## Soil control week recognized

The Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District has announced they will join in the national observance of Soil Stewardship Week. It will take place on May 27-June 3, 1984 according to an announcement by Joe Rawlings, chairman of the district board of directors.

The theme of this year's observance is "Conservation: A Common Commitment". This focus is especially appropriate as each one of us is dependent on water and related resources. Together we must work for the good of all to utilize, conserve and properly manage those resources in our care. Participation in Soil Stewardship Week activities offers an opportunity to reflect on the nation's natural renewable resource problems and consider actions to resolve them or reduce their impact.

The Coke County SWCD was organized in 1948 for the purpose of offering farmers, ranchers,

and local community leaders a voluntary conservation technical assistance program through which individuals could seek and request conservation assistance to meet their individual land's capabilities and needs.

"Basically, it is the district's responsibility to provide technical assistance when requested relative to proper soil use and treatment, erosion control practices, and assist farmers and ranchers with crop and rangeland management," said Rawlings.

Informative material on the Soil Stewardship Week theme each year is distributed through local conservation districts to churches interested in participating.

Information and materials for the 1984 observance of Soil Stewardship Week can be obtained in this area from the Soil Conservation office in Robert Lee.

## Casebearers can damage trees

Pecan growers in Coke County as well as homeowners with backyard trees need to be on the lookout for casebearers--those perennial pests that can completely destroy a pecan crop if not controlled.

Based on various prediction models as well as trappings and scouting reports, casebearers should be showing up on pecan trees in Coke County in the near future.

Normally, casebearers damage nuts within a two-week period--from the first week of May in southern and coastal areas to the first week of June in northern and western sections of the state.

To time spray applications for casebearer control, first check for eggs on a daily basis. Eggs are usually found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of the ball in a ball-point pen. The eggs are white when first laid, then turn red over a three-to-five day period before turning white again after hatching.

Apply an insecticide the third day after the first eggs hatch to kill the larvae before they enter the nutlets. Since the larvae will hatch over a week-long period or

more, a second spraying may be necessary.

For those of you who do not wish to inspect your trees daily, the predicted spray date for Coke County is May 31-June 7. Insecticide placed on the trees anytime during this period should control casebearers.

Twenty-four players and guests enjoyed a covered dish supper following the 9-hole tourney.

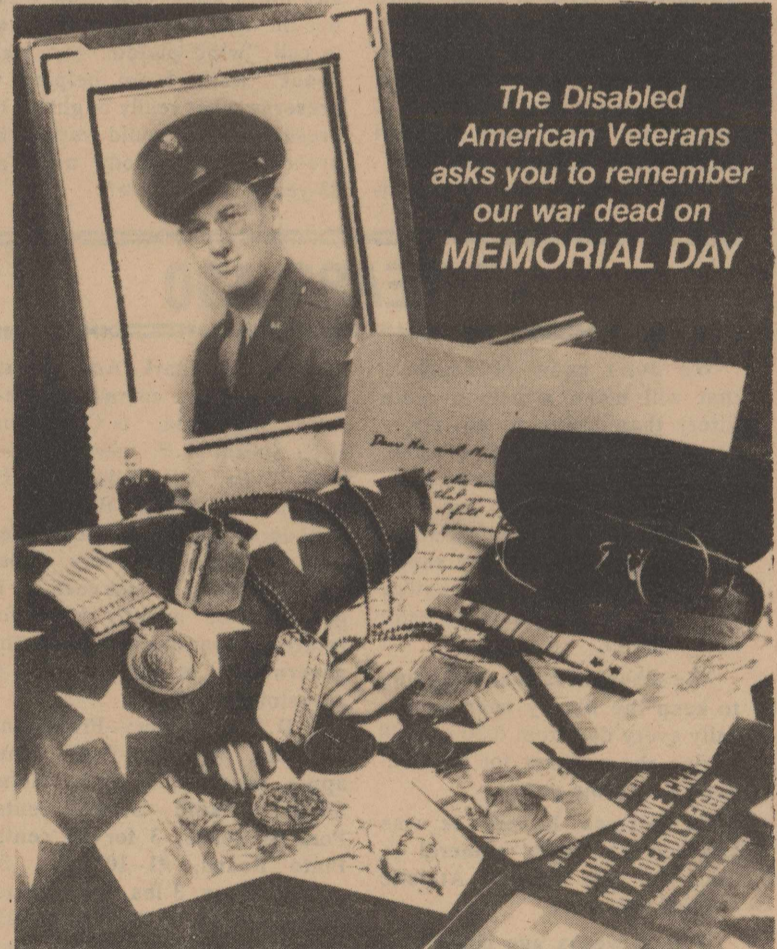
Treat-A-Weed was the sponsor for Sunday's ABC Tournament, when 40 golfers braved the heat to play.

## Sanco Meeting planned for June 9-10

For thirty summers, former Sanco residents and their relatives and friends from all over the country have thronged back to their old meeting grounds on Yellow Wolf Creek.

This year the time comes on Saturday and Sunday, June 9 and 10 under the big tabernacle.

The schedule is as usual for this 30th meeting. Saturday evening a meeting of those who want to get together a day early. There is usually singing in a vesper service with a free-for-all friendship time.

Sunday at 10:30, a program followed by a noon meal under the tabernacle. Meat is furnished by the Sanco Community Association or Sanco Village.

Ulmer Bird was long-time president of the group.

Several organizations came into existence during the life of the community. The first of these was the Sanco Cemetery Association, which was begun, died or ceased to function, and was reorganized in 1954. In 1924, when the annual camp meetings started under the pastorate of William E. Hawkins, the community built the tabernacle, which was the idea of the brush arbor developed. Then after I came here in the early fifties, and the church school property was vacant and running down, we contacted the school board, and they offered to sell it for some such nominal price, about \$10.00, I believe. So, we had three original organi-

zations, one owning a cemetery, one owning a tabernacle, and one owning a school house and four acres of land.

Understand, the organizations all had the same membership and they held all three meetings in one, but each of these owned land, and there was a strong chance that there would be problems arise sometime if the organizations were not all united. We elected the same trustees in each organization.

Our effort to combine all three finally worked out—we just formalized and got on paper what had been the case for years, with the same officers, the same members, in the same meetings.

Within these Sanco Village organizations, we have the three organizations, like merging three corporations, at the top, yet existing in the fact that each owns property.

It is rather a foggy thing to explain and I don't kick it around a lot. But if anybody wants me to explain it all, I will try to explain it, if he will bring along lunch for both of us, and sit down under a big mesquite tree.

I am well, but tired and beat, and don't know how long I can live on what the old timers used to call "wind puddin' and walk about" while I am helping to preserve what really ought to be preserved. I would rather be preaching. Anybody need an 83-year-old preacher?

## Care needed in driving tractor

Tractor safety is a serious matter, for violation of some basic operating rules could mean injury or even death.

All farm workers should be instructed in tractor safety when they first begin work and at least annually thereafter, says Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Nelson offers these guidelines for tractor safety:

- Securely fasten seatbelts if the tractor has a roll-over protective structure.
- Where possible, avoid operating the tractor near ditches, embankments and holes.
- Reduce speed when turning and crossing slopes, and on rough, slippery or muddy surfaces.
- Stay off slopes too steep for safe operation.
- Watch for dangers or obstacles, especially at row ends, on roads and around trees.
- allow no extra riders.
- Operate the tractor smoothly. No jerky turns, starts or stops.
- Hitch equipment only to the drawbar and hitch point recommended by the tractor manufacturer.
- When the tractor is stopped, set brakes securely and use the park lock if available.

With farm activity in full swing across Texas, now is a good time for farm workers to be instructed in basic tractor safety, says Nelson.

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## Exploitation of elderly targeted

The state's human resources commissioner has called on Texans to get involved in the prevention of widespread and growing abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly and disabled persons.

A 24-hour, toll-free hotline

(112-800-252-5400) has been established to receive reports of abuse to deter these acts and protect the victims, reported Marlin Johnston, commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

"The people of Texas need to

be aware that adult abuse exists, but more importantly, they need to be involved in its prevention," Johnston said. Department estimates indicate that more than 10,000 were victims of elder abuse last year.

The 1981 state legislature rec-

ognized the problem by making it mandatory for citizens to report suspected abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly persons. The department was given authority to investigate the reports. The law was amended in 1983 to include disabled adults.

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## SSI decision can be challenged

A person who wishes to appeal a decision on a Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) claim should make certain that the request is submitted within the specified time, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security district manager in San Angelo, said recently.

"If a request for a review is not submitted before the end of the time limit, the person may lose his or her right to that review and may not be eligible for the next step in the review process."

When the last day of a time limit falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or national holiday, the time limit

is extended to the next workday.

"A person may not want to take advantage of all the review steps," Upp said. "But, anyone who wants to do so must follow them in order."

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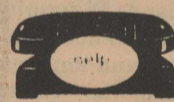

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## Stenholm co-sponsors savings tax-relief bill

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford) has announced his co-sponsorship and introduction of legislation to provide tax relief to low and middle-income families with passbook savings accounts and to help lower overall interest rates. The bill is titled, "The American Passbook Savings Act."

This bill, introduced by Congressman W.J. "Billy" Tauzin (D-La.), Stenholm, and 54 other members of both parties in the U.S. House of Representatives, would exempt from federal income taxation the first \$5,000 (\$10,000 on a joint return) of interest earned on "traditional passbook" savings accounts paying up to 6 percent interest.

"This bill will accomplish three very important things," Stenholm said. "First, it will ease the tax burden on the average family that manages to save a little. Second, by reducing the cost of money that is the source of mortgages and other loans, it will help bring down interest rates. Third, by attracting more money into savings accounts, it will make more money available for the capital investments needed to maintain our country's economic recovery.

"For years," Stenholm said, "our tax laws have encouraged everyone, including the government, to go into debt. Rewarding people for saving for a change, while bringing down the general level of interest rates at the same time, will be a shot in the arm for the entire economy.

"The 'American Dream' of

owning your own home will stay just that -- a dream--unless we can bring mortgage rates down from the 13 to 15 percent range."

At a Washington, D.C. press conference called recently to announce introduction of the bill, its Congressional sponsors pointed out that, currently, only a

relatively few persons can make investments large enough to obtain tax-free status or high interest rates. They noted that the American Passbook Savings Act would, if passed, give this same opportunity to small savers and families of modest to moderate means.

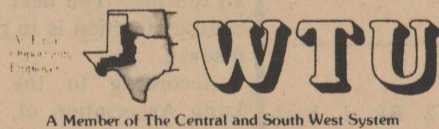

## Emphysema surfaces slowly

Emphysema, a disease afflicting more than 1.3 million Americans, usually does not appear until middle age. The symptoms do not manifest themselves until after extensive damage has occurred and is seldom seen in non-smokers.

Emphysema causes permanent damage to the lungs, cutting down the amount of surface air available for transporting oxygen to the blood. Its major symptom is shortness of breath, which becomes worse as more lung tissue is damaged. Emphysema places such demands on the heart that death often comes from heart failure.

Although treatment can sometimes help relieve discomfort, damage which has already taken place cannot be reversed. The treatment for emphysema is complicated; machines, medicine, special exercise, tubes, and frequent trips to the hospital are all routine. The best solution or course of action is to prevent the disease.

## Insanity defense draws criticism

An overwhelming majority of Texans disapprove of the use of insanity as a defense in criminal trials, according to a state-wide poll results released today by Senator J.E. "Buster" Brown and Richard Collins of ATAC (Associated Texans Against Crime).

The poll of 605 adult Texans was commissioned by ATAC and conducted by Arthur J. Finkelshtein and Associates, a nationally recognized polling firm. It is accurate to within plus or minus 4 percent at the 95 percent confidence level.

The Texans surveyed were asked if they approve or disapprove of the use of insanity as a defense in criminal trials. "Over 72 percent said they disapproved of insanity as a criminal defense, while only 17.7 percent approved," Brown, who serves as ATAC's chairman, said.

### IN OPEN COUNTRY

If there is not time to find a suitable inside shelter, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

**Keep Listening--**Your radio, television and NOAA Weather Radio Stations will broadcast the latest National Weather Service tornado watches and warnings an inform you when the danger is over.

**Watch the sky--**Tornadoes come and go so quickly there may not be time for a warning. During a tornado watch, be alert for sudden appearance of violent wind, rain, hail, or funnel-shaped cloud. When in doubt, take cover. Tornadoes are often obscured by rain or dust. Some occur at night and are difficult to detect.

downs to prevent overturning will minimize damage. A warden should be appointed in mobile home parks to scan the skies and listen to radio and television for warning. There should be a designated community shelter where residents can assemble during a tornado warning. If there is no such shelter, do not stay in a mobile home during a tornado warning. Seek refuge in a sturdy building or a ditch, culvert or ravine.

**In Schools--**Follow advance plans to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Try to avoid hallways that open to the south or west. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums or other structures with wide freestanding roofs. If a building is not of reinforced construction, go quickly to a nearby reinforced building, or a ravine or open ditch and lie flat.

# Follow safety rules in tornado and live

[Editor's Note: These rules are presented by the National Weather Service.]

When a tornado approaches, your immediate action may mean life or death.

Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado cellar, underground excavation, or a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial construction. Stay away from windows! Also, do not attempt to outride the tornado in your automobile! You are much safer in a reinforced building or at home than in your vehicle.

### IN CITIES OR TOWNS

**In office buildings--**Go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, or to the designated shelter area.

**In factories--**Workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with advance plans. Plant managers should consult with Civil Defense and plant engineering personnel to locate the safest possible shelter areas.

**In Shopping Centers and Malls--**Go to a designated shelter area, NOT your parked car!

**In homes--**The basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Recent research indicates that it is not necessary to open windows and doors...stay away from them!

**Mobile homes--**Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to destructive winds. Proper tie-
