to Atlanta so he could be introduced at a news conference Wednesday.

"It was a whirlwind five days for me," Hecker said. "I still have to go back to Green Bay and clean out my office."

Hecker said that he feels Atlanta has some top college players on its roster, "and with the 42 players we will get from the other teams I believe we will have pretty good talent."

The former Baldwin-Wallace College star, who played halfback for the Los Angeles Rams and the Washington Redskins before a knee injury ended his NFL career in 1957, said he will first build a strong defense with the Falcons.

"You can't win in the NFL without a good defense," said Hecker, who has been defensive backfield coach for the Packers. "And it is easier to build a defense than an offense."

"Our biggest problem will be to instill a desire to win among our players," Hecker said. "I hope we can get some players from championship teams that will have that desire."

Hecker was never mentioned as a candidate for the Falcon

post, and Smith said he was the only one "of about 10 prospects" interviewed for the job that had not applied.

Hecker apparently was suggested for the post by NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle, who visited with Smith at length in Atlanta last Friday, when Red Hickey, former head coach of the San Francisco 49ers, was considered the top candidate.

Smith's first contact with Hecker came a day after the

meeting with Rozelle.

Hecker has been considered one of Packer Coach Vince Lombardi's top aides. But he lacks Lombardi's brooding intensity and is slow to anger.

"Norb has all the qualifications of a paragon," Lombardi said. "He is a very fine young gentleman, highly intelligent and with a fine personality. He is extremely loyal and one of the finest workers I have ever

Moses will be assisted on the Junior Varsity by Clovis Hale. A coach to be named in the near future will serve as an aide to Bearden with the Pioneers.

While he will still continue to work with the linemen, his new assignment will make it necessary to oversee the entire program.

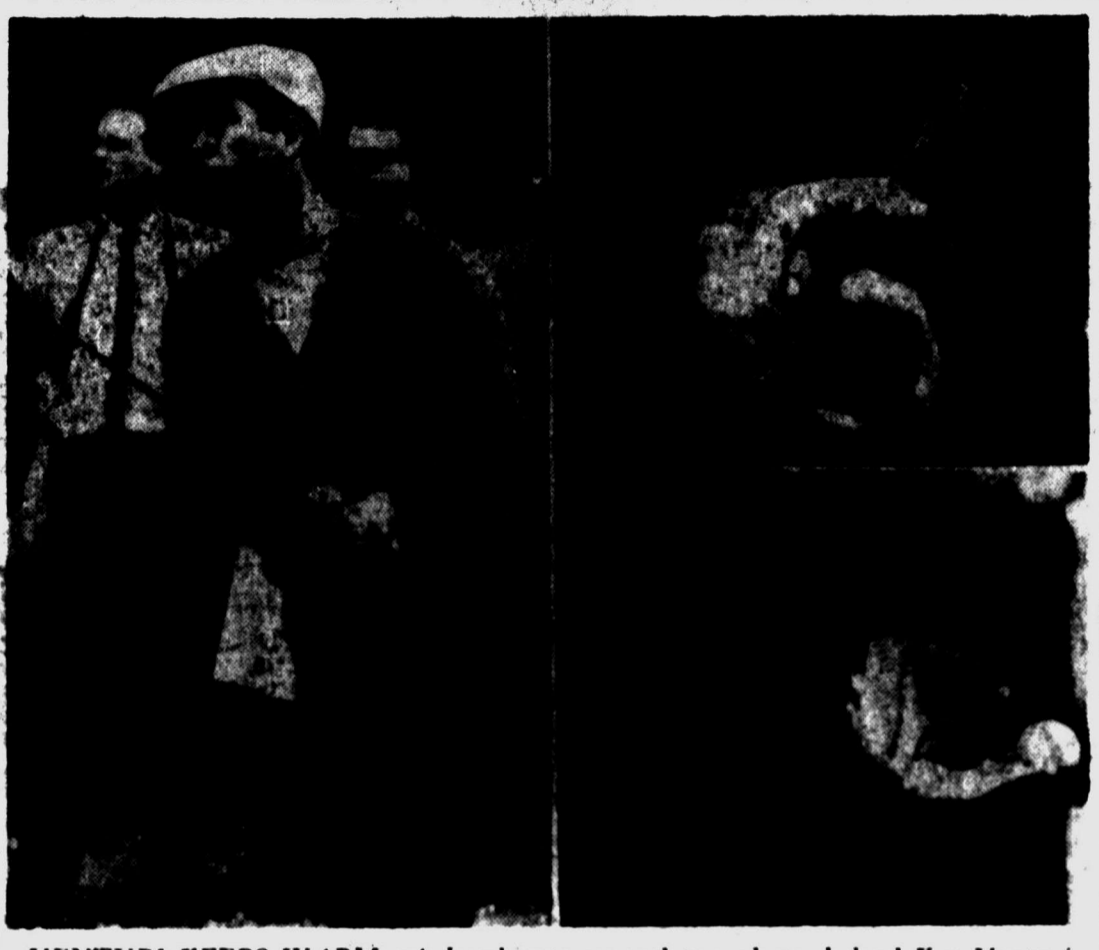
Prior to the shuffle, Parker was the head junior varsity coach and Moses headed the 'B' team.

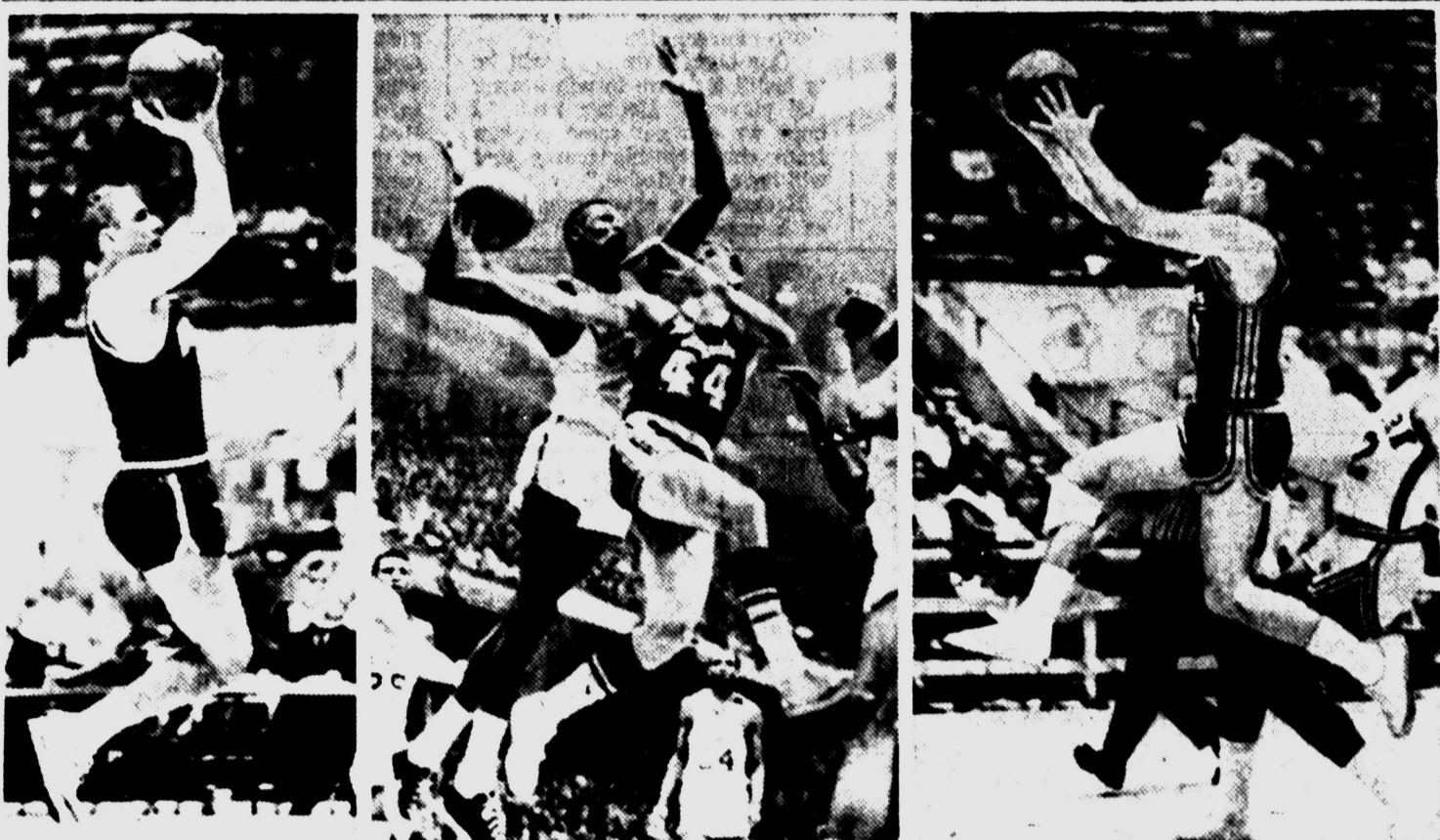
The Cougars boast a 102-89 victory over the Providence Friars, the lone defeat of the season for the Friars, third-ranked in the Associated Press poll.

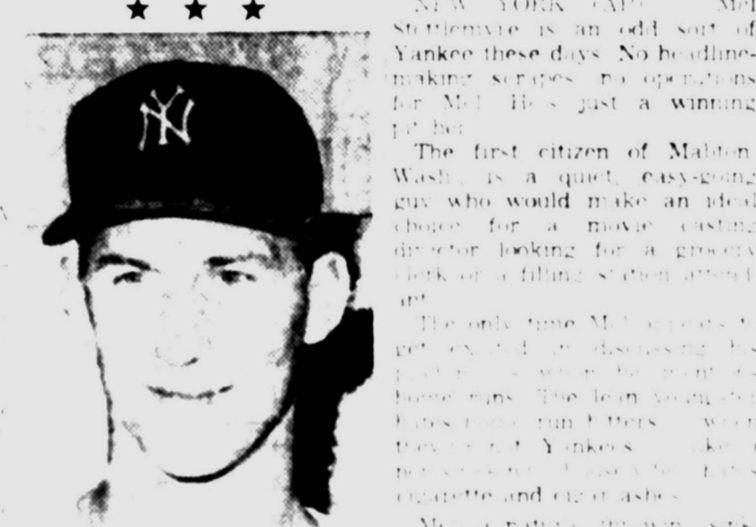

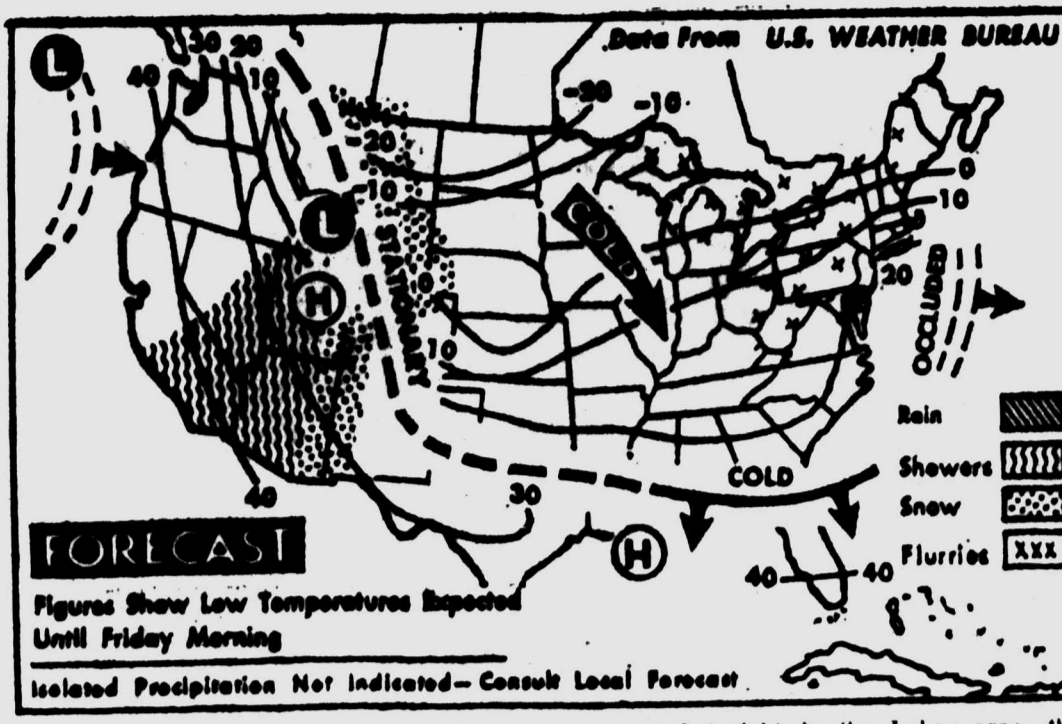
