Viet Nam Peace Efforts Spread

Year Ahead Seen In Crystal Ball

(EDITOR'S NOTE: World-famed for her forecasts of things to come. Jeane Dixon peers into the future at the start of each year and reports what she sees to Columnist Ruth Montgomery, Mrs. Montgomery, author of "Giff of Prophecy," best-selling book about Mrs. Dixon, tells what the seeress foresees for 1966 in the following exclusive article.

WASHINGTON: Jeane Dixon, the Capital's amateur seeress whose uncanny foresight has brought her world renown, has been studying her crystal ball in preparation for this annual column of predictions.

While visions of sugarplums dance in some heads, the celebrated subject of "A Gift of Prophecy" sees instead such world-shaking developments as a strange sighting-devise on Viet Nam battlefields, a government turnover in Indonesia, a sea of new faces on Capitol Hill, more blackouts, increased bloodshed here and abroad, and peace negotiations early this year.

LBJ To Face Stubborn Congress Here, then, are her forecasts for 1966:

President Johnson will experience more difficulty in dealing with Congress than heretofore. In the Fall elections, Republicans will sharply increase their representation in both House and Senate. Democrats will retain control, but it will not be a "rubber stamp"

The U.S. economy will continue to boom, but the President's "Great Society" projects will "fare badly in 1966 because of mismanagement and a subversive foreign influence." Jeane foresees that "meetings held by our enemies not far from our shores, in this hemisphere, will lead to increased infiltration here and stir up our already tense racial situation."



Sukarno Ouster Is Forecast

DRESIDENT Sukarno will be out of office by the end of the year and Communists will fail in their attempt to establish a strong foothold in Indonesia.

Our relations with France will markedly improve. President Johnson will shortly appoint a new Ambassador to Paris who will "work much more smoothly with President Charles De Gaulle." De Gaulle will begin grooming his own handpicked successor, however, and will bow out of office before completing his new term.

Jeane foresees that peace negotiations for Viet Nam will begin early this year "when the enemy decides that the time is right, but not before our combat casualties have sharply increased and our troops have suffered even greater

Mystifying Picture In Viet Nam

Mrs. Dixon sees a mystifying picture in her crystal ball, which she interprets this way: "Our chief foe in Viet Nam is actually Russia. The battle strategy is being directed by a Russian general who once knew President Eisenhower on a very friendly basis. There is a big 'Z' in his name, but I do not get the other letters. (Gen. Zhukov, perhaps?).

Day after day I see this general giving orders to Russian Ambassadors from two countries adjoining Viet Nam. The first step in recognizing our true enemy is to stop a long line of European ships that are carrying weapons to the Viet Cong. I see this line approximating 120 ships a month, and some are bringing a new type of Russian airplanes to North Viet Nam for assembling there. Russia wants us in Viet See FAMED WASHINGTON Page 14

Pope Renews Appeal To Communist Heads

CRESH appeals for peace brought a measure of hope to the world Saturday as it looked forward to 12 new months.

As the last of the merrymakers reached home in many cities, the Vatican disclosed an extension of Pope Paul VI's personal campaign for peace in the

Viet Nam war. Appeals went to the presidents of North and South Viet Nam and, for the first time, to the leaders of Communist China and the Soviet Union.

Social Security Tax Arkansas' **Boost Takes Effect**

Goldberg conferred Saturday WASHINGTON (AP)—Saturday began the painful part night with Prime Minister Harlof gaining greater security in old age—paying for it. With the first paychecks of the new year, Social Security deductions jump 60 per cent for every employe earning \$6,600 or more. Employers must match the higher tax.

New Year **I**mperiled 11 Die Hourly

On Highways TRAFFIC deaths climbed Saturday toward a new high for a New Years weekend as holidaying motorists took to the highways for the

drive back home. Fatal traffic crashes, costing about 11 lives per hour, climbed near the 400 mark, pushed upward by a rash of New Year's Eve accidents. Late Saturday, with more than

24 hours remaining in the 78hour tabulated period, 387 persons had died in traffic mishaps. Thirty-two deaths in fires, eight in plane crashes and 34 in miscellaneous accidents brought the over-all violent death toll to 461. In Steel Hit Ohio, California Lead

Sheriff Puzzled **About Summons Issued For LBJ**

VALPARAISO, Ind. (AP) — Sheriff William E. Seidel was puzzled Saturday about what he should do with an order summoning President Johnson to make an appearance in a local court in connection with a plea for an injunction by a woman who says her son was drafted illegally.

The sheriff doesn't know whether the summons is legal and has asked for opinions from the county prosecutor and county judges.

The summons was issued Friday by Porter Circuit Court Clerk Dorothy Lenburg after Cassic Orr filed suit in the court asking that the President be restrained from drafting any more men into the armed serv-

The court order "summons and requires President Lyndon Baines Johnson himself or an attorney" to make an appearance by Jan. 27.

Mrs. Orr's suit is the latest in a series of legal battles she has had with local, state and federal officials. Mrs. Orr, 57, owner of a motel

prepares her own legal papers. Her latest suit is in connection with the drafting of her son, William, 21, last Nov. 4. It says the President has no authority to order a draft of citizens for the armed forces.

Arabia, he agreed to call off the costly, three-year-old war in Yemen. He installed a more moderate government in Egypt and ordered a helt-tightening program to try and solve Egypt's critical production and population problems.

Nasser also dropped prestirious but expensive foreign auses that had sapped Egypt's resources and alienated the West. And he abandoned the anti-American campaign that had cost him U.S. food supplies. The new U.S. food program for Egypt runs for six months.

Outlook Brighter It will probably be renewed only if Nasser continues to be-have — in U.S. eyes. This minimizes chances of fresh anti-American outbursts and brightens hopes for better relations in







AS A change of pace from politics and world affairs, I asked Jeane to touch on the future of Cassius Clay. This is what she reports:

"Do not let anyone underestimate the talents and power that have been bestowed on this individual. I see him reaching for the great love of his life—adventure and excitement and this will bring him to the brink of danger. A new marriage will help him tremendously, although it ends in separation. He will not always be so boastful. His braggadocio comes from a great inner confidence, so that he thinks of himself as a king, but before long he will be faced with a very diffi-

"One path could lead him into an extremely high position with great possibilities for helping America, but my symbols indicate that he will choose the other path. He will become extremely powerful with a segment of his people, but he must guard against the misuse of this power, for great danger to many people and our country lies therein.'

Jeane's final prophecy ends on a somewhat cheerier note. Despite the threat within and without our country," she muses, "I have seen the Lord putting His hand of blessing on America in 1966. I have never seen this before, but the blessing is there for us, if we will but be wise."

LaBruzzo Scores Twice In Second As LSU Manages Major Bowl Upset

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—College football's longest winning streak-22 straight games-came to an end under the dreary skies of the Cotton Bowl Saturday as thrice beaten Louisiana State, powered by stubby Joe La-Bruzzo, beat Arkansas 14-7.







SPORTSMEN participating in the third annual Palo Duro Canyon aoudad sheep hunt bagged 16 aoudad sheep during the three day December hunt, according to Phil Evans, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist.

Landowners with sheep on their property received 70 either sex permits from the Department. These were quickly claimed by trophy-conscious sportsmen.

Eight rams and eight ewes were killed during the hunt. The largest ram weighed 225 pounds field-dressed.

In the first aoudad hunt in 1963, 42 permits (either sex) were issued and 36 were utilized. The combined bag of six rams and three ewes aggregated a 25 per cent success.

In 1964, a total of 50 permits (any sex) was issued and all but one utilized. Seven rams and six ewes were harvested for a 26.53 per cent success

From all accounts, it appears the aoudad transplants are here to stay in their new home in the rugged Palo Duro Canyon country. Their size and their habitat throw a challenge at any big game hunter. The hunter success figures indicate the difficulty in getting a sheep in the scope. The gradual increase in the number of permits is an indication of the increased numbers of the aoudads.

Maybe 1966 will be "the year I killed an aoudad sheep, native of Africa, but transplanted to the Palo Duro." If you look into your hunting crystal ball and see such an image, you'd better start making plans for the hunt now. Starting point might be writing to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, and asking for a list of landowners who have been issued sheep permits in the past. Then contact them long before the permits are issued.

DEFINITE INDICATIONS of apparent heavy deer harvest throughout the state have just reached the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in reports of a near record mule deer kill west of the Pecos and of a good overall hag in the Panhandle. A Department spokesman said field reports consistently reflect a fine deer harvest throughout the main big game ranges.

Figures on the state at large will be available shortly. Wildlife biologists had hoped for a substantial kill to relieve the pressure on overstocked ranges and to avoid a possible wanter dieoff.

The actual count on the Trans-Pecos take show a total of 9.725 deer bagged, running about 90 per cent mule deer. The season there was Nov. 27 through Dec. 12.

In the Panhandle regulatory district, an estimated 499 deer were bagged along with 1,048 wild turkeys. The season was from Nov. 13 through Nov. 29. The principal big game habitat there is in the narrow Panhandle stream bottoms and in the Palo

Mule deer killed in Oldham County near the New Mexico line equaled the whitetail kill in Hemphill County with 94 mule deer and 93 whitetails being harvested in each of the two areas. The highest turkey kill occurred in Hemphill County with 390





WEAKNESS IS OVERCOME

The Week's Market Action

MONDAY-The average opened on the upside but its early advance soon was wiped as cross-currents attributable to tax considerations kept trading cautious. Volume was the lowest in six weeks, suggesting that lack of buying interest rather than selling pressure was the dominant influence. In the final 30 minutes prices moved down rapidly. It was the tenth Monday in a row in which the average declined. The close was off 6.57.

TUESDAY-A sharp decline carried the average off more than 4 points in the first hour. Then a recovery move set in which pulled the average above the previous close for a time, but prices fell back in the late trading. Declines among issues in the average outnumbered advances two to one, and prices swung in an unusually wide range. The close was off 1.83.

WEDNESDAY-Prices were on the upside throughout the session, which was marked by a revival of interest in aerospace and airline stocks that had been battered earlier in the week. Stocks in the average outperformed the

market as a whole. The close was up 2.34. THURSDAY-Prices were in the plus column at each hourly reading with some key stocks establishing new highs and several other posting sharp gains. Although the blue chips were in demand, there also was a revival of interest in a variety of glamour issues. The close was up 3.39.

FRIDAY-A surprise increase in basic steel prices by Bethlehem brought a sharp early rise in steel issues, which sparked a general advance that showed the usual year-end concentration on high-quality stocks. The result was that the average pushed on to close out the year at its highest level in history. The close posted a gain of 5.57

SUMMARY-Buffeted by peace feeler talks and year-end tax complications, the market backed off early in the week from the record peak establishea at uie close of the previous week. But the weakness was overcome and the year went out in characteristic 1965 fashion with a strong rally that put the average at its all-time high.

The secret is that a mattress lasts longer if a different peron sleeps on it every night, which is what happens in hotels and motels," explains Manfred Steinfeld, chief executive officer of one of the companies.

Grocery Pricing System Puzzling, Reader Says

EDITOR, The Avalanche-Journal: I have noticed for some time a practice of pricing in local groceries that would seem to be somewhat questionable. I refer to the quite common practice of increasing (never decreasing) the prices of items on the shelves.

For instance, the other day I bought an item in a store for the price of \$1.19. When the price tag was pulled off, another tag, underneath, was marked \$1.09. Under this tag was a third tag marked \$.98. It would appear my carton of cheese sprouted 21 cents worth of gold inlays while decorating the grocer's shelf.

It is my understanding that food items are ordered and delivered at a certain price. The grocer marks up a certain percentage for overhead and profit and prices the article accordingly. I would be pleased if someone would explain what prompted two price increases from the time of receiving this box of cheese until I purchased it

This is not an isolated case it is all too common. You can go into almost any large store here and see a stock clerk changing prices on items on the shelf every day. I know prices are increasing daily, but it certainly shouldn't be retroactive

This practice may be legal, but it doesn't seem ethical

(Dear Mrs. McDaniel: To be honest with you, I don't know any more about running a grocery store, or pricing groceries, than I do about atomic fission. To impress a rival monarch who was coming for a visit, she therefore had her serfs erect beautiful facades in a solid row facing the Volga Then she took her important guests along the river, where they reportedly gazed in awe at the splendid edifices. From that vantage point they could not observe that the "buildings" were only false fronts

WASHINGTON'S SIJ'MS are in stark contrast to our classical stone Government buildings and flowering parks. Licking poverty takes time, however, and word has gone out from the White House to "dress up" at least 10 of the principal approaches to downtown Washington by Spring. Committee are enthusiastically mapping plans with district commissions, who have applied for \$765,000 of U.S. highway beautification funds to be spent within the next few months for trees and shrubbery along the main approach routes. Wise Lures **Bypassers**

ACROSS TEXAS, tourist-dollar-wise communities are mapping brief-circling back routes to lure and teach us bypassers. For unusual variety, few will top the loops from Wise County's Decatur, northwest of Fort Worth. In depth, you range rolling grass and timber-from pioneer to Indian to prehistory.

Articulate Mrs. Rosalie Gregg's Historical Survey Committee has motorcade-tested tours with a score of stops-many, likely to be marked. There are ghost towns, forgotten battlefields, a mysterious cave smelter and old homes-the gingerbreads to Sam Woody's log cabin: built in one day, yet stoutly there these 111 years later.

SOUTH OF DECATUR along Blue Creek are archaeology's workings that found the fiercetusked shaggy mammoth of 12,000 years ago. Looping north, you plunge time deepest: well back from the road and still creek-walled are dinosaur remains. (Bring no shovels; science guards this

At little Rhome, Fort Worth-way, you touch pioneer humor in perhaps the most name-changed town in Texas. Laid out, the 1850's, it was first "yellow dog," then Prairie Point. With settlement, name-debate! For one founder's wife, "Roxanne" She said no. Well, then . . . Calif: didn't westbound Butterfield stages hammer this way? On went the name-fight; for some time, "Scuffletown" rightly stuck. Finally came settler B. C. Rhome-a name everybody liked. They still do. His rifle-armed grandson Jerry is a fine young quarterback for Dallas' Cowboys.

WEST TOWARD tiny Boonsville, one gentle vista marks beginning of the end for Sam Bass. On the prairie sloping south for Parker County, the Bass gang ran into pursuing lawmen, escaped but lost their deadliest gun, "Arkansaw Johnson." Before he went under, down that slope. Arkansaw had gun-forced a settler's wife to make bread for the gang. It took 25 pounds of flour.

Mrs. Gregg reports a macabre story to Arkansaw's grave. "A doctor in (nearby) Cottondale, wishing a skeleton for his work, paid two men \$25 to dig him up.

But the Bass name still struck fear. "The men were warned to put him back; at night he was reburied. In black dark, they missed the location a few yards. Their haste left one arm above ground.

Executions Decline

WHILE MENTION of the death penalty is enough to stir up a loud pro-and-con argument, in practice Texas' pace of executions has slowed to

This is dramatically illustrated by the fact that no executions in the past year have been carried out in Huntsville. Dr. Rupert C. Koeninger, former director of

the Bureau of Classification in the Department of Corrections at Huntsville and for six years head of the sociology department of Sam Houston State College, cites this evidence of decline in a study he is preparing on executions in Texas. The electric chair was first used in Texas in

February, 1924. Five men were executed that first night. During all of 1964, five men were executed a third of the total executions in the United States during that year.

During the 42 years that the electric chair has been used, 460 have gone to the Huntsville death house. Of these, 360 have been executed, 92 have had sentences commuted to life imprisonment, At present, eight men are in the Huntsville

death house. During 1965, final disposition was made in only one case — a commutation of sentence to life imprisonment.

The decline of executions can be traced to several factors — jury reluctance, expanded use of the appeals court and others. But it seems an inescapable conclusion that executions for capital

crimes are becoming more and more the exception, not the rule - (San Angelo Standard-Times)

Pre-trial news coverage -In a provision whose meaning has been subject to dispute the code requires lawyers and offi-cers in criminal cases to "so conduct themselves as to insure to the delendant a fair trial upon the presumption of innocence and at the same time afford the public the benefit of a free

press." Severance of defendants—the new code lets judges decide whether two or more defendants in the same case should be tried jointly or separately. The old code required separate trials.




