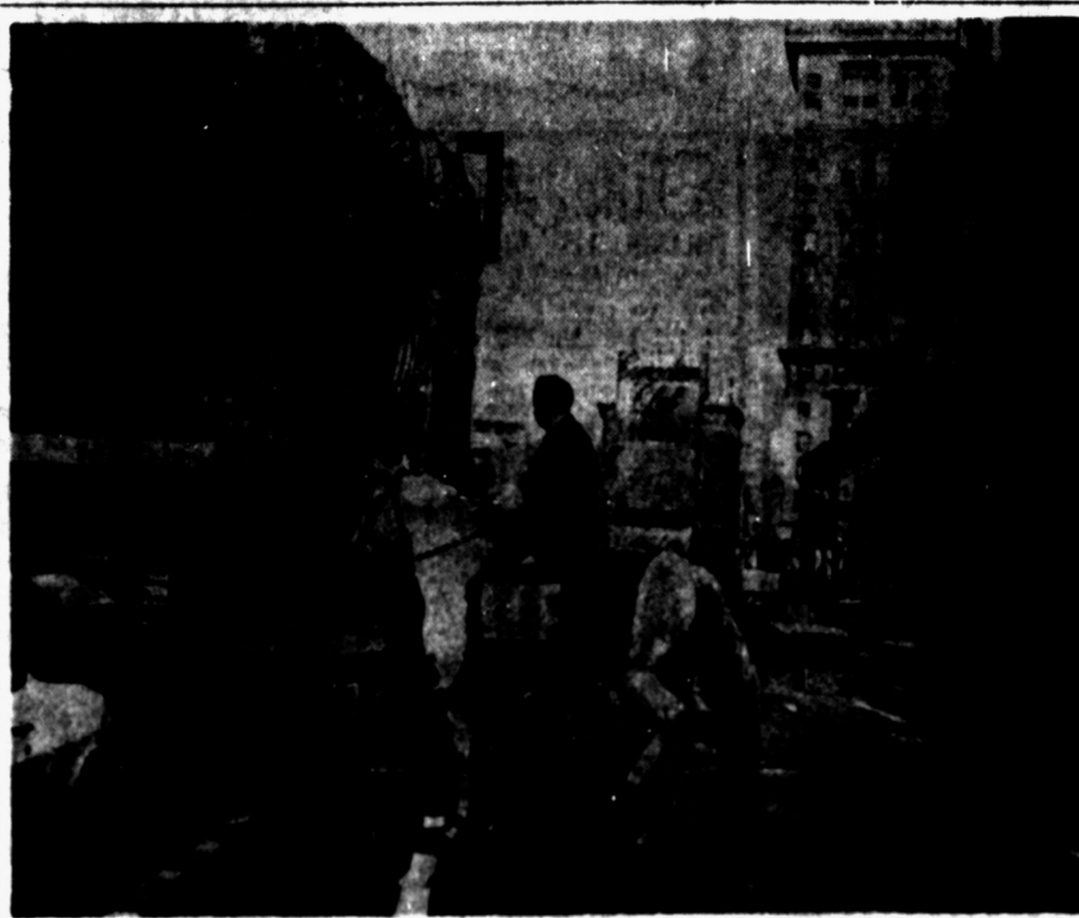

Screwworm Count Is Up

MISSION (UPD) — The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Center reports Texas had twice as many screwworm cases in 1965 as in the previous year.

The state had more reports of the cattle pests than any other state.

The eradication center said the weather this winter would be a big factor concerning the number of screwworms in 1966.

The most vigorous attempts to kill the pests are being made in Northern Mexico to keep the screwworms from reinfesting border areas in the United States already treated for the pests.

The center drops sterile screwworm flies in infested areas to reduce reproduction.

Before the eradication program began in 1962 there were one million cattle a year infected by the pests. In the past year, Texas had 466 cases, Arizona 455, New Mexico 122 and California 7.

The screwworm burrows into the skin of cattle and can be fatal unless treated promptly.

Booming Economy, War Buildup Boost Employment Totals To Record High

WASHINGTON (AP)—The increasing economic demands of war and peace pushed the nation's job total to a record December high while unemployment hit a nine-year low and the government moved Friday against the threat of inflationary labor shortages.

"There is still no evidence of a general labor shortage," said Commissioner Arthur M. Ross

of the Bureau of Labor Statistics. He reported employment of 72.7 million and a 4.1 per cent jobless rate.

But threats of shortages are cropping up in some critical defense plants and elsewhere in the economy and the Labor, Defense and Commerce departments moved to head them off.

Ross said the booming economy and Viet Nam war buildup

are the main pressures on employment demands.

Ross said there still is no evidence of a connection between rapidly climbing living costs and the sharp drop in unemployment, but that the coming year "will test our capacity to eliminate potentially inflationary manpower bottlenecks."

While the record five-year expansion of the economy is the major factor in the bright job picture, "the stepup in war production certainly has been a significant factor," Ross said.

Wages of Wage Pressure

His warning of threatened inflationary wage pressures followed President Johnson's recent successful efforts to curb steel, aluminum and copper price hikes the administration considered inflationary.

The 4.1 per cent jobless figure, down from 4.2 per cent of the civilian labor force in November, is likely to drop below the government's long-sought interim goal of 4 per cent in the coming year, he added.

The total unemployed at 2.9 million was 600,000 below a year earlier and total employment was up 2.4 million. The civilian labor force was up 1.4 million to 75.6 million.

Of the expected 350,000 increase in the male labor force over 20 years of age in 1966, the armed services will absorb some 300,000, Ross said.

More Older Workers

"In view of the severely limited supply of adult men, some jobs will have to be redesigned

so that women, older workers, young people and part-time job-seekers can perform them," Ross said.

The long critical teen-age jobless rate climbed back above 13 per cent last month.

Most government economists believe that reduction of the over-all jobless rate below 4 per cent inevitably will bid up wages and threaten inflation.

"It seems clear that manpower demands will intensify during 1966 as a result of increased defense production, continuing capital expansion and greater numbers of men in military service," Ross said.

Ross said government agencies after studying the manpower situation in depth will call in labor and management leaders

to discuss the problem of labor shortages.

Government efforts will be aimed at speeding up job training programs, improving employment services, and recruitment and relocation of workers to meet specific shortages, Ross said.

He said some unnecessarily stiff hiring requirements will have to be relaxed in some areas, and some metropolitan transportation systems improved to get workers into jobs from distant neighborhoods.

"Wages should be more competitive in certain poorly paid yet essential occupations," he added.

Negro Rate High

And, with Negro unemployment still double the white rate—7.3 versus 3.7 per cent—"equal employment opportunity is more essential than ever," Ross said.

Ross said the tightest labor situation is in machine tool and

construction jobs, and among engineers, scientists, mathematicians, tool and die workers and electronic maintenance men in such critical defense industries as aircraft, ordnance and electronics.

The new Social Security medical care program going into effect July 1 is bound to worsen an already existing shortage in medical personnel, Ross said.

ESCAPES RUPTURED HOSE

Chemical Fertilizer Kills One At Plano

PLANO (UPI)—A half mile square area north of Plano was covered by leaking chemical fertilizer Friday, killing a passing motorist before a fireman wearing oxygen masks shut it off.

Anhydrous ammonia fumes forced closing of two busy highways for about an hour. Two women overcome were treated at a hospital at nearby McKinney.

Metal Value Explodes

Joe Steinbergen, 50, of Plano, north of Dallas, was killed when he got out of his station wagon in the blinding fog-like gas. Instead of running to safety, Steinbergen went further into the deadly chemical.

First sign of danger was a "popping noise" made by an exploding metal valve on one of four 6,000 gallon tanks. It was heard by Lee T. Uland, operator of a chemical fertilizer station next to the Wells Brothers Feed and Grain Co.

I heard what sounded like an explosion and turned to see the gas forming," Uland said. At the time he was preparing to channel the anhydrous ammonia, kept under pressure

at below freezing temperatures, into a tank truck.

Uland spread the alarm to Steve Haney and another man in the grain company building, and all escaped.

Chemical Hugs Ground

From a ruptured metal hose the chemical fertilizer billowed across both state Highway 5 and U.S. Highway 75, the calm air allowing it to hug the ground like an eerie fog.

Mrs. Anita Powell and Mrs. G. D. Tallent were overcome when their cars had to stop, but recovered after being treated at Wysong Hospital in McKinney.

George Holcomb, a United Press International photographer, compared the fumes to household ammonia—making eyes water. He had to take pictures quickly and then run for fresh air.

Cotton Herrell, an employee of Scott Air Pak Co., brought oxygen tanks and masks. The equipment allowed Richardson firemen to get close enough to turn off the chemical.

Break-Ins Could Be Dangerous

A warning of possible electrocution—without trial or sentencing by a court—has been given to a person or persons who have been breaking into power facilities here.

Sam Hunter of Southwestern Public Service Co. reported two break-ins of fenced substations this week, at an "interchange station" at E. 26th Street and Glove Avenue and another south on the avenue at 96th Street.

"It could be very dangerous situation," Hunter told sheriff's deputies.

He added that there had been other break-ins prior to this week.

Terry Exploration Yields Test Oil

MacDonald Oil Corp., Blair & Norris No. 1 Reynolds, wildcat to five miles southwest of Wellman in southwest Terry County, pumped oil and water in an attempt to complete a discovery. The project drilled to a total depth of 5,585 feet. It pumped 55 barrels of brine and 18 barrels of oil and 17 barrels of water in 12 hours. Earlier the test recovered 100 barrels of fluid in 10 hours. It then swabbed 52 barrels of oil and 48 barrels of water. Location is 1,980 feet from east lines of Section 48, Block DD, John H. 

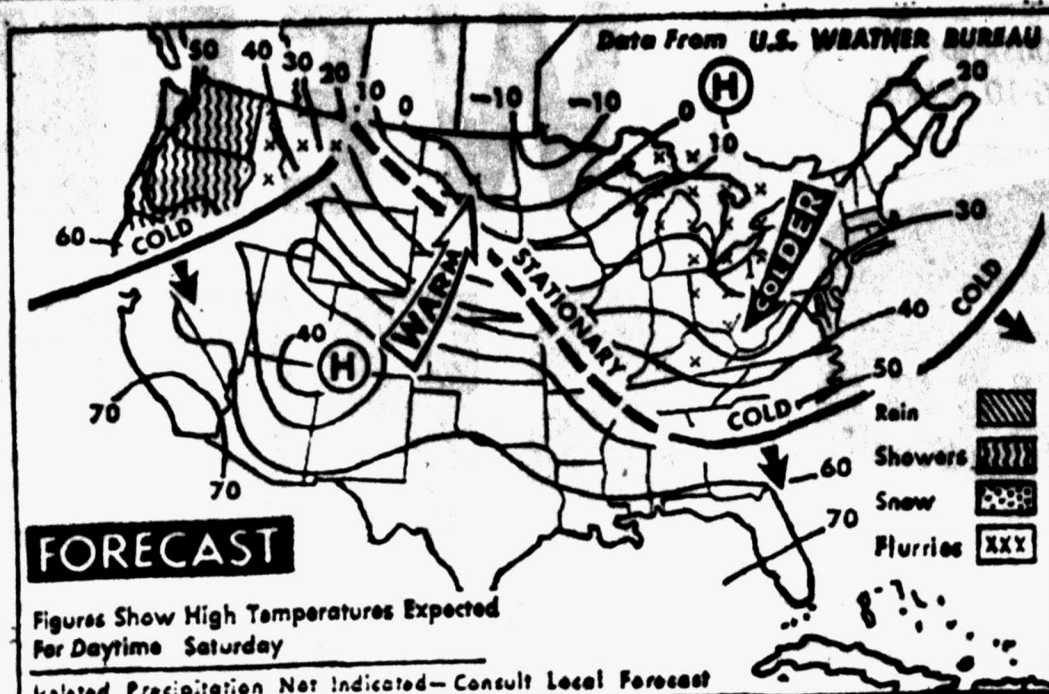

Villain In Sherlock Holmes Cases Blamed For Strike

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — The Society of the Six Napoleons said Friday night the New York City transit strike was a plot of Prof. Moriarty.

"Certainly it wasn't a coincidence that the tie-up came when the Irregulars were to convene," said Paul S. Clarkson, a society member.

Cancels His Visit What with Manhattan hotels and cabs full, the official society delegation to the annual Baker Street Irregular Convention, held Friday night at New York City's Cavanaugh Restaurant, had to cancel its visit. The group is dedicated to the study and discussion of Sherlock Holmes.

"Holmes would have seen a deep conspiracy involving Moriarty," said Clarkson. "I take the same position. We are most bitter about this highly suspicious affair."

Clarkson said he was disappointed he would not be able to discuss the famous fictional detective Friday night with Detroit's "Amateur Mendicants," Boston's "Speckled Band," Philadelphia's "Sons of Copper Beeches," and other chapters. Each cell takes its name from one of Holmes' famous cases.

Blamed For Blackout Lloyd H. Denton, another Napoleonic member, said the infamous Moriarty, principal villain in a number of Holmes' cases and the one who eventually

vanguished Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's famed character, had been leading up to the strike.

"He caused the great black out, and as a preliminary to the whole thing, he caused the water shortage last summer. He knew drinking Scotch without water is impossible."

Only one member of the group, Ralph E. Edwards, said he would defy the strike to join the Irregulars this year. Ralph Reppert, who heads the Baltimore chapter's 75 members, insisted that Moriarty was indeed behind the whole nefarious scheme.

"Moriarty is the brain behind all organized crime, murder, robbery, blackmail and espionage," he said. "Transportation may be a new field for him, but remember, Holmes said he is 'a man who will stick (stop) at nothing.'"

Reppert said he understood other chapters such as Washington's "Old Soldiers of Baker Street" and Akron's "Scandalous Bohemians" also had to curtail their plans.

Paratrooper Sings Praises Of M16 Rifle

A Lubbock man serving as a paratrooper in Viet Nam thinks a lot of the weapon he is using. "It's the best friend I have in Viet Nam," he says.

That was Spec. 4 Nathan Lundberg, 21, son of Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Lundberg of 3317 32nd St., speaking to a correspondent in Viet Nam. The interview was published recently in The San Antonio Light.

Lundberg said he has frequently owed his life to the speed, accuracy, and firepower of the M16 rifle.

"Just Right" He said he had spent several months as point, or lead man, on patrol in Zone D and the Iron Triangle, two guerrilla jungle strongholds north of Saigon, and "the M16 is just right for the airborne—it's good for close-in fighting."

He was slightly wounded in action several months ago but returned to his unit after two weeks.

The M16 weighs only 6.5 pounds and can spew bullets at the rate of 700 to 900 per minute. It also will fire single shots, but the men prefer three- to six-round bursts at the semi-automatic or full position which makes it a submachine gun, Lundberg explained.

Lundberg graduated from Lubbock High School in 1962 and attended Texas Tech prior to entering the service in October 1963.

He said he joined the airborne because he likes to make parachute jumps.

Furious Diplomacy Suggests Big Events In Offing

By WILLIAM L. RYAN
A period of furious diplomacy by the leaders of both world camps will encourage speculation that big events are in the offing.

The display of jet-propelled diplomacy staged by the United States since Christmas week is being matched by Soviet efforts, suggesting a mood of urgency.

Absence Of Leaders
Whatever the Soviet leadership is up to, it must be a matter of highest priority, since it required the absence simultane- ously from Moscow of many top party and government leaders.

Among the absentees were the party chief, the premier, the defense minister, the foreign minister and a goodly number of lesser lights.

Apart from a mission to North Viet Nam, the most intriguing development is a suddenly an- nounced trip of Communist chief Leonid I. Brezhnev, with a glittering array of aides, to Mon-

golia on what is described as a "friendship visit."

More Interest In Hanoi
It is possible that Moscow is preparing for the eventuality of a showdown with China. It also appears that Moscow is taking more interest in Viet Nam, so that if it seems the Americans are going to lose out, the U.S.S.R. will be in a position to protect its interests; and if mat- ters become highly dangerous, Moscow will have a measure of control over developments.

The Hanoi mission includes a military production expert and a rocket forces general. This suggests to some that Moscow intends to step up military aid in an apparent Soviet attempt to outbid Red China for the loyalty of North Viet Nam.

New Trial For Pope Is Denied

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI) — A judge Friday denied motions for a new trial and sentence reduction for Duane Earl Pope, 23, sentenced to die for the murder of three persons during a bank robbery in Big Springs, Neb.

U.S. District Court Judge Robert E. Van Pelt, who presided over Pope's trial, denied the motions. The de- fense has five days to file a notice of appeal in district court.

Chief Defense Atty. Robert B. Crosby, a former Nebraska governor, has indicated he will carry the appeal to the U. S. Circuit Court in St. Louis, Mo., and to the Supreme Court if necessary.

A jury last Dec. 3 convicted Pope of killing three persons in the \$1,500 robbery of the Farmers State Bank in Big Springs in June, a week after he graduated from McPherson (Kan.) College.

Pope is scheduled to die in the electric chair March 3.

Plains Farming Producer Likes Late Guar Crop

By DUANE HOWELL, Avalanche-Journal Farm Editor



A late planted crop of guar helped a Dawson County farm- er realize a good return from 30 acres after a June hail last year wiped out cotton too late to re- plant to cotton.

Milton Schneider planted the guar on June 16. It yielded 1,782 pounds per acre and brought in a total of \$69.49 an acre.

Dawson County Agent Lee Roy Colgan says Schneider was the first in his county to irrigate guar, although the legume has been raised under dryland con- ditions for a number of years.

Colgan considers the returns good for a late-planted, substi- tute crop. He suggests that other farmers may want to consid- er guar if they're forced to plant a late crop.

Guar has been grown on only

limited acreages on the South Plains. Some farmers have used the deep-rooted legume as a soil- building crop rather than as a strictly commercial cash crop.

Schneider's guar received 12 inches of irrigation water and was planted on land that had been fertilized for cotton with 70-70-0.

He planted seven pounds of the Hall variety per acre with a regular cotton planter, using maize plates.

Colgan said Schneider plans to run a guar variety demonstra- tion for Dawson County under dryland and irrigated conditions this year.

Mill operators told Schneider they import guar to run their plant for 10 months of their year-around operation.

Reds Say U.S. 'Bombing Again'

Raids On North Viet Nam Stopped Dec. 24

WASHINGTON (AP) — Red China reported Friday that the United States resumed bombing of North Viet Nam on Wednesday. Washington denied it, and an administration leader said he expects no early end to the bombing lull which began Dec. 24.

A Peking broadcast heard in Tokyo reported three American warplanes struck in western Thanh Hoa Province Wednesday, bombing and strafing ground targets.

The Defense Department said: "We do not ordinarily comment on Communist propaganda. However, North Viet Nam has not been bombed since Dec. 24."

At a news conference after a White House meeting with President Johnson, Sen. Mike Mansfield of Montana told reporters the question of resuming the air strikes against Communist North Viet Nam is being kept under constant study by the chief executive.

LEJ Decision
Then the Senate Democratic leader said: "Any decision on the resumption of bombing will be a presidential decision, made by the commander in chief. I don't expect any resumption in the bombing shortly."

The bombing hiatus is the military phase of the intensive peace offensive Johnson has been directing since shortly after Christmas. Indications in the past few days have been that it is likely to continue through next week even if Hanoi persists in its refusal to join in any effort to move the Vietnamese conflict from the battlefield to the conference table.

Growing Restive
Some military and civilian leaders are known to be growing restive under the continued interruption of the air strikes but the senior Republican member of the Senate said Friday he doesn't think the bombing should be resumed unless and until the Communists expand significantly the ground fighting in South Viet Nam.

Sen. George D. Aiken said in a telephone interview from his home in Putney, Vt., "I would continue it unless there is greatly increased activity on the part of North Viet Nam."

Aiken is a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and is one of four senators who accompanied Mansfield on a recent 30,000-mile tour of world capitals, including Saigon.

General War Seen
The five said in a lengthy report that the fighting in Viet Nam will escalate toward "general war on the Asian mainland" if peace efforts fail. And they said chances of a just, negotiated settlement are very slim.

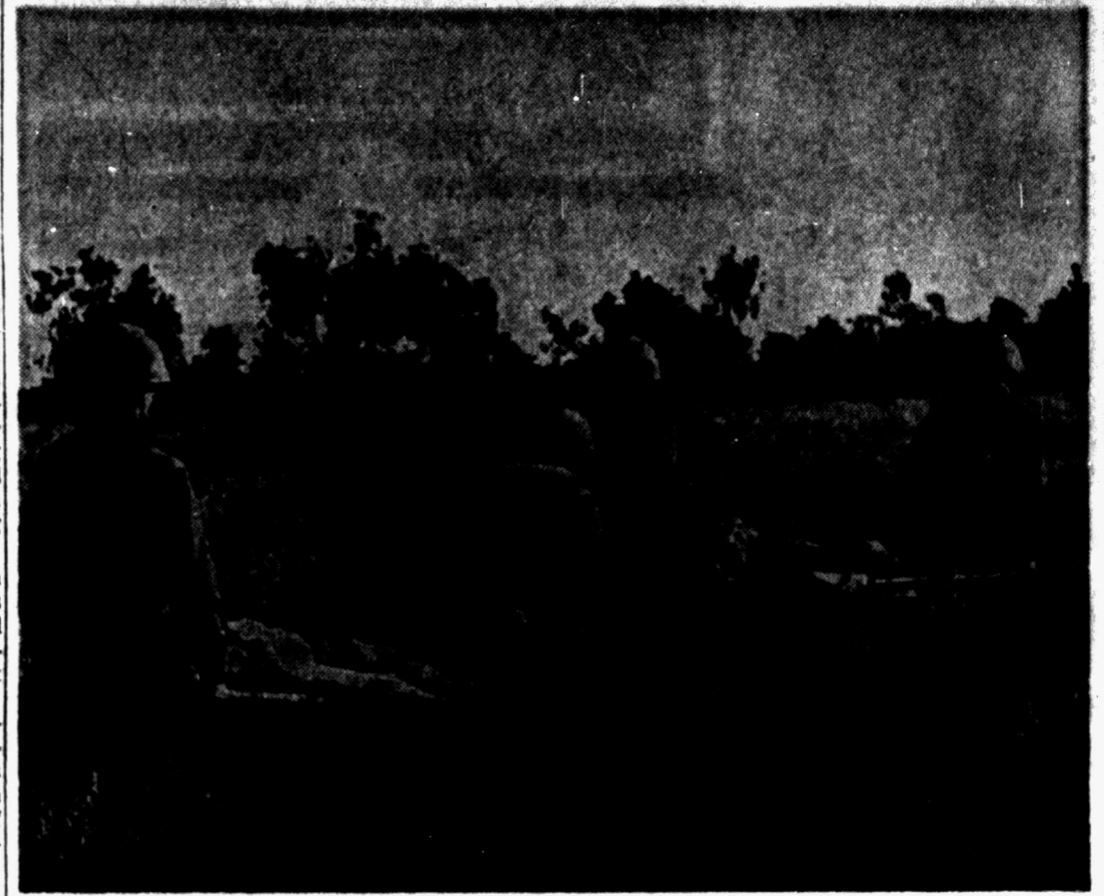
While the suspension of bombing remained in effect, the United States continued to press its diplomatic efforts to bring about negotiations. But just what these efforts are and what their results have been were cloaked in official secrecy.

It was known that Ambassador W. Averell Harriman — who has been literally ranging the world to promote the American viewpoint on Viet Nam — was in Tokyo and would go from there to Australia.

But neither the State Department nor the White House would say where he would go after that. Bar Postpones 'Aid' Action

Lubbock County Bar Assn. Friday postponed action on a proposal to reorganize the county's legal aid system.

Decision to delay for two meetings (approximately a month) came after a general discussion at the bar association luncheon at the Pioneer Hotel.

The reorganization plan was presented by J. Q. Warnick Jr., chairman of the bar's legal aid committee, who proposed formation of a non-profit corporation to administer legal aid.

Plans Outlined
The corporation would be headed by a board of directors made up of attorneys, representatives of various other professions, welfare organizations and other groups. Attorneys would handle cases on a volunteer, no-fee basis.

This organization would operate for about three years until the legal aid organization could qualify for United Fund assistance. After that, the volunteer attorneys would be replaced by a full-time legal aid attorney.

The reorganization plan also would expand the field in which legal aid is available by reducing the number of classes of cases in which free legal aid cannot be given.

Members of the legal aid committee who worked with Warnick in developing the plan are Walter Taylor, Bill LauBach, Broadus Spivey and James Brewster.

Warnick, in urging immediate action on the proposal, pointed out that if nothing is done, federal legal assistance programs administered by the Office of Economic Opportunity would take over.

"There is nothing anyone can do to stop them if the OEO decides to organize legal assistance in a city or county, but if we already have a legal aid organization in operation and have

Bigger, Better And Brighter Garden Flowers Will Be Available This Year



IN NEW COLORS—A young zinnia plant in the Texas Tech annual flower trial area shows tremendous potential for Plains residents. These hybrid zinnias are being developed in many new color categories.

What in the way of garden flowers can we expect in the near future?

In addition to new roses and new gladiolus, new dahlias, iris and mums, some of the most drastic departures or changes in development have taken place in the seed-grown annuals; and the catalogue descriptions stating newer and bigger and better, or brighter or more unusual will be true claims as many of these new items actually exist and are not merely on the drawing boards. Thus, hybrid zinnias—a dream 10 years ago—should shortly be on the market. These zinnias have factors for additional vigor and disease resistance which would permit you to have bigger, more double, longer-lasting zinnia flowers and plants with no more effect than you exert now.

Makes Difference
This advantage might not be so spectacular to see in other areas, but under our bright sun conditions, this factor for disease resistance and flower size really can make a difference in performance compared to the very best that have been available on the market in the past years.

New snapdragons are now available and should be in this area this coming spring. They appear to last longer and give greater total show of color because of the fact that the snap in the snapdragon was bred to be left open, giving it a penstemon appearance. These snapdragons against proved to be top-notch performers under our South Plains conditions.

We have not been quite so fortunate in finding suitable giant-flowered dwarf marigolds that would be well adapted to South Plains conditions, but no doubt in due time this heat resistance factor will be brought into new varieties of marigolds.

Texas Bluebells
Area plant dealers who have not had them in the past should be stocking a few Texas bluebells this season. These native Texas wildflowers are now domesticated and appear to withstand our drought conditions and heat rather well.

Texas Bluebells are grown from very small seed, and they form extremely small plants which grow very slowly the first few months of their existence. Plants just an inch and a half to three inches tall planted early in the spring should produce excellent flowers this season. These plants have few problems in the garden except perhaps the overproduction of seed, which does tend to shorten their life span.—E.Z.

GROWERS TO MEET
South Plains dahlia growers will hold a meeting at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Garden-Arts Center to organize a dahlia society. Plans will be made for a dahlia show to be held at the center in September.

ALERT THEM TO NEEDS

Extended Weather Data Should Aid Gardeners

The full coverage weather information which is being disseminated by the improved, extended weather bureau reports should be of considerable value to regional gardeners to at least alert them to possible needs of their garden plants.



Whenever the sun is bright and temperatures moderate, with low humidities and some air movement, the rate of water loss may be such that, even at this time of year, watering might be necessary, especially in plant beds where relatively shallow rooted plants without the water absorbing capabilities of Bermuda grass can be found.

Therefore, perhaps it would be best to go out and look for yourself, but having some idea of the drying conditions and the rate of water loss certainly can alert you to a closer estimation of possible water need in your landscape.

Another problem which appears to be developing is one which frequently arises when some member of the family has been fortunate enough to obtain some new pruning equipment, and he begins to make mince-meat out of trees and shrubs.

Purpose Of Pruning
Many pruning acts are performed for the sake of pruning, but are really a method of gaining exercise. Pruning is a simple, practical and logical. Most of the intentions in pruning are aimed at making the plants stronger or more attractive.

In most instances, pruning which is done for an increase of strength selects just a few major scaffold branches; preserve these; and eliminate superfluous branches like those especially on fruitless mulberry, which tends to over produce many major branches.

Gardeners should make it a point to make their cuts of main branches flush to the main trunk itself so that eventually this scar can be healed over completely. Young trees, of course, need to have just a number of main branches selected and these branches so space that they arise at different points along the trunk rather than all at or near the same place. By all means, trim up and trim out narrow angled branches, although this is not usually necessary in oaks and other strong-wooded trees.

On a warm, sunny day you might also check over your gates and latches. Often continued use of wooden gates will tend to loosen wooden stops or partially pull out parts of the latches.

By all means, see about applying dormant oil sprays to trees that have been attacked by scale this past season.

The special 30-minute program was aired Dec. 29 by Hanoi radio and monitored here.

"O.K., guys in Viet Nam. This is Radio State-side broadcasting from Watts, central California. This has been your (words in distinct). We hope to see you

Construction Progressing On By-Pass Route

PLAINVIEW (Special) — Construction on the approximately \$2,550,000 by-pass to route U.S. 87 to the west of Plainview is ahead of schedule in some phases, D. C. Greer, Lubbock state highway engineer, has reported.

Total used against the contract as of the beginning of January was \$628,885. Good weather that extended into the early winter weeks boosted progress on the project, designated as Loop 194.

Greer gave the following status on the major project:

The loop, from U.S. 87 north of Plainview to the south end of U.S. 70 overpass west of Plainview—grading, structures, establishing base and two course treatment—19 per cent complete with \$17,620 used against a contract of \$37,028.

Other Segments

Other segments of work:

Loop 274 in Hale County from the FW&D Railroad-State Highway 194 overpass and approaches west of Plainview, 32 per cent complete with \$123,277 used against the \$519,197 contract.

Loop 274 in Hale County from the south end of the U.S. 70 overpass west of Plainview to U.S. 87 at Ferguson Switch, 25 per cent complete with \$226,998 used against the \$891,787 contract.

U.S. 70 in Hale County from two-tenths of a mile west of Loop 274 to two-tenths of a mile east of the loop, a \$58,680 contract with work not started at the time of the report.

State Highway 194 in Hale County from one-half mile east of the Loop 274, to 0.28 mile west of the loop, \$106,652 contract with work not started.

Sgt. Donald K. Mulder Honored At Reese AFB

T.Sgt. Donald K. Mulder has been nominated to Air Training Command as 1965's outstanding airman for Reese Air Force Base.

Sgt. Mulder was assigned to Reese in July 1963. He is in the requirements and planning section of the civil engineering control center. His selection was by a board at Reese, which considered nominees of Reese units. Accomplishments throughout his career, with special emphasis on his production in 1965, were the basis of his nomination.

Col. Richard A. Steele, Air Base Group commander, said he has "always found Mulder's work, attitude and appearance to be on the highest plane."

The performance records showed that the sergeant has been responsible for supervising preparation of work orders, long-range planning of maintenance and repair requirements on an annual basis, the financial management associated with maintenance and repair work.

Filled Captain's Slot

Mulder's knowledge and management were commended. He filled a captain's slot as chief of requirements and planning for a time.

Special emphasis was placed on the painting job in which Reese was directed to paint 50 buildings between Nov. 1 and Dec. 15, 1965. The sergeant planned, organized and supervised the job, using 25 temporary civilian employees to complete the project 15 days ahead of schedule.

Sgt. Mulder, 35, enlisted in the Air Force in 1948 and served at Walker, Otis, Grenier and McGuire bases prior to going to Korea as officer in charge of the carpenter shop.

He returned to Eglin AFB and later served three years at Eielson AFB, Alaska, where he won a commendation medal. He came to Reese July 19, 1963.

War Of Genocide Cited

"What happens to that theory when the No. 1 song across the U.S. happens to be an antiwar, antisoldier song, a song which is appealing to you, our GIs in Viet Nam, to lay down your arms, to refuse to fight, to go on hunger strikes, to become reclassified as conscientious objectors and to return here to liberate your own country, to bring about a little more civil rights and civil liberties here in America."

The broadcaster then said the war is a war of genocide against the Vietnamese people and called upon the soldiers to lay down their arms and become conscientious objectors.

Philadelphia Address Given

The broadcast claimed it was sent from Watts which it described as the "ultraleft Negro ghetto in Los Angeles."

U.S. officials noted that references in the broadcast dated it sometime after the Negro riot in Watts last August but sometime before the Nov. 15 Viet Nam Day Movement. There was a reference to the Central Committee of Conscientious Objectors, with an address given at 2006 Walnut St., Philadelphia, as the headquarters of a group that could give information to American soldiers who do not want to fight in Viet Nam but who do not know a legal way not to.

"They will send you some information about how you can protest," the broadcast said.

Raiders Meet Razorbacks In Ozarks Today

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — For the first time this season, Texas Tech pits its Southwest Conference prominence on the line beneath foreign surroundings, and Coach Gene Gibson is reflecting almost everything but optimism.

The University of Arkansas, one of the league's surprise teams during non-conference play, hosts the Raiders in a 2

p.m. contest that will attract interest all over the SWC. "Arkansas probably is the most improved team around," Gibson said Friday, shortly before departure. "They have a veteran outfit, boasting experience, poise and possibly the best defense we'll meet all season."

Coach Glen Rose's Razorbacks, fresh from an 88-85 loss to TCU at Fort Worth in the league opener, bring into today's contest a 6-3 season ledger. "They've played a lot of good ball teams," Gibson observed, "and have won a lot of games. They play an exceptionally tough zone defense, and we will have to cope well with it if we hope to win."

The Raiders, pre-season favorite to cop the SWC crown they missed by default last year, come into the game with a 5-5 record that may be misleading. The losses have come to the likes of Kansas, Kansas State, Colorado, Wichita and Kentucky. In the season opener in Lubbock Tuesday, Tech exploded for a record-setting 115-77 victory over Baylor. Gibson indicated Friday that he would use the same starting lineup here this afternoon.

That means that Dub Malaise and Bobby Messells will be at guards, Bob Glover at center and Billy Tapp and Norman Reuther at forwards. Four of the Tech starters are averaging in the double figures. Malaise, who of late has been utilized more for his passing and quarterbacking than for his shooting, paces the team with a 17.7 average. Following in order are Reuther (16.9), Glover (14.1) and Messells (10.5). Arkansas, with a starting lineup consisting of four two-year lettermen seniors and a letterman junior, definitely has an advantage in experience, and their scoring balance is almost parallel to that of the Raiders.

Ricky Sugg, a 63 senior who has started at both guard and center, paces the pack with a 16.5 mean. He will be joined at guard by Steve Rousseau (11.5), a 5-9 senior. John Talkington (11.1), a 6-5 senior, will be at center, and J. D. McConnell (11.00), a 6-5 senior, and Tommy Rowland (6.3), a 6-4 junior, will be at forward.

Only one common opponent appears on the records of the two teams. Arkansas lost to Kansas, 81-52 in Lawrence in the season opener, and the same Jayhawks beat Tech in Lubbock, 74-70, three games later. Arkansas' other loss came to Iowa (77-75) in the opening round of the Sun Bowl tournament last week. The Razorbacks have scored victories over Missouri (75-62), Oklahoma State (55-52), Centenary (90-61), Phillips 66ers (75-64), Arlington State (78-64) and Loyola of New Orleans (67-57).
