IN HAITI Plane Crash Fatal To 28

PORT AU PRINCE (AP) - A Haitian commercial airliner crashed near the southwest coast of Haiti, killing 28 of the 33 persons aboard, it was revealed Sunday. Among the dead in the first crash of a Haitian commercial plane since 1944 were Mrs. Roger Polgar, German-born wife of the French chief of the United Nations development program here; Eric Simonet and Mrs. Raymonde Mavre, Swiss experts with the U.N.'s International Labor Organization; a Canadian priest, the Rev. Alard; a Haitian Baptist minister, the Rev. Robert Rocourt, and textile magnate Antoine Hage. The DC3 was on a regularly scheduled flight from Port au Prince to Les Cayes and Jeremie on the southwest coast. It left Les Cayes with 27 passengers and a crew of six and crashed 25 minutes after takeoff in an area known as Duchiti. Planes from the American aircraft carrier Saratoga located the wreckage and brought the survivors to Port au Prince.

Shocks Recorded

Prof. Maurice Major of the Colorado School of Mines said instruments recorded a shock late Sunday which had a magnitude of about four on the Richter scale, which would be considered moderate. He said at least seven events have been recorded in the past 24 hours.

# Eleanor Pillsbury's Ideas On Cooking, Habits Shared

NEW YORK (UPI) — Eleanor Pillsbury makes an ideal hostess for a baking contest. "I can't get the contestants into trouble because I know nothing about cooking," said Mrs. Pillsbury.

But in her 16 years as official hostess for the Grand National Bake-Off, she has evolved some theories about the cooking and eating habits of U.S. families. She's also become a sort of Godmother to the 100 finalists in each annual baking contest sponsored by the milling firm of which her husband, Phillip W. Pillsbury, is co-chairman of the board.

**Wide Range of Problems**  
She said that many contestants come to her with problems that range from getting ingredients for their recipes or a bandage for a sprained wrist, to how to have breakfast in bed.

A group of contestants who asked the last question apparently was prompted by a second day feature of the two-day competition in which any contestant who wishes may have his or her morning meal served in the hotel room.

Mrs. Pillsbury said that many contestants also ask what she serves at parties and what her favorite recipe is.

There's no answer to the latter question, because she's no cook, she added, but the menu part is easy.

"For a dinner party, I like to serve a simple meal of consommé, steak or wild duck, rice, salad and dessert.

"Many times a contestant will tell me that such a menu wouldn't be enough for my guests."

# Obtain Soundproofing



Dear Ann Landers: Not very long ago you printed a letter from a woman whose husband snored so loud it made a nervous wreck out of her. My husband and I have far more serious problems.

We have lived in this same apartment for five years and we love it here. Four months ago a woman moved in next door with a 90-pound Boxer. (I don't mean a pugilist, I mean a dog.) Well the dog snores. At first we thought it was the woman who was snoring but several weeks ago she went on a vacation and her sister stayed in the apartment with the dog. When that horrible snoring continued we figured it had to be the dog because no two people could have identical snores. My wife finally asked the sister and she verified the fact that it was indeed the dog.

Is there a solution — short of moving, which we don't want to do? — Irate Irene

Dear Irene: First, invest in soundproofing. The cost is minimal compared with what a night's sleep is worth. Second, ask your neighbor if she will bed the dog down in another room — as far from your bedroom as possible. And goodnight Irene.

Dear Va. L. L.: It sounds like your husband is awfully fond of the coffee they serve at the bowling alley. Tell him you'd like to try some of that coffee and that the next time he goes over for a cup to wake up and take you along.

Dear Ann Landers: My sister and her husband and family were living with mother when she died. Mother's will said the house should be sold and the money divided equally among her four children. We thought my sister would move within a few months but she kept making excuses — "Can't find anything we can afford — hate to break up the children's school year, etc."

It seems to me that living rent-free for five years in a home that belongs partly to others is overdoing it.

My husband and I know of a house that will be put up for sale very soon and we want to buy it. If we had the money coming to us from the sale of mom's house we could make a down payment.

Mom would turn over in her grave if she knew what was going on. What should be done? — P.P.R.

Dear P.P.R.: The lawyer who handled the estate should see to it that your mother's wishes are carried out. She stated specifically that the house should be sold and each of her children should share in the proceeds. If she had wanted your sister to have the house she would have left it for her. The lawyer should give your sister a deadline — like 90 days to vacate.

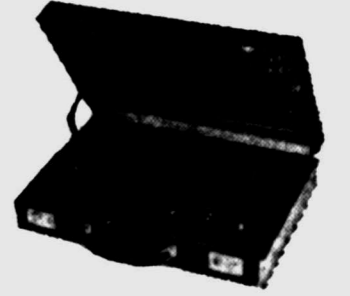

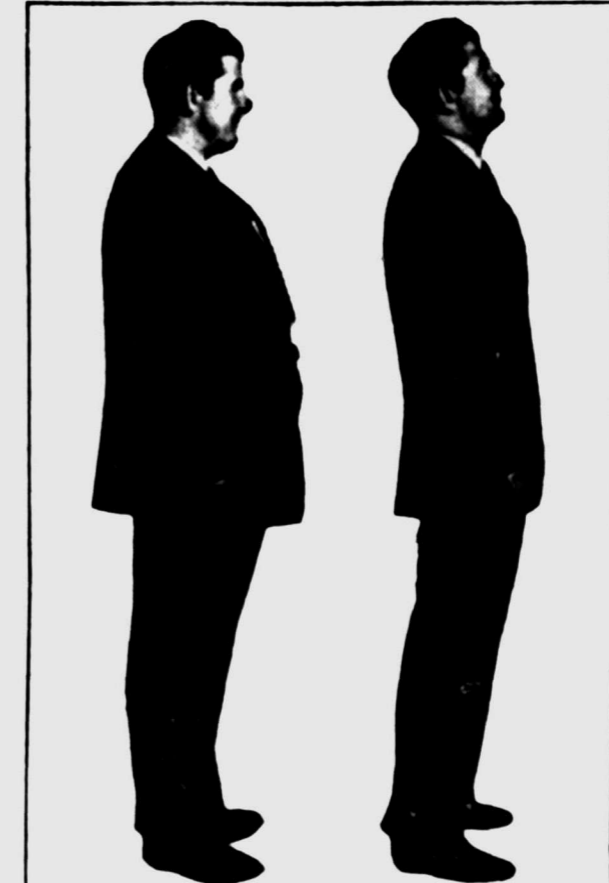

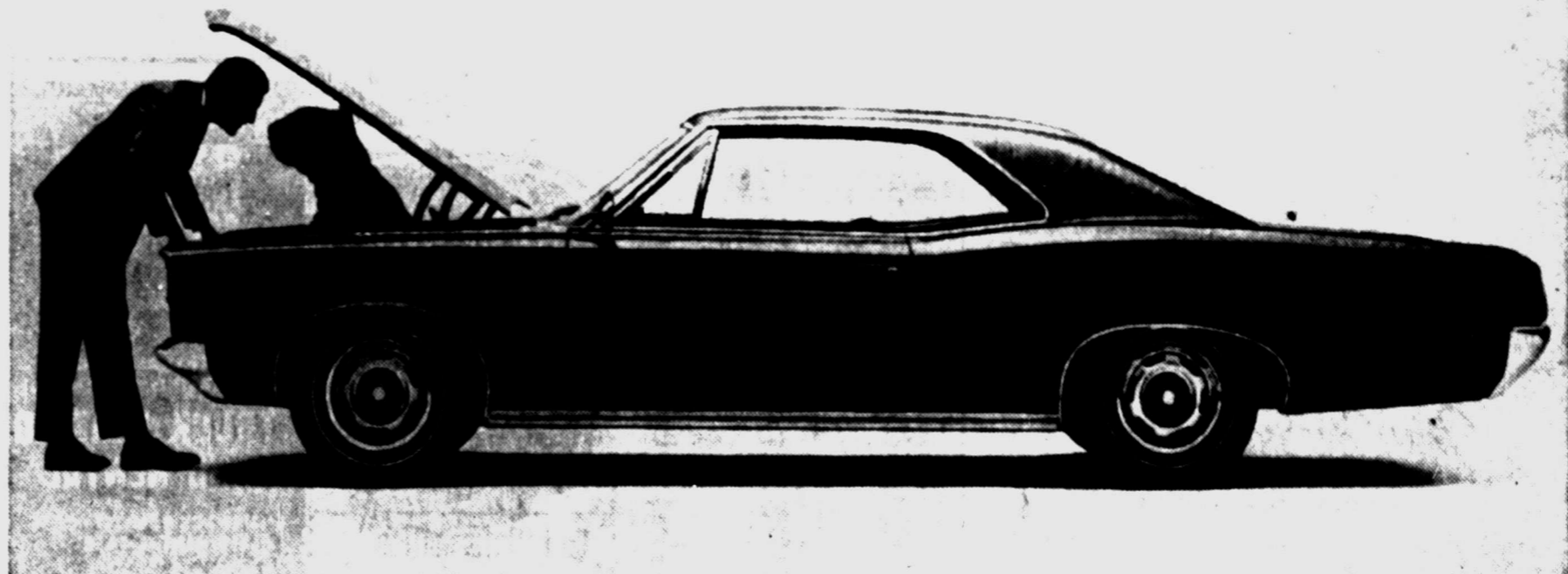

# Completing Tax Forms Due To Be Easier This Year

**EDITOR'S NOTE:**—It's income tax time again, and one of the most important things to keep in mind is to use the correct tax table. This article, the first of five, discusses tables and other matters.

Filing out an income tax form this year should be easy in comparison to some past years.

There are very few important changes, but Form 1040 has been given a face-lift. In other words, the degree of complexity—and frustration—should run no higher than normal.

This article explains the major changes and gives a few basic tips. Subsequent articles in this series will give more details.

Sometimes a simple change can trap up an unwary taxpayer. Make sure you use the tax tables or the tax schedules which apply to 1965 income. The income tax rates were lowered for 1964 and the same law provided for another rate reduction to take effect in 1965.

**Changes Cause Confusion**

The changes caused considerable confusion last year for persons who used the tax tables. You may use the tax tables if your income was less than \$5,000 and if you do not itemize personal deductions. At one point, the Internal Revenue Service reported that nearly one out of every 11 taxpayers using the tables made an error.

Many persons simply used the wrong table. And two out of three of the errors were in favor of the government.

The main source of this confusion has been eliminated this year. You won't find a place on Form 1040 to deduct the dividend credit. This credit was reduced from 4 to 2 percent in 1964 and eliminated in 1965 income. However, you may still exclude from your income the first \$100 of dividends received from U.S. corporations. You can do a joint return if both husband and wife each receive over \$100 in dividends.

**Forms Mailed Out**

As in the past, the IRS has mailed out millions of forms and instruction sheets and they are also available at any IRS office. For additional information, the government's booklet "Your Federal Income Tax" can be purchased for 50 cents, and you can get personal help by telephoning or visiting an IRS office.

In Southeastern and Middle Atlantic states, there is a pre-arranged change for taxpayers

who are expecting a refund. You may mail your return direct to a regional processing center for faster service. Most taxpayers in those areas have received an addressed envelope with their mailed tax forms. And, of course, every taxpayer should file early if he expects to get his refund back quickly. Remember, the line is 40 million persons long about two out of every three returns calls for a refund and many of them get caught in the crush a short time before the April 15 filing deadline.

**Cause Unnecessary Work**

Taxpayers sometimes cause themselves unnecessary paperwork and delay by carelessness, make certain the name or names and Social Security number are correct.

### CALLS FOR PRAYERS Pope Says 'Perhaps Hour Near For Christian Unity'

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI said Sunday perhaps the hour is near for Christian unity.

The pontiff, in his regular Sunday blessing to thousands gathered in St. Peter's square, called for prayers to help in the re-union of all Christians in the only visible Church of Christ.

"As you know," he said, "this problem of the union of Christians in the unity of the church is of great importance and of great actuality, and we must confront it... instead of putting in evidence many difficulties."

"Perhaps Hour Is Near?"

"It is necessary more than ever that we have divine help, nearly a miracle of the Lord. But perhaps the hour is near, and this is why there is the need for many prayers."

The Pope did not specify but Vatican sources said he probably was referring to the forthcoming visit to Rome of the archbishop of Canterbury, primus of the Anglican Church, and the improved relations with the orthodox faiths.

In conclusion, Pope Paul said that "We send our greetings and a respectful and blessed salute to all our separated Christian brothers to those who have had an observer present at the ecumenical council to all those of the East, the Orthodox, to those of the West, the Anglicans and the Protestants to everyone."

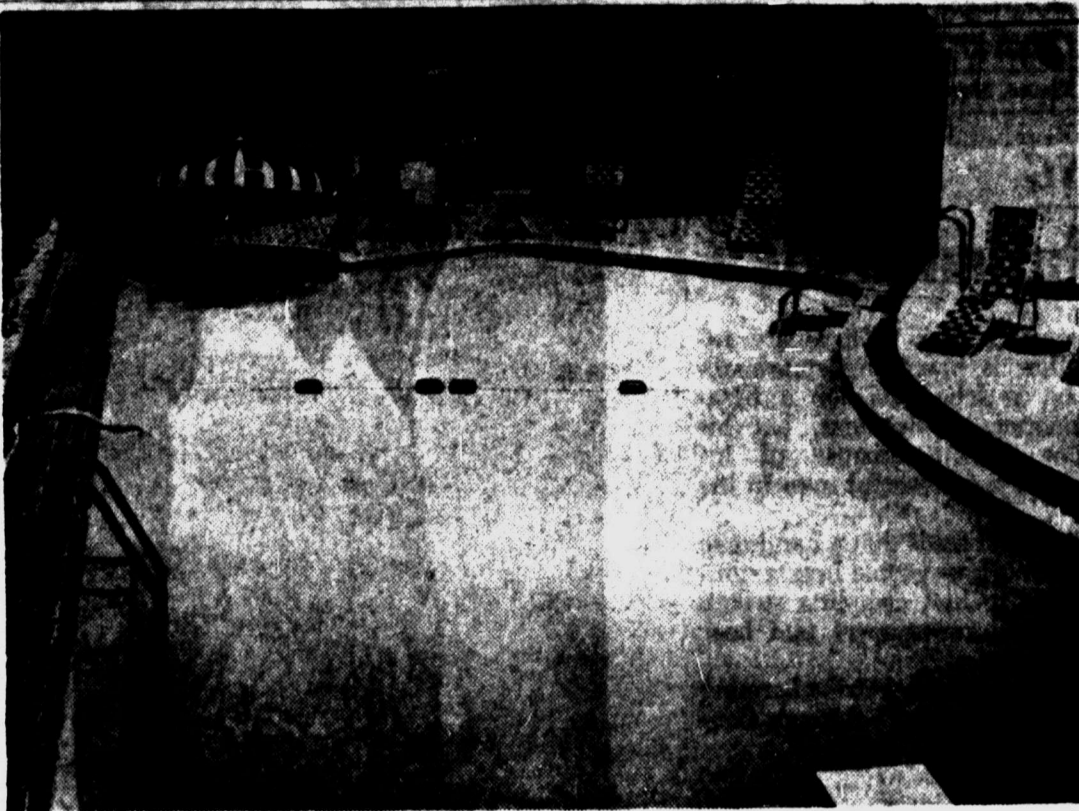

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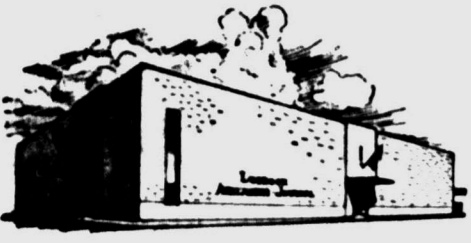

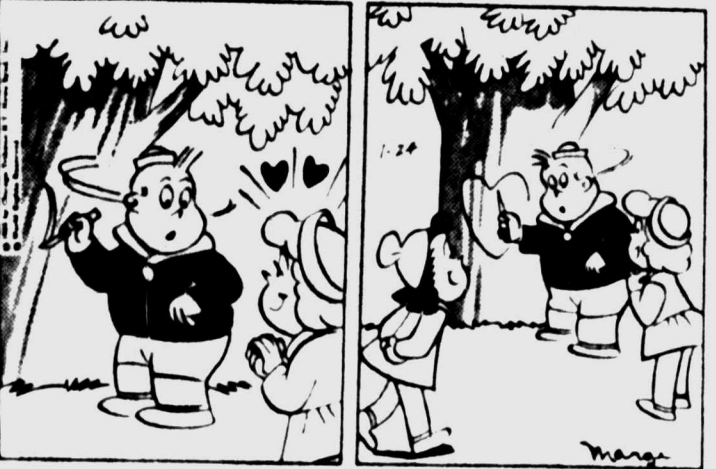

December, 1961, hit the Buffalo suburb of Lancaster, N. Y., which reported a two-foot fall.

In Buffalo, where 17.6 inches of snow fell in 24 hours, the airport was closed and authorities said all public and parochial schools would be shut down today.

**Eight Die**

The storm was blamed for the deaths of at least eight persons who suffered heart attacks while shoveling snow in upstate New York.

As snow piled up and turned into slush and clogged roads, New York City declared a "snow emergency" to hold clear its 6,000 miles of streets.

A 10-mile section of U.S. 40

in Maryland was closed to west-bound traffic by snow drifts several feet high. Snowplows were rushed into operation.

More than 18 inches of snow fell in western Maryland and winds of 25 to 30 miles per hour piled the snow into drifts.

Blowing snow and fog struck Gage in northwestern Oklahoma as the temperatures were below freezing through the day. The minus-5 reading at Gage and Guyton were the lowest in the state overnight.

Schools were to be closed today in 32 Kentucky counties because of hazardous roads. Snow stopped over most of the state, but Lexington had 9.4 inches.

**Power Lines Severed**

Rain, sleet and snow lashed by gale force winds rocked the Gotham city, halting ferry service between Manhattan and Staten Island. Streets and expressways were flooded. The Jersey Central Railroad tracks were flooded at Jersey City, Newark and Perth Amboy, N.J.

The wind and sleet severed power lines in the New York boroughs of Staten Island, Brooklyn and Queens, causing power failures. House trailers and miniature buses were banned from the George Washington Bridge because of the wind gusts. The Port Authority Trans Hudson commuter railroad suspended service because its New Jersey tracks were under water.

The U.S. Weather Bureau said the snow was falling at a "non-accumulative rate" in many areas of the northeast. White Plains, N.Y., got 15 inches of snow in six hours.

**Heavy Snowfalls Reported**

In upstate New York, Buffalo and Rochester reported record snowfalls for a 24-hour period in January. Rochester had 18.1 inches and Buffalo 18.2 inches. The Buffalo Airport was closed and schools in Buffalo, Niagara Falls and Lockport reported they would not open today.

Brookfield, Pa., and West Virginia. Marshall County reported 18 inches of snow. West Virginia had more than a foot of snow. Marietta, Ga., reported 12 inches.

The snow fell extended Kentucky, where Ohio River towns reported 10 inches and Louisville, the Tennessee-Virginia border, where up to a foot of snow fell.

**Basketball Game Cancelled**

All upstate New York airports were closed. So was Philadelphia's International Airport. Boston's Logan International Airport shut down and a plane carrying the Boston Celtics was diverted to New Jersey, forcing cancellation of a National Basketball Association game.

Air travel was delayed at Pittsburgh, Pa., and flights to New York City were cancelled. Elsewhere, bitter cold replaced temperatures in the Midwest. Temperatures were not expected to go above zero in Minnesota and Iowa. Forecasters predicted heavy snow in northern Minnesota.

**Lowest Set Records**

Overnight lows included 26 below in Roseau, Minn., and 25 below in Thief River Falls, Minn. It was 25 in Williston, N.D. and Bismarck, N.D.

Low temperature records for the date included: Amarillo 7, Wichita Falls 7, Midland 7, Abilene 7, Brownsville 7, and the only point in Texas that escaped above freezing weather during the night. Freezing was experienced for the first time this season along much of the Gulf Coast and the farmland of the Rio Grande Valley. However, no major damage to citrus trees or vegetables was reported.

It was bitter cold in Arkansas with the overnight low dropping to a shade in Fayetteville. Four Arkansas traffic deaths were attributed to icy roads during and after the snowstorm that blanketed the state Friday.

**Expect 12 Below Readings**

Indiana braced for 12-below-zero weather and 20-mile-an-hour winds. Southern Indiana got six inches of snow Saturday and the northern section three inches. Weather conditions were blamed for seven traffic deaths.

Rain continued along the northern Pacific coast, but it changed to snow inland to Montana and Idaho. The remainder of the Far West generally was clear but chilly.

Midday readings in the '20s covered most of the Southeast. A 12-hour high temperature ranged from 23 below zero in Devils Lake, N.D., to 66 in Key West, Fla.

**DIESEL PARTS**

The other car and furnished a sketchy description of the gunman. One of the two companions officers still had very little concrete information on until the suspect was identified Sunday night.

**Garb Recalled**

Alderson and Brown said the Aviator had a Sunday night that there was no doubt in their minds that the suspect was the same man that had fired the gun Sunday morning.

He was even wearing the same sweater. Alderson said of the gray sweater with black V neck he had described to officers following the shooting.

Underwood's companions said Sunday night that Brown had just arrived in Lubbock on a 30-day leave from the Air Force and that a bunch of his companions had not together for a long time. Brown said Sunday night he had attended school together at Smyer from the time they entered the first grade until graduation. Underwood and Brown had entered the Air Force together in 1944.

**In Route Home**

Alderson said they had to drive to the home and were on their way home when the incident occurred.

We were driving south on Avenue A and were on the inside lane. Alderson said, "We were going faster than the car in the other lane and started to pass, just as we did, he pulled in front of us. I tried to brake and switch lanes to keep from hitting him."

By the time we had slowed down we were inside his lane. Rodney pulled down the window and asked him what his problem was. The man on the left side of the car said, "You don't like it, huh?" and when Rodney said we certainly didn't, the man pulled a gun and shot. Alderson added.

**Hands To Mouth**

"Everyone ducked when he shot and I got out of there," he said.

It wasn't until after they had left the other car behind that his companions discovered the shot had hit Underwood.

Brown said that after everyone in the car had raised up, Underwood said, "They hit me," and turned to Brown who was sitting beside him in the back seat of the car. "He had his hands in his mouth and I saw blood coming out his mouth and told James to get to a hospital because Rodney had been shot."

All of us were shocked. Brown said the gun sounded like a toy gun but when we realized it wasn't, we didn't think about license plates. We were just thinking about saving Rodney's life.

**Victim "Went Limp"**

Goodnight Hospital about two miles from the scene of the shooting, was the closest place Underwood's companions could think to take him. Brown said he was still alive and trying to move until they turned in at the hospital. Then he went limp. Brown said the gunman must have had the gun, later found to have been a .22-caliber through the bullet taken from Underwood's neck, in his hand when they pulled up beside the car. "It didn't take him a split second to shoot, and the expression on his face never changed," he said.

Alderson said everyone in the car except McCasland got a good look at the gunman, and three of the men were able to pick the suspect out a lineup of six men Sunday night.

## U.S. OFFICIALS SKEPTICAL Body Of American 'Suicide' Victim Taken To Moscow

**BY JAY ANELBANK**

MOSCOW (UPI)—The body of a young American man, reportedly a Soviet laborer, was taken to Moscow Sunday for an autopsy. U.S. officials said they were skeptical about the Soviet explanation that the man, identified as a "suicide" victim, was killed by a bullet fired from a Viet Nam war.

Kobler called at the foreign ministry Saturday and demanded the most thorough investigation into the death. He said the United States would not accept the suicide explanation until more facts were known.

In Sheffield, Mass., Howard S. Mott, who attended the trial along with her husband, said she was convinced her son did not take his own life. "He met death in some full mannered way," she said.

**In Good Spirits**

Both she and her husband said their son's letters indicated he was in the best of health and spirits.

Mott's death came just five months before he would have been eligible for release from the Soviet prison. His sentence started from the day of his arrest on Sept. 4, and Russian law provides prisoners are eligible for parole after serving half their term.

Kobler denounced the Russian handling of Mott's case and said the tragic ending could have been avoided had the Soviet government seen fit to heed the numerous appeals from both his family and his friends in the interest of securing mercy and clemency for this unfortunate young man.

wants so far as fiscal matters are concerned, maybe a little more."

Lomb said the program outlined by Johnson would be sufficient to meet the government's foreseeable financial needs, but he did not rule out the possibility of a request for a tax increase in May.

Johnson has declared that he would not hesitate to ask Congress for further fiscal action if the Vietnamese war effort makes it necessary.

The key to his thinking was this sentence in his State of the Union address: "This nation is mighty enough, its people are healthy enough, its people are strong enough, to pursue our goals in the rest of the world while still building a Great Society here at home."

**Union Shop Hassle**

The budget notwithstanding, congressional action this week will center in the Senate, where Democratic leaders will reopen the battle over the union shop.

In his message, Johnson made another appeal for Senate approval of the House-passed bill to repeal section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Labor Act.

This measure would in effect nullify laws which 14 states now prohibit union shop contracts that require all employees to join a union or at least pay union dues.

**Outlook Not Bright**

The House passed the repeal bill July by a vote of 221 to 216. The Senate defeated it several weeks in October before dropping it in the face of an opposition filibuster.

The outlook for the bill is no brighter now than it was last year. Its backers still don't have the votes to halt another filibuster. Last October they failed to get even a majority on a vote to end the talkation. They need two-thirds.

Meanwhile, other Senate business will come to a halt except for action in committees.

The House, having nothing on its docket for floor consideration will do nothing this week except in committees.

**Committees Active**

Committees on both sides of the Capitol will keep cabinet members on the jump during the week.

See of State Dean Rusk is to give closed-door briefings on international affairs to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today and to the House Foreign Affairs Committee on Tuesday.

See of Defense Robert S. McNamara is to be leadoff witness at a meeting of the Senate-House Economic Commission today. McNamara is slated to testify before the House appropriations Committee on Wednesday in support of an emergency \$12.7 billion defense appropriation.

A Public Works subcommittee of the House will consider Tuesday a bill to provide an official Washington residence for the vice president.

## BATTLE-TESTED 'ENTERPRISE'

### Captain Gives Praise To Nuclear Warship

Against the north, Holloway said, "it's tough. There's no such thing as a milk run. Those people are well trained, well led, well equipped and damned determined."

**Damage "Substantial"**

How badly the Enterprise damaged the Communist side during her 45-day patrol is a matter of debate. The captain is certain, "I can say this, though. I can say that we have been highly successful."

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Pilots who fly the more than 100 warplanes aboard the Enterprise include some of the most experienced men ever assembled for such a task.

The skill, the courage, the dedication of these men is unbelievable," Holloway said.

He said that operating the Enterprise in combat is easier than running a conventionally powered ship.

**Rickover Gets Credit**

Part of her reliability comes from the watchfulness of Vice Adm. Hyman C. Rickover, who fathered nuclear power in the Navy and, from his post at the Bureau of Ships, still keeps an eye on a vast amount of detail.

Holloway was a World War II destroyer sailor who later took flight training and came under special training for his present assignment.

"The year I spent working for him was as intellectually stimulating as any 12 months I have ever spent," Holloway said.

That was the only break for the 5,000-man crew until the Enterprise returned to the Philippines for a brief rest before setting out again with the U.S. 7th Fleet.

Until air attacks against North Viet Nam were called off Dec. 24 the Enterprise operated in Tonkin Gulf waters off the north coast. Later, she had a little more leeway in the open sea off the south coast.

**Not Ideal Use**

Holloway admitted that operating a nuclear carrier in the role of a tactical support ship against Communist guerrillas is not the ideal use of a ship with the punch and mobility of the Enterprise.

However, he said, "Tactical support is required to do the job in Viet Nam. The Navy's contribution is required. It is not an ideal situation, but nobody else could make those strikes if the carriers were pulled out."

Holloway said he is convinced the 1,125-foot-long Enterprise could be flown right into battle from bases in the United States.

Although no bombing raids have been flown against North Vietnam for nearly a month, a spokesman disclosed Sunday that American and Vietnamese planes darted across the border pretty far down south and frontier Wednesday and Thursday to shower greeting cards and new year's gifts on the Communist North.

He was asked to take over the command of the Enterprise in the Pacific area. We just cranked up and charged up there (at a speed he would not reveal) and we were in position when they needed us."

"A conventional carrier could not have done it."

On a conventional carrier the captain is always thinking of his fuel supply. This concerns the skipper of the Enterprise only about once every four years.

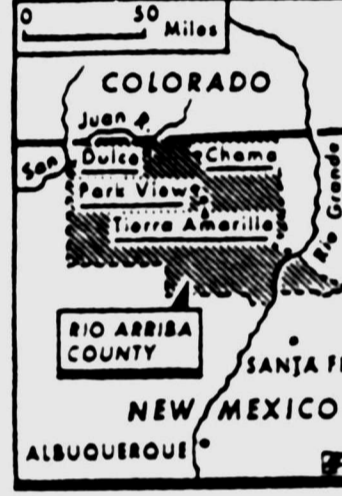
With unlimited fuel and high speed the Enterprise can dash about the sea looking for acceptable weather to launch and land warplanes.

**Ran From Weather**

"Off Viet Nam we never canceled a sortie because of weather," he said. "Once we were operating in a weather trough. As the trough would get on top of us we would make a high-speed dash to get on the other side."

"Our people in Viet Nam need ground support. We push ourselves to the limit of our capability to give it to them."

The Enterprise lost planes on both sides of the border.

Stated police officer Robert Goke of Dulce said panthers were moved back from houses, water pipes broken, foundations cracked in half, windows, broken, walls cracked and doors of stores and refrigerators thrown open.

Further, Varin reported that one-fourth of the roof of his church in Dulce collapsed. Blaster fell off the roof at the parish church in Lubbock. A six-foot crack in his house was broken.

Frank Francis, closed the bar-paquetage store he operates after bottles and glasses were broken. He estimated damage at about \$1,000.

**Window Broken**

Sam Hilliard, administrative assistant to the Jicarilla Apache Indian tribe which has headquarters in Dulce, said electricity and telephone service were interrupted briefly in some areas. He said a 12x30-foot window at a Bureau of Indian Affairs power plant was shattered.

A geophysicist at the New Mexico Institute of Mines and Technology at Socorro, Dr. Allan R. Sanford, said a tremor was recorded by the school's seismographic instruments at 7:57 p.m. CST. A disturbance was recorded at the same time at Sandia Laboratory instruments near Albuquerque.

"I don't have any indication what the magnitude was," Sanford said. But he said it was strongest to occur within 250 miles of Socorro in the four years the school has had its present instruments.

He said the Dulce region historically has had very little tremor activity.

## Severe Quake Jolts North-Central Japan

**TOKYO (AP)**—A strong earthquake, centered on Matsushiro, jolted north-central Japan on Sunday.

The Central Meteorological Agency said the intensity of the quake was five on the Japanese scale of seven at Matsushiro, a town of 22,000 where nearly 100,000 tremors have been registered since Aug. 3, 1965.

Reports from Matsushiro said there was only minor damage, such as roof tiles dropping. The quake occurred at 8:16 p.m. Many school buildings and private homes and shops had built supports, bracing for expected quakes.

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**ISOLATED**

Owing to a double bend in the Mississippi river, there is an area of about 10 square miles in the extreme southwest corner of Kentucky that cannot be reached from the rest of the state except by passing through a part of Missouri or Tennessee.

**Sets Records**

The aircraft, called Operation Blue Light, brought 2,000 men of the 3rd Brigade, 25th Infantry Division into Viet Nam with 3,200 tons of their equipment.

The brigade was flown from Hanoi to Pleiku in the Vietnamese central mountains in an airlift that began on Christmas Eve and ended Sunday morning.

Li Col. Russel J. Revel of the 25th Infantry, who headed the airlift control force in Viet Nam, said the operation proved "beyond a doubt" that divisions of American soldiers with their equipment could be flown right into battle from bases in the United States.

Stage will hurl its sophisticated payload 280 miles into space.

Instead of racing into orbit the Apollo's own 22,000 pound thrust engine will ram the cabin section back into earth's atmosphere at 18,700 miles per hour to test the heat shield that must protect three astronauts on 25,000 mph reentry from the moon.

Once safely back in the thick layer of air blanketing the earth, three parachutes will lower the 11,000-pound command module into the south Atlantic Ocean near Ascension Island about 5,400 miles south of the cape.

This scorching, suborbital flight will be followed by another unmanned up and down with a space shuttle and a Pacific Ocean splashdown. Both missions are designed to test the Apollo heat shield, the spacecraft's systems, and the Saturn-1B launcher.

**Apollo Mission Tentative**

After a third experimental launch of the Saturn-1B late in the summer, another Apollo mission is tentatively set to take place for the first time in the next few months. The shot could come late this year.

But before three astronauts venture into space in an Apollo ship, the federal space agency hopes to wind up the fast-paced Gemini program.

The next two-man flight, to be made by Gemini 8 and Gemini 9, is expected some time in March. Engineers are aiming for a launch about March 8, but a firm date has not been set.

The Gemini 8 mission will be the nation's second space rendezvous flight, but it will mark the first attempt to link two orbiting spacecraft. Scott is also scheduled to make an around-the-world spacewalk.

**AMARILLO (UPI)**—A pipe used to tow a sled behind a pickup truck snapped Sunday and the sled struck a parked truck, killing Robert Carthel, 16, and critically injuring another youth.

Police arrested the driver of the truck.

Police said the driver of the truck, John Alvin McPherson, father of the injured boy, would be charged Monday with negligent homicide. A city ordinance prohibits towing sleds behind motor vehicles.

**Records Indicate Disease Decline** ... CHICAGO (UPI) The American Medical Association reported Sunday that the health records of two armed services and an Eastern boys' school indicate that disease rates among generally healthy American males have dropped by as much as 25 per cent since World War II.

The report, written by three physicians at the University of Pennsylvania, was based on a study of records of the U.S. Navy, the Marine Corps and St. Marks School in Southboro, Mass. Health records of the school's 12 to 18-year-old students have been kept daily since 1909.

"These records show that, except for seasonal changes, the rate of disease was generally unchanged for almost 50 years. After World War II, it began to drop shortly," the article said.

Pope was born March 31, 1884, in Jackson Parish, La. He was graduated from the Louisiana Polytechnic Institute at Ruston in 1906 and the University of Chicago Law School in 1909 when he set up law practice at Boise, Idaho.

He served briefly as a deputy collector of internal revenue, was Boise city attorney in 1916-17, assistant Idaho attorney general in 1918-19, and Boise mayor in 1929-33.

A Democrat, Pope was elected to the Senate in 1932. He was defeated in a bid for re-election in 1938.

Funeral services are to be held in Knoxville, where he will be buried. The time of the services had not been set.

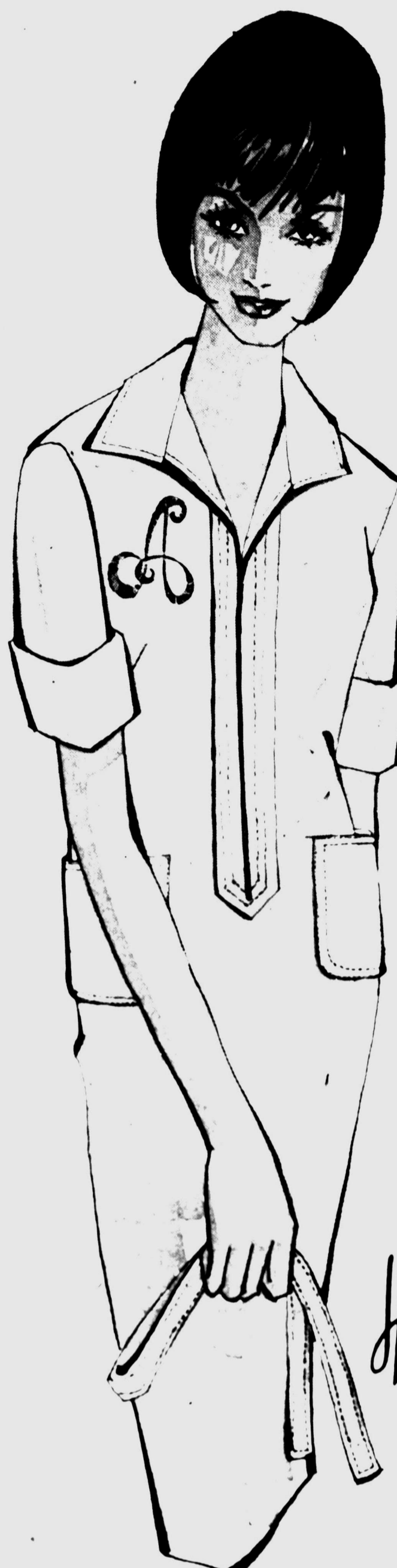

## Briton Forms 'Secret' Army For Viet Nam

By JAMES F. KING LONDON (AP) — Recruitment of a "secret" army of 2,000 British volunteers ready to fight alongside the Americans in Viet Nam was reported Sunday by a London businessman.

Paul Daniels, a World War II veteran, said U.S. Embassy officials show interest in his British volunteer legion but he must get official permission from the British government.

"When we applied last year to send 700 volunteers the British government refused permission," he said. "But we are applying again and have hopes of a change of attitude."

British law bans private armies, he noted, but "not a military register, such as mine."

**Still Unformed**

Daniels said what he meant by "military register" was that he had compiled a list of volunteers but they would not be formed into a unit until they reached the overseas port of destination.

"This," he contends, "conforms within the law."

Daniels, 49, and managing director of a Polish manufacturing firm, said he has been "spending all of my spare time and nearly all of my savings in this recruiting campaign for the last two years."

He declared his legion is dedicated to correcting "failure" of British politicians to oppose world communism adequately.

**'Britain's Glory'**

"We believe in what the Americans are doing in Viet Nam," he told an interviewer. "The democratic way of life is at stake. In a true sense this movement could be 'Britain's glory.'"

The British Ministry of Defense declined to comment on the legion's appeal for permission to send volunteers. A spokesman said a legion offer to send 200 noncombatant volunteers to Viet Nam is being considered.

Daniels said the offer to send noncombatants was made some time ago, after the government refused to apply for others, but that his new group of volunteers was intended for fighting.

**U.S. Must Pay**

"These are not meant to be mercenaries," he went on. "But the financing—transporting the men to Viet Nam, uniforms, equipment and pay at the regular soldier rates—would, of course, have to be borne by the United States."

"Our men would be better than mercenaries. For all have their heart in the cause and most are experienced soldiers. And the value of the volunteer work cannot be underestimated. Look what 200 men did in the Congo."

Daniels said his group includes mostly veterans or others with military training. In their 30s and 40s, up to the rank of colonel.

## Harriman Says North Viet Nam Not Willing To Talk

WASHINGTON (AP) — Roused by this war," the ambassador W. Averell Harriman said Sunday the impression, talking with Soviet North Vietnamese have shown no willingness to negotiate a settlement of the war in Viet Nam but that world opinion is against them.

"I think that Peking and Hanoi are isolated from world opinion," said Harriman, commenting on his recent tour of world capitals where he explained President Johnson's peace offensive. "They don't want this war to continue. They want peace," he said, referring to the world leaders.

**'Don't Like War'**

Harriman said he also believed the Soviet Union would like to end the Viet Nam war as soon as possible. "The Soviet Union is very much embarrassed by this war," he said.

He said he had gained the impression, talking with Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin last summer, that the Russians don't see it stopped.

"One of their preoccupations is the struggle for leadership of the Communist international movement and Peking has had the audacity to challenge Moscow's leadership."

**Talks Not Discussed**

Harriman declined to comment on reports of further direct negotiations between the United States and North Viet Nam.

"I don't think I can talk about direct approaches. Matters of this kind must be kept confidential," he said.

"But I can say this. So far, there has been no indication of any desire on the part of the North Vietnamese to come to the conference table and thrash out the differences and come to a reasonable peaceful solution."

**No Concrete Results**

### OFF SPAIN'S COAST

## Searchers May Have Found Lost A-Device

By EMILIO MOYA VERA, Spain (AP) — A concentration of offshore activity Sunday morning, said, "The Sunday produced reports that searchers may have located in the Mediterranean a nuclear weapon reported missing since a U.S. B52 bomber crashed near here last Monday."

An official source confirmed later that an object had been found and said operations were under way to recover it.

Unofficial quarters said the object had been pinpointed at a depth of about 1,000 feet mid-way between the Spanish coastal villages of Garrucha and Aguilas, and about 500 yards offshore.

**Boats Are Rusted**

Experts here said such a depth was too great for operations by frogmen searching this sector earlier, and that a U.S. minesweeper and two chartered Spanish fishing boats were en route to the scene.

Helicopters and search planes believed to be equipped with radiation detectors were crisscrossing the area, nearly four miles in a straight line from the area where rescuers found the wreckage of the big bomber and an aerial tanker from which it was refueling. They collided Monday morning, killed seven of 11 crewmen.

**Searchers Continue Hunt**

U.S. and Spanish search parties continued their hunt on shore through the area where most of the wreckage fell, but it appeared greater attention was now focused on the sea. Three of four nuclear bombs reported aboard the B52 have been recovered by Spanish sources, it has been reported. The U.S. Air Force has said the bombs could not have been exploded in the crash, since they were not armed or made ready to fire.

A survey of the area in which the accident occurred, including several villages and rural settlements, showed most fear of harm from the nuclear armament had disappeared. No settlement against the U.S. Air Force could be found and one over 65 years of age.

### Want Explanation

The only criticism heard in these villages was that neither U.S. nor Spanish officials gave them an immediate explanation of the situation, which some said "led to a lot of worry for nothing."

Some 15 civil guardsmen who Spanish doctors said had picked up traces of radiation while handling wreckage of the fallen bomber, returned to work Sunday. Their superiors said they were in normal condition.

Nevertheless, residents in the immediate area around the wreckage were reported carefully washing all vegetables, themselves and their clothing more frequently than usual, to avoid possible contact with radioactivity, even though detection instruments brought into the region indicated no danger.

### Elderly Couple Killed By Train

TEMPLE (AP) — An elderly McGregor couple was killed Sunday afternoon when their automobile skidded onto a railroad track and was struck by a 117-car Santa Fe freight train near Temple.

The victims were Alvin Bryan Fisk Sr., 70, and his wife, Henrietta Louise Fisk, 65.

Mrs. Fisk was driving the automobile which a train brake-man said skidded onto the track and stopped moments before it was struck by the engine of the fast-moving freight.

### UNEPLAINED DEATHS SOLVED?

## Researchers Point To Heart Defects As Deadly Culprit

NEW YORK (AP) — Heart defects inside the heart appear to be the cause of many sudden deaths in which no cause appears, researchers say. The study, published in the Journal of the American Medical Assn. by Drs. Howard I. Richardson, Kathryn J. Grainger and Mary E. Rich, works of the Veterans Administration Hospital, North Little Rock, Ark., and the University of Arkansas Medical Center.

**Reason Lacking**

One or two cases of this kind of sudden death occur annually in the 2,000-bed hospital for neuropsychiatric patients, the physicians said. The victims, usually young, are found dead with no signs of struggle or distress, and post-mortem until now have not indicated a reason.

Dr. Richardson and associates, one of them his wife, found the strange heart defects through careful study of the hearts of four men who died in 1964 and 1965. Their hearts were cut into block sections, including all heart chambers, and examined with special stains and techniques.

The defects showed up in the inner heart muscle tissue and in tiny blood vessels, either as degenerative changes or overgrowth of some kinds of tissue.

**Might Affect Rhythm**

The defects "appear to be unique," they said, and of a type that might affect the heart's electrical conduction system and hence its rhythm.

Some of the victims, in life, had shown nonspecific changes in their electrocardiograms.

The physicians said they had produced similar defects in the

Candy, 45, and her newpew Powers, 29, are accused of killing Mossler because he interfered with their love affair. They have pleaded innocent and are free on bond.

Still to come are the lurid details of adultery, perversion, fornication, and incest which the defendants' attorneys have warned the prospective jurors on whether Candy and Powers are guilty of first degree murder as charged.

Mossler was killed early June 30, 1964. His body was found on his dog's rubber sleeping mattress with 39 stab wounds and compound fractures of the skull in a Key Biscayne apartment. No murder weapon was found.

Percy Foreman, the Houston attorney who has finished questioning 12 men in the jury box but has not stated whether he has accepted them all, said he expected to have a jury selected by the end of the week. He said it could be sooner.

### Police In Hungary Jail 'Spy For U.S.'

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — Hungarian police have arrested a retired teacher on charges of military espionage for the United States, the Interior Ministry disclosed Sunday.

The accused, identified as Laszlo Asboth, was said to have been enlisted "by the American intelligence organs" during a "stay in the West."

The children, all from poor families, were en route from the coffee plantations of Sebastian and Candelaria, where they had been harvesting the crop.

The bus, of the Oaxaca-Pacific Line, careened 1,000 feet before crashing at the bottom of the canyon. Experts said the accident was due to a mechanical failure.

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# Texan Don Massengale Wins Crosby Crown

## TCU Grad Fires 70 For \$11,000

Victory Is First Major Win For 28-Year Old Jacksboro Native

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Texan Don Massengale conquered the monster Pebble Beach course Sunday with some great putting to capture his first major pro golf title in the \$104,500 Bing Crosby tournament with a two-under-par 70 and 283 total.

The 28-year-old Texas Christian University graduate raced out in front with four birdies and an eagle on his first nine holes and then stood off the challenges of Arnold Palmer, Al Geiberger and Billy Martindale to take the \$11,000 first prize.

Massengale, from Jacksboro, said he was unafraid of the 6,747-yard Pebble Beach layout and proved it.

The 190-pound Massengale dropped a 25-foot putt for his eagle on the 497-yard, par 5, second hole. He sank a 15-footer on the third and from 20 and 17 feet on the seventh and eighth to make the turn in 32 after one bogey when he missed the green at the fifth.

When he bogeyed three of the first five holes on the back nine, the race tightened and it wasn't until he dropped a birdie putt of four feet at 18 that he shut out Palmer, who finished second with a 284 after a 71. Arnie was one group behind and even though he birdied the 15th, 16th and 18th, his patented charge fell short.

Still, he collected the \$6,200 second prize.

**Geiberger Shoots 74**  
Geiberger, the leader after the first and third rounds, soared to a 76 and 285 total for third with Martindale of the Jacksonville, Tex., pro who had tied for second after the third round. Martindale carded a 73 for his final round on a warm, sunny day.

Chuck Courtney, who had only a 292 score, teamed with Dr. John L. Moler, a dentist from La Jolla, Calif., to win the pro-amateur title in a playoff. Dr. Moler scored a net 4 on the first extra hole to earn \$4,000 for his pro partner.

A throng of about 35,000 watched the finals, and many stayed for the playoff after Courtney and Dr. Moler tied with Martindale and San Francisco businessman Bob Roos with a net 253 for 72 holes.

The playoff victory came on the same 385-yard hole where Palmer had started his round with a double bogey 6 when he missed the green and then topped a chip shot.

**Out Of Bounds**  
Martindale's second shot went out of bounds and Courtney's hit a trap to leave the issue up to the amateurs.

Pebble Beach lived up to its monster reputation for several of the golfers, including 1965 leading money winner Jack Nicklaus, who took a nine on the final hole for a 76 and 295.

Doug Ford, who won here in 1962, soared to an 83 on his final round for a 305 total.

As the leaders holed out on the 16th, Massengale held only one stroke lead over Palmer, Martindale and Geiberger. Each parred the tricky 218-yard 17th.

## 500 MILE AUTO RACE

### Cool Dan Gurney Takes Fourth Straight Riverside Victory

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP)—A reeling race over the twisting 2.7-mile course ended in a three-way battle among three top drivers ended in victory Sunday for cool Dan Gurney in the \$77,000 Riverside-Motor Trend 500 mile stock car race.

The win brought Gurney \$20,000 of a head cold. His 1966 Ford 44 competitors finished the gu-

Turner then headed for the pits where his crew worked frantically to repair his car. He was lapped by the leader.

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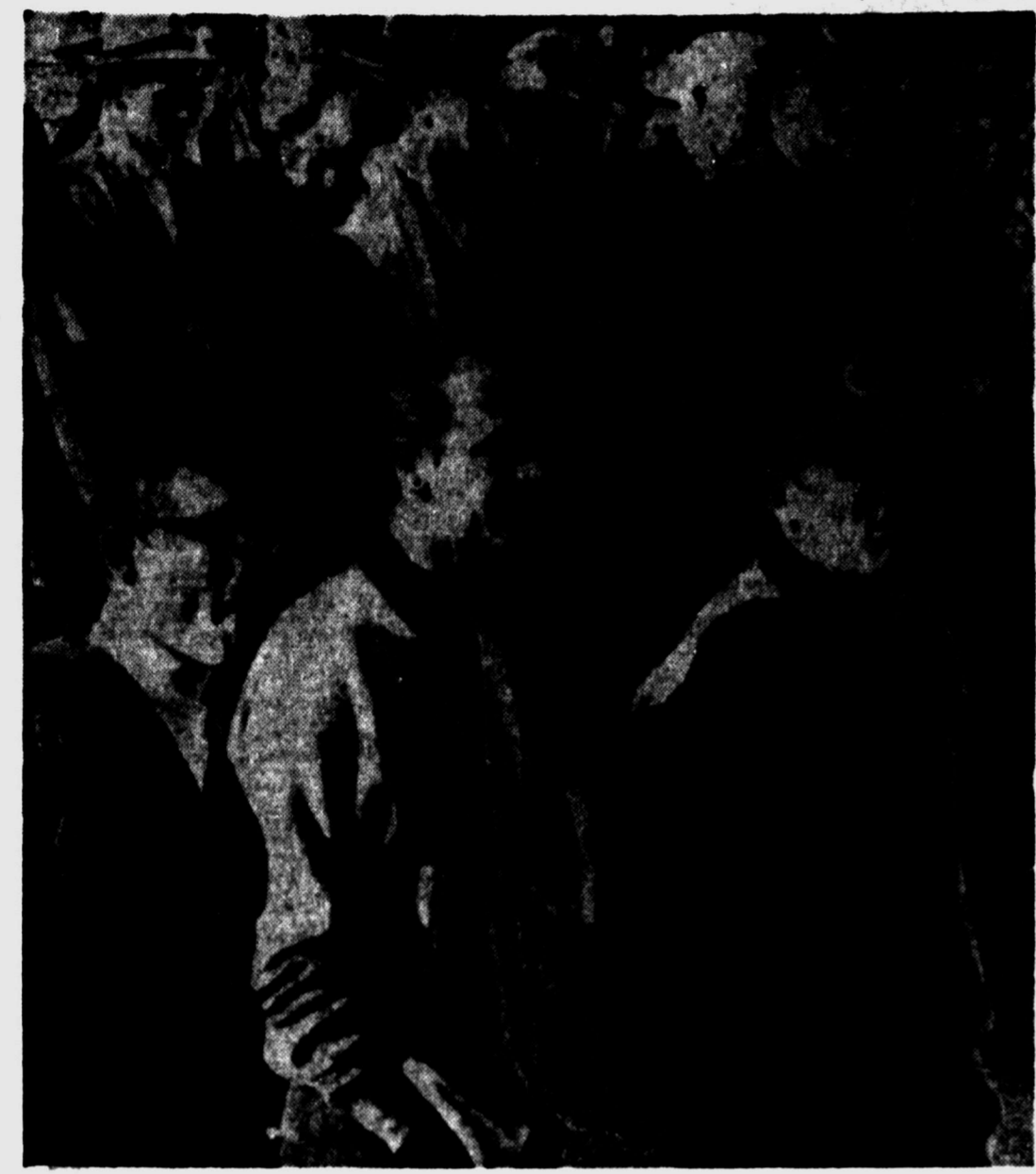

## Diamond Belt Is The Prize

**ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP)**—Chalk up another trophy and another record for baseball's amazing Sandy Koufax.

The 30-year-old left-handed pitcher star of the champion Los Angeles Dodgers was named winner Sunday of the S. Rae Hickok Professional Athlete of the Year award for 1965.

Koufax, also a winner in 1963, became the first to receive the \$10,000 diamond-studded belt twice since the competition was started in 1950.

The fastballer with the arthritic left elbow captured the valuable trophy by the largest margin and with the most first-place votes ever.

**Nett 363 Points**

Koufax was named first on 114 of the 146 ballots cast by a nationwide panel of sports writers and sportscasters. He collected 363 points on a basis of three points for a first-place vote, two for a second and one for a third.

South Africa's Gary Player, winner of the U.S. Open golf championship and many other titles was a trailing second with 14 first-place votes and 101 points. Jim Clark, the world auto driving champion from Scotland, was third with six first-place votes and 54 points.

Jack Nicklaus, of Columbus, Ohio, the winner of the Masters golf tourney, was fourth with three firsts and 47 points. Jim Brown, the great fullback of the Cleveland Browns of the National Football League, was fifth with one first and 42 points.

Then came Willie Mays of San Francisco, the National League's Most Valuable Player, 36; rookie sensation Gale Sayers of the Chicago Bears, 23; and heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay, 9.

**Winner Several Times**

Koufax has been named winner of numerous awards since he ended 1965 in a blaze of glory with two World Series victories over the Minnesota Twins. He won the Cy Young award as baseball's outstanding pitcher and was voted Male Athlete of the Year in The Associated Press' annual year-end poll.

In his 11th season, the Brooklyn native captured the pitching triple crown in the National League on win-loss percentage, 28-8, 765 earned run average, 2.04 and strikeouts, 382.

His strikeout total was a major league record, and he set another with his fourth no-hitter—a perfect game against the Chicago Cubs.
